Humanitarians honored at Rahway Hospital

Rahway Hospital paid tribute on Sept. 18 to three individuals and one organization who have earned the title of Humanitarian Award Ceremony.

The human relations committee of the Board of Governors created the Humanitarian Award in 1973 to honor those people and groups who have demonstrated a concern and caring above and beyond the call of duty, both to the hospital and the community.

This year's recipients were as follows:
—The American Red Cross, Eastern Union County Chapter, which supplies blood and blood

products to the hospital on a daily basis. If there is an emergency situation, the Red Cross always comes through. Its members help co-ordinate two blood drives a year at the hospital and since these drives began in 1977 more than 1,000 pints of blood have been collected.

The Red Cross has taken part in the hospital's health fairs and offered classes in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). The social services department often depends on the Red Cross to help in bringing home service personnel from overseas when family members are critically ill. County-wide the Red Cross takes part in disaster drills so should the real thing occur everyone will be ready. Mr. Anthony DiGiovanni,

the chapter chairman, accepted the award for the Red Cross.

The second recipient of the evening was Dr. Edmond B. Lee, an internist and cardiologist, who has been on the staff at the hospital since 1959. For more than 10 years he has been the chairman of the medical audit committee and through this committee he has helped heighten physician awareness of quality care, judicious use of resources, and economic trends as they affect the practice of medicine.

Dr. Lee is in charge of the hospital's teaching program for Rutgers Medical School students and is an assistant clinical professor of medicine at the school. Since 1976 he has been director of continuing

medical education at the hospital, which involves planning weekly educational programs for the medical staff.

Claire McClure, the immediate past president of the Auxiliary, and the third recipient of the evening, put in many hours of work for the benefit of the hospital. During her tenure the snack bar was re-organized, the Auxiliary's bylaws were re-written and a new information service for new mothers called "Shots for Tots" was begun.

Perhaps the highlight of her term in office was the Auxiliary's pledge for \$500,000 to the hospital's Expansion and Modernization '80 Program. Also during her tenure the Auxiliary pledged another \$303,000 to meet the terms of a grant

from the Fannie E. Rippel Foundation that was used to buy equipment for radiology and the operating room.

The fourth honoree of the evening, Rahway businessman, Edward Valvano, received the award for his work with the hospital's Hospice program. He first became aware of the program when his father-in-law was referred to it. Working closely with the Hospice team, Mr. Valvano was very supportive to his father-in-law during his last days. Through this contact he came to have a very profound respect for Hospice and the work that is done under its auspices. He became a Hospice volunteer, and went one step further—he

organized the Hospice "Have a Heart Dance" last February which raised nearly \$9,000 for the program.

Each recipient received a bronze medallion on a walnut base and a plaque with a citation recounting the various services to the hospital and community. The master of ceremonies for the evening was Thomas Grahill, the chairman of the human relations committee of the Board of Governors. Other members of the committee are: Marydel Grahill, Esther S. Krueger, who holds a doctorate in education, Frank J. McGovern, the Rev. Edward Myers, Thomas F. Richel, and C. Vigilante, the editor and publisher of the Rahway News Record and The Clark Patriot.

'Main Street' comes to Rahway

Editor's Note: The following press release from Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin was released as an open letter to the people of Rahway.

On Sept. 18 the city of Rahway participated in a national video-conference entitled "Revitalizing Downtown." The program was produced by the National Main Street Center, which is a part of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

The video-conference was broadcast from Washington, D.C. and explained several techniques utilized by the National Main Street Center for revitalizing downtowns throughout the United States.

Rahway, always a leader in progressive ideas, was one of only three sites in New Jersey "hooked up" to the video conference. The Main Street Approach includes four main elements:

Organization - How separate groups can work together more effectively in the downtown area. Bankers, city government, merchants, the Chamber of Commerce, civic groups and individual citizens.

Promotion - Promoting and advertising the downtown as an exciting community stage, a meeting place and a gathering place filled with activity, lively stores, quality service and community focus.

Design - Enhancing the visual quality of the downtown. Buildings, signs,

window displays, landscaping and environment, "people places" and physical elements.

Economic Restructuring - Diversifying the downtown economy - filling gaps by recruiting new stores to provide a balanced retail mix, converting unused space into apartments or offices and improving the competitiveness of Main Street's traditional merchants.

