Taskforce calls waste problem 'time bomb'

A billion-dollar effort to deal with New Jersey's toxsites ic and solid-waste problems has been recommended by a taskforce studying the issue at the Newark campus of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey.

the people of this nation by voting to end a treaty which forces the kill of seals. One of the largest mail drives ever to hit the Congress peaked in October of 1984 as the public protested the federal government's annual kill of seals for the fur trade

The first stage of Uncle Sam's fur business takes place each July in the mass clubbing of about 22.000 seals on their breeding grounds. The locale is Alaska's Pribilol Island. 750 miles off Anchorage and some 200 miles north of the Aleutians an isolated area where one might suppose this distasteful business could be conducted in secrecy. However, the significant millions in tax support needed to keep this very deficit fur business going inevitably calls attention.

The last Congress missed the chance to answer the people's demand due to chicanery on the part of the self-interest bureaucracy which directs the fur business. They parried the public outcry by delaying presentation of the issue, a delay which was further stimulated by the commitment given to ending the kill by Senator Charles Percy, then chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee: The bureaucracy submits to that Committee a commercial fur treaty. first initiated in 1911 to improve the lur trade, and following consideration by Foreign Relations, the entire Senate votes to renew or let lapse the treaty which forces the kill of seals. The freaty must be acted on shortly if, as the bureaucrats. hope, the July 1985 kill will be authorized. Or, as the people demand, the kill is to be halled.

The commercial treaty is at odds with the federal law known as the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (MMPA). While there is room for improving the MMPA it does have as a centerpiece the ecological importance of marine mammals and would stop the kill of seals on their breeding grounds because the population is rapidly approaching extinction. With renewal of the treaty the MMPA excludes the seals since international agreements are exempted from its provisions.

Letters to all U.S. Senators are needed. It is particularly vital to write President Reagan and also Richard Lugar. the new chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, since neither of them have given the issue their personal attention. Both respond to the public with letters apparently written by the self-interest bureaucracy.

Americans have long protested to Canada about its kill of the white, fluffy seals born on the icelloes of the Atlantic each February. The Congress in 1982 sent a resolution to the Canadian Parliament on behalf of the American people requesting a halt to that kill. The answer received was predictable, in the vein of "How can you object to our February seal kill when you have an official government kill every July?"

Halting the kill of marine mammals might be looked upon as saving a barometer of the health of the oceans, much as canaries were once used to test the air in mines. Man is killing the oceans in many ways, all of which need attention: Over-lishing, pollution with chemicals and nuclear materials, the dumping of non-bibdeoradable plastic materials and nets____

Jacques Cousteau warned the Congress, way back in 1970, that the life of the oceans had decreased by 40%. Since that time man's actions have resulted in a further vast decrease of both fish and marine mammals. It's overdue to act to save-the oceans. The Congress must take this lirst step now to save the sealsand then continue with other measures.
