Voters to decide on \$9.5 million in school taxes

Rahway's approximately 14,500 registered voters will be asked to cast ballots Tuesday on a 1985-1986 Board of Education budget which includes \$9,221,542 in local taxes for current expense and \$298,011 in local taxes to support capital outlay.

Although the outcome of voting for three candidates to fill the three, three-year seats on the Board has very little doubt attached to it, since the three incumbents are unopposed, an unusually large number of votes for a write-in candidate could unseat any of the three.

That event is highly unlikely, however. The budget will mean an increase of 21 cents per \$100 of assessed value or a boost of \$105 on a \$50,000 property if it is approved.

The overall tab, which includes many other factors besides local property taxes, amounts to \$14,034,273 for current expense, \$337,800 for capital outlay and \$258,825 for debt service.

Debt service is not voted on in the yearly school election. It is the amount paid on items approved at previous elections on bond issues and paid off over a number of years.

Prior to the adoption of the budget on March 12 the School Board had approved cuts from the budget then before it. The reductions, most of them in ad-

ministrative areas to reflect the fact that the ninth grade will be transferred from Rahway Junior High School to Rahway High School for the next school year, totaled \$292,732.

Included in the current expense portion of the budget is \$7,486,890 for instruction, a decrease of \$488,088.

Other items included in the current expense portion of the budget are: Attendance, \$15,075, an increase of \$700; health services, \$205,420, an increase of \$26,255; transportation, \$514,125, an increase of \$9,820; operations, \$1,128,385, a decrease of \$12,515; maintenance and equipment, \$518,170, an increase of \$25,910; fixed charges, \$1,895,310, an increase of \$308,145; student body activities, \$252,005, an increase of \$19,970; special projects and special education, \$844,505, an increase of \$666,505, and special projects, federal, state and others, \$717,193, a decrease of \$16,393.

The three Board members seeking re-election are Mrs. Lillie Henderson of 421 E. Milton Ave., Louis R. Rizzo of 1065 Madison Ave. and Ronald Matusalis of 1143 Stone St.

Mrs. Henderson, who has served on the school body for the past three years, is a supervisor at the Wood-

bridge Developmental Center. She has also served on 13 Board committees and was vice president of the education body during the 1983-1984 school year.

The candidate also serves on the board of directors for the Rahway Community Action Organization Service on the Educational Community and is the chairwoman of the agency's Emergency Food Bank Program, which provides food to anyone in the community who is in need.

Mr. Rizzo, the former president and owner of Town Hardware, Inc. of Clark, is completing his 24th year on the Board.

He served as its president from 1963 to 1968 and from 1977 to 1978 and again after that. He has been vice president a number of times and has

chaired a number of school body committees.

Mr. Matusalis, who has also served as president of the education body, was first elected in 1979.

He is the assistant vice president of operations for Paul's Trucking Corp. in Woodbridge and has held various offices with the Sideliners Club of Rahway.

School Board tables re-organization plan

A plan to re-organize the administrative and supervisory staff at Rahway Junior and Senior High Schools was tabled for further discussion at the March 18 meeting of the Board of Education.

Because of declining enrollment and the projected move of the ninth grade from the junior high to the senior high school in September, 11 department chairman positions would be abolished effective on Sunday, June 30, 1985, and nine re-structured area supervisor positions would become effective on Monday, July 1, 1985 if the proposed plan was adopted.

One controversial move was the proposed combination of guidance and special education into one supervisory position in place of the current guidance chairman at the senior high school and special education/guidance department head at the junior high school.

Board member, Mrs. Lillie Henderson, questioned the effectiveness of one person being able to deal with the combined departments.

Frank Brunette, superintendent of schools, cited budget constraints and the declined enrollment as reasons for the planned re-organizations. He urged approval of the plan and stated notices of the change have to be sent out by Tuesday, April 30.

Board member, William Hoodzow, stressed his interest and compassion for the special education children and his desire to see them get all the help available to them. He warned too many cuts in this area could hurt the children who need these services the most.

Another area of discussion included the new supervisory position of communication skills to include reading, compensatory education, library, compensatory education, writing, gifted and talented and H.S.P.T. Remediation.

Mr. Brunette stressed the importance of oral and listening skills in preparation for the High School Proficiency Test. Noting

this test would be more difficult than the Minimum Basic Skills Test given in the past, he explained the student would have to pass it in order to be graduated.

The motion to approve the re-structuring proposal was voted for further discussion with Board members, Ronald Matusalis and Louis Rizzo, dissenting.

In other business the Board:

--Accepted the resignation of Ned Howard, night custodian at the junior high school, effective on July 1, 1985.

--Approved the re-appointment of Paul R. Davis, night custodian at the senior high school, for the 1984-1985 school year, at an annual salary of \$12,550.

--Approved the following fundraisers for the senior high school class of 1986 to sell Austrian leaded crystal necklaces and jewelry for Mother's Day, proceeds to be used towards next year's senior prom, orders to be taken from Wednesday to Friday April 17 to 19; class of 1986 to sell M & M candies the week of April 22 to 26, proceeds to be used towards next year's senior prom, and the track team to sell M & M candies from March 19 to Monday, April 1, proceeds to be used towards the track meet in Williamsburg, Va.

Junior Women aid sight unit



Hospital to hold lung disease course

"I found out I had emphysema 22 years ago," says Leah Kasner, 73, a resident of Elizabeth who is currently enrolled in the Respiratory Evaluation and Support Program (RESP) at Alexian Brothers Hospital. "After that, my life became a series of adjustments. I learned that laughing, crying or running too much caused tremendous breathing problems. And the weather - particularly in the winter time - became my greatest enemy. Living with emphysema isn't easy," she says, "but I've done pretty well for myself and I'm getting a lot of help from RESP."

