Proctor, Hoodzow, Ulrich win Board seats; school budget loses by narrow margin

City voters elected two incumbents and a newcomer to the Board of Education as well as defeating the proposed school budget by a slim margin during Tuesday's School Board Election.

Beginning his third term on the school body, Rick Proctor led the six candidates vying for the three three-year terms open this year. He gained a total of 510 votes with his strongest support coming from the

Sixth Ward, Third and Fourth Districts.
He is the director of health and human services for Bloomfield.
The Board member began his career as a sanitary inspector in the Rahway/Clark Health Dept. and served as the health officer for Scotch Plains.

Following Mr. Proctor, the second incumbent, William Hoodzow, garnered 467 votes in total. He was also favored in the Sixth Ward, Third and Fourth Districts.
Beginning his second term on the Board, Mr. Hoodzow is a retired employe of the Union County Sheriff's Office. He is a college officer and has served as the vice president of the Sideliners, boosters of

sports in Rahway, and is a director of the Rahway High School Hall of Fame.
Newcomer, William Ulrich, gained 434 votes, enabling him to capture the third Board seat. Much of his backing came from the Third Ward, Third and Fourth Districts, and the Sixth Ward, Third and Fourth Districts.
He is currently an account executive with the New Jersey Bell Telephone Co. He is a graduate of Seton Hall University in

South Orange and has been employed in the business communications industry for the past 25 years.
Mr. Ulrich has become a member of the Rahway Chamber of Commerce and serves as the chairman of both the budget and finance committees and the community relations committee.
The other voters received the following tallies: Audrey Coleman, 351; Jerry Coleman, 328; and Sheila Huxford, 311.

Of the three Board members whose terms expired this year, Barry Henderson, chose not to seek re-election after serving nine years on the school body.
During a candidates' forum held prior to the election, both Mr. Proctor and Mr. Ulrich expressed their support for a capital improvement program within the school district.
Focusing on the defeat of the School Board budget, the \$9,878,801 to be raised in support of current ex-

pense was defeated 434 to 408, a 26-vote margin, while the \$442,786 to be raised in support of capital outlay went down 440 to 393, a 45-vote difference. The proposed school budget totaled \$14,148,362.
The school budget was soundly defeated in the Second Ward, Third and Fourth Districts, and the Third Ward, Third and Fourth Districts.
The school budget rejection followed the city's trend of tab defeats, with 19

of the last 21 school budgets being turned down.
Following a school board's defeat, the Board of Education must meet with the City Council to determine ways to reduce the amount.
Although it may be kept the same or raised.
The total number of ballots cast was 1,008. According to board attorney, Len Kahn, approximately 8.5% of the voters turned out for the School Election based on an estimated 12,000 registered city voters.
The Board's re-organization meeting will be held on Thursday, April 12, at 7:55 p.m. at Rahway Junior High School in the superintendent's office.

Theatre project enjoys soaring support

In a groundswell of support that can only be described as phenomenal, family and corporate memberships in Rahway Landmarks, the non-profit organization, have soared since January, reports a spokesman.
"A year ago when our membership seemed to be holding at about 150 we would have been encouraging to see it grow to 200," said Dick Costigan, the organization's acting publicity director. "It subsequently dipped to 108 due to slow renewals, but has now passed the 400 mark."
The arts center project involves the purchase and restoration of the 1,440-seat Old Rahway Theatre at the intersection of Irving, Main and Hamilton Sts. in downtown Rahway. The fund drive was officially launched last June.
Mr. Costigan attributed the accelerating support primarily to increased media attention.
"From the beginning, we have had good press and radio support," he said, "but lately the local press has become actively involved in the project and we're starting to get good television coverage as well."

One current example of the project's television exposure is a half-hour special entitled "Facelift for the Arts" on Suburban Cablevision, 22-24 hours a week, which has been repeated twice and is scheduled to be repeated today at 7:30 p.m.
R. S. Sawyer, Rahway Landmarks' membership chairman, added local organizations have also contributed to the current membership growth.
"More than 60 recent joiners have come from just one local church," he said, "and the local American Assn. of Retired Persons has lately become another prime source."
The Rahway Chamber of Commerce, the Rahway Historical Society and the Garden State Theatre Organ Society are among other organizations well represented in working on the project, he added.
Mr. Sawyer also noted, since many memberships are taken out by families, the actual headcount of members is probably greater than 500. Regular annual memberships cost \$15 and there is a \$5 discount for students and senior citizens.

As for acquisition funding, at last count the organization had raised \$93,075 toward the \$175,000 needed for purchase. Sponsor \$18,000 of the already collected sum has come from one local media campaign and at least another \$10,000 has been contributed by the membership (over and above annual dues). Most individual contributions have been relatively small, but have ranged as high as \$5,000.

The project is currently undergoing a comprehensive marketing study commissioned by Merck and Co. Inc. The Rahway-based pharmaceutical giant is sponsoring the project. "Meanwhile," several benefit events are planned, notably a flea market at Rahway's Columbian School on Saturday-June 23, a raffle of \$7,000 worth of Yamaha motorcycles and at least another \$10,000 has been contributed by the membership (over and above annual dues). Most individual contributions have been relatively small, but have ranged as high as \$5,000.

