## Waste-plant tour 'sells' resource recovery

Faszczewski Rahway residents on a bus tour to the Signal-RESCO resource-recovery plant in Peekskill, N.Y. on May 2 were concerned about the number of jobs a similar plant proposed for Rahway, off Rte. No. 1 near Lawrence St., would provide and the effect of increased traffic from garbage trucks bringing trash from Union County's 21 ipalities into the city

would have on their lives. As on trips to the plant, which converts garbage to steam for electricity, taken earlier this year most of those attending were made aware Union-County and the state face a crisis situation when it comes to a place to dispose of garbage.

On the May 2 excursion was pointed out by Joseph Coleman, a partner in the public relations firm of Coleman & Pellet, which has been hired by Union County to run an educational program on resource recovery for Rahway and other county residents, the state at one time had over 360 landfill sites and by last year that number had decreased to 11.

A few of those on the trip had lived near the old Rahway city dump, which was located near the proposed site of the Union County resource-recovery plant, and they said they were aware of the smell and other irritations caused by having an open landfill

Those who had lived near landfills were very receptive to an alternative such as resource-recovery before the tour of the Peckskill facility, which disposes of 2,250 tons of municipal solid waste daily and generates enough electricity tor 40,000 homes.

They were more suppor-tive of the process after touring the Westchester County facility.

According to Richard Felago, the project manager fielded questions on the facility, trucks enter the pollution standards would control over the truck traf-

plant and dump their refuse into a pit, where it is taken by overhead cranes to incineration furnaces to be burned at 2,700 to 3,000 degrees Fahrenhelt and turned into ash which has had most of the pollutants

Mr. Felago added the burning process destroys most of the combustible hydrocarbons in the trash. and the plant maintains a "negative pressure" ventilation system that prevents

odors from escaping. —— He noted emissions into the air are also odorless, invisible and non-hazardous.

On the tour of the plant itself there was only the smell of garbage in an observation area above the pit brought in and an even slighter hint of a garbage. smell near the fur naces themselves.

There was no sign outside for garbage incineration, except for the trucks, which were covered securely when they entered and carefully

weighed.
Mr. Felago also pointed out workers stationed in observation areas high above the pit where the trash is brought in can get an overview of the entire dumping operation both with their own eyesight and with computerized monitors so any attempt to

truck in potentially-hazardous waste would be detected fairly quickly. years the Peekskill facility







It is to the men who responded in under five minutes to a plea for help, I is to the men who are professionals and provide a service to this community that too infrequently goes unnoticed. or worse yet, is taken for granted. This letter of thanks is to the men who not only say ed my house from total destruction, but for their efforts

A fire broke out in an upstairs bedroom and quickly spread between walls to the roof gable. Flames and smoke shot out the attic vent and substantial structural damage was the result.

Firefighters appeared within five minutes after my wife's phone call. Fire hoses were run through the house, men appeared with masks and rain gear and entered the smoke-filled room with exhaust fans

Within minutes the fire was under control, the smoke (which is probably more dangerous than the flames) was vented and a careful watch followed for an hour or so to make sure the fire was out and we could With all the excitement we didn't sleep very well. We

probably wouldn't have been able to sleep at all if not for be parting words of the last fireman out the door. He said, "Don't worry, the fire's out, but if you have any fears please call us any time tonight, and if we can be of any other service please don't hesitate to call." I am still amazed how such a dangerous and hot fire could be dealt with so quickly, and with such a minimal amount of water damage. Thank God no one was hurt. And thank God for the Rahway firemen who responded our urgent need. My family and I cannot thank you
