

First Ward Dems have sole city Primary contest

There will be very little action on a local level in Rahway on the Tuesday, June 5, Primary Election, when, in addition to choosing candidates for President, United States Senate, Congress and the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders city residents from the Democratic and Republican Parties will be selecting nominees for the six ward seats on the Rahway City Council and members of their respective municipal party committees.

According to filings made on April 26 with local, county and state officials, the following are running. For City Council in the First Ward running unopposed as the Regular Organization Republican of Union County the candidate will be Adam Mackow of 1900 Lufbery St. On the Democratic side Jerry L. Coleman of 1761 Park St., running under the slogan, "Democrats for a Constructive Community," will be facing Barry G. DeReamer of 344 Linden Ave., who is the organization Demo-

cratic candidate, in the Primary. The Democratic nominee in the Second Ward, Leon Wasielewski of 754 Linden Ave., will be running unopposed, as will incumbent Republican Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh of 924 Maurice Ave. However, Councilman Marsh will be running under the slogan, "Regular Republican of Rahway," instead of the regular Republican line.

In the Third Ward, which includes Rahway, incumbent councilman, Walter L. Pitts of 515 Hamilton St., will be unopposed in the Primary, but will face the GOP nominee, George T. Wagenhofer of 733 Kaminski Dr., in November. Fourth Ward voters will also see no contest in the Primary, with the GOP nominee being Herbert Dandridge of 1557 Essex St. and the Democratic nominee, incumbent, Harvey Williams of 1628 Park St.

In the Fifth Ward a former Republican who is now the incumbent Democratic councilman, Walter L. Pitts of 515 Hamilton St., will be unopposed in the Primary, but will face the GOP nominee, George T. Wagenhofer of 733 Kaminski Dr., in November. Sixth Ward Republican Councilman James J. Fulcorn of 1142 Midwood Dr. will be unopposed in his party's Primary, but he will face John Blair of 1243 Madison Hill Rd., the Democratic nominee, in November.

In the race for Congress in the Sixth District, which includes Rahway, incumbent, Bernard Dwyer of Edison, will be facing Alex Pechocki of East Brunswick in the Democratic Primary, and the Republican nominee, Dennis Adams of Edison, will be running unopposed for his party's nod.

Rahway and Clark voters will have a wide choice in several races on the county and national level in the Primaries of the Democratic and Republican Parties and in the General Election in November. In the race for Union County freeholder there will be three three-year

terms and one one-year term before the voters this year. The Republican Primary will see no opposition to any of the nominees, who are: For the three-year positions, incumbents, Edward Slomkowski of Union and Alan Augustine of Scotch Plains, and newcomer, Robert Gonor of Linden, and for the one-year position, G. Richard Malgrain of Plainfield.

Regular Democratic Organization of Union County candidates, MaryAnn Dorin of Linden; Harry Pappas of Springfield, and incumbent, Gerald Green of Plainfield, for the three-year terms, will face a slate of Regular Hillside Democrats. Adrienne E. Sneed, Samuel McCher and William Galik, and two William Zatterfi residents, Abdul Salam Ismail and Myra Satterfield, who are running under the slogan, "New Leadership, New Horizons—Do It."

The Democratic nominee for the one-year term, incumbent, Peter Okrasinski of Union, is running unopposed for his party's nod. In the Democratic Primary for United States Senate, incumbent, Bill Bradley of Denville, will face Elliot Greenspan of Haworth, who is running on the slogan, "Citizen Democrat—Stop War and Depression." On the Republican side, the Regular Republican Organization candidate, Mary Mochry of Montclair, will be facing Regular Republican Robert Morris of Manalapan.

State offers loans for home repairs

On the eve of the spring home-improvement season, a spokesman for the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency announced the availability of interest-free home-improvement and energy-conservation loans at the below-market interest rate of 5%.

The Home Improvement Loan Program (HILP) of the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency offers loans of up to \$15,000 for a maximum term of ten years to repair, expand or improve their homes. HILP loans are available to modest-income homeowners of one-to-four unit residences throughout the state.

