

Six contenders give city voters wide choice; school tax levy totals \$9,321,487

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Running for his third term on the school body, Mr. Proctor was first elected in 1978 and served as the Board vice president in

1980 and 1981. He is currently the director of health and human services for Bloomfield. He is a graduate of Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va.

He is a collegiate baseball officer and has served as the vice president of the sidelines, booster of sports in Rahway, and a director of the Rahway High School Hall of Fame.

The four newcomers seeking seats on the education body are William A. Ulrich of 670 W. Hazelwood Ave., Audrey A. Coleman of 927 Midwood Dr., Jerry L. Coleman of 1761 Park St. and Sheila Huxford of 2118 Lufberry St.

Mr. Ulrich is presently an account executive with the New Jersey Bell Telephone Co. He is married to the former Miss Therese DeSurrey and they have three children, twin daughters, Carly and Kristy Ulrich, three years old, and a son, Justin Ulrich, 17 months old. The candidate is a graduate of Seton Hall University in South Orange and he has been employed in the business communications industry for the past 12 years.

He has become a member of the Rahway Chamber of Commerce and serves as the chairman of both the budget and finance committees and the community relations committee.

Mrs. Coleman is a graduate of Rahway High School. She has been the president of the Rosary Society at St. Mary's R. C. Church of Rahway and the president of the Rahway Junior Service League.

Mr. Coleman is a 1975 graduate of Montclair State College in Upper Montclair with a bachelor of science degree in business administration and professional accounting. The founder and former president of the college's Black Alumni Assn., he is a co-founder and the former president of the Union County Fair Housing Council.

The candidate is also the founder and president of the Union County Black Athletic Assn., a former adjunct professor for African American Studies at Seton Hall, a former fiscal officer for the Union County Community Development Program, a 1981 independent candidate for Union County treasurer, a member of

the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, a member of the Assn. for the Study of African-American life and history and the co-founder and the former president of the Union County Senior Citizens Service Corp.

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The candidate is presently on the committee for a possible four-year high school plan. She is employed as a marketing specialist by the Marketing System, Inc.

There are approximately 13,044 registered voters in Rahway.

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Yergaloni becomes Indians' chief

The Board of Education on March 19 appointed Edward Yergaloni, a former Rahway resident and school employee, as the head football coach for Rahway High School as well as a physical education and health teacher for the remainder of the 1983-1984 school year.

Mr. Yergaloni replaces Mike Prunko who was found in violation of Board Policy by the Board.

Subsequently the school body posted the position of head football coach on Dec. 12 of last year.

Two Board members, Barry Henderson and Elizabeth Jacobs, abstained during the motion to appoint Mr. Yergaloni as an instructor within the school system.

Mr. Henderson was quick to point out his refraining from the vote was in now way a reflection on the new football coach.

He said he believed the position of a physical education and health teacher should not be created at this time.

The Board member noted Mr. Yergaloni had been on the staff before and had only success as Division High School by bringing the team to the state championship. He explained Mr. Yergaloni was "most qualified and highly recommended."

Mrs. Jacobs echoed Mr. Henderson's sentiments by saying the vote should be a part of the coaching

staff. She believed he would be excellent in the district.

The new mentor is scheduled to begin teaching at the high school effective on Sunday, April 1. He will earn \$18,455, prorated, per year as an instructor and \$3,367 as a coach for extra athletic services compensation.

He played football for William and Mary College in Virginia and served as a line coach at the University of Cincinnati. The Rahway High School graduate was an assistant coach at Rahway under Mr. Prunko for two years.

For the past three years Rahway's new football coach successfully guided the Dunellen Destroyers and he took them, for the first time, to the state championship playoffs.

Mr. Yergaloni is an Iselin resident.

• Appointed Robert Van Bergen as the coach of the boys' intramurals at Rahway Junior High School effective on Feb. 28.

• Named William Roach as the volleyball coach for the 1983-1984 school year as well as the junior varsity softball coach at the extra athletic services compensation of \$1,530.

• Appointed Miss Lee Ann De Lorenzo as the volleyball coach for the 1983-1984 school year at the extra athletic services compensation of \$258, per

ding approval of the county superintendent of schools.

