Council to state: Fund theatre project

The Rahway City Council April 8 gave its unanimous support to a measure currently before the New Jersey State Senate which will possibly give state support to Rahway Landmarks, Inc. in its effort to restore the Old Rahway Theatre as the Union County Cultural Center.

If the bill, S.2624, is signed into law it will provide \$50,000,000 for the establishment in the department of state of a non-lapsing revolving fund to be known as the New Jersey Cultural Capital Improvement Fund.

The purpose of the fund will be to provide state grants to assist cultural centers owned and operated by non-commercial enterprises with their capital improvements.

Council members asked if the bill is signed into law the county cultural center be selected to receive funding.

The Governing Body members also introduced a bond ordinance to appropriate \$1,300,000 to pay the cost of improvement of the city's water distribution system.

Improvements proposed include the construction of a new 75-million-gallon elevated storage tank, including demolition and removal of existing stand-pipe and other structures at the water treatment plant currently in a state of disrepair.

Also in line for improvement are the upgrading of the city's water supply, quality, treatment and pumping systems to comply with current state and federal drinking water regulations and to reduce electric operating costs through improvements to the pumping systems.

Improvements to the city's water system distribution network, including repairs and replacement of leaking, undersized piping, valves, hydrants and appurtenances to comply with current New Jersey Water Supply Management Act and New Jersey Safe Drinking Water Act regulations would also be included.

Also introduced was an ordinance to prohibit parking on the southern side of W. Grand Ave. at any time from points beginning 350 feet east of the extended easterly curblines of Irving St. for 50 feet east, 205 feet east of the easterly extended curblines of Irving St. for 50 feet east and 160 feet west of the extended westerly curblines of Allen St. for 120 feet west.

The public hearings and possible final adoptions of the two ordinances will be held on Monday, May 13 at 8 p.m.

In order to celebrate "Lafayette Day," to be co-sponsored by the Rahway Business and Government Economic Development Committee and the Rahway Businessmen's Assn. on Sunday, May 5, the councilmen gave their permission for the city's sidewalk ordinance to be suspended to allow for an arts and crafts show on Main St. from Lewis to Monroe St., on Cherry St. from Irving to Main St. and on Irving St. from Lewis to Cherry St.

The gala is being planned to commemorate the day in 1824 when the Marquis de Lafayette was officially welcomed to Rahway.

Because additional funding has been made possible under the Community Development 10th-Year Jobs Bill, the Governing Body voted to extend the

second section of the Linden Ave. sanitary sewer project to the intersection of Linden Ave. and Hulek Pl.

The councilmen also adopted a resolution honoring the 1985 Rahway High School Boys Varsity Basketball Team.

The team, which had a 22-8 season record, was the North Jersey Group No. 3 champion.

It was also the runnerup for the state Group No. 3 championship and was the runnerup in the Union County Tournament.

Also adopted was a resolution awarding bids for

paper products and washroom and maintenance supplies.

The two successful bidders were the Zep Manufacturing Co. of Springfield and American Paper Towel Co. of Hackensack.

Senior citizen deductions for 1985 property taxes were granted to Efetus C. Wright, Charlie Lee Rogers, Carol Kmak, Jr., Carl R. Spies, Ernest Stanke, Lillian T. Finer, Majorie Christer, Edna Cannon, Anna Elizabeth Kinch and Hilma H. Hollingshead.

Dorothy Chomicki was granted a surviving-spouse deduction and Hyman

Zarinsky a deduction for the permanently and totally disabled.

Veteran deductions were given to Ellis Spears, Frank Irwin, Mark H. Keefe, William H. Marbach, Edward Bartz, Robert J. McCartney, John L. Malone and Thomas F. Higgins.

Granted deductions for being the widow or widower of a veteran were Mary Casio, Ann Vandermark, Ann Ginfida and Edward B. Devlin.

A total of \$8,250 in senior citizens deductions and deductions for the totally and permanently disabled

were removed for the 1984 tax year.

A total of \$7,300 in the same deductions as above were removed for the 1985 tax year.

\$2,536.58 for five property owners and \$1,097.66 for two property owners were ordered refunded for 1984 taxes paid in error.

The city treasurer was directed to refund \$80 of the \$100 paid by the Rahway Young Men's Christian Assn. for a permit for the repair and renovation of the group's main roof on its building.

'Grassroots' nourish arts center project

The Union County Arts Center Project, which involves restoration of the old Rahway Theatre on Irving St., Rahway, has continued to receive unsolicited donations from several quarters despite the current lack of a major fund-raising campaign.

