

Resource recovery vote tabled again

After a confusing set of accusations and counter-accusations about the legality of a proposed amendment to a resolution for a referendum on resource recovery, the Rahway City Council Monday tabled the measure, which had been postponed for action since July.

The resolution, brought to the floor again by Second Ward Republican Councilman John C. Marsh, had originally sought to have residents vote on accepting or rejecting the resource recovery concept in this year's General Election, which was held on Nov. 6.

Since the 1984 election has already passed, Councilman Marsh Monday attempted to amend his original resolution to have the question voted on in a special election to be held on Feb. 5.

However, Democratic Councilman-at-Large Walter McLeod, who later was to move to have the motion tabled, said since a committee has already been set up by Council President Max Sheld to study all the

implications of a referendum on resource recovery, the Governing Body should not take any action on the question until it gets all the facts from that committee.

City Council Attorney Louis Rainone at first said he questioned whether the council could technically require a non-binding referendum on resource recovery, as called for in the Marsh resolution, to be put on the ballot by the county clerk for a special election.

Replying to a question from Democratic Councilman-at-Large Vincent Addona, Mr. Rainone said adding to the resolution adopted during the summer was improper.

After consulting state law on the matter, Mr. Rainone told the councilmen they could only request the county clerk to put the question on the ballot in the next General Election, not in a special election.

Acting on this ruling, Councilman Sheld ruled the Marsh amendment out of order.

Councilman Marsh objected to the fact that during the summer, when the Council had adopted a resolution calling for a question to be placed on the 1984 General Election ballot on whether a special election could later be held on resource recovery.

Mr. Rainone had not brought out the fact state law does not allow a non-binding referendum except on the General Election ballot.

The attorney replied that during the discussions in the summer the only election that had formally been discussed to contain a referendum was the General Election of 1984 and that is why he hadn't consulted the state law on a special election on the topic.

However, Mr. Rainone did not rule out the possibility a binding referendum could be held on the question at a time other than the General Election, and he said he expects to have a ruling in December for the Council on the full implications of a binding referendum.

Councilman Addona pointed out to Councilman Marsh that although the

Governing Body could not require the county clerk to put a referendum on the ballot in other than a General Election there appeared to be nothing to rule out the city putting its own referendum on the ballot at a different time.

Both resolutions, which had also been postponed during the summer, were tabled by a 6-3 vote along party lines, with the Democrats in favor of tabling and the Republicans opposed.

The tabling motions probably mean the issue of a resource recovery referendum is dead for this year, since any resolutions brought up at the Monday, Dec. 10, regular council session or at any special meetings before or after that would die at the end of the year if they in any way bound the incoming Council to any action.

The councilmen also unanimously adopted an ordinance which will give the firm the power to suspend enforcement of parking restrictions at meters at any time.

This measure, which clears the way for free parking to be allowed for shoppers during the holiday season and when other special events are being held

in the city, was accompanied by a special resolution which will put the ordinance into effect less than 20 days after its publication in order to allow the free parking to go into effect for the holidays this year.

Introduced was an ordinance which would rescind the one-way status of Emerson Ave. between Fulton and Pierce Sts. and would designate Emerson Ave. westbound between Main and Pierce Sts. as one-way, and another ordinance which would prohibit parking near the Merck gate on the west side of Bond St. between Underhill Pl. and E. Scott Ave. and on the east side of Bond St. between Underhill Pl. and Upton Pl.

The first measure is intended to allow fire trucks to leave the fire headquarters off Main St. and Milton Ave. easier and the second was requested by Merck & Co. Inc. because the firm owns all the property in question and has enough parking for employees in its own lots and it will make for better traffic safety.

The public hearings and possible final adoptions of the two measures will be held on Dec. 10 at 8 p.m.

County college sets master plan this year

The development of a five-year master plan for Union County College will be a major goal for 1984-1985, Dr. Derek N. Nunney, president, told the board of trustees at a meeting on Nov. 5 at the Cahoon Campus.

Dr. Nunney reported the board of higher education in authorizing the plan in 1982 and the Union County Technical Institute in 1982 required the college to prepare a master plan by spring.

A number of task forces have far collected extensive data and prepared preliminary reports," Dr. Nunney said. "These data are now being reviewed and analysis has been made of what still needs to be done to complete a master plan," the county president said.

Dr. Nunney reported he asked Dr. Leonard T. Korman, the vice president for academic affairs, to head a small task force to prepare the master plan.

The new Union County College president also named an internal committee is reviewing the educational and job-training needs of Elizabeth Plainfield and how the college might address them.

