

High school revamp on the move

Work in some areas can begin immediately while other work will be spread out during the year. Repairs to major exterior areas will

hopefully begin in March, including new front steps and railings. Work on locker rooms, the biggest area slated for repair next to heating and ventilation, is planned to commence in April, 1986, with the auditorium, library and cafeteria projects expected to begin in June. Mr. Maggio said an elevator will be installed across from the auditorium entrance to accommodate six to eight people and to be used for moving equipment and for the handicapped. He said plans are in good shape and they are now just tying up loose ends. Mr. Nilo explained work on the heating system can continue throughout the fall and winter by isolating certain areas of the school. He expects to be able to install new boilers without dismantling the old ones and by installing new valves he stressed there will be a minimum of discomfort. He said the present heating system is antiquated and would cost too much to repair. Mr. Rocco said classroom disruption would be minimized throughout the project. He asked the parents to understand any complaints that might come home with their children are due to the renovation work. He also thanked Board member, Louis Rizzo, for his support and involvement in the renovation project. Waste plant report: No drop in property values

There is growing evidence resource-recovery facilities already in operation have no negative impact upon neighboring property values—and actually serve to improve the desirability of land surrounding the plants. According to Union County Freeholder Chairman G. Richard Malgrán, data gathered from prominent real estate brokers, major real estate lenders and a local tax assessor indicates that a similar plant in operation since 1984 is attracting considerable attention from other municipalities interested in its technology as well as from businesses hoping to be neighbors, the Union County official said. According to a recent "New York Times" report Philip T. Gans, Jr., a real estate agent for Houlihan/Lawrence, said of the Peckskill resource-recovery plant, "if they're all as good as this one, I think everybody would be happy to have one in their locale," the freeholder added. "The information is extremely good news for the people of Union County and Rahway in particular," said Chairman Malgrán, "because it should serve to allay any concerns residents might have had with regard to the impact the plant will have on property values. If there is any impact at all the evidence suggests it will be a positive one."

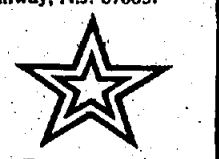

Rahway Landmarks calls it a "Seat of Recognition." Jewish Women sell safety banners

Members of the Mid-Bergen Section of National Council of Jewish Women, a community service organization have inaugurated a "life-saving" project. A banner-type white sign emblazoned with bold orange letters that spell out "CALL POLICE" can be attached to a car windshield signaling trouble on the highway. The section is making these banners available to the public at a cost of \$3 each. The banner is made of sturdy, reflective plastic with reflective lettering. Double-stick tape holds it securely to car windows. The chairman of the project, Judi Neidenberg, suggests each family carry one of these signs in its glove compartment so all the driver needs to do in an emergency is to tape the banner to the interior rear car window, lock the doors and wait for police help. Don't risk disaster by walking miles for help or leaving children unattended, she said. Proceeds for this project will support council community service projects. Alternatives to Domestic Violence, Swim-In for the Handicapped, Dr. David Goldberg's Child Care Center, special events for senior citizens, "Tapes for Tots" project for the pediatric services of local hospitals, Winter Emergency Food Packages for senior citizens, and "Kids on the Block" - a puppet program for the local schools using handicapped puppets in an effort to combat discrimination against the handicapped. Adult school sets courses in health

