


Savings bonds aid in reducing debt

United States Savings Bonds, designed principally for the savings of individuals, were first issued in 1935. The program was created for the purpose of assisting the United States government in financing its debts in the least expensive and least inflationary way possible and to encourage systematic thrift habits by the American public

Savings Bonds are particularly important today because they are the most cost effective way the Treasury has to finance the public debt.

During World War II Savings Bonds became an important medium for absorbing the large increases in per-sonal incomes. Since that time the treasury department has promoted sales of savings bonds, particularly through payroll savings plans, as an important part of the debtmanagement program. A major revision in the savings bond program took place in January, 1980, when Series E and H bonds were replaced by EE and HH bonds. These
