## \$3.9 million high school revamp in hands of voters

Rahway's approximately 14,500 registered voters will decide on Tuesday whether or not the Board of Education should bond \$3,919,000 for major structural renovations at the city's 44-year-old high school.

A bi-partisan committee of city and school officials found, in a report published in last week's Rahway News-Record, "major renovation of Rahway High School must be undertaken immediately. Professional evaluation indicates the building is structurally sound and renovation is completely feasible. The committee recommends major emphasis be placed on the repair of the exterior and the replacement of the heating system."

As far as maintenance goes, it was noted by the committee, "a maintenance program has been in effect for the past five years, but it was too little, too late to preclude the need for a major capital improvement from developing."

The major proposed areas of improvement are: Mechanical—the heating and ventilating system; exterior-masonry repair and replacement of windows; interior-building improvements for the handicapped, electrical, lighting and plastering; auditorium-lighting, doors, seating and curtains, and locker room facilities for boys and girls.

New construction was not recommended by the joint committee for three reasons: First, neither the present high school site nor any other site owned by the school system would meet state requirements for a new high school; second, the length of time which would be required to develop a site, obtain state

approvals and actually construct a new facility would not meet the needs of the students and the community; and third, the cost/benefit ratio of building new, at an estimated price tag of \$15 million, provides no significant long-term benefits to the community and its students compared to properly executed, long-lasting renovations to a structurally-sound facility.

Two previous bond issues, totalling \$5,990,000 each, were defeated by voters in February and April, 1983 and a revised renovation project priced at \$3,100,000 was considered by the Board in December, 1983.

A major opponent of the two bond issues that were voted on, Atanzo Lawrence, the president of the Rahway Taxpayers Assn., reportedly has decided not to organize opposition this time.

Mr. Lawrence, an architect in Rahway, told a local daily newspaper he favors the school being weatherized before inside work is started, a project he said does not require bonding.

However, he did admit to the daily paper the heating plant does need something done to it.

According to the city-school committee report, "The committee carefully studied each and every item of work to be accomplished in the stated areas of needed improvement and alternate methods of accomplishing the needed work, then scrutinized all cost estimates on an item-by-item basis. Emphasis was placed on health and safety factors as well as educational program needs. Revised budget figures, using mid-1985 cost

factors, were prepared by the architects, with particular attention paid to the areas of concern expressed by city inspection officials. Items to be accomplished during the 1984-1985 school year from the capital outlay budget were deleted."

Architectural/engineering representatives from Eckert, Morton, Russo and Maggio, the official architects for the Rahway school system, attended all meetings and provided the committee with all requested information, according to the report.

In addition to help from city experts such as the plumbing inspector and business administrator, Joseph M. Hartnett, the committee members solicited the opinions of various members of the school's staff to help determine current and projected uses of school facilities.

Rahway's professional inspection staff made a detailed inspection of the high school and, as sitting members of the committee, thoroughly briefed all other members on its findings and professional recommendations, the report said.

It is believed the committee found it more advantageous to put the bond issue before the city's voters now than at the regular School Board Election on Tuesday, April 2 because Rahway voters have vetoed the regular school budget 22 times in the last 24 years and the same fate would befall the high school renovation should it be put up for a vote the same time as the budget.

The bond issue has the unanimous support of both the Board of Education and the Rahway City Council as

well as the city administration.

In a press release to The Rahway News-Record on Feb. 7, the Rahway Ministerial Assn., whose secretary-treasurer is The Rev. Thomas J. Donohue, the pastor of Zion Lutheran Church of Rahway, gave its public support to the bond issue and stated, "We encourage our members to study this matter carefully and to participate in the decision-making vote on Feb. 19, 1985."

### Martin: Vote 'yes' for good business

Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin issued a special appeal today to businesspeople and property owners to support Tuesday's referendum for the renovation of Rahway High School.

"I've discovered some businesspeople don't realize they have an important financial stake in the approval of a school-improvement bond issue like this," Mayor Martin said.

"This relates to the school bond issue," he explained, "because a primary factor in residential property values is the quality of the local school system. As any real estate agent knows, the value and sales price of a home is significantly influenced by how the local school system appears to prospective buyers."

"In short," the city's chief executive noted, "the status of school facilities affects residential values and residential values affect how much taxes businesspeople pay. This is why I urge all businesspeople to support Tuesday's bond issue."

"As for homeowners themselves," the mayor said, "even those without children in the Rahway school system have a major interest in supporting the referendum. Good school facilities mean more home equity and better sales prices for homes in Rahway and everyone wants to see their property value investment protected and enhanced. Investing in our schools is like investing in our own homes."

"The bottom line," the mayor asserted, "is everyone in Rahway—businesspeople and all property owners as well as schoolchildren and their parents—has an important interest in the approval of this referendum on Tuesday. That is why I as mayor am putting my name behind this referendum and am asking all Rahway citizens to vote 'Yes'."

### Martin proposes Parkway plan

Mayor Daniel L. Martin stated today he has learned certain Union County officials are pushing a proposal to install entrance and exit ramps on the Garden State Parkway at Inman Ave.

"I am dead set against this," Mayor Martin said, "and will do everything in my power to stop it."

In his view, the mayor declared, "increased traffic through Rahway, particularly in the Inman and Lake Aves. area, is the result of unbridled development in Middlesex County. If there are to be new Parkway ramps, they should be located where the traffic flows to and from Inman and Middlesex County, and not through Rahway."

The city's chief executive added any new Parkway ramps should be located at New Dover Rd. in Middlesex County.

"This would be an ideal site to serve the residents of Middlesex County without forcing the traffic through Rahway and Union County," he said.

The mayor continued to be "grossly annoyed" by the fact that the Parkway ramps would be located at Inman Ave.

"Over the years, Middlesex County municipalities have approved countless developments of houses, townhouses and shopping centers which are served by Inman and Lake Aves. in Rahway," he pointed out. "If these developments need to be served by Parkway ramps, it's about time Middlesex County officials took some responsibility for the traffic," he declared.

The Rahway mayor noted ramps on Inman Ave. would greatly increase traffic through residential areas of Rahway without any increased traffic through Middlesex County.

"This is a highway facility that happens," he said.

The mayor also pointed out certain officials in Clark Township are assuming the Inman Ave. interchange.

"I can understand their frustration," he said, "because their residents are also suffering from Middlesex County traffic. But I intend to win over Clark support to shift the burden of Inman County traffic to the Inman and Lake Aves. area, and not through Rahway."

Mayor Martin said that his administration has already been in contact with Inman County and Clark officials and he is forwarding formal written statements to the board of freeholders and the mayor and Council of Clark.

"I have already supported proposals which increase traffic safety," he noted, "but I will never support proposals such as this which attempt to inflict upon my citizens a burden which they do not want."

He concluded by saying, "The people of Inman and Lake Aves. and all of the communities along the Parkway need to be protected by the Parkway ramps. It's about time Middlesex County officials took some responsibility for the traffic," he declared.

### Franks bill helps remove asbestos




