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Report: School revamp in best community interest

Editor's Note: Following is the complete, edited text of the "Report of the Joint Committee of the City of Rahway and the Rahway Board of Education on School Facilities," referring to the proposed high school renovation bond issue to be voted on during the special school election on Tuesday, Feb. 19.

The joint committee was formed pursuant to action by the Office of the Mayor and the Office of the Superintendent of Schools and resolutions adopted by the Rahway Board of Education and the City Council. The committee was charged with the responsibility of reviewing the status of the physical facilities of the Rahway school system and recommended a plan of action to be supported by both city and school officials.

The members of the committee were: Mayor Daniel L. Martin; Superintendent of Schools, Frank Brunetto; School Business Administrator, Board Secretary Anthony Rocco; Board President Rick Proctor; Board members, Louis Rizzo and Elizabeth Jacobs; Council members, James Cadigan, Lawrence Bodine, and Walter McLeod; city director of health, welfare and buildings, Anthony Deiga; the director of the Rahway Fire Dept., Chief James Heller; city building inspector and construction code official, Robert Cotte, and Robert Brown, vice-principal of Rahway High School.

In addition to substantial man-hours invested by committee members in personal review of all relevant information the committee met formally for many hours on six occasions: July 17, Aug. 8, Sept. 12, Oct. 18, Oct. 29, and Nov. 15, 1984.

When needed the committee called in various experts to assist the committee

with its work. For example, city plumbing inspector, Edward Huey, was brought in for review of the high school heating plant; city administrator, Joseph Hartnett, was asked to assist in organizing the committee's findings and recommendations; and various school personnel were utilized to help determine current and projected use of school facilities.

Members of the city's professional inspection staff made a detailed inspection of the high school and, as sitting members of the committee, thoroughly briefed all other members on their findings and professional recommendations. Architectural/engineering representatives of the firm of Ekert, Morton, Russo, and Maggio (official architects for the Rahway school system) attended all meetings and provided the committee with all requested information.

The major focus of the committee's work was the facilities of the school and obtaining maximum utilization of the high school building. Other facilities were not found to be in need of major capital improvement at this time. It is the finding of this committee that the physical condition of the school is extremely unsuitable for the children of the community and adversely affects the educational environment of the youth of our community, and a major capital improvement is required for the high school students of the community as soon as possible. It is further found that such an improvement, by virtue of its utmost importance to future generations and to the quality of life of the community, takes on the dimension of a social commitment for community leaders and concerned parents and citizens.

The committee also notes that this commitment translated into a need not just for all those directly involved, but to all citizens of the community, because the quality of the educational system bears directly on property values and many other factors impacting on each and every resident of the community.

The committee recommends against new construction for three major reasons: Neither the present high school site nor any other site owned by the school system, would meet state requirements for a new high school; the length of time which would be required to develop a site, obtain state approvals and actually construct a new facility would not meet the pressing needs of the community and its students and the cost/benefit ratio of building new, at an estimated cost of \$15 million, provides no significant long-term benefits to the community and its students compared to properly executed, long-lasting renovations to a structurally sound facility.

After detailed consideration of all relevant facts, it is the finding of this committee that major renovation of Rahway High School must be undertaken immediately. Professional evaluation indicates the building is structurally sound and renovation is completely feasible. The committee recommends major emphasis be placed on the repair of the exterior and replacement of the heating system.

Proceeding with the idea of renovation the Rahway High School involves more than trying to determine which specific areas should be renovated. The inspections conducted of the facilities indicated most of the problem areas could have been and still can be remedied by a fully supported, well-staffed maintenance program. It is noted a maintenance program has been in effect for the past five years, but was too little, too late to preclude the need for a major capital improvement from developing.

The committee concludes the public must be assured the current maintenance program will be improved upon with proper staffing, budgeting and direction. The committee thoroughly reviewed the bond issues of \$5,990,000 submitted to the voters in February, 1983 and April, 1983, which were defeated, and the itemization of renovations proposed to be accomplished by said funding.

The committee also thoroughly reviewed a revised renovation project of \$3,100,000 which was being considered by the Board of Education in December, 1983. After detailed consideration of all relevant facts it is the recommendation of this committee that funding in the amount of \$3,919,000 be provided for

the renovation of Rahway High School. This is not an arbitrary figure, but one which was very carefully arrived at to see to it that essential areas of immediate need are addressed. They are: Mechanical heating and ventilating system; building exterior masonry repair and replacement of windows; interior building improvements for the handicapped, electrical, lighting, and plastering; auditorium lighting, doors, seating, and curtains, and locker room facilities for boy and girls.

The committee carefully studied each and every item of work to be accomplished in the above items and alternate methods of accomplishing the needed work, then scrutinized all cost estimates on an item-by-item basis. Emphasis was placed on health and safety factors, as well as educational program needs. Revised budget figures, using mid-1985 cost factors, were prepared by the ar-

chitects, with particular attention paid to areas of concern expressed by city inspection officials. Items to be accomplished during the 1984-1985 school year from the capital outlay budget were deleted.

