## Appointments start Council year in debate

Rahway's City Council Monday had several appointments to make or confirm, but what it didn't realize was it had an appointment to debate almost every one of the actions.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin recommended city prosecutor, David P. Erickson of 933 Lakeside Dr., to replace retiring Municipal Court Judge Marcus Blum for a term running from Monday to Wednesday, Jan. 13, 1985.

However, a section of the appointment resolution saying the salary for the position would be established in the 1985 salary ordinance at the same level as that of the director of law brought charges the increase in the judge's salary from the \$17,896 paid to Judge Blum to at least \$28,711 was too much.

Sixth Ward Republican Councilman James J. Fulcomer also asked if Mr. Erickson, who also serves as attorney for the Rahway Housing Authority, could legally hold the judgeship and the housing unit post.

Council attorney, Louis Rainone, replied since the housing authority was an agency independent of the city government there probably wouldn't be any conflict, but he would have to research the matter.

Replying to a charge by Councilman Fulcomer Mayor Martin had offered Mr. Erickson the judge's salary figure already agreed upon. Mayor Martin said Mr. Erickson would be paid the same salary as Judge Blum until the 1985 budget

was adopted, then his salary would increase to the level established for the director of law.

The mayor added the prosecutor agreed to accept the judgeship with the understanding when the new salary was approved he would be receiving it.

A memorandum to the governing body by Business Administrator Joseph M. Hartnett pointed out the salary recommended by Judge Blum for his successor was \$33,000, but the mayor had recommended \$28,711.

The Harnett memorandum also pointed out cities like Elizabeth, Linden and Plainfield, with similar workloads for judges to that of Rahway, paid comparable salaries.

Councilman Fulcomer pointed out municipalities of similar size to Rahway—Westfield, Cranford and Summit—pay their judges less than the amount recommended.

Despite the fact the Sixth Ward representative said he had no problem at all in voting for Mr. Erickson's appointment, he did move to delete the section of the resolution referring to the salary being equal to that of the director of law.

The move to delete the salary section was supported only by Councilman Fulcomer, Republican Councilman John Marsh of the Second Ward and George Wagenhoffer of the Fifth Ward and Democratic First Ward Councilman Jerry L. Coleman.

The other five Democrats voted against the deletion.

After the vote Democratic Councilman-at-Large Vincent Addona pointed out at the caucus session Judge Blum had asked for more staff to handle the increased workload and the city would have to add another day for Municipal Court and one night of court in the near future, thus adding to the workload.

Councilman Marsh said many attorneys would be glad to serve as municipal judge just for the prestige involved, and the salary increase would be setting the guidelines for salary negotiations for other city workers for 1985, who would demand greater increases because of the judge's increase.

Councilman Coleman, although against the salary level proposed in the resolution, did say he had spoken to a young attorney friend who had said he would not take the position and give up a lucrative law practice.

The councilman added if, as Judge Blum had told the Council, the city would be losing money by letting summonses lay dormant, it would be worthwhile to spend more money on the judge's position.

He said more information was needed on that matter. Councilman at-Large Walter McLeod pointed out the judge's salary would actually be set by the salary ordinance, not by the resolution appointing him.

Mayor Martin explained the Council couldn't compare the present salary paid to the judge with the proposed salary because Judge Blum had stayed with the

city long past his normal retirement date without asking for any increase in salary because he needed the hospitalization provided by the city because he and his wife had illnesses which precluded getting that coverage elsewhere.

Councilman Wagenhoffer replied if Judge Blum accepted the salary with the city because of what the mayor said that was probably legitimate.

However, he said the workload in the courts could probably be handled by taking the raise proposed for the municipal judge and hiring another clerk with that money.

Although he agreed some raise might be necessary he was not in favor of the one proposed, and said it was bad for the city to "put its chips on the table" when talking to Mr. Erickson about hiring him before he was even in the position.

Councilman-at-Large James Cadigan, referring to the Hartnett memorandum, said Rahway was second in the county in the income produced from the municipal court and among the largest in workload.

He added the judge appointed would have to give up the practice of criminal law, thus cutting down on his outside income also.

On the confirmation of the appointment the six Democrats were in favor of it and the three Republicans were opposed.

Resolutions on several other appointments also drew fire from several councilmen.