The video-conference was attended by over 80 citizens of our city whose backgrounds include several: Downtown businessmen, prominent landlords, high-ranking bank officials, representatives of various civil groups including the Kiwanis Club and the chamber of Commerce, the New Jersey Bell Telephone Co., Union County Economic Development Corp., several Realtors, Rahway Landmarks theater group, the Senior Housing Corp., the Union County Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs, members of the City Council, Planning Board, parking authority and top-ranking city officials.

I'm sure you will agree by looking at the diverse backgrounds of those persons who attended the conference, one can see the dedicated manpower and womanpower exists for us to work together and succeed in this very important undertaking.

This letter has been written to inform you of this major effort ongoing in Rahway as well as to solicit your input and assistance in this endeavor.

Health fair offers blood test

A comprehensive blood test (S.M.A.C. 234 B.C.) will be made available for Rahway residents at the Fourth Annual Health Fair on Sunday Oct. 21 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Rahway municipal complex for a fee of \$8.

The test, in addition to a complete blood workup (C.B.C.) is also intended to detect liver, thyroid, bone and kidney disease, anemia, gout, diabetes and venereal disease. The test

also indicates cholesterol and triglyceride levels, which are indications of heart disease, as well as the overall health of the individual.

Due to the six to 12 hour fast necessary for some of these tests, a special 9 a.m. starting time has been arranged by appointment, for this test only.

Deficit spending by Democrats hurts Clark: GOP

Clark Republican mayor and Council candidates, Bernard Yarusavage, George Sanguiniano, Joseph P. Nuccio and Thomas Belverio, today released a budget plan introduced in 1983 by Democrat George Nuccio and seconded by his running mate in this year's election, Joseph P. Nuccio, left the community on the brink of what the Republicans called "financial disaster."

Councilman Nuccio and Puzniak bled the city treasury dry with their foolish plan to use our modest surplus as though it were a revenue source," said Mayor Yarusavage. Congress takes aim at reduced deficit

Congress is continuing to move forward on initiatives aimed at reducing the federal deficit, and the House of Representatives has taken an important step forward in this area through passage of legislation improving the system by which the defense department purchases military spare parts.

A number of Congressional subcommittees have examined the Pentagon's spare-parts procurement system and uncovered many cases where the defense department has been overpaying by dozens and hundreds of times on some spare parts.

Much of the problem has been attributed to the Pentagon's practice of purchasing most of its spare and replacement parts on a non-competitive basis. In fiscal year 1982, for example, the military spent \$13 billion on spares and replacement parts and 77 percent of those purchases were on a non-competitive basis.

The House-passed legislation amends the fiscal year 1985 authorization bill for the defense department to address this situation. The amendment, which is strongly supported when it came before the House earlier this year, opens the spare parts bidding system up to competition, a move the General Accounting Office (GAO) estimates will yield some 30 to 40 percent in savings. The amendment also requires contractors to supply parts at their lowest commercial price or justify reasons for any higher charge.

The amendment not only will help save billions of taxpayers' dollars; it will also increase the ability of small businesses to bid on these spare-parts contracts and improve growth opportunities for this vital sector of our economy. Sole-source procurement practices have in the past prevented many small businesses from participating in the procurement process.

I have supported other initiatives in the past to restore some fiscal sanity to the military spare-parts procurement system, including legislation enacted by Congress last year to promote accountability in military procurement by the creation of an independent Office of Management Test and Evaluation to manage the weapons testing process. That legislation also required the defense department to report to Congress on its efforts to solve the spare parts problem.

The 1985 defense authorization bill is presently pending in the House-Senate conference committee, and I am hopeful conferees will report the legislation back to the House and Senate for final action in the near future.

While this legislation is not a final solution it will begin to put a halt to the waste that has been occurring and afford all business concerns the opportunity to offer their product or service to the government and thereby effectively increase competition and cost savings without any reduction in quality.

Older Americans get renewed aid

The Older Americans Act, which was first approved in 1965 and is now the center piece of the federal commitment to the elderly, has been reauthorized by Congress for another three years.

Legislation extending the act was passed last week and has been forwarded to the White House for President Ronald Reagan's signature. The President has indicated he will sign the bill into law. As the ranking Republican on the House Select Committee on Aging, I strongly support reauthorization of the act and fought in Congress to defeat efforts to eliminate some of the programs and to reduce funding.

