We were able to observe, first hand, how 119 million people are crammed into an area about the size of Montana, with most of the population in the cities of Tokyo, Osaka and Nagoya. Diving space—pis at a pehium with misall houses jammed together on narrow streets in the old section. Traffic is horrendous and pollution from automobiles is the worst 1 have ever seen. One thing you don't see is dented and damaged can't or trucks. All cars and trucks are clean and polish-

trucks are clean and polished. There are no old vehicles on the roads. Streets are clean, buildings have no graffitti, and no garbage, bottles or paper can be found in the streets are small and all stairways are on the outside of the dwellings to increase living space indoors. Washers, dryers and refrigerators can be seen on many of the balconies, again to increase living space. Clotheslines are hung on these balconies and wash is always blowing on the lines.

We drove through a section of the town known as "Chinatown." Most sailors refer to it as "Passion Town" for obvious reasons. Despite the fact the cost of living in Jupan is one of the highest in the world we had a delicious lunch in a Chinese restaurant for \$4.50. Dinner can cost up to \$70 per person in some places. A round of nine holes of golf can cost so, which includes a caddy or a golf cart. Cameras, television sets and computers are more expensive than in the United States. Japanese cars cost more here than they do in New Jersey.