Republicans objected to the replacement of Louis A. Garay on the parking authority with former Democratic Fifth Ward

Councilman Walter Pitts, saying it was a "political payoff" for Mr. Pitts' conversion last year from Republican to Democrat and the replacement of Mr. Garay would deprive the authority of its most senior member and would take an important post away from a member of a minority group.

Councilman McLeod introduced a motion appointing Mr. Garay as an alternate to the Planning Board and that measure was adopted.

The GOP councilmen also objected to the replacement of Evelyn Wilson on the Municipal Board of Alcoholic Beverage Control by former Republican Councilwoman-at-Large Irene Rinaldi, claiming it too had been a "payoff" for her support of Democrats in recent elections.

Councilman Coleman said he objected to the replacement of any minority group member on any Board, especially on the eve of the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and abstained on the Pitts and Rinaldi appointments.

Republicans also said it was unfair not to re-appoint Evelyn Wilson, who was also a faithful member of their party, a member of a minority group and well qualified for the Alcoholic Beverage Control post.

On the Rinaldi appointment five of the Democrats were joined by Councilman Marsh in support of it, Councilman Fulcomer and Wagenhoffer voted against it and Councilman Coleman abstained.

Mr. Pitts was named to the parking authority with five Democratic votes. The three Republicans were against the measure and Mr. Coleman abstained.

### Today honors diplomat-hero

Editor's Note: The following resolution, introduced by Rahway Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer, was adopted unanimously Monday by the Rahway City Council.

WHEREAS, Raoul Wallenberg of Sweden put his life in jeopardy to save 120,000 lives from Nazi death camps during World War II;

WHEREAS, Raoul Wallenberg's heroic efforts to rescue innocent lives from the Nazi holocaust merit recognition by all free men everywhere;

WHEREAS, On January 17, 1945 Raoul Wallenberg was arrested in Hungary and later imprisoned in one of the horrible Soviet prisons of Vladimir in the Gulag;

WHEREAS, There is some evidence that he may still be alive today in a Soviet prison, despite the Soviet claim that he died in 1947 at the age of 35 years;

WHEREAS, On January 17, 1985, bells will ring 40 times in a special worldwide commemoration to honor the courageous and noble humanitarian deeds of Raoul Wallenberg;

WHEREAS, It is hoped by many that the worldwide ringing of bells commemorating the deeds of Mr. Wallenberg, letters and petitions to Soviet diplomatic missions, and other activities will persuade the Soviet Union to free Raoul Wallenberg;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Rahway declare January 17, 1985 "Raoul Wallenberg Day" in Rahway and encourage all appropriate owners of places with bells to ring their bells at noon 40 times on January 17, 1985;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we direct the City Clerk of the City of Rahway to send a letter to the Soviet delegation to the United Nations requesting the Soviet delegation to use its influence to persuade Soviet authorities to free Wallenberg and to explain why neither Mr. Wallenberg nor his body have been returned to Sweden.

### Theatre gets first installment on pledge

The Union County Arts Center project in Rahway is the recipient of a \$7,500 first installment on a \$20,000 gift pledged by Robert S. Engelman, retired president of Chicago's world-famous Spiegel mail order house and son of Bernard ("Barney") Engelman, who built the Rahway Theatre in 1928.

The arts center project involves restoration of the once-elegant, 1,400-seat theatre, which was acquired for that purpose by a non-profit group in September, 1984.

A sum of nearly \$800 was earlier donated by the same benefactor to pay for a bronze memorial plaque to be installed in the lobby of the restored theatre honoring the elder Mr. Engelman, who died in 1950.

Robert Engelman's \$20,000 pledge was made during a nostalgic return visit to the Rahway Theatre in November, 1984. The \$12,500 balance will be spread over a five-year period.

Rahway Landmarks, the nonprofit corporation which purchased the 56-year-old former vaudeville theatre from the Wood Group of Morristown, has already contracted with the Conrad Schmitt Studios of Wisconsin to commence restoration sometime this month. Most of the work will be done by local labor, specially trained by artisans on the staff of the Wisconsin firm, reports a spokesman.

Before building the theatre in 1927-1928, Barney Engelman had already made his mark as

one of this city's more respected businessmen. He ran its largest department store, was active in the management of two of its banks, and had extensive real estate holdings within the city. He was also a philanthropist and civic activist. The plaque honoring him is expected to be unveiled sometime this spring, the spokesman added.