"We are still in the data-gathering, idea-generating phase," Dr. Nunney said, "in the near future we will have tentative proposals to bring to the board."

Dr. Nunney reported the state higher education budget for 1985-1986, adopted by the state board of higher education or submission to Gov. Thomas Kean and the Legislature, includes \$4 million for urban initiatives proposed by Chancellor T. Edward Hollander.

"The chancellor has singled out a number of cities in New Jersey for special attention, including Elizabeth," the college president said. "He has suggested our college and Kean Union work with Elizabeth city and school officials to help the city solve some of its major problems. I've already met with Mayor Thomas Dunn and with School Superintendent Rocco Colelli and found them receptive to working with the College. I've also met with Mayor Rick Taylor and with School Superintendent Oliver Lancaster in Plainfield to determine their needs and aspirations."

Dr. Nunney added he "has a sense people in Union County want things to happen—and they want us to help them make them happen."

"Chancellor Hollander's urban initiatives present a great opportunity for us to work more closely with our urban areas—an opportunity

we do not plan to miss," Dr. Nunney noted.

Merck to sell Calgon division

A spokesman for Merck & Co., Inc. of Rahway, the health products company, announced today the firm has completed preliminary negotiations for the sale of the worldwide operations of its Calgon Carbon business to a group of investors headed by Thomas A. McConomy, currently the vice president and general manager of Calgon Carbon Corp.

Discussions are now in progress on the definitive agreement for the transaction, which is subject to approval by the Merck board of directors. It is expected to be completed before the end of 1984, the spokesman added.

Calgon's carbon business provides granular activated carbon which is used to absorb toxic impurities from liquid and gaseous effluents before they are released to the environment, as a purifying agent in manufacturing operations and to remove contaminants from drinking water.

This transaction will allow Calgon to focus more of its energies and resources in the area of specialty chemicals, the spokesman noted. The sale does not affect Calgon's Water Management Division or Commercial Division, both of which will continue to be important components of the Merck specialty chemicals group.

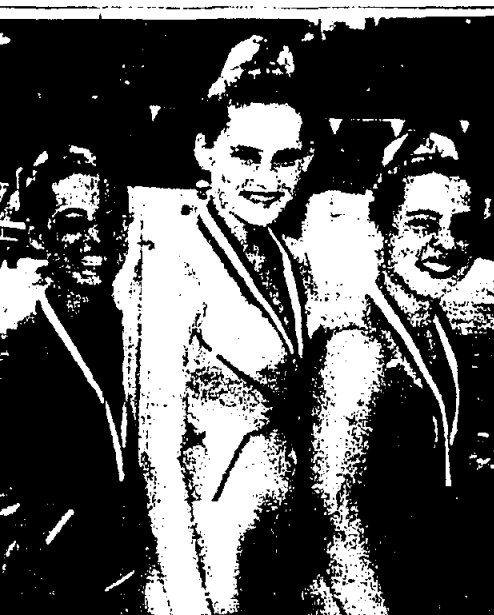

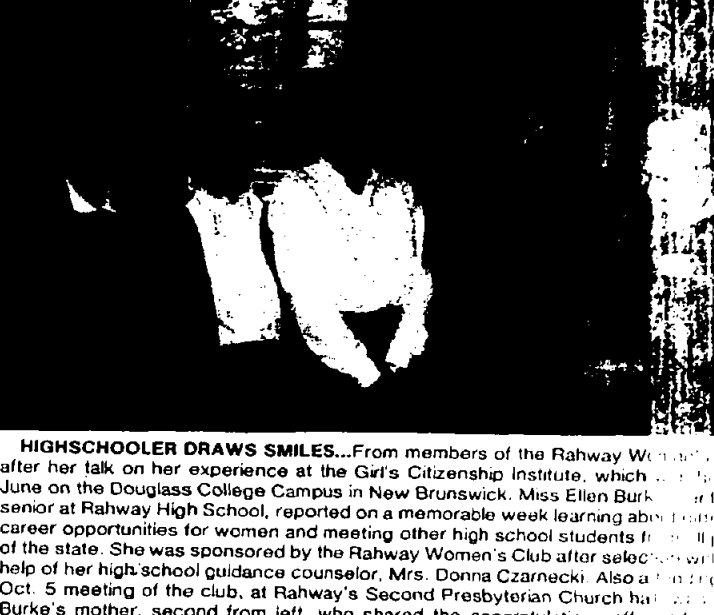

Prosecutor pledges war on senior crime

Editor's Note: The following is an open letter to the residents of Union County from county prosecutor, John H. Stamler.