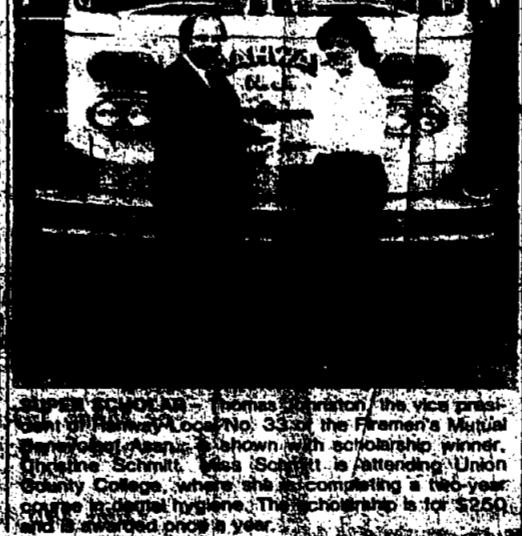
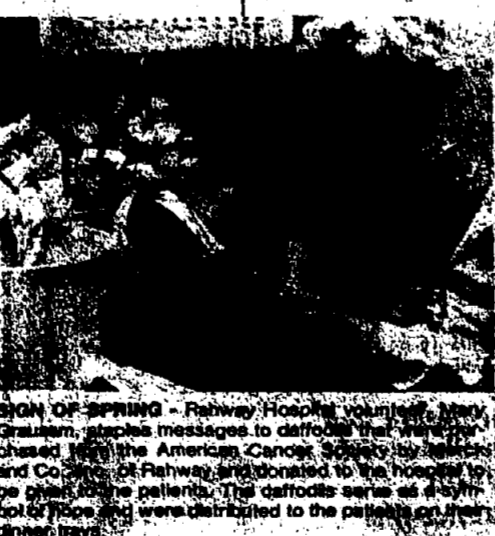

Congressman Bernard Dwyer Reports

Important progress has been made in Congress on legislation that will make a major contribution to a more skilled and productive workforce.

The House of Representatives recently approved legislation which co-sponsored providing for a five-year extension of the Vocational Education Act, the primary federal program to assist states in providing vocational education and training programs for persons of all ages.

The Vocational Education Act of 1963 has been in effect now for 20 years. Since 1963 enrollments in vocational programs have increased from four million to 16 million at present and there are some 9,000 area vocational schools.

The passage of that act in 1963 was a wise decision by the federal government and our expenditures for these purposes have been paid many times over in terms of increased earnings and taxes paid by better-trained citizens.

Help's on the way for expensive ills

During the first five years of his life David was hospitalized five times. The child was suffering from an extremely rare blood disease that placed both an emotional and financial drain on his family.

It took four years and more than \$70,000 in medical bills before doctors could determine what was wrong with David. And after that the medical bills continued to mount. One four-month hospital stay cost the family more than \$11,000—and this did not include doctors' fees.

The physicians did not charge for their services.

As a result, the family owed the hospital more than \$20,000. With the medical insurance exhausted the family had to pay the continued cost of treating David.

This is just one example of the hardship faced by families with a chronically-ill child. The emotional trauma families face when their child is seriously ill is only compounded by the stark reality of the staggering cost of the medical treatment. While the vast majority of families have medical insurance, as in the case of David's family, it falls far short of meeting the child's constant medical needs.

This program re-enacts scenes, requesting public cooperation in supplying information that will lead to the arrest and indictment of offenders. Cash rewards are paid to citizens supplying fruitful information.

The New York Crime Stoppers Program has achieved a high degree of success since its inception. Chief Theodore E. Polhaus said.

The Union County chiefs have unanimously endorsed this new concept of citizen cooperation and will work closely with the prosecutor to enhance and promote this program in the county.

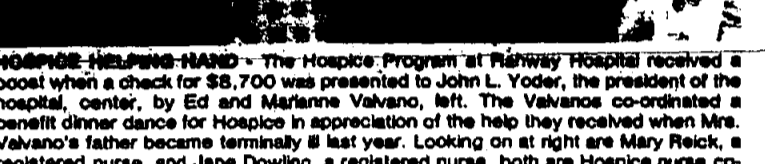

Rinaldo warns: Debt cut crucial

Republican Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, whose district includes Clark, today warned unless federal budget deficits are brought under control, the national debt could nearly triple by the end of the decade.

Rep. Rinaldo said, the debt stands at about \$1.2 trillion now and is projected by the Congressional Budget Office to reach \$3.2 trillion by the end of 1989.

The projection is based on anticipated budget deficits ranging from \$197 billion to more than \$300 billion a year over the next five years.

"It took more than two centuries to accumulate a debt of one trillion dollars and now we are faced with the prospect of tripling that figure in a single decade," the New Jersey Republican pointed out.

The representative pointed out the cost of financing the debt amounted to more than \$130 billion in 1983 and the interest payments on the debt are the third largest item in the budget, ranking behind Social Security and military expenditures.