Though the project has recently received cash gifts ranging from a few hundred to \$15,000 (the latter from the Rahway Savings Institution earlier this year), most have been of the relatively modest "grassroots" variety, in the \$1 to \$100 bracket, reports a spokesman.

Among the more significant recent gifts in this latter category was one from W.A.T.E.R., a Perth Amboy volunteer association currently involved in the restoration of that city's historic ferry slip.

Another was received from Mrs. Alberta Bublik of Rahway, whose two brothers-in-law, Barney Engelman and David

Oltarsh, built the Rahway Theatre in 1927-1928.

In addition, local artist Mike Harnett, has been donating 8 percent of his income from the sale of a limited series of reproductions of historic sketches depicting familiar sites in and around Rahway.

These cash donations are supplemented by dues for membership in Rahway Landmarks, the theatre's non-profit corporate owner, and by various fund-raising efforts. The latter include the sale of souvenir items such as T-shirts, caps and key chains. The hottest souvenir item at the moment is "ENCORE," a 50-page illustrated history of the theatre.

Rahway Landmarks plans to have a vendor site at the special outdoor historic pageant to be held in Rahway on Sunday, May 5, commemorating the Marquis de Lafayette's visit to the city in the early 1800's. It is also planning a flea market for the summer, an auction for the fall, and occasional bus trips to Atlantic City.

The 1984 vice president of the Rahway Board of Education, Mrs. Betta Jacobs, moved up to the top post without opposition on April 11 as the Board held its re-organization meeting.

Chosen as second-in-command for 1985, again without opposition, was long-time Board member, Louis R. Rizzo.

Elected to her first full term on the school body in 1983, Mrs. Jacobs was chosen on a write-in vote in 1981 to serve out the remainder of an unexpired term.

The administrative assistant to Dr. Mattyahu Marcus, an economist in Union, she is the past president of Roosevelt School Parent-Teacher Assn. and a member of the Rahway Parent-Teacher Assn./Organization Presidents' Council and the Rahway Junior High School Parent-Teacher Organization.

Regular Board meetings were scheduled for the third Monday of each month at 7:55 p.m. in the Roosevelt School auditorium and caucus sessions were set for the Thursday preceding the regular session at 8 p.m. in the Superintendent's Office at Rahway Junior High School.

Mr. Rizzo, who is beginning his 25th year on the school body after being re-elected on April 2, is the former president and owner of Town Hardware, Inc. of Clark and has served three terms as president of the Board of Education.

In addition to Mr. Rizzo, Mrs. Lillie Henderson and Ronald Matsuzaki, both re-elected incumbents, were sworn in for new terms on the school body.

In the second game he was credited with a save as the home team scored four times in the last inning.



Editor's Note: Following is the complete, edited text of a proclamation by Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin declaring Sunday, May 5, as "Lafayette Day" in Rahway.

As Mayor of the city of Rahway, it gives me great pleasure to declare Sunday, May 5, 1985 "Lafayette Day" in Rahway.

Sacrificing his own personal fortune, being wounded in action, the Marquis de Lafayette is a beloved historical figure who spent much time in Rahway during the American Revolution and upon his return to America after the war.

How to avoid mail sales ripoffs

The convenience of mail-order shopping will be more pleasant and less risky if you order.

•Never send cash. Use a check, money order or credit card because these can be traced if necessary.

•Don't buy a pig in a poke. "Above all, don't look for simple answers to complex problems, like losing weight without exercise or dining on fantastic bargains, like getting a \$350 color television for \$50."

•If you are suspicious about a company check with the Postal Inspection Service, the Better Business Bureau or a local or state consumer protection agency before you order to avoid offers that claim to be your "last chance" to get a bargain.

Fulcomer demands cuts in city budget

The inflation rate of the past year under 4 percent and last year's tax increase already too high," said Councilman Fulcomer.

"Consider the terrible municipal purposes tax paid with Westfield. In 1970 Rahway's municipal purposes taxes (not schools and not county) were \$44,000 LESS than the city of Westfield, a municipality with about the same population as that of Rahway. With less city services today as compared to 1970 Rahway taxpayers in 1984 paid \$2,756,100.32 MORE than Westfield taxpayers in municipal purposes taxes, according to the county tax board. We should try to stop this terrible trend from getting worse," the Republican declared.

Sex advertisements can be stopped

Parents who want to protect themselves and their young children from sexually-oriented advertising sent by mail can get help from the Postal Service, according to Postmaster Joseph P. Rulfo of Rahway.