To qualify, applicants must meet the program's income limits established according to family size. Maximum income limits for a one-, two- to three-, or four-member household are \$25,000, \$27,000 and \$30,000 respectively. The finance agency's executive director, Feather Connor, further explained the program's eligibility criteria. "In addition to meeting the maximum income limits, HILP borrowers must reside at the property to be improved and have an acceptable credit rating. Home-improvement financing is only for new work and repairs which have already begun or have been completed."

The program also offers loans of up to \$4,000 for energy improvements without maximum limitations on the borrower's income. Eligible energy improvements include installation of storm windows and domestic solar hot water systems. HILP loans are made by participating lenders throughout the state. Dump limit opposed until New York cleans up

The letter that the city joined fellow members of the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority and surrounding communities in protesting the fact the federal government is requiring sludge to be dumped 106 miles out into the ocean rather than at the present 12-mile limit, while still permitting New York City to dump untreated wastes directly into the Hudson River.

In a recently unanimous resolution the City Council expressed concern with the great expense to sewerage authorities and municipalities for dumping at the greatly-increased distance as well as what is called "conflicting directions from the state department of environmental protection which have caused the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority to build a sludge/de-watering plant which now produces a bi-product which cannot be disposed of."

In a letter to the authority from Emil C. Herkert, the president of Elson T. Killam Associates of Millburn, which has been the consulting-engineering firm for the sewerage unit for the past 35 years, it was pointed out the federal government had requested the authority to apply for a "Step 3 grant" for a de-watering scheme, the government had approved awarding the contract and had changed the requirements to remove sludge from the ocean by 1981 and then had stopped paying for the construction of the de-watering facilities, creating "in effect, an unusable facility for Rahway Valley, not to mention the fact that should these facilities be utilized some time in the future, five, eight or 10 years hence, in all likelihood additional expenses will be incurred to put the equipment in working order, representing another cost to the authority in which the member municipalities and taxpayers must participate."

Mr. Herkert continued, "It is recommended the authority initiate, through its Congressional representatives, legislation to modify the Clean Water Act, providing 100% funding for Rahway Valley in view of the circumstances which exist as a result of constructing a facility at the best of the regulatory agencies which will never be used. It is further recommended the authority pursue with the Congressional representatives this avenue and prepare a white paper in support of the authority's position. This should then be followed-up with meetings with Congressional representatives to enlist their aid and support in sponsoring the necessary legislation which we would, together with your council, draft."

The Rahway City Council resolution further expressed its support of efforts by Rep. James J. Howard to force New York City, into stopping its dumps into the Hudson River and send a copy of the resolution would be sent to Rep. Howard and the Senate sponsor, Frank Lautenberg of New Jersey, and the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, "which owns one of the most notorious contributors to said ocean dumping, the World Trade Center."

The councilmen expressed their opposition to a change in the dumping limit at this time and sent a copy of the resolution to Gov. Thomas H. Kean expressing their dismay with his support of the change in the limit.