The renewed act authorizes the government to spend more than \$1.2 billion a year over the next three years to help meet the needs of the nation's elderly. The money will be used to provide an estimated 10 million citizens with nutrition, transportation and health services. Additionally, funds are provided for various research and demonstration and training programs that benefit the aged.

New Jersey is authorized to receive up to \$35.3 million in Older Americans funding during the current fiscal year, which began Oct. 1, or about 14 percent more than what the state received in fiscal 1984. The state is authorized to receive up to \$37.1 million in fiscal 1985 and \$38.9 million in fiscal 1987. While these are authorized sums, the amount the state actually receives will be determined by the budget Congress approves each year for the Older Americans program.

New Jersey senior citizens have benefited enormously from the various programs and services provided under the act.

For example, in fiscal 1984 24 nutrition sites scattered throughout the state served more than 3.6 million meals. An additional 1.5 million meals were delivered to the homebound. Nearly 300,000 older New Jerseyans were provided with transportation, legal aid, home care and other supportive services. Nearly 1,800 older New Jerseyans have part-time jobs through the Title No. 5 Senior Community Service Employment Program.

Supportive services to help seniors receive the Aging Committee to New Jersey earlier this year to receive testimony as to how well the program is working in the state and how it could be improved. Many of the recommendations advanced by witnesses at the New Jersey hearing are included in the Act.

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Mackow, Fulcomer back progress on flood control



Rahway First Ward Republican Council candidate, Adam A. Mackow, and Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer today announced they would work together to secure more flood-control progress for Rahway.

Mr. Mackow said his priorities are to help the poor people in his ward who have been victimized by flooding from the Allen St. area of the Rahway River system and to upgrade antiquated sewer lines.

He added he would work closely with Councilman Fulcomer because, "Councilman Fulcomer has been the first chairman of the Board of the Union County Environmental Health Advisory Committee. He has been instrumental in securing funding for the start of the sewer separation in the Hazlewood Ave. storm-water system, but I want much more action in this area. This affects street flooding and cellar flooding on Pierpont, Bryant and Stanton Sts. and nearby areas. This flooding problem only can be alleviated if the Hazlewood sewer separation is completed and if it is followed up by sewer separation on the 'east side,' he added.

Councilman Fulcomer also wants infrastructure to be completed, including the Sixth Ward water main and Madison Hill Rd. and from some cellars on Stone St. problems that he said were created by poor planning over 20 years ago.

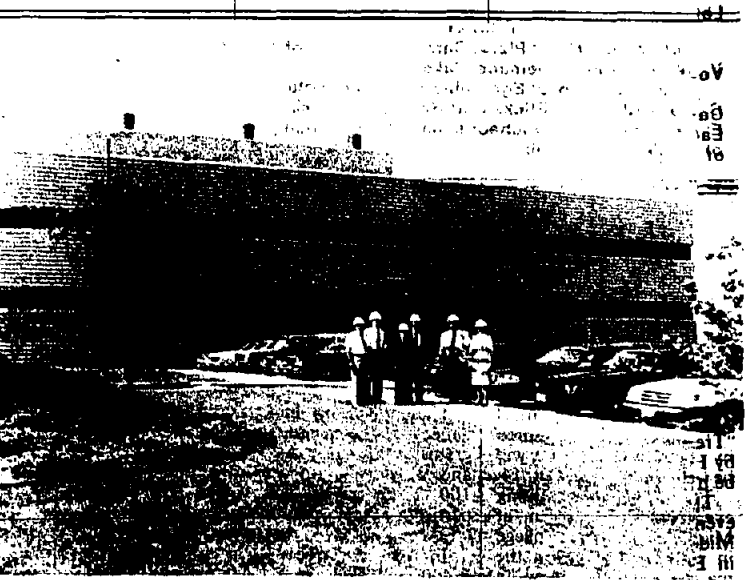
The Sixth Ward representative noted he is the sponsor of Rahway's stormwater runoff control ordinance and the sponsor of the resolution for a better Milton Lake.

Councilman Fulcomer's ordinance successfully has succeeded in getting the line item in the budget for the Hazlewood sewer separation, which is helping to reduce flooding in Rahway, and supported the purchase of better sewer cleaning equipment, the councilman noted.

