

## Waste plant talks address many objections

A detailed agenda for a formal memorandum of understanding between Rahway and Union County on the county resource-recovery plant proposed for an area near Rte. No. 1, Rahway has been presented by city and county officials — and it addresses many of the objections raised by opponents of the plant.

Rahway Business Administrator Joseph M. Hartnett and Joseph E. Kazar, county solid waste co-ordinator, said in a joint statement, "This is a significant achievement because for the first time the county and city have a formal, written document setting forth all of the issues and conditions involved in the consideration of resource-recovery siting."

The agenda lists over 40 items for negotiation between the county and the city, with major emphasis on host community benefits and conditions that would be met if Rahway accepts the facility.

Among the items to be discussed are:  
— Substantial payments by the facility operator in lieu of taxes in the first year, with a formula for annual increases thereafter.  
— Permanent community improvements either as a lump-sum payment or for specific projects such as: The reconstruction of Mad-

den Field to provide new playing fields for baseball, men's and women's softball and soccer with lighting for night play. The lighting would be powered by the resource-recovery plant itself. Also, a contribution to the John F. Kennedy Community Center, the facility's nearest neighbor; contribution to Rahway Landmarks for the renovation of the old Rahway Theatre into a new Union County Arts Center; restructuring of Veterans Memorial Field and improvements to Green Field.

Mr. Kazar, in an interview with The Rahway News-Record, said the track record of other resource-recovery plants shows they are built to fit into the scenery of the surrounding community.

He added the evidence from facilities already in existence points to an improvement in desirability of property surrounding the facilities instead of a decrease in property values — as opponents of the Rahway facility have claimed would occur if the plant is constructed in this city.

The county official said in Saugus, Mass., where a resource-recovery facility has been in existence for over 10 years, there has been no evidence of a decrease in property values because of the plant's presence.

He added Peekskill, N.Y., where another facility has been in operation for a few years, the city is seeking additional industrial neighbors for the facility and a local real estate broker in the area was quoted by The New York Times recently as saying the area has become more attractive because of the existence of the plant.

— A traffic control plan for the county and the city which would insure no adverse impact on any res-

idential areas. Mr. Kazar told The Rahway News-Record the New Jersey Solid Waste Management Act gives the agencies in charge of waste disposal specific authority to control truck routes to and from a waste-disposal area. Mayor Daniel L. Martin added the control of truck routes by writing the contract with waste haulers to include penalties for not abiding by the routes is completely different from the recent controversy involving tandem trucks being allowed onto federally-funded highways in New Jersey because the roads involved in the resource-recovery system do not involve federal funding. Mr. Hartnett pointed out the county has suggested, if possible, all trucks will be color-coded according to the routes they can use, and not only the police but any citizen will be able to easily see if a truck is on a street on which it doesn't belong.

Mr. Kazar also said the proposed plant will probably not generate any "trucks" in addition to the ones which already use the Rte. No. 1 corridor through the city — about 190 garbage trucks per day.

— An environmental safety plan which would allow for city and county monitoring, as well as adherence to all state environmental regulations. Mr. Kazar explained the New Jersey environmental standards for resource-recovery plants are part of the licensing procedure and they would be required to be adhered to before any proposed facility was given permission to operate. The state would inspect the facility at least every five years to see if it was meeting the standards and also within the five-year licensing term. There would be automatic pollution controls installed on the facility

itself and the facility would be required to file forms with the state on its environmental controls — these would be kept as part of a permanent state record. He added the New Jersey guidelines, because they are tailored to each specific facility, are, in effect, more stringent than those in California, which is supposed to have the strictest environmental-protection laws in the country.

— Preservation of aesthetically-pleasing site conditions, including trees, shrubs and modern architecture.

— Purchase of all water from the Rahway Water Division, which, Mr. Hartnett noted, would have a major impact on keeping water rates low in the community.

— Job opportunities with hiring preference given, wherever possible, to Rahway residents, and then to county and state residents.

— Implementation of a resource-recovery project to insure that the plant and county conditions are met.

— A prohibition against any expansion of the proposed facility beyond what would be required to serve the needs of Union County. Mr. Hartnett pointed out before a memorandum of understanding is voted on city officials will seek input from citizens and the mayor would hold a formal public hearing on it.

"We want to give every resident a chance to make suggestions about the conditions Rahway should set for resource recovery," said the business administrator. "With all the co-operation the county has given in this effort we expect negotiations can be concluded in the next few weeks so the freeholders can reach a final agreement by Tuesday, Oct. 1. This would give Rahway residents and officials a full month to study the proposed final agreement before the November referendum on the resource-recovery facility."