The postmaster said two laws offer remedies and his post office can provide the needed forms and assistance in filling them out.

By making out Postal Service Form 2150 anyone who receives an advertisement for material he finds erotically arousing or sexually provocative can obtain an order against the mailer that will prohibit him-30 days after he receives the order-from making any further mailings to an address and his children listed on the form if they are under 19 years of age.

House spotlights pay equity action

Hearings on a proposed major study of alleged sex-based discrimination in the federal job-classification system began in the House recently, signaling a new round of controversy over the pay equity issue. Pay equity is defined as "equal pay for work of equal value to an employer, even though the jobs are not the same."

A recent Government Accounting Office (GAO) report cites a substantial wage gap between men and women in the federal government. According to the report, at least 50 percent of the pay gap remains unexplained.

The Subcommittee on Compensation and Employee Benefits of the House Post Office met on March 28 to review the recently-released report.

In the last Congress a bill to study the federal Civil Service pay system was introduced by my colleague, Rep. Mary Rose Oxtar. By a vote of 413 to 6 the "Federal Pay Equity and Management Improvement Act of 1984," overwhelmingly passed the House.

The legislation failed to gain approval in the Senate and died following the adjournment of the 98th Congress.

However, under an agreement worked out between several key legislators, the Government Accounting Office was requested to evaluate different methods of studying the federal Civil Service pay system.

Generally speaking the GAO report discusses ways to determine why female federal employees earn less than male federal employees.

Two general approaches were discussed, economic analysis and job content. Economic analysis attempts to measure and explain existing wage differences between men and women, using characteristics of individuals, occupations and the workplace.

Such an analysis could indicate the extent to which factors such as education, work experience and occupation account for wage differences by gender in the federal government.

On the other hand the job-content approach focuses on an individual's particular characteristics, such as seniority and education. GAO believes each approach has merit. Accordingly, the most comprehensive and effective means through which to conduct a pay-equity study at the federal level would be to include both approaches.


Through the passage of the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and the Civil Rights Act of 1964 Congress sought to deal with the problem of sex-based wage discrimination.

Still, for a variety of reasons, women continue to earn substantially less than men. The statistics, as tabulated by the Government Accounting Office, indicate male Civil Service employees earn the average \$12,000 per year more than female employees and that women are concentrated in the GS-5 positions and below.

In response to this gap Rep. Oxtar has re-introduced pay equity legislation, H.R. 27 calls for a detailed study of potential wage discrimination within the federal government to determine if and to what extent it actually exists.

As the nation's largest employer the federal government has an obligation to erase all vestiges of discriminatory wage practices. The passage of H. R. 27 would be an important first step toward this goal.

Heart disease is the No. 1 killer in New Jersey and the nation. Cycling is one of the exercises recommended by the American Heart Assn. to promote cardiovascular fitness. "Pedal For Heart" hopes to raise \$10,000 for heart research.

Mr. Kennedy's efforts are being supported by the American Heart Assn. Chapter and the New Jersey Chapter of Kiwanis International.

Both strongly urge community support of his noteworthy undertaking.

The meeting hall of Rahway Council No. 1140 of the Knights of Columbus is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year. Between 1948 and 1955 Knights of Columbus club rooms were upstairs at 73 E. The Knights purchased the present property from the city early in the 1950's. 

Children's Specialized Hospital and the American Lung Assn. of Central New Jersey, which is headquartered in Clark, will be offering "Superstuff Saturday," a day-long family education program for children with asthma and their parents, on May 4.

According to Chere M. Posch, nurse educator at Children's Specialized Hospital and co-ordinator of the program, "Superstuff Saturday" is structured to meet the needs of the elementary school child, aged five and above. Planned activities include sessions with physicians, a family counselor and a respiratory therapist. Portions of the day will be devoted to breathing in-

struction and relaxation techniques as well as group discussions. Each family will receive a copy of "Superstuff," a self-help program designed by the American Lung Assn. for children with asthma. The kit contains a fully-illustrated, 86-page book of activities which teaches children about coping with asthma. The disease accounts for about half of all chronic illnesses among children in the United States and is the No. 1 cause of school absenteeism.

"Asthma can be a frightening experience for a child," says Mrs. Posch, "but knowledge about it can help overcome that fear. 'Superstuff Saturday' is designed to teach children about asthma in a relaxed, fun-oriented environment. Our goal is to provide them with the knowledge and skills they need to control the disease."
