## City woman strikes 'gold' in cable industry

Janet Shalestik is outgoing, friendly and loves people.

These attributes led her to a career as an award-winning producer for Suburban Cablevision's TV-3. Janet won two Ace Awards, cable television's highest recognition for local programming and the equivalent of an Emmy for producing "Info, New Jersey's Newsmagazine," a program seen on TV-3 every Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock.

The awards were announced on June 3 in Las Vegas at the National Cable Television Assn. Convention and were given in recognition for both a program series and a single program—magazine show.

The winning entry includes a look at Seeing Eye, Inc. of Morristown, the story of the container shipping operation in Port Newark/Port Elizabeth, a piece on an independent film company working in New Jersey and stories on a Summit school teacher who adopted four Korean children and a taxi driver who is also a painter.

Janet is used to winning awards.

The New Jersey Video and Film Festival recognized her work by bestowing a first prize on "Info, New Jersey's Newsmagazine" in the magazine format category and a first prize in the local news category, for "Garbage," a program about Rahway's proposed resource recovery facility. She also won an Ace for a 1984 public service announcement on missing children that she co-produced.

The award winner is the youngest of four daughters and her parents, Mary and William Shalestik, still live

on Waite Ave., Rahway. She attended St. Mary's and Rahway High School.

While at Rutgers University in New Brunswick she switched her major from business administration to communications and journalism.

"I was in mathematics class one day and the professor put an equation on the board," she explains. "He said if anyone didn't understand it they didn't belong in that class. I picked up my books and left."

Her roommate, a communications major, had just returned from studies in France.

"She had a big effect on me. I saw how much fun she was having. I changed my major and went on from there," she added.

The Rahway interned at Suburban Cablevision in the underground construction department and honed her production skills. After graduation she worked at ABC News for a year in audience analysis, then offered her services to Barbara Friedman, producer of "A Woman's Place" at Suburban. She changed her internship to reporting and

writing and was listed as associate producer for the first time.

Janet was hired by TV-3 fulltime to develop a public relations department and to work on the "Right to Know" program. She sent out press releases, set up press conferences and gave speeches and spent more time on producing specials.

When the public relations department for TV-3 was consolidated with Suburban Cablevision's offices in East Orange she devoted her time exclusively to producing.

In larger companies each facet of production would be handled by different departments. At TV-3 the producer is also the researcher, writer, interviewer, director and sometimes host, and often sits in the room while the film is edited.

Janet attributes her success to the people she works with.

"Info is very much a team effort," she explains. "Robin Kempf, the associate producer/host and Patrick Lepore, the videotape editor, and I work closely together. We

are a team of three. The Ace Awards would not have been won if not for their effort. The Ace is theirs as well as mine."

In her spare time the producer plays tennis, skis, bikes—and belongs to a Nautilus Club.

"Exercise is important to me. I feel better when I exercise and when I don't have much time I give up sleep first," she declared.

Where does Janet see herself in the future?

"I very much like the hosting and interviewing parts of my job. I am not camera shy and I would like to do more on-camera work in the future. I can't see myself in any other type of job. I like going out and meeting people and I am concerned with issues important to people. I am very fond of New Jersey," she

told The Rahway News-Record.

"Info, New Jersey's Newsmagazine's" topics for June include "Seton Hall Prep. — South Orange," "Suntan Salons — Livingston Dermatologist," "Corporate Child Care — Hoffman La Roche in Nutley, and Merck in Rahway," and "Models and Designers Competition — Woodbridge."

### Court backs Merck in trade dispute

A spokeswoman for Merck & Co., Inc. of Rahway said June 7 the previously issued permanent injunction barring a generic manufacturer from selling or distributing indomethacin capsules similar in appearance to Merck's branded product, "Indocin" was upheld on appeal.

The permanent injunction, issued in October, 1984, barred Par Pharmaceutcal, Inc. from marketing indomethacin capsules in a look-alike trade dress (color, size and shape) to those marketed since 1965 by Merck under the trademark "Indocin."

The United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit on May 29 affirmed the earlier ruling by the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey in Newark.

The spokeswoman said the court found there is substantial generic non-look-alike competition for the Merck product and Par adopted Merck's trade dress for an unfair competitive advantage.

Indomethacin is used as an anti-inflammatory in treating the symptoms of ailments such as arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis, gouty arthritis, bursitis and tendonitis.