"If Congress and the administration are going to solve the deficit crisis they are going to have to set aside their political differences and substitute meat cleavers for paring knives in cutting the budget," he added.

Billions of dollars could be saved by reducing target prices for farm commodities, stretching out some defense programs and containing the cost of health care, according to the legislator.

"Further savings could be realized, he added, by cutting 'pork barrel' water projects and by sharply cutting back the \$1.5 billion synthetic fuels program.

Additionally, the representative has offered legislation aimed at reining in federal spending by capping outlays on government contracts and by vetoing out federal programs that are no longer useful or effective.

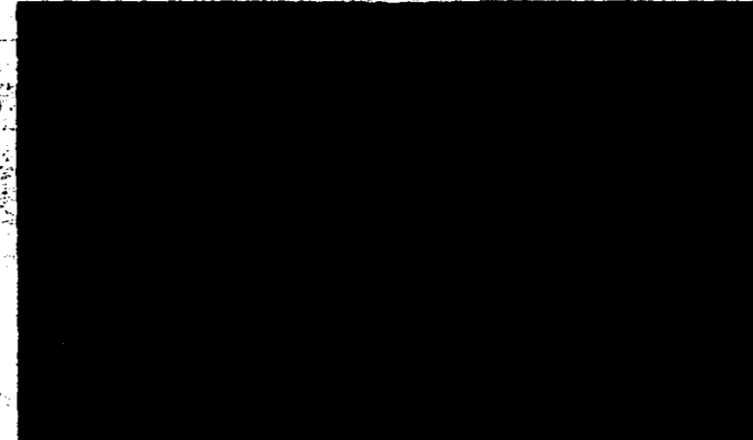

Elected women discuss revaluation

The New Jersey Assn. for Elected Women Officials on Feb. 25 had its annual meeting and election of officers. Mrs. Virginia Apellan of Clark was the chairwoman of the nominating committee which submitted the new slate of officers. The meeting took place at Eagleton-Woodlawn at Douglass College in New Brunswick.

Several seminars took place that day with a break for lunch. The following panelists presented a program: Eugene J. McCaffrey, Sr., the commissioner of Civil Service of New Jersey, and John Baldwin, the director of the division of taxation.

Commissioner McCaffrey spoke about women in the Civil Service system and he pointed out key upper positions are held mostly by men. However, he thinks maybe some exceptions should be made to skip procedural ranking methods to put women also at top-ranking positions. Otherwise women who have the qualifications may never reach there in the near future, reports Mrs. Apellan.

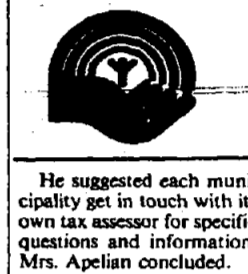
Whether one's taxes increase or decrease of the revaluation depends on whether the property value has increased or decreased in relation to the value of all the properties of one's township. It is on this basis one's tax bill will change. It was also noted by Mr. Baldwin 46% of the taxes are raised by property taxes in New Jersey and if we had quarterly assessing, that is to have tax assessments more often, there wouldn't be that many tax appeals.

However, the purpose of revaluation is not raising taxes. Instead, its aim is to insure properties are assessed uniformly in relation to market value and to other properties in the municipality.

According to the New Jersey State Constitution, all properties must be assessed at fair-market value, stated Mr. Baldwin. So, if the assessed value of all the properties is increased, the tax rate is reduced. However, if the assessed value is decreased then the tax rate must increase so it will provide the same amount of funds needed for the budget.

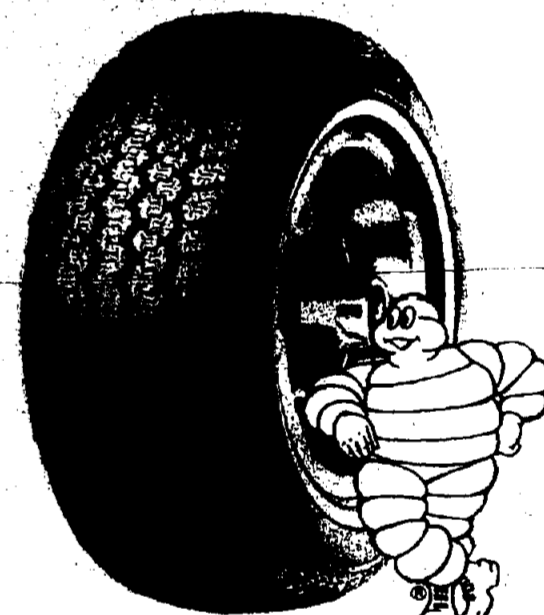

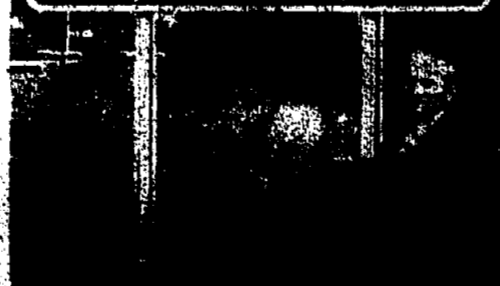