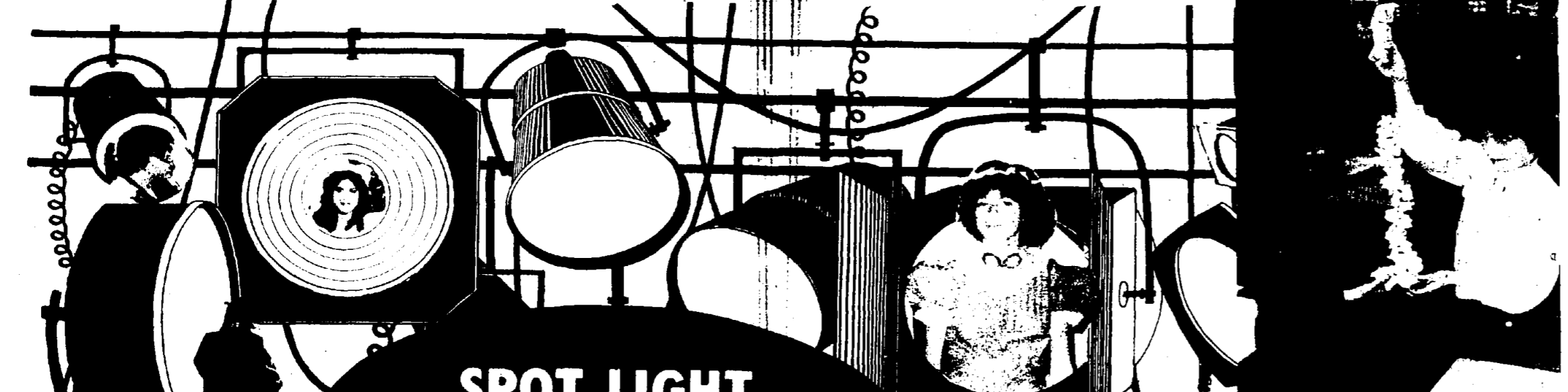
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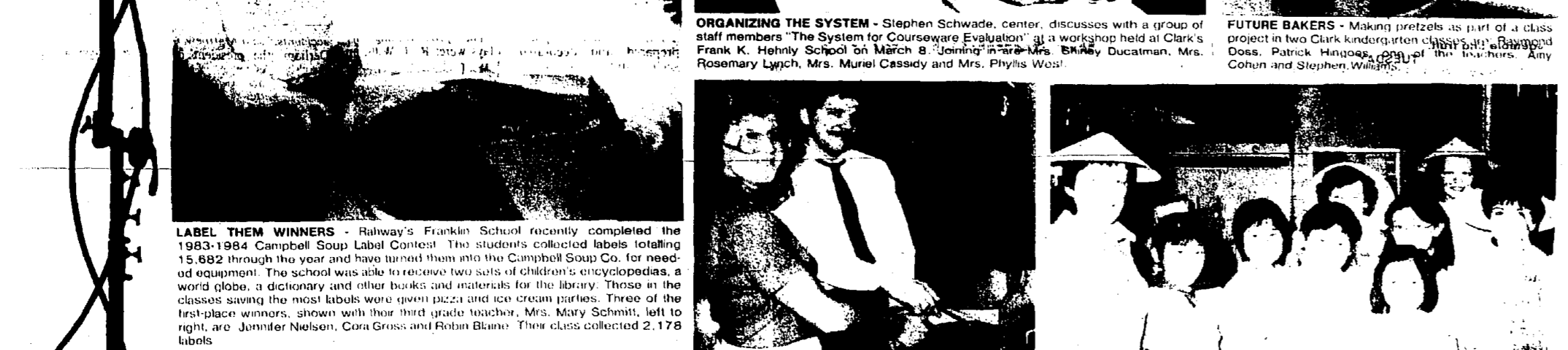

Fulcomer opposes meter expansion

Rahway Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer today announced his opposition to a parking authority plan to expand parking meters into residential areas of Rahway, calling a "substantial portion of the proposed new metered parking areas unnecessary and an ill-advised burden on many of the affected Rahway homeowners."

"Some of the new meters would be placed in front of one-family homes which lack off-street parking facilities. These homeowners during most days would have to put money in the meter to park near their own homes. Only if these homeowners welcomed meters in front of their homes would this be fair. But I know of no homeowners who have requested meters in front of their homes," said Councilman Fulcomer.

The plans, depicted on maps prepared by the city engineer's office, were presented for consideration at a recent City Council meeting by the chairman of the parking authority. Councilman Fulcomer said a consultant's report costing \$16,000 was used to justify the plan. But the councilman added the consultant, among other deficiencies in the report had failed to consult the affected homeowners, residents, shoppers and business owners who would be affected by the recommendations.

"Much of this appears to be an unwarranted territorial expansion of the parking authority in an unnecessary effort to enhance the revenue of its already ample treasury. The wishes of the affected residents should be considered first," the councilman noted.

According to sheet No. 2 of maps entitled "Parking Authority Study: Recommended Revisions," the parking authority would have four-hour meters added to the following areas: Along the residential side of Broad St. from the present metered area to W. Hazelwood Ave., along E. and W. Emerson Ave. from Main St. to Elm St., all of Clinton St., all of Georgia St., the rest of one side of Pierce St., one side of Main St. from the public driveway of the Rahway Post Office lot to the fire headquarters, Esterbrook Ave. from W. Cherry St. from Esterbrook to Campbell St., one side of Campbell St. from W. Cherry St. to Elm Ave., Elm Ave. from Irving to Campbell St. and Fulton St. from the present metered area to E. Emerson Ave., the Sixth Ward representative pointed out.

Councilman Fulcomer suggested interested residents should examine the maps in the city engineer's office and let city officials know their opinions on the plans.