### Franklin rewards good attendance

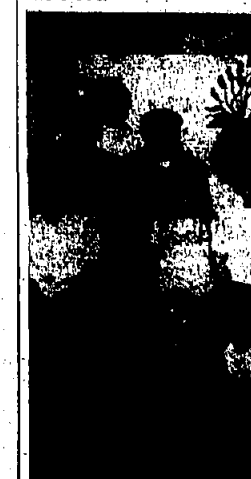

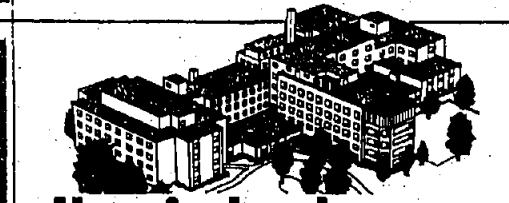

### Former Rahwayans receive degrees

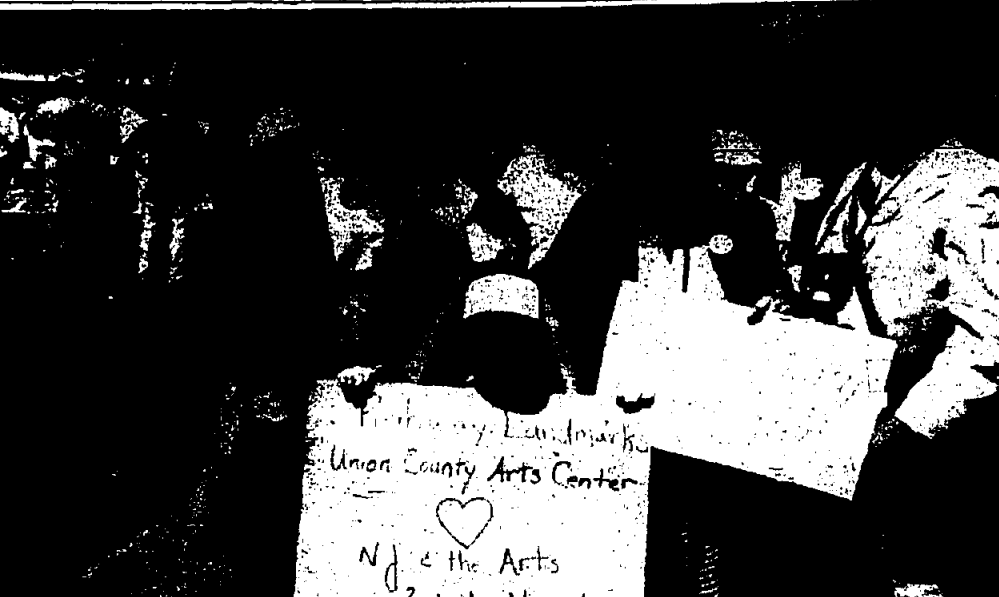

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### Twenty-six get adult diplomas

Twenty-six students received their New Jersey State High School Diplomas when they successfully passed the General Educational Development Test (G.E.D.) last month.

The 1985 governor's science scholars — 65 men and 35 women — will spend an intensive four-week studying chemistry, physics, mathematics, biology and computer science.

The scholars will have the opportunity to study science at the advanced level or to explore for the first time previously untried areas.

Evening elective classes include a popular "Quality" course on forensic science taught by a state police crime laboratory chemist. Or students may elect a course on cosmology, anomalies in science, genetics or in the science of stress, each taught by a resident expert.

Residence halls are overseen by 10 counselors who, in their own lives, are Drew science majors representing the five disciplines covered by the school.

The life of the science scholar is replete with — but by no means limited to — science. The inaugural class excelled at sporting events, music and other non-scientific, out-of-class pursuits and the class of 1985 is expected to follow suit.

This was the second G.E.D. testing given in Rahway this school year. The first testing, done in November, granted 17 adult diplomas.

The Adult Basic Education Program will honor this year's graduates and the students who participated actively in other aspects of the adult school at a special ceremony and reception today at 4 p.m. in the junior high school cafeteria.

**Fulcomer: Defeat freeze on benefits of Social Security**

Rahway Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer today urged the Congressional representatives to "oppose vigorously" an attempt before the Congress to reduce the amount of the Social Security payments to senior citizens and to continue the present policy of providing increases in accordance with significant increases in the cost of living.

"Many senior citizens cannot afford any loss of the purchasing power of their Social Security income. A one-year freeze on the amount of Social Security payments to senior citizens would reduce thousands of senior citizens to poverty level," said Councilman Fulcomer.

The councilman noted he strongly opposes any attempt to reduce the Social Security system to reduce the federal deficit, which is the argument given for the proposed freeze.

"There are many other ways of reducing the federal deficit without touching the Social Security system. Other remedies should be used and the full benefits of the present system should be retained," concluded the Sixth Ward representative.

Councilman Fulcomer recently sponsored a Rahway City Council resolution opposing the freeze.

