# Six contenders give city voters wide choice; school tax levy totals \$9,321,487

By R. R. Faszczewski For the first time in recent memory Rahway vot ers will have twice as many candidates as there are posi tions open to cast ballots for in Tuesday's Board of Edu-

Six candidates have filed for the three, three-year terms open this year.

Also on the ballot will be figures for the support of the \$14,148,362 school

The tax figures-those which will actually be before the voters-are \$8,878,801 to be raised in support of current expense and \$442,786 in support of capital outlay.

Among the candidates, only two incumbents, Rick Proctor of 628 Bryant St., and William Hoodzow of 181 W. Scott Ave., will be running.

There are hundreds of other instances in varying degrees of severity affecting unities throughout the country. The situation in Warren Township points up the ousness of the danger posed to our ground-water supplies by old underground storage tanks. Unless action is taken to clean up the problem the experience in Warren could be repeated in numerous other communities. The

> toll on the environment would be heavy and the cost of the cleanup to the taxpayers could be staggering. It is estimated there are 1.4 million undergroun gasoline storage tanks in the country. About 85% are made of steel, have no corrosion protection and are more than 20 years old. Experts have estimated that 75,000 to

> 100,000 of these tanks may already leak and as many as 350,000 could spring leaks within the next five years. The consequences could be severe. To head off this developing crisis, I have sponsored legislation to regulate underground tanks and permit the use of Superfund money to include the cleanup of hazardous substances that leak from buried containers.

> Basically, the bill would give the Environmental Pro

tection Agency (EPA) the go-ahead to move in and mop the pollution from these leaks.

The EPA also would be authorized to provide alternate water supplies, temporary evacuation and housing for individuals affected by a leak.
