

## Expansion poses major challenge for hospital

In his recent annual report to the Rahway Hospital Board of Governors Gordon Harris, the chairman of the board, noted 1983 was a very challenging year.

The hospital felt the impact of national and regional health care trends and had to react appropriately to external influences, Mr. Harris noted.

Last year the hospital secured authorization to build and also received approval to issue the bonds for its Expansion and Modernization '80's Program (having received an "A" rating from Standard and Poor's Corp. and Moody's Investors Service.)

Due to favorable interest rates secured for the expansion program the total cost of the construction project was changed to \$43 million instead of the projected \$48 million, the board chairman pointed out.

The community fund drive got underway last year and was helped by two exceptional gifts. One from the Auxiliary for \$300,000 and the other from Merck and Co., Inc. of Rahway for \$120,000. By the end of 1983 the fund drive's over \$2 million goal was in sight.

Actual physical progress on the expansion program included construction of a

new physicians' parking lot, installation of a new central oxygen tank, partial installation of the storm sewage system, excavation for the new environmental control center and the eastern extension and receipt of bids for the mechanical and electrical contracts, Mr. Harris explained.

In 1983 Rahway Hospital felt the effects of four years on the Diagnostic Related Groups (DRG) system for reimbursement. This prospective pricing system groups patients by diagnosis, establishes length-of-stay ranges, pays hospitals for each patient's care according to diagnosis and determines payment rates for each diagnosis in advance of admission.

The most dramatic effect of the DRG system shows up in the statistics for number of patient days. Over the past few years the total number of patients per year has remained fairly stable, but the total number of patient days has dropped.

In 1981 it was 96,848; in 1982 it was 94,231, and by 1983 patient days had dropped to 91,355, the chairman pointed out.

"It has taken time for everyone to understand the system," according to Mr. Harris. "Last year many physicians were finally con-

vinced by statistical evidence the quality of patient care is not compromised by judicious use of services."

One way Rahway Hospital made good use of its resources and worked to contain costs was by its membership in the Alliance for Health Care.

Last September, this consortium, which includes the John F. Kennedy Medical Center in Edison, Muhlenberg Hospital in Plainfield and the Raritan Bay Medical Center (Perth Amboy and Old Bridge Regional Hospitals), opened a distribution center in Raritan Center which has reduced costs for all the hospitals involved. In addition, Rahway Hospital's storeroom re-located there to make room for construction, he noted.

Other alliance programs include a critical-care course for registered nurses which is offered at each hospital once a year and a personal-emergency response system which is scheduled to start the hospital during 1983 and one that has remained a major issue is parking.

"In order to fulfill a mandate from the city of Rahway for 650 parking spaces by the end of the construction program," Mr. Harris stated, "we have been exploring ways to use proper-

## Merck breaks ground for research

New Jersey Gov. Thomas H. Kean together with Merck and Co., Inc. of Rahway officials on March 1 broke ground for a new basic research building that Merck is adding to its corporate headquarters complex in the city.

When completed in about three years the highly specialized facility will be dedicated to research in microbiology, genetics, recombinant technology and synthetic and process chemistry. The 263,000-square-foot building and its scientific instrumentation will represent an investment by the health products company of more than \$80 million. More than 300 researchers will work in the new facility, reports a Merck spokesman.



### Good Tax Records Equal Easier Return Preparation

Keeping accurate and complete tax records makes tax return preparation easier, the Internal Revenue Service advises.

You should keep the necessary records to prepare a complete and accurate income tax return. Generally, you should keep records for as long as the contents may be needed to administer any Internal Revenue law.

Records that support an item of income or a deduction should be kept until the statute of limitations for the return expires generally three years from the date the return was filed, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later.

Other records that concern income-averaging or property transactions—such as a home, for example—should be kept for as long as they are material.

Copies of tax returns filed should be kept even after the cancelled checks, receipts and other records are disposed of since they may be helpful in preparing future returns. You should keep them for at least three years to conform to the statute of limitations. If you are considering income averaging you will need your records for the past four years.

Additional information on maintaining records is contained in IRS Publication 552, *Recordkeeping for Individuals and a List of Tax Publications*, available free by using the mail-order form on your tax package.

### Allow 10 Weeks For Refund Checks

Taxpayers filing their 1983 federal income tax returns and claiming refund should wait at least 10 weeks to contact the Internal Revenue Service about their refund, the IRS says.

Generally, taxpayers who file their returns early in the year may receive their refund within 10 weeks. However, the return was incorrect in some manner, according to the IRS. The return expires generally three years from the date the return was filed, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later.

High blood pressure, or hypertension, can be a "silent" killer because there are no symptoms for it. Dizziness and headaches, often thought to be a result of high blood pressure, are actually unrelated to it. The only way to tell for sure if you suffer from it is to have your pressure checked regularly, reports a hospital spokesman.

As your heart beats, your blood pushes against your blood vessels. When this push is too great, high blood pressure results. This can cause a stroke, heart disease or kidney disease, the spokesman added.

## Facelift for the arts II

In an action that reflects the recent groundswell of support for restoration of the Old Rahway Theatre Merck and Co., Inc., one of the nation's largest pharmaceutical firms and this city's largest employer, has agreed to fund a marketing study of the theatre as a county arts center.

Joseph Wesley Zeigler, who has been closely associated with the New Brunswick Cultural Center project, will conduct the study for Rahway Landmarks, the non-profit corporation which hopes to acquire and restore the now-closed facility on Irving St. in downtown Rahway.

The study will concentrate on determining who represents the primary market for arts events in Union County, what mix of arts and other community events would be appropriate and what it will cost to operate the facility. It will involve multi-media surveys together with analyses of population statistics and the results of similar studies in other communities.

Rahway Landmarks volunteers will participate in the survey work and the proposed in the computer center at Montclair State College will tabulate the results. Mr. Zeigler intends to complete the study by mid-June.

Meanwhile, action has been taken to extend Rahway Landmarks' purchase option on the theatre from the present March 4 deadline to Wednesday, July 4. This will provide time to complete the marketing study and to raise the approximately \$85,000 balance still needed to purchase the theatre. (To date, approximately \$90,000 has been raised in a combination of cash donations and interest-free loans. The full purchase price is \$175,000.)

Eric Ricks, the Rahway Landmarks funding coordinator, cautioned the extension does not mean fundraising efforts can be relaxed.

"In fact, just the opposite," he warned. "We now have only four months in which to raise roughly the same amount it has taken us a year to raise so far."

As for the Zeigler study, Mr. Ricks pointed out previous studies have already indicated the theatre can be operated successfully as an arts center.

"But," he added, "before we can expect to be funded by major corporations and foundations, we have got to be able to define more clearly how the arts center will be operated and the opportunities it offers."

"The study proposed is really a definition of exactly what the Rahway Theatre can and should be and of how it can then best serve the Union County community."

The following people have responded to our plea and our hopes for the Union County Arts Center are now becoming a reality. We'd also like to thank those people whose donations were received long before our plea effort was made. The list below does not include prior donations, without which this project would not exist.


