

Residents: Waste plant not as popular as you think

Members of Rahway's Governing Body were warned by two residents and a councilman on June 12 that there is a great deal of opposition to the county resource-recovery plant proposed for the city and that the City Council and the administration should take more control of the events surrounding the waste-to-energy plant before giving outsiders such as Union County and the state the final say on what happens.

Eddie Smith of 1280 Clark St., warning opposition was growing to the facility, which is being considered for a site off Rte. No. 1 off Lawrence St., said the administration has been too kind to the county in its negotiations for the plant so far.

Pointing out 85 to 90 percent of Rahway's land has become occupied since 1954, Mr. Smith said it was absurd to let the use of the 5 percent remaining be put in the hands of outsiders and the question of resource recovery should be put on a referendum only to satisfy Rahway residents and not for the benefit of anyone else.

He also said it is wrong for the city to negotiate any benefits to be derived from the proposed facility only from a position of agreeing with the proposal because this was giving away bargaining power.

Mr. Smith said all residents, those in favor of the facility and those against it, should have the same right to have a voice in the matter.

He added the city should also consider the increased role the state is playing in the resource recovery plant decision, especially in light of the fact a bill on siting of resource recovery facilities has been introduced in the Legislature, and Union County may be giving out information on the plant in bits and pieces in order to wait for the state to act.

Citing the county's draft qualifications for proposals for the facility, Edward Robertson, another resident, wanted to know where an estimated 60 trucks per hour going into the resource recovery plant would be put, since the plant's location might force them to be backed up onto Rte. No. 1.

Mr. Robertson said it was difficult for people in the area of the proposed facility to understand the decision to build it, especially when they might have children crossing the highway to get to school.

He also emphasized the city is running out of land and it has firms like Quadrel, Ritter and Garden State Brickface and construction firms "which were kicked out of Montclair," to blame for some of the land in Rahway being lost.

Mr. Robertson noted money should not be the only consideration when thinking about the facility.

Business Administrator Joseph M. Hartnett assured Mr. Robertson many of the things he had seen in the draft proposal would be eliminated in the final county proposal document because Rahway was being given much more input on such things as traffic control and pollution standards.

He also said any entrance and exit areas for trucks going into or coming from the facility would be on-site and not off-site.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin assured Mr. Robertson there would definitely not be a grade crossing put on Rte. No. 1 to allow trucks to get from the northern to the southern end of the highway.

Pointing out there had been several trips already to an operating resource-recovery facility in Peekskill, N.Y., Mr. Hartnett asked Mr. Robertson if he would help organize trips to Peekskill or to others in Baltimore or in Saugus, Mass., specifically for residents of the neighborhood near the proposed Rahway site.

Mr. Robertson said he would be willing to help organize the trips.

The administrator added if the residents had any doubt whatsoever about the resource recovery process the only thing which could answer their questions satisfactorily would be a trip to see a facility in operation—not public relations presentations and not facts given out by officials.

Fifth Ward Councilman Jerry L. Coleman said he wanted specific answers on two questions: Whether resource recovery would be put on the ballot in Rahway, and if it was voted down would the plant not go up anyway?

Councilman at Large James Cudigan, who heads the Governing Body's committee looking into a referendum on the waste plant, told his First Ward colleague the city is still talking with the county on traffic and other matters and the referendum would only be held after that information was complete.

Mr. Hartnett added the Union County Board of James J. Fulcomer, who is also a member of the referendum committee, said in any event the councilmen would have a vote on the referendum and the county already has an official invitation from Carteret to bring its garbage to a resource recovery plant proposed for that municipality.

Responding to a statement by Councilman Coleman that the county must pay \$500,000 on an option to buy the Rahway land for the waste plant whether the plant goes in or not and the plant would go in even if the citizens voted against it, Councilman Fulcomer said under the law the freeholders would not be bound by the referendum, but past experience has shown they are willing to abide by the wishes of the people on the matter.

Mayor Martin replied the county has no intention of closing on the property—the closing must be done by the developer.

He also repeated Rahway would ask a minimum of \$1 per ton income from the facility and would have definite input into the final specifications going into the proposal for the plant, including traffic patterns and dollar benefits to be realized by the city.

Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh

declared the survey put out by the public relations firm hired by the county was geared to make it look like residents were definitely in favor of resource recovery.

The councilman added the public relations firm was definitely selling resource recovery, and he would introduce a resolution in the future asking residents simply if they wanted an incinerator put in their city.

When an ordinance was proposed which would change the zoning ordinance to allow for a hotel office complex zone in the area of the former urban renewal plot, behind City Hall some councilmen questioned the ordinance allowance of one parking space for every 350 square feet of floor space.

Fifth Ward Councilman George Wagenhoffer pointed out the present zoning ordinance requires 100 spaces for every 150 square feet of floor space, the most allowed in the city now is at City Hall, which has one space for every 250 square feet of floor space.

Mr. Hartnett suggested before the public hearing and possible final adoption of the ordinance, scheduled for Monday, July 8, members of the Planning Board, which set the parking standard in the new ordinance, should be brought in to explain how the standard was arrived at.

An attempt by Councilman Fulcomer to have the standard changed to one space per 200 square feet was defeated and the ordinance was introduced with only Councilman Marsh voting against it.