• Awarded contracts to the following qualified low bidders for renovations at the girls' bathroom facilities at the high school: Star Industries, general construction, \$60,000; Arthur J. Murphy and Sons, plumbing, \$19,900, and Allied Conditioning Corp., heating, ventilating and electrical, \$14,827.

• Approved a motion to contract with Cedar Hill, Inc. to renovate the baseball field at Veterans Field at a maximum cost of \$4,300.

• Reduced the number of department chairmen from 12 to 11 for the 1984-1985 school year.

• Changed two department chairmen's positions for the 1984-1985 school year. The Board voted to create and post these positions to include responsibilities for grades seven to 12: in physical education and health and science.

• Accepted the retirement resignation of Miss Ruth Brown, the department chairwoman of English and foreign language at the high school.

• Approved a five-year lease/purchase agreement with Xerox Corp. for a Xerox 8200 copier at a cost of \$673.37 per month.

• Appointed Mrs. Ann Brodsky to teach second grade in the Adult Basic Education Program for the remainder of the year at the salary level of \$12,000.

City to distribute cheese to needy

Also eligible are a single-member household with

\$8,991 in income; two members, \$12,099; three members, \$15,207; four members, \$18,315; five members, \$21,423; six members, \$24,531; seven members, \$27,639; and eight members, \$30,747.

The income-eligibility criteria for persons 65 or over are one (single person) \$12,000 and for two (a married couple) \$15,000. No one will receive cheese without proof of eligibility if they did not register an application in November, 1983.

Those seeking cheese are asked to bring a sturdy bag.



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

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Legion unit president highlights national confab

At the American Legion Auxiliary Union County meeting on March 15, President, Mrs. Arthur Simmons, gave highlights of the American Legion Auxiliary National Assembly held from Feb. 29 to March 3 at the Washington Hilton Hotel in Washington, D.C. National president, Anna Gear, presided at the national conference.

The national session opened with Robert Lynch, the director of the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Division of the American Legion, who said the Washington headquarters was erected in 1950 and was seven stories high and housed four important national divisions.

The chief function of the Washington office is to represent the division in Congress, oversee the division's facilities across the country, provide oversight in observing what the Veterans Administration does in regard to American Legion services, insure one-on-one service to veterans and their families, coordinate services and discharges reviewed or corrected.

Mr. Lynch gave an appeal for the Auxiliary to continue its help in these areas, especially in hospital services.

James Bourke, the director of economic, spoke about the unemployment of Vietnam veterans and the work done in community service in helping these men and women return to being active citizens.

The director of juvenile justice and delinquency prevention, Alfred Stregney, gave a report on victimized children, runaways and homeless children. It was stated communities must be made aware of the problems and take an active part in helping.

Another orientation session dealt with "The Legion of Political Awareness in Social Programs for 1983."

On March 1, the Legion provided for a pilgrimage to the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery. The Auxiliary members observed the changing of the guard and the placing of a wreath by Anna Gear.

Arriving back at the Hilton Hotel, approximately 600 Auxiliary members were honored by the presence of President Ronald Reagan in the International Ballroom.

President Reagan spoke on the national budget, unemployment, the foreign

front and deployment. He also spoke about his admiration for the economic and social achievements. On crime and drugs Mr. Reagan said state and local officials are working together to combat this problem. He commended the Auxiliary for the fine work it is doing and its interest in the veterans and their families.

President Reagan was presented with the National Presidents Commemorative Plaque by the Auxiliary's national president.

At 2:30 p.m., the participants were addressed by Lt. Robert Goodman, Jr. of the United States Navy, who was recently released from the Vietnam War. The airman spoke about his job, which he had been trained for, and stated being taken captive and held in a prison camp was one of the hazards of war. He signed autographs and had photographs taken with the participants.

Anna Gear presented him with a tie.

It was at this state department building Secretary of State George Pratt Shultz was presented with an award.

"The image created is that of a ghost town rather than a progressive city on the way up. Commuters cannot use the platform, especially during periods of inclement weather," he added.

The councilman indicated people had informed him the station is now a hangout for many undesirable.

