## Hospital consortium teaches critical care

The Alliance for Health Care, Inc., a consortium consisting of John F. Kennedy Medical Center, Mulhern Hospital, Perth Amboy General Hospital and Old Bridge Regional Hospital, is offering a critical care course for registered professional nurses. The course is approved by the New Jersey State Nurses Assn. for 12.5 contact hours.

## Hospitalized veterans need your help

The nation will salute its hospitalized veterans during the week of Feb. 14 and a spokesman for the Veterans Administration invited citizens nationwide to visit the nearly 50,000 patients in the VA's medical facilities.

The VA, which administers veterans medical and benefits programs, has encouraged an effort to encourage Americans of all ages to serve at hospital volunteers year-round.

Over 50 national volunteer groups and veterans organizations have joined in the effort.

With the First Lady, Mrs. Nancy Reagan, as the honorary patron, and Harry Morgan, the star of "AfterMASH," as the honorary chairman, the program's theme is "Nothing burns like being forgotten—Nothing helps like being remembered."

In addition to honoring our veterans and volunteers," said VA administrator, Harry N. Walters, "this is an opportunity for us to share with the public the professional excellence of the VA's health care system which is the nation's largest."

The VA system includes 172 medical centers, 16 dispensaries and 59 training hospitals throughout the country.

**Mr. Walters noted,** "Volunteerism is critical to the quality of care provided to those who have served their country in time of need."

During fiscal year 1983, 79,000 volunteers provided 11.9 million hours of service to hospitalized veterans. The value of their participation, based on the generally accepted average value of \$6.50 per hour, would be \$77.2 million. Volunteers also generated \$10 million dollars in donations.

Volunteers are involved in everything from patient care and recreation to administration and transportation assistance.

Examples of volunteer services range from helping with supervised youth groups from pre-school to junior high school in one-to-one "adopted grandparent" activity.

Because of the rising age level of the veteran population, there is a growing emphasis on geriatrics and services for the terminally ill and their families.

The groups supporting the drive to get more volunteers are members of the VA Voluntary Service's National Advisory Committee. In addition to major veterans groups they include organizations such as the Red Cross, the American Assn. of Retired Persons, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and the Salvation Army.

About 60% of all VA volunteers are affiliated with a group or organization, ranging from very large national ones to local clubs and churches. Those without organizational affiliation are recruited by VA staff members.

### Merck promotes Dr. Scolnick

Named the senior vice president of the Merck Sharp and Dohme Research Laboratories (MSDRL) Division of Merck and Co., Inc., headquartered in Rahway, was Dr. Edward M. Scolnick.

A leader in oncogene research at the National Cancer Institute before he joined Merck in 1982, Dr. Scolnick served as the vice president of virus and cell biology research in West Point, Pa., since June, 1983.

In his new position, Dr. Scolnick is responsible for the research phase of Merck's total research and development activity. He will oversee basic research activities at 13 Merck facilities worldwide.

Areas under his direction will include immunology, inflammatory diseases, molecular biology, pharmacology, chemistry, biotechnology, membrane and arthritis research, microbiology, agricultural research, new drug delivery systems and safety assessment.

He will continue to direct virus and cell biology research as the acting head.

Approximately 1,350 persons are employed at the MSDRL headquarters facility in Rahway, there are about 1,000 employees at West Point, Pa., where the company's second major research installation is located.

"Dr. Scolnick's keen research mind and his leadership abilities have been demonstrated in his pivotal work in the discovery of the significance of oncogenes in their relationship to human cancer," said MSDRL president, E. Roy Vogel, in his announcement of the promotion. "In the short time he has been at Merck after his brilliant initial work at the National Cancer Institute, he has become the head of the genetics section in 1971 and the chief of the Laboratory of Tumor Virus Genetics in 1975."

While at the National Cancer Institute, Dr. Scolnick's research, demonstrating the cellular origin of sarcoma virus oncogenes in mammals and defined specific genes that are implicated in human malignancy disease.