"Flooding from streets and inadequate stormwater sewers is still a problem. We will do more to stop this flooding," concluded Mr. Mackow.

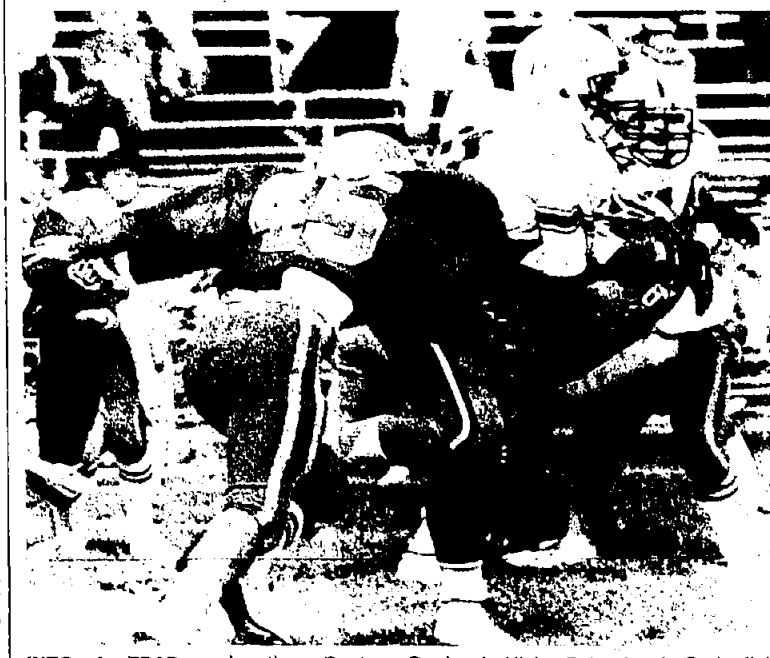

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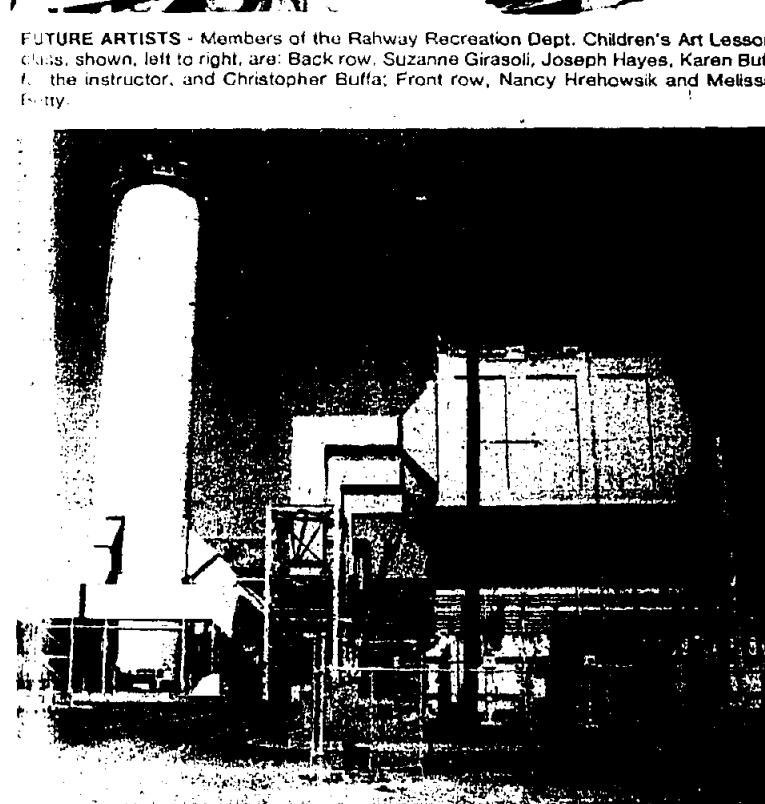
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Rahway juniors cast votes for future

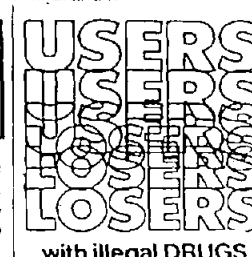