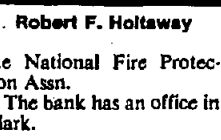

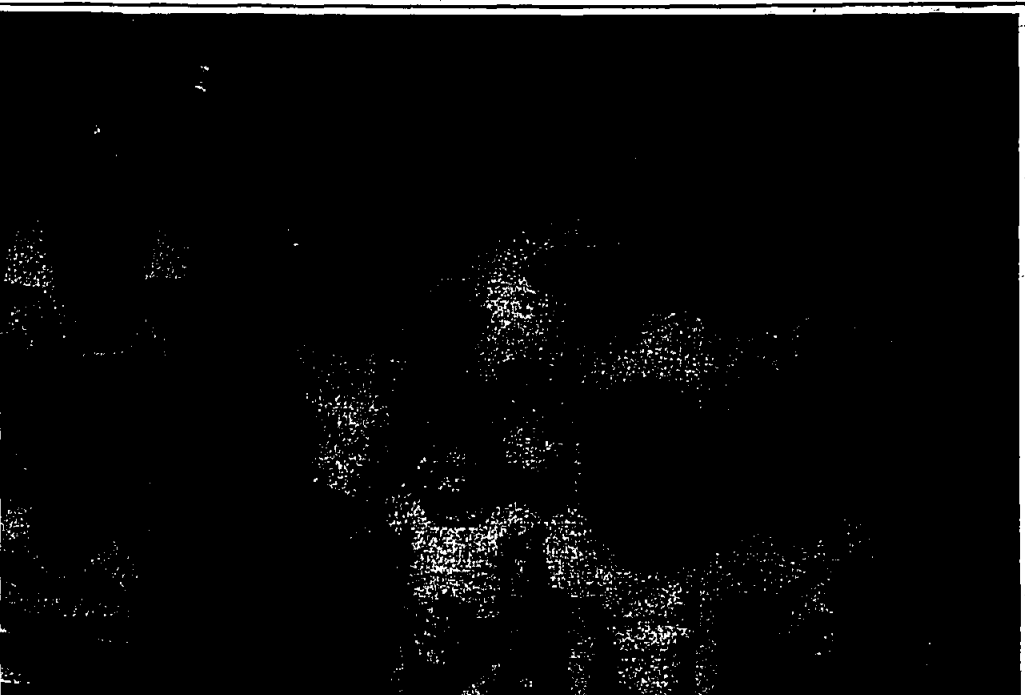

Boright gets action on residency law

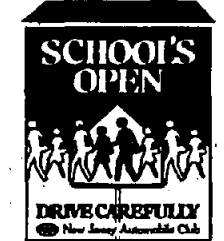

Capt. Jones retires from Navy service

A former Rahway resident, Capt. Stephen H. Jones, son of Mrs. Robert L. Jones of 26 Black Birch Road, Scotch Plains, and a 1960 graduate of Rahway High School, retired from the Navy on Sunday, Sept. 1 after over 21 years of active duty. Capt. Jones had a distinguished combat record after commanding a group of river patrol boats in Viet Nam in 1969-1970. He attended naval nuclear power training and served as a nuclear engineer on the nuclear aircraft carrier, USS Enterprise and USS Carl Vinson, and on the nuclear cruiser, USS Mississippi. The captain recently completed 27 months' assignment of the guided missile destroyer, USS Buchanan, homeported in San Diego. During this past March the Buchanan was the ship denied entrance into New Zealand, precipitating an international disagreement among the ANZUS Treaty signatories over New Zealand's insistence United States ships certify they are not carrying nuclear weapons as a pre-condition to entry into New Zealand ports. The United States position is to neither confirm nor deny the presence of nuclear weapons. Capt. 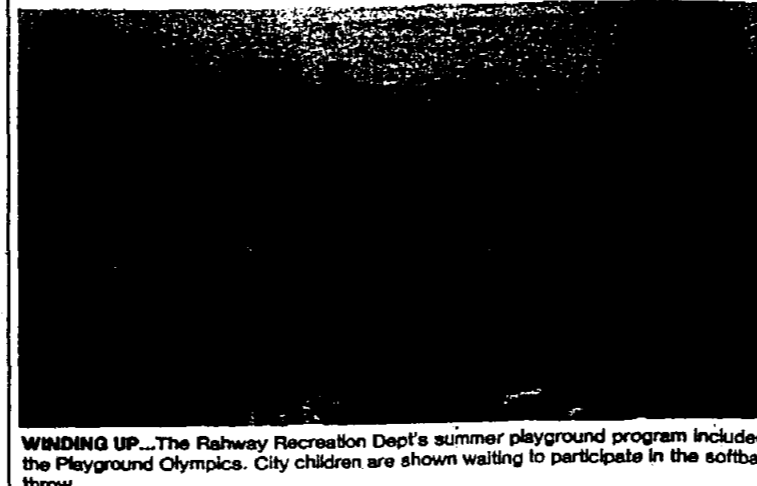

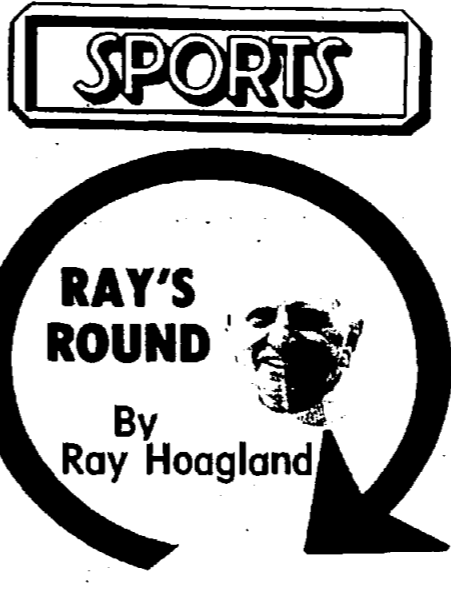

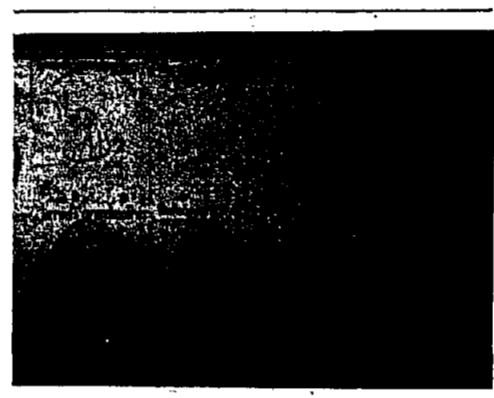