The history of the Rahway Theatre is told in a just-published 50-page souvenir book, copies of which are available at the theatre on weekends.

**Fulcomer urges Wallenberg freedom**

On Thursday, Jan. 17 at 8:00 p.m. bells will ring in various cities throughout the free world in honor of Raoul Wallenberg, who put his life on the line to save 120,000 lives from the Nazi holocaust during World War II.

Despite his noble humanitarian acts against Nazi oppression this courageous Swedish diplomat was arrested by Soviet authorities on Jan. 17, 1945 and imprisoned in the Gulag. A Soviet spokesman claimed he died in 1947, yet he was seen as recently as 1975 in the Soviet prison of Butyka.

The bell ringing effort is part of a growing effort among people of different nations to demand the Soviet Union free Mr. Wallenberg. It is hoped Raoul Wallenberg will still be alive and liberated by the time world public opinion has its full impact on the Soviet authorities.

In April of this year an informative miniseries will appear on television to further educate the people of the world on the good works of Mr. Wallenberg.

I urge everyone to join the effort to free Mr. Wallenberg by writing letters to the U.S.S.R. in honor of Raoul Wallenberg, who put his life on the line to save 120,000 lives from the Nazi holocaust during World War II.

**Time to conquer new horizons**

On Jan. 8 I stepped down as Senate Minority Leader after serving an unprecedented three years in that post. Representing the interests of Republican legislators and Gov. Thomas Kean in the Democratic-controlled Senate has been a challenging and rewarding experience.

We have launched a \$3-billion transportation program #9 repair our crumbling roads, we have launched an all-out campaign to get drunk drivers off the road and we have focused on improving the quality of public education.

I have decided, however, it is time to move on and devote more time to the upcoming gubernatorial and legislative campaigns in this state.

I will continue to serve as a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, which will continue to review all legislation involving the courts.

In addition, I recently joined the Senate Labor, Industry and Professions Committee. This committee deals with such important issues as automobile insurance and the regulation of other industries in this state.

Another interest of mine during my years in the Senate has been ensuring equal rights for all our citizens. I have served on the Commission on Sex Discrimination in the Statutes, which over the past six years has reviewed New Jersey's voluminous laws to weed out sexually-biased language.

Recently I was named to the Task Force on Equitable Compensation, which will be studying a major issue confronting state governments across the country — comparable worth.

The concept of comparable worth is simple enough: Workers who perform jobs requiring comparable skills, responsibility and working conditions should be paid the same. However, making this concept a reality would require a major restructuring of job classifications and pay scales in state government.

That is why a special commission was established to conduct a fair and realistic study of this issue.

"Numerous" sex-discrimination court cases filed throughout this country have brought to light the fact that average female worker makes only 56 cents for every dollar earned by a male worker. Comparable worth is the latest method being advanced to eliminate this wage gap.

The issue of comparable worth and its implications to society cannot be ignored.

Three million of families today are single-parent households supported by women. These women, most of whom are unskilled labor, hold traditionally female occupations, such as secretaries or clerks, typists. Their salaries are far below those paid to unskilled workers in traditionally male jobs, such as truck drivers.

Unlike many other states, New Jersey has taken some steps to remove the inequities in state employment. A job-evaluation system was implemented 17 years ago. However, this system has only had limited success in reducing the gap between traditional male and female jobs.

The newly-formed 21-member task force on equitable compensation — which includes legislators, state officials, public employee union leaders and business executives — will take this effort one step further. The task force will be looking at about 400 of the 6,000 job titles filled by the state's 60,000 employees.

These 400 job titles, which were identified by a similar task force established by executive order last year, have at least 15 workers and are at least 70 percent filled by women.

The process of reviewing all these titles will be a long and arduous one. Balancing the need to correct pay inequities against the need to keep public employees' salaries under control, will not be an easy task.

However, we in the Legislature have a responsibility to realistically address this issue before the courts step in and mandate action without any regard to our fiscal constraints.

The Women's Liberation Movement of the 1960's brought to national attention the fact women were not getting the same opportunities in the work place as men.

Now, twenty years later, with more and more women in the workforce, we face this new challenge that promises to be one of the most significant public management issues of the 1980's.