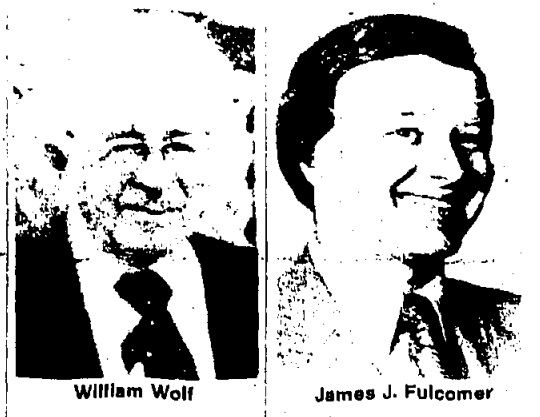

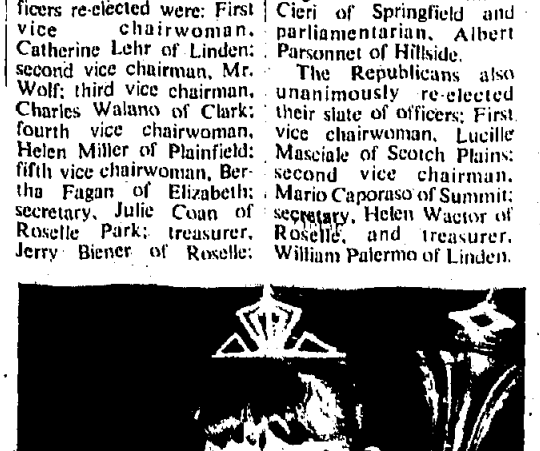

Landmarks thanks newspapers for aid

Another plaque has been added to the several that already adorn one wall just inside the Central Ave. Railway entrance to the offices of Tabloid Lithographers Inc., publishers of The Atom Tabloid and The Rahway News Record/Clark Patriot.

This latest one reads, "Our Sincere Appreciation to Tabloid Lithographers Inc. For Their Generous Contribution to Rahway Landmarks Inc."

A clue to the significance of the award exists in the view from any front window of the Tabloid offices. For there, dominating the landscape across the busy juncture of four of the city's

principal thoroughfares, somewhat tarnished with age, but still presenting an imposing visage of earlier days, is the old Rahway Theatre.

Its marquee, which bore "For Sale" signs for a couple of years, is back to being changed every week or so, usually to trumpet some new upcoming event for the benefit of something called the "Union County Arts Center."

Rahway Landmarks purchased the facility last fall, and, according to its president, Sandra Sweeney, "The acquisition, the restoration of the lobby, the current high level of

volunteer activity on weekends and the sort of "rosy-cheeked glow" that's gradually returning to the building may never have happened had Tabloid Lithographers not come to the rescue as the 11th hour approach to save this ornate old picture palace from an uncertain fate."

"Red" and Ellen Vigilante, the papers' owners, not only donated funds, says Mrs. Sweeney, "but they donated valuable space on their papers' pages, space in their offices, the use of their telephones and their good name to simulate an outpouring of support from local residents."

Many of Landmarks' dues-paying members, including those recruited through Tabloid Lithographers' intensive drive early in 1984, would probably agree the awarding of the plaque at a recent general meeting was long overdue.

"We thought of it several times and, in fact, had the plaque made late last year," reports the group's president, "but were so busy with so many different aspects of the arts center project restoration of the Rahway Theatre we just kept putting it off."

In casual conversation following presentation of the plaque, Mr. Vigilante remarked, besides the obvious benefits of the proposed arts center to the city, his newspaper had a much more humble reason for helping.

"We're neighbors," he said.

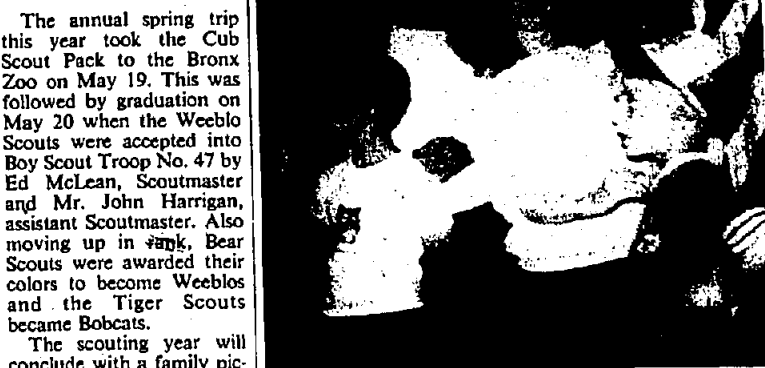

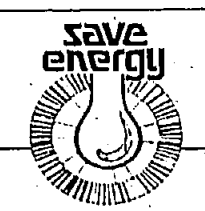

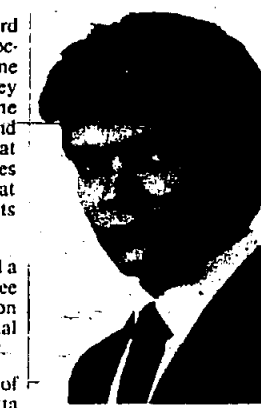

BUYING A USED CAR. Part Two: Inspecting the Car
Buying the right-used car involves a lot more than kicking a tire or two. You will need to look both inside and outside the car, under the hood and in the trunk.

Test Drive