The committee also examined the question of a solar energy retrofit for the building, but determined it was not an economically viable alternative to a renovation project of this type at this time, but could be compatible with the proposed system in the future.

All concerned parties, and especially the public, can be confident the recommended project budget of \$3,919,000 is neither extravagant in any way, nor does it shortchange the community or its students. This budget has the full, unqualified support of the committee.

It should be noted many other worthwhile improvements could be made to the facility, but the committee reduced its consideration only to essentials

as identified above, precisely so the public can have full confidence what is recommended is desperately needed for its benefit. The renovation of the heating system, for example, represents a cost of nearly \$2 million, or virtually one-half of the project cost, and is clearly a mandatory requirement for the health, welfare, and safety of our children.

As stated, the committee recommends a renovation budget of \$3,919,000. School officials have explored the possibilities of outside grants for such a project and no outside funds are available. Since the major portion of the recommended project is the heating system, it is recommended school officials investigate whether a state-approved "shared savings" contract would be applicable. ("Shared savings" is a program whereby a private company helps capitalize energy-use improvements in return for a

share of the annual cost savings.) School officials should issue a written report as to whether or not "shared savings" would be applicable to this project. Regardless of whether or not it is applicable, the committee wishes to emphasize its full support for the \$3,919,000 budget and its recommendation of community support for same.

The project should be financed by a bond issue of \$3,919,000. The amount of the bond issue, but not the project budget, would be reduced if any "shared-savings" investment could be obtained.

The life and terms of the bond issue should be determined by the financial experts utilized by the city and the school system, as they are better able based on their expertise and knowledge of market conditions, to structure the financing in the best interests of the taxpayers.

The bond issue should be brought to the voters for support as expeditiously as possible.

The committee agrees to stay in existence to the conclusion of the building program. All community leaders should give their strongest support to approval of the bond issue and campaign for voter support. The committee also recommends that the strength, success, and progress of the Rahway school system be emphasized to gain the public's favor.

Finally, the committee recommends an expanded maintenance program be designed and budgeted for in the annual school operating budget.

The quality of life for all citizens of Rahway depends on successful passage of a bond issue for the renovation of Rahway High School.

Rahway Center gives day care service

Editor's Note: The following article is in response to one published in the Rahway News-Record on Thursday, Jan. 31 which mentioned survey results showing the need for more day care in Rahway. It was submitted by JoAnn Gromel, the director of the Rahway Day Care Center.

The Rahway Day Care Center, a non-profit United Way child care agency founded in 1972, operates year round to provide child-care services to families of all professional and income backgrounds.

The agency, which was formerly located in the First Baptist Church on Elm Ave., moved to its present location in the old "Columbian School" building on New Brunswick Ave. in February, 1983.

Full and part-time programs are available for children three months to five years old in educationally-supervised classroom settings or in private family day care homes that are sponsored by the organization. During July and August the Rahway Day Care Center expands services to older children at very affordable costs to families.

The center's newest program, Infant & Toddler Care, meets an increasing demand from working families in the Rahway community. The newly-completed infant and toddler classrooms were designed to provide for the special needs of very young children. Babies are given

very individualized care and many opportunities throughout the day to move about and explore their environments. In the Toddler Room materials and organized activities encourage language, motor co-ordination and time to learn about people and the environment.

Through contracts with the New Jersey Dept. of Human Services and the New Jersey Child Care Food Program, the Rahway Day Care Center provides full-day pre-school and kindergarten care to more

than 85 families every month at very low cost.

Parent fundraising and private support allow the center to subsidize middle-income families who cannot qualify for federally-funded child care but who are still struggling with child-care costs.

Families wanting information about services provided by the Rahway Day Care Center are encouraged to telephone the office at 382-0544. The center is open Monday to Friday, 12 months a year, from 6:45 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

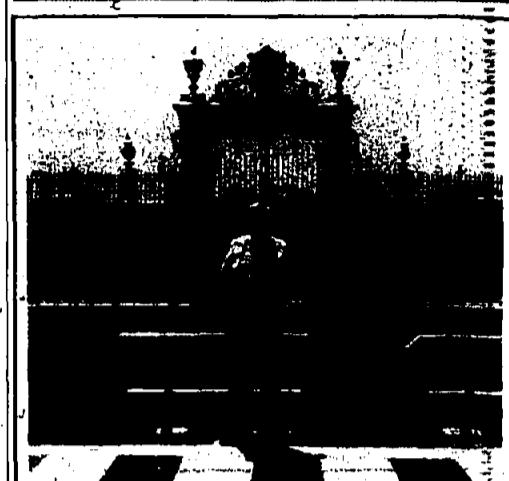
