



# Rahway Geriatrics Center opens its heart to city's grandmothers and grandfathers

For Loretta Coogan, 88, of Rahway, moving into the newly-opened Rahway Geriatrics Center was almost like remaining in her home. Mrs. Coogan, the first person to move into the 120-bed facility, has lived in Rahway all of her life and says she never would have considered going into a nursing home if it hadn't opened up in her own neighborhood.

"I lived right around the corner from here for 59 years," she says, "and there was no way I was going to leave this city. Everyone here is so friendly I felt right at home immediately."

According to Frank Crue, the president of the Board of Directors of the center, that's what the center is all about.

"It was our aim to provide a facility for the elderly in the area that would be staffed with caring friends, not just workers—and that would offer a home-like environment. We feel we have succeeded," he added.

With the arrival of the first patients on Nov. 30 the members of the Board of

Directors were able to see the culmination of their many months of planning and preparation.

These board members serve without any compensation, except for the personal satisfaction of knowing they have helped provide an exemplary residential health care facility for the area's elderly residents, reports a spokesman.

Other members of the board are James Daly, Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin, Joseph McGrath, Joseph Salay, Ruby Scott and Rahway Third Ward Councilman Max Sheld.

The nursing home provides three types of service: Nursing care, personal care and residential services in a protective environment that offers a social life and recreational programs, as well as rehabilitative, dental, podiatry, psychological, dietary, laboratory and pharmaceutical services.

Each day the center's calendar is filled with various activities for residents to enjoy such as discussion groups, slide

shows, poetry seminars, arts and crafts and dancing.

Carol Hermanski, a registered nurse, and the director of nursing, stresses it is important for the residents to really feel at home here.

"We have hand-picked what we feel is a professional, concerned, caring staff. The center's theme is 'Friends caring for and in service to friends' and we expect all of our staff members to be committed to that outlook," she added.

When it is fully completed, the \$7.4 million center, located at the intersection of E. Grand Ave. and Lawrence and Monroe Sts., will combine the nursing and day-care facilities with 40 units of congregate housing.

The center staff has been working in close cooperation with Rahway Hospital, drawing on the hospital's expertise for many facets of the operation.

"We have worked with the hospital right from the beginning," according to Mr. Crue, "and this has proven to be very beneficial. The hospital provides services to us and we can also make sure we aren't duplicating health-care services."

can cause resentment and tension in the home. By offering supervised day care, the center can give families a place to send their loved one for the day, confident he or she is in good hands. They can then fulfill their obligations to their employer or family without feeling guilty.

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Mr. Crue feels Rahway residents can be proud of this new facility.

"A lot of people have worked hard to make sure the Rahway Geriatrics Center is a warm, caring place," he noted.

Mrs. Coogan would be the first one to agree they've succeeded. Sporting a corsage that some of the aides had purchased for her in honor of her being the first resident, she told how on her first night there her foot was giving her a lot of pain and trouble.

"If I'd have been at home, I would have been up all night, in pain and worried to death," she says. "Instead, here I had three nurses come to help me and I was able to sleep for the rest of the night."

That's what the Rahway Geriatrics Center is all about—caring professionals being there when needed, concluded the Board of Directors president.

## Safety unit continues its 'Hot Tips'

At the December meeting of the Rahway Safety Council with Louis R. Rizzo presiding, the following members were elected to serve as officers who will govern the council during 1984: President, Mr. Rizzo; vice president, Arthur Wheaton; secretary, Frederick A. Grimaldi; treasurer, William M. Fee; assistant secretary, Andrew Marino and trustees, Mr. Fee, Herbert H. Kiehn and Frank G. Resse.

The installation of the officers will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 10, 1984, at the council's 43rd Annual Dinner at Aliperti's Restaurant on Raritan Rd., Clark, at 7:30 o'clock.

The Council will also be celebrating its 58th year of continuous service to Rahway.

Continuing "Hot Tips" for cold weather drivers, a council spokesman submitted the following hints for safety:

• **Fog, rain and snow are spoilers:** Weather conditions affect your ability to see and be seen. They can make the road slippery and reduce your ability to start, stop and turn. Fog, rain and snow all limit your visibility to varying degrees. For best visibility under any of

these conditions, use low-beam headlights. The high beams will reflect off the water vapor and make it harder to see.

• **Three things to do when blinded:** Avoid the temptation to get back at a driver who fails to switch to low beams when approaching and bears down on you with blinding high beams. Sure it would be nice to give drivers like that a taste of their own medicine, but the defensive way to go is to (1) switch your lights to low beam, (2) reduce speed and (3) look to the right edge of the pavement as a guide until the danger is passed.

• **What to do when you slide on water:** When water on the road surface is deeper than the tread of your tire, hydroplaning (riding on a layer of water) can occur. You can test for hydroplaning conditions by looking to see if the car ahead is leaving tracks on the road. If there aren't any, look out. Reduce speed immediately to prevent hydroplaning.

• **Seven dangerous distractions:** At the same time you must be on the defensive against these seven concentration destroyers: Alcohol, daydreaming, distractions, fatigue, anger, frustration like in a slow-

moving traffic tieup and stress.

• **Finally, if you drive don't drink if you drink don't drive:**

Sgt. Dennis O'Day, who serves as liaison to the council from the Rahway Police Dept., briefed the council on the new traffic laws in effect in the state: (1) Car lights must be on at dawn and at all times during inclement weather. Also they must be on at dusk and in foggy conditions. Regular beams, not low beams. This law went into effect during April. Sgt. O'Day pointed out under the child-restraint laws the following must be adhered to by parents riding with children in their cars: (1) A federally-approved child-restraint seat must be used for all children under 18 months of age. (2) Children of 18 months of age to five years of age must be strapped in properly with seat belts. (3) Vehicles carrying more children than available seat belts must have the children placed in the back seat. (4) The worst and most dangerous place to have a child is in a mother's lap on the front seat.

