Voters to decide on 9.5 million in school taxes

By R.R. Faszczewski Rahway's approximately 14,500 registered voters will be asked to cast ballots Tuesday on a 1985-1986 Board of Education budget which includes \$9,221,542 in local taxes for current expense and \$298,011 in local taxes to support capital

Although the outcome of voting for three candidates to fill the three, three-year seats on the Board has very little doubt attached to it. since the three incumbents are unopposed, an unusual-ly large number of votes for write-in candidate could unseat any of the three. That event is highly

Revenue sharing: Our cities need it

General revenue sharing, which was established in 1972, represents an important portion of county and local budgets throughout the nation. It is the only federal allocation to local governments with the flexibility to be spent in response to local needs. Despite the crucial role revenue sharing has played in

enabling local and county governments to carry out na-tional objectives the Reagan Administration has proposed this program be eliminated beyond 1986, and has, in fact, sted no funds be provided for it in the 1986 fiscal year budget. In 1983 the program was re-authorized for three years, Tuesday, Sept. 30, 1986, an effort which I sup-

ported. Yet, only a little more than a year later, this pro-gram which benefits over 39,000 local governments and the people they serve is targeted for elimination by the Reagan Admi The loss of \$4.6 billion in GRS funds will deal a

severe blow to thousands of local governments which are already straining from the loss of billions of dollars of federal aid in the last four years. Local services paid for by revenue sharing are not frills. The bulk of revenue-sharing funds are spent for essential services such as police, fire, health care, education and corrections. In 1983, the latest year for which information is

available, the largest category for which these funds were spent was police protection. When expenditures for police protection are combined with those for fire these two categories of services alone account for close to 30 per cent of total revenue-sharing funds spent by all local

According to figures produced by the Office of Revenue Sharing the following municipalities in the Sixth District, under a formula which takes into consideration n, income, and tax effort, will lose the following amounts in money: Carteret, \$236,586; Edison, \$550,125; Highland Park, \$79,164; Metuchen, \$77,842; New Brunswick, \$516,915; North Brunswick, \$151,760; Old Bridge, \$514,143; Perth Amboy, \$515,405; Sayreville, \$120,495; South Amboy, \$33,183; South River, \$110,060; Woodbridge, \$465,924; Linden, \$151,505; Rahway, \$294,088; Roselle, \$198,737; Aberdeen, \$142,493, and Matawan, \$46,881. In addition, Middlesex County stands to lose more

than \$5.3 million, Union County will lose almost \$3.0 million and Monmouth County will lose more than \$3.8 What is important to remember about revenue shar-

ing is while these services are provided, in many cases, at the direction of the federal government, counties and municipalities are the mechanism that must carry them out and establish the local delivery system. This is the reasoning behind revenue sharing.

In fact, despite its name, the program really is a tax base sharing. To help counties and local governments meet the cost of meeting national objectives the federal government has been sharing its enormous tax base with local governments which have much more limited resources. If this is not done there is no question the difference will have to be made up by the municipalities through the property tax, which will increase the burden

There can be little doubt this program has provided county and local governments with the funds necessary to carry out vital services and I feel strongly about its importance. It is for this reason legislation has already been introduced for a five-year extension beginning in 1986 and I have co-sponsored it. In addition, I will be working for the funding of this