Miss Susan Kirk, the director of governmental relations of New Jersey Transit, assured the councilman the station is scheduled for refurbishing within the year, but that she will give him more accurate information as soon as she can.

Councilman Sheld will continue watching and will renew his request if no progress is achieved, he concluded.

Fuldamer opposes parking-rate boost

Rahway Ward Councilman James J. Fuldamer today announced his "strong opposition" to a request to increase on-street parking meter rates from 10¢ to 25¢ per hour in Rahway and adjacent portions to raise certain rates to 20¢ per hour, as "totally unnecessary and damaging to business in downtown Rahway."

Councilman Fuldamer addressed his opposition to a request made at the last regular City Council meeting to increase the on-street parking rates from 10¢ to 25¢ every two hours for four and two-hour zones plus an increase to 25¢ every two hours for four and two-hour zones. The request was made by the parking authority chairman.

The councilman also objected to another proposal to increase the rates to 20¢ an hour which appeared in a document for the meeting of March 16, was taken off the agenda.

The rate presently is 10¢ per hour, for on-street parking, he pointed out.

"This proposed increase on top of the increase in the metered parking rates from \$2 to \$5 would do great injury to the competitive shopping advantage of downtown Rahway businesses. Such action is particularly ill-advised in view of the possible re-evaluation of Rahway real estate in three years. A further decline in downtown business not only would hurt Rahway businesses and consumers, but it would cause a shifting of the property tax burden to our already over-burdened homeowners," said the Sixth Ward representative.

Farnella explains Clark school tab

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following press release was submitted to the Clark Patriot by Dr. John F. Farnella, the Clark superintendent of schools.

The 1984-1985 school budget for the Clark schools is unique in that it has been completely analyzed for the state department of education and a cap waiver of \$445,164 has been approved.

The approval indicates the commissioner of education has reviewed each part of the budget and agreed the anticipated expenditures are crucial to maintain the school system in accordance with the provisions of Chapter No. 212, Laws of 1975, Thorough and Efficient Education.

With this as a basis for presenting the budget to the voters for consideration, the following facts could prove helpful in understanding the school budget.

1. The pre-school program for learning handicapped children will be continued.
2. A foreign language program will be added in the eighth grade to complete the provision of a foreign language program for all students in seventh and eighth grades which will result in advanced placement upon entrance into high school.
3. One teacher will be added to the fifth grade at the Frank K. Hehly School to bring class size to an 18-20 range.
4. Three classroom positions will be abolished at the Carl H. Kumpf School which includes current expansion of a teacher in the fifth grade at the Hehly School and the elimination of three classroom positions at the Kumpf School will result in a net loss of one teacher on staff for the 1984-1985 school year.
5. There will be a cutback of two custodial positions due to the leasing of the Charles L. Brewer School to Clark Township.

Rep. Matthew J. Schools to get Chapter 1 funds

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following news release was provided to The Clark Patriot by Dr. John T. Farinella, the township's superintendent of schools.

Notification of eligibility for Chapter No. 1 funds was received from the state department of education on Dec. 7, 1983.

This eligibility was based on the economic need of several students residing in Clark. The total amount of eligible funding was \$31,354.

The state department was contacted and several conferences were held as to how to make good use of this money, if possible. There was no requirement we use this money and it would have been reallocated among other districts if Clark did not take advantage of the available funds.

The consolidation of the two middle schools in Clark to one middle school at the Carl H. Kumpf School had created an opportunity to help students grasp a better understanding of mathematical concepts and to compete more successfully with their peers operating at the 90th percentile level or above.

In addressing this need the possibility was explored with the state department of education to use Chapter No. 1 money to employ an additional mathematics teacher to provide the opportunity for more individual attention and a challenge for all students. It was found to be possible to develop a project which would make the Chapter No. 1 money available and also to meet a need expressed by parents to help students to become more competitive with their peers in mathematics. Included in the plan developed was also a full-time mathematics teacher to work with students

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

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

Progress Against Backaches - Estimates are that more than 18 million doctor visits a year are related to backaches. Many of these visits to doctors are from patients whose underlying problem is depression. Although this diagnosis may not always be made.

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
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
