vocational training

Important progress has been made in Congress of legislation that will make a major contribution to a more skilled and productive workforce. The House of Representatives recently approved legislation which I co-sponsored providing for a five-year extension of the Vocational Education Act, the primary ederal program to assist states in providing vocational education and training programs for persons of all ages. The Vocational Education Act of 1963 has been in

effect now for 20 years. Since 1963 enrollments in voca tional programs have increased from four million to 16 million at present and there are some 9,000 area voc onal schools. The passage of that act in 1963 was a wise decision

by the federal government and our expenditures for these purposes have been paid back many times over in terms of increased earnings and taxes paid by better-trained tizens. To assist states in updating their vocational programs

the bill establishes a new initiative-grants to states to train persons in high-technology fields through partner ships with industry. Fifty percent of the cost of these programs must come from non-federal sources, including pa cipating businesses. In addition the legislation authorizes a new national

rogram to demonstrate successful co-operative ventures etween employers and educational institutions. Finally the bill continues the national effort to ob-and disseminate information on occupational trends tain and disse and requires greater involvement of business and labor in program planning. The bill also maintains current law by requiring states to spend at least 10% of their basic grants for handicapped individuals and 20% for the disadvan-taged. The bill also adds a reservation of 5% within the basic grant that must be spent on programs to overcon ex bias and to provide support services for women participating in vocational courses. Overall the bill recognizes the future job market will

require workers who have both strong academic skills and pecific up-to-date occupational skills. Although federal support for vocational training small when compared to state and local expenditures the federal role has served as the catalyst in the exciting growth and sophistication of vocational and technic

programs in states all across our country. With the increase in service and information jobs along with the necessary re-training that will be needed in the coming decades for our nation's workforce the Vocational-Technical Education Amendments of 1984 will help America to meet these challenges. The bill, which is presently awaiting action in the Senate, recognizes our economy depends on a qualified and well-trained workforce for continued economic



During the first five years of his life David was hospitalized five times. The child was suffering from an extremely rare blood disease that placed both an emoional and financial drain on his family.

bills before doctors could determine what was wrong with David. And after that the medical bills continued to mount. One four-month hospital stay cost the family more than \$51,000-and this did not include doctors' fees. the physicians did not charge for their services. The father earned less than \$12,000 a year and even though he had medical insurance the coverage was limited to \$30,000 for each illness.

As a result, the family owed the hospital more than 20.000. With the medical insurance exhausted the fami y had to pay the continued cost of treating David. This is just one example of the hardship faced by milies with a chronically ill child. The emotional trauma amilies face when they learn their child is seriously ill is only compounded by the stark reality of the staggering cost of the medical treatment. While the vast majority of families have medical insurance, as in the case of David's amily it falls far short of meeting the child's constant