The council spokesman cautioned all parents these child-restraint laws are being strictly enforced by local police and the state police.

## Council delays fire-pact okay

A resolution which would have authorized the mayor and city clerk to enter into a labor agreement with the Rahway local of the Firemen's Mutual Beneficial Assn. was withdrawn by the administration at the Dec. 21 special meeting of the Rahway City Council to allow for further negotiations.

The Council authorized the awarding of a contract for Workers Compensation Insurance to the Rasmussen Agency of East Orange.

Also approved was the transfer of \$601 from the recreation department's salary-and-wage account in the 1983 municipal budget to accounts for salaries and wages for the department of assessments and for the office of emergency management.

Agreed to by the council was the anticipation of \$21,831.54 in the 1984 budget because of reimbursement from the state for lighting costs for facilities the city maintains for the state along state highways which bisect the city.

The Governing Body also authorized the cancellation of \$34,135.76 in current-fund appropriation balances in the 1983 budget.

Also cancelled were \$33,960 in 1983 water-operation fund appropriation balances.

The pre-meeting conference of the Council for January was changed from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 1984.

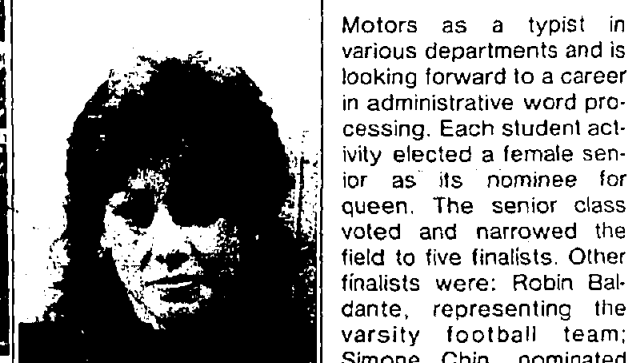

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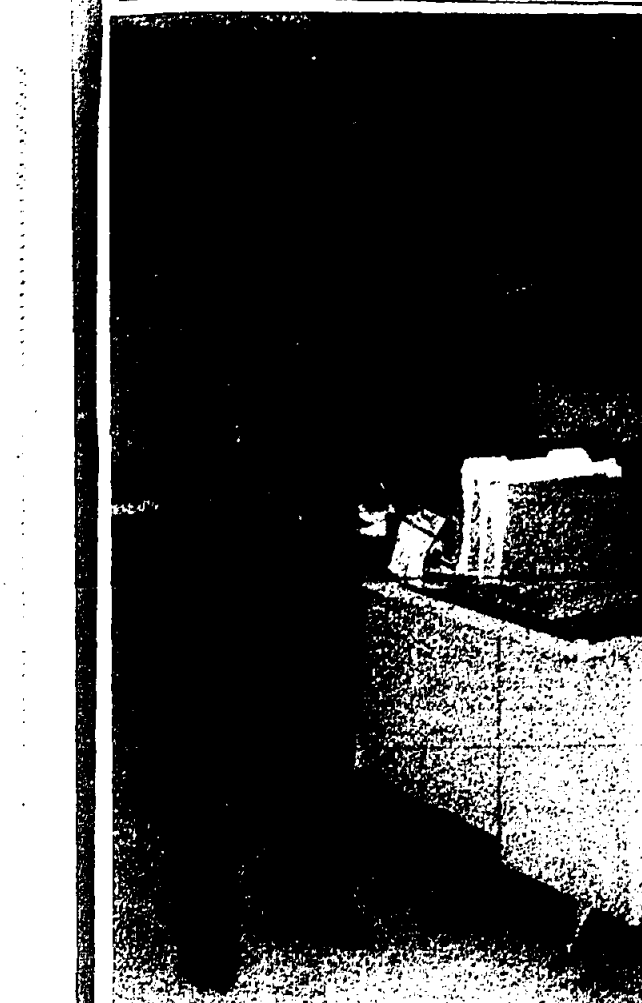

## Telephone bill rings in new year's changes

In preparation for divergence from AT&T on Sunday, Jan. 1, 1984, New Jersey Bell is making a redesigned telephone bill this month to its three million residence and business customers.

The new bill is divided into three primary sections. One part lists current charges for local service and toll calls within New Jersey Bell's serving areas.

Another section lists current charges for leased telephone equipment. Beginning on Jan. 1, leased telephone bills will be provided by AT&T Information Systems.

The third part lists current charges for long-distance calls made outside of New Jersey Bell's serving areas, provided by AT&T Communications.

If a person owns his or her telephone there will be no billing from AT&T. One will receive a bill from New Jersey Bell. A summary of all current charges and the total amount due will appear on the first page of the bill.

Carriers such as MCI or Sprint will continue to get one bill and will make one payment to New Jersey Bell. A summary of all current charges and the total amount due will appear on the first page of the bill.

Subsequent pages of the new bill will list details of other charges and credits such as changes in service or repairs, if any, by New Jersey Bell or AT&T Communications.

There will also be pages that list details of toll calls, if any, provided by New Jersey Bell or AT&T Communications.

The average bill is expected to be about 20 percent higher than the current bill. Coincidental with the Jan. 1 divestiture New Jersey Bell will be divided into three serving areas. One will cover the 201 area code and there will be two in the 609 area code.