Recent reports more and more senior citizens are becoming crime victims, coupled with three tragic events which have hit home personally, have given me reason to review the policy of this office in dealing with those who commit crimes against the elderly.

(1) On a recent weekend an older couple had their home broken into and were then robbed and brutally beaten by two teenagers, the oldest of whom was 17.

(2) Recently a 74-year-old plumber was savagely struck on the head with an iron pipe as he entered his car, but the two robbers - in their late 20's - were scared off by his screams for help and the appearance of a retired Fairwood police officer.

(3) Recently a 69-year-old widow was nudged by a lone male as she entered her home.

The persons who committed these acts are depraved animals, cowards who have forfeited their right to live in a free society.

At the very least, they should be in custody instead of walking around. There are dozens of other recent examples with the same recurring theme of violence.

Any burglary, robbery or assault is a vicious act, showing no regard for our law, our society, or the basic human rights of the victims.

But to commit those crimes with full knowledge the victims are elderly, usually alone, and less able to protect their persons or property is an act as despicable as any we know.

Though the crime statistics may indicate overall crime is down the senior citizens in our county find little relief in that, because they still fear for their safety when they go out or come home at night.

If law enforcement is to move forward in the battle against crime as opposed to merely "holding the line," no law abiding citizen should ever have to fear going shopping, getting off a bus, or putting the key in his or her front door.

So beginning Nov. 1 there will be no plea bargaining with any defendant who commits a crime of violence against one of our senior citizens. They will all be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

If the offender is a juvenile we will have to have him or her treated as an adult. We will appear at every sentencing to urge the court to impose the maximum custodial term allowed by law.

It's time the criminals started chalking with the fear so many seniors have experienced. It's time we in law enforcement started kicking a little butt.

I am also renewing my plea for residents to join forces with the police and the Prosecutor's Office. Don't turn your back on criminal activity. We can't be everywhere so we need your help. Pick up the telephone when you see something suspicious.

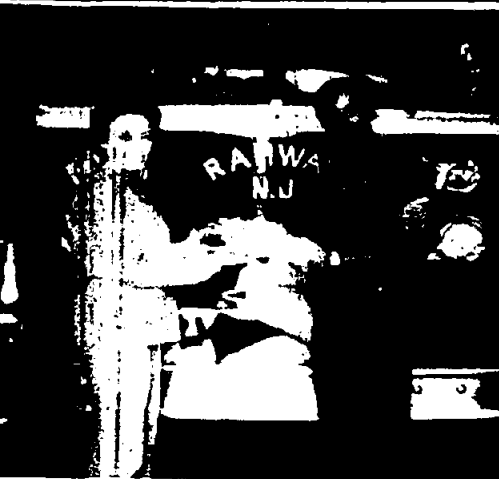

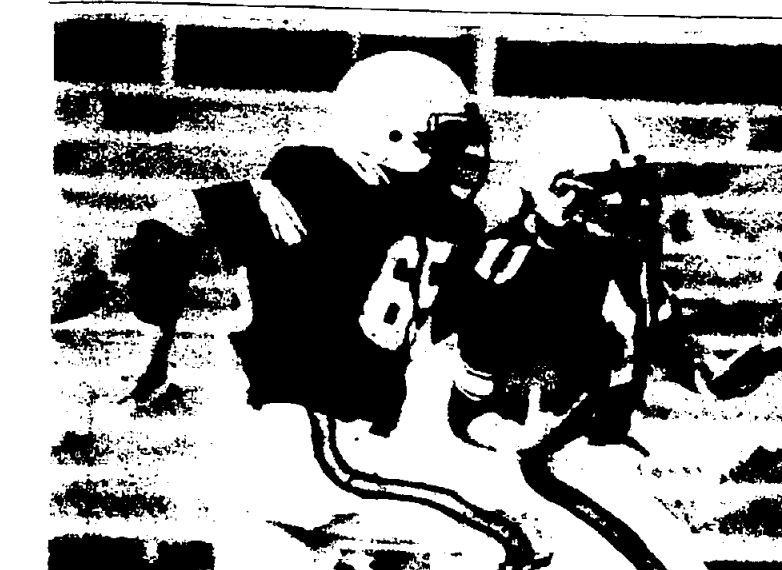

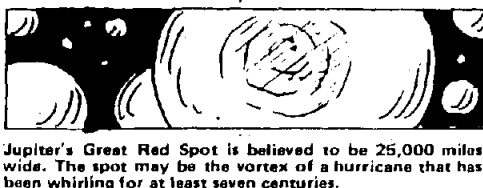