**Leaders seek co-ordinated hazardous leak response**

Organization of the Hazardous Materials Advisory Council (HMAC) for Union and Middlesex County moved forward on May 30 with the announcement of key executive and committee appointments.

State Sen. Raymond Lesniak, who represents Rahway, the county chairman, said more than 40 representatives of government, industry and emergency-response agencies have accepted assignments to work together on the HMAC.

"This is a significant accomplishment," Sen. Lesniak added, "because it demonstrates wide support for addressing this critical issue. We have formed a public and private sector to minimize risks to our communities. We have major funding from industry for a training program for emergency response personnel. Now there is a broad-based organization in place to coordinate and address community concerns."

In April HMAC announced five industry-sponsored emergency response centers in Rahway, Dupont, American Cyanamid, Exxon Chemical and Union Carbide pledged \$400,000 to fund a training program to help emergency response personnel receive specialized training in management and hazardous materials involvement and cooperation.

"Speaking at a briefing on the progress of the program," Lesniak said, "the program was signed recently and work has begun on the first phase of the training."

Area officials involved with the program include Milton Grans, emergency management coordinator, Col. Richard Crosta, Union County emergency management coordinator, Alan Gardiner, assistant to the executive director of Rahway city services, R. Lajoussie, manager of the engineering and mechanical division of Exxon Chemical Americas, Committee chairman, Joseph M. Hartnett, Freholder Michael J. Lapolla, Bud Rafalo, a private citizen, of 275 Valley Rd., Clark, and Jack S. Snyder, director of corporate safety at Merck.

The main purpose of the group is to assess the emergency response capabilities of the communities.

Mr. Lajoussie added that the group will be able to coordinate the response of government, industry and emergency-response agencies.

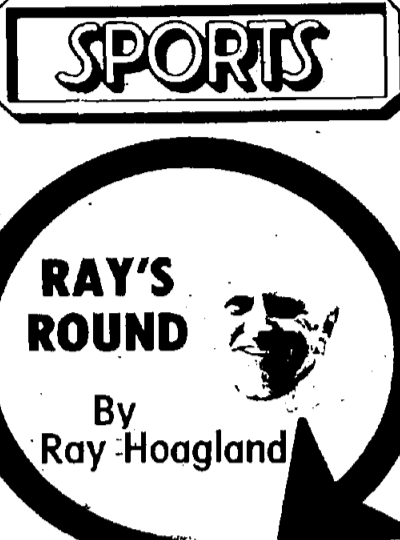

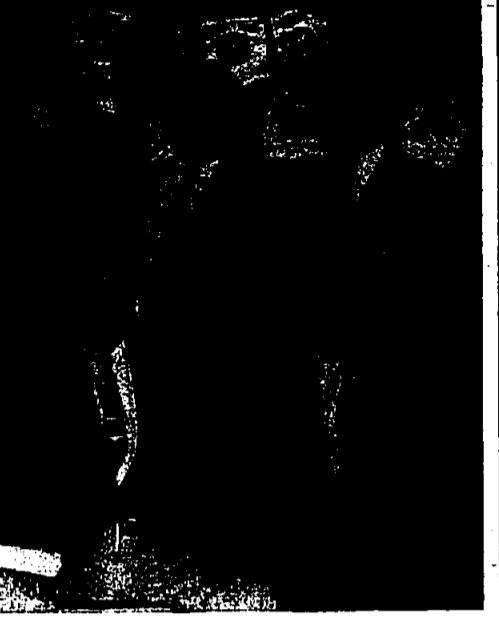

### Advisory unit backs rape crisis fund

At the last meeting of the Union County Advisory Board on the Status of Women the membership agreed to urge the Joint Appropriations Committee of the New Jersey Legislature to vote "yes" on Assemblyman Bob Franks' resolution to establish a \$500,000 yearly line item in the state budget to fund rape crisis centers throughout the state.

Administered by the department of health, the funds would be run like federal block grants, with counties being expected to come up with 10 percent matching funds.

A. Assemblyman Franks represents Clark.

Sandy Flack, head of Union County's rape crisis center, said the center is currently short \$65,000 of its annual budget of \$75,000 for the coming

year. The center is presently surviving on \$10,000 given to it by the mental health division of a social services block grant.

She emphasized such hit-and-miss support cannot sustain the center for very long and it was imperative a line item be included in the county budget for rape crisis so funding would be mandatory and no more laws would be required.

Sandy Flack and chairwoman, Betty Cox, agreed because Union County is the only county in the state not to have a fully-funded rape crisis center it was a top priority for women, cutting across party and ideological lines.

In other business, a questionnaire was drafted to explore the child care needs of the employees of the county. It will be distributed to them in their paychecks.