Union County Freeholder Chairman

Richard Malgran told The Rahway News-Record the county has been working with Rahway officials very closely to get the best deal for the city and for the county and the county's options are somewhat limited since there is very little land left in the county suitable for a resource-recovery facility.

He added he is not in favor of a referendum because he is afraid this will "politicize" the issue of resource recovery and all those concerned about the issue will not come out to vote on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 5.

The county's options are also limited, Freeholder Malgran said, by the fact the New Jersey Dept. of Environmental Protection has been negligent in not setting up a regulatory authority to

deal with the solid waste crisis on a regional basis and the county must act now in its best interest.

The recent suspension of Union County Manager Louis Coletti will probably have a more positive effect on the negotiation process for the plant, according to the freeholder chairman, because acting county manager, Robert Doherty, will probably have a closer working relationship with the freeholders and he is familiar with all the details of resource recovery because of his position as county councilman.

A specific firm to build and run the facility has not been chosen, according to Mr. Kazar.

He said six companies have been qualified and proposals will be solicited from all six of them.





## Arts center offers 'Recognition Seat'

Rahway Landmarks calls it a "Seat of Recognition." Other arts centers have different names for it, but the objective is the same: GIVE CONTRIBUTORS THE OPPORTUNITY TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL AID TO THE PROJECT WHILE, AT THE SAME TIME, PERPETUATING THE MEMORY OF A LOVED ONE VIA AN INSCRIBED PLAQUE ON THE BACK OF AN AUDITORIUM CHAIR.

Rahway Landmarks' is a bargain compared with some others. For example, an arts center in San Diego requires a \$5,000 donation, spread over five years, for a single commemorative seat-back plaque. (For the same size donation, Landmarks offers a distinctive individual wall plaque in the lobby.) The required minimum donation for a Seat of Recognition — only

\$1,000 — total. It should be made clear the Seat of Recognition is merely a perpetual memorial, and does NOT grant the contributor a permanently reserved seat for attendance at future shows. The honoree may be a person living or deceased, an organization, a pet, a memorable event... There are no specific stipulations.

However, the wording will be negotiable, the limited mainly by the approximately four-by-six-inch uniform size of the plaque. Location within the auditorium may be freely chosen from among available seats in designated areas.

As a bonus the contributor will be granted a

membership in Rahway Landmarks (the non-profit organization operating the arts center), and the honoree's name will be listed in all future printed programs. Membership benefits include receipt of the Arts Center Newsletter (six issues per year) and discounts on souvenir items and on tickets to certain events.

## Schaffhauser Towers fulfill 15-year dream

The completion of the nearly-15-year dream of Walter Schaffhauser, the late director of the Rahway Housing Authority, came to fruition on Sept. 12 with the dedication of the five-story Walter Schaffhauser Towers senior citizen apartments at 165 E. Grand Ave. next to the Rahway Geriatrics Center.

The project, built and managed by the housing authority, is part of a total center for the elderly meant to work in conjunction with the geriatrics center.

It contains 39 one-bedroom units and one two-bedroom unit. Four of the one-bedroom units are specifically designed and built for the handicapped.

The first floor houses the new offices of the housing authority, including office space, a conference room and an area for social services. A multi-purpose room with a cafeteria is also included. There is parking and landscaped grounds with areas for sitting, walking and gardening.

Addressing the gathering at the dedication, Mayor Daniel L. Martin said the building of the facility took much hard work and frustration.

Citing the fact the New Jersey Historical Commission had wanted to preserve the old Washington School, which had stood on the site, as a historical monument instead of erecting the housing complex there, the

mayor said the area now has "living history with this building. It is a large building, but it is a small tribute to Walter Schaffhauser."

He congratulated all involved in the planning and construction of the towers. After an invocation by the Rev. Donald B. Jones, the pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Church of Rahway, in which he cited the new pride residents of Rahway felt with the construction of the complex, John P. McGrath, the executive director of the authority, said the dedication was a tribute to the

"best board of housing commissioners any community could have," noting the presence of two commissioners, Catherine Papirnik

and Councilman-at-Large Walter McLeod, in the audience.

Mr. McGrath added there was no partisan politics in the authority. It just got the job done.

After the presentation of a new television set to the apartments' residents for their community room by representatives of the building's architectural firm, Harsen & Johns, authority commissioner, Frank D. Cruz, unveiled a plaque in front of the building into which the original cornerstone of the Washington School had been placed.

He also presented the authority with a picture of the school citing its 66 years of service to the city from 1897 to 1983.

Johnson, remembered Mr. Schaffhauser as a "warm and wonderful man" and complimented Rahway on its good sense and hard work in putting the project together.

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

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