RESP is designed to help people with chronic lung diseases such as emphysema, bronchitis or asthma learn to better understand and cope with the disease. The ongoing program, which began at Alexian Brothers Hospital in 1982, is co-sponsored by the American Lung Assn., Central New Jersey, which is headquartered in Newark and which is headquartered in Clark.

The 12-week program is run by JoEllen Farrell, a respiratory nurse at Alexian Brothers.

"We teach the participants the importance of a proper diet and good health habits and we also devote a portion of each class to exercise. In this way we can help them build up their stamina and their lung capacity so climbing a flight of stairs or taking a short walk doesn't become a major problem," says the nurse.

She added, "RESP gives people with lung disease the knowledge and ability to be more in control of their lives."

To help filter through this information and to assist in separating fact from fiction, Mrs. Dedrick offers the following guidelines.

1. Check the author's credentials. Is the author from an accredited university or college? Does the author have experience in nutrition? Is the author a member of a recognized professional nutrition association?

2. Check the author's sources. Are the references cited or noted? If they aren't, you should be suspicious. If the references have been included, are they from reputable and recent sources?

3. Check the contents of the information. Is it logically and clearly presented? Is there excessive promotion of a certain product that should be taken or used to provide the nutrition?

It is easier to tear down a bridge than it is to build one. It is simpler to burn a book than it is to write one. We have seen these facts reinforced once more in our local school board election. The facts have been distorted and bent to fit a particular point of view which says simply, "We don't want to pay to educate the children of Clark. We don't care if the education they are getting is good, bad, or indifferent."

The loss of \$4.6 billion in GRS funds will deal a severe blow to thousands of local governments which are already straining from the loss of billions of dollars of federal aid in the last four years. Local services paid for by revenue sharing are not frills. The bulk of revenue-sharing funds are spent for essential services such as police, fire, health, and education.

In 1983, the latest year for which information is available, the largest category for which these funds were spent was police protection. When expenditures for police protection are combined with those for fire to 30 percent of total revenue-sharing funds spent by all local governments.

According to figures produced by the Office of Revenue Sharing the following municipalities in the Sixth District, under a formula which takes into consideration population, income, and tax effort, will lose the following amounts: Carteret, \$236,386; Edison, \$550,125; Highland Park, \$79,164; Metuchen, \$77,842; New Brunswick, \$5,169,915; North Brunswick, \$1,761,760; Old Bridge, \$514,143; Perth Amboy, \$515,055; Sayreville, \$120,495; South Amboy, \$33,183; South River, \$110,060; Woodbridge, \$465,924; Linden, \$151,505; Rahway, \$294,088; Roselle, \$198,737; Aberdeen, \$142,493; and Matawan, \$46,881.

In addition, Middlesex County stands to lose more than \$5.3 million, Union County will lose almost \$3.6 million and Somerset County will lose more than \$3.6 million.

What is important to remember about revenue sharing is that the services are provided, in many cases, at the direction of the federal government, counties and municipalities are the mechanism that must carry them out and establish the local delivery system. This is the reasoning behind revenue sharing.

In fact, despite its name, the program really is a tax base sharing. To help counties and local governments meet the cost of meeting national objectives the federal government has been sharing its enormous tax base with local governments which have much more limited resources. If this is not done there is no question the difference will have to be made up by the municipalities themselves and the burden will increase the burden on homeowners and renters.

There can be little doubt this program has provided county and state governments with funds which are important. It is for this reason legislation has already been introduced for its extension beginning in 1986 and I have co-sponsored it.

In addition, I will be working for the funding of this program in the Appropriations Committee. Simultaneously, bills are being made in the Senate and it is my hope this effort will be successful.



Mrs. Ogden backs Mt. Laurel truce

Assemblywoman Maur-
oan Ogden, who represents
Clark, said today "intense
negotiations between
governor and leaders of
both parties in the
Legislature are necessary
for a settlement of the Mt.
Laurel issue."

She said the governor will
conditionally veto a bill,
S-2046, that has passed
both houses of the Legis-
lature. The thrust of the bill
is to remove the courts from
their current role of setting
state housing policy.

"A solution to the Mt.
Laurel problem should have
the highest priority in Tren-
ton," Mrs. Ogden said, "and
the terms of the conditional
veto are crucial. They must
be acceptable to both parties
in order to avoid a legisla-
tive stalemate that would
be a disaster for the state."

"I believe the climate is
right for these
negotiations," she added.
"The Republicans want a
moratorium on court activi-
ty, a Constitutional amend-
ment to limit the court's
role in housing issues and a
new formula to establish
fair-share allocations of low
and moderate-income hous-
ing. The Democrats want a
stable funding source as an
alternative to the so-called
builders' remedy. Hopefully,
discussions between the con-
ditional veto to help assure
bi-partisan acceptance of its
terms."

"The legislator said an
alternative to the builders'
remedy is the most impor-
tant part of the legislation.
"The builders' remedy, a
court-ordered formula that
allows the construction of
fair housing units at market
value for every unit of low
or moderate income hous-
ing, has the potential to
destroy many suburban
communities," she noted.
"In many cases the courts
are ordering re-zoning to ac-
commodate construction
that literally doubles the
housing stock in some com-
munities. This is an in-
tolerable situation that cries
out for legislative relief."

Mrs. Ogden said she will
support provisions for a
stable funding source in ex-
change for the amendments
sought by the Republicans.
"There must be give and
take on both sides," she
declared. "Many com-
munities in our state will
suffer irreparable infrastruc-
ture and environmental
damage if we fail to resolve
the issue soon."

Mrs. Ogden, the
Assembly's assistant minor-
ity whip, voted against
S-2046 two weeks ago "in
hopes of strengthening the
bill through negotiations
and the governor's promis-
ed conditional veto."
