Presently the Clark Senior Citizen's Club meets weekly at the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall and the money the township gives to this group -\$1,500 per year is used to oav for rental of the facility for its meetings What our opponents fail to mention is that the Council has offered a rent-free meeting place for this private club so that the need for the \$1,500 no longer exists.

The current Democratic administration has establish a senior citizens' complex in the Brewer Community Center --a complex supported by a \$40,000 county grant that was secured by Mayor Nucera while he was still a member of Council. With this grant it has been possible to refurbish many areas of the Brewer building for the use of all of Clark's senior citizens. I have spoken with William Wermuth, the president of

The Clark Senior Clitzens' Club, a number of times in order to arrange a meeting facility in the Brewer complex, and because his group has paid rent for the VFW meeting room to cover the rest of this year it wishes to remain there for now. The Brewer complex is now open, however, to all

senior citizens in Clark. The local chapter of the American Assn. of Retired Persons meets there once a month and is very happy with our accomodations. Our services are many and varied and the list continues to expand: There are recreation, game and conference rooms; there is a television and a library, the gymnasium is set up rium. We have offered blood pressure testing three times a week we hold exercise classes with a qualified instructor, and we have scheduled speakers, the Handicapped most recently a nutritionist. We have distributed vials in which our senior citizens can place important medical information that would then be made available to the first aid squad in the case of an emergency. Late in August I conducted a survey of senior citizens who met at Brewer to determine their priorities. Their greatest concern was housing and next in importance was the availability of meals in the cafeteria. I have been in

contact with Phillip Pearlman at the county division on aging in order to obtain a unit for meals in the Brewer afeteria and we have discussed the possibility of Meals on Wheels in town. I must clarify one last point. I now receive a salary for my position- so do other township directors. But contrary

to what my opponent hopes you will believe, my salary comes from the \$40,000 grant budgeted from the county, not from the township. The county earmarks \$4,000 for this salary, but so far with three quarters of the year gone by I have personally collected \$1,332. The balance has been utilized for the fees of speakers and instructors at the senior citizens' complex. I could also have my out-of-pocket expenses reimbursed but I choose to pay for them

I have worked hard for the senior citizens of Clark, I have put in long hours, I have tried to do my best for them, I strongly believe in what I do, I love my work. And of these accusations, I admit, I am guilty.



My staff and I appreciate the chance to chat with you and describe to you what goes on on a daily basis in our office. We want to answer questions which "you always wanted to ask, but didn't know from whom you ould get the answers." Today let's discuss two questions which many of you

ask whenever you come to the Surrogate's Office at the Union County Court House, Second Floor, Old Annex, 2 Broad St. Elizabeth, telephone, 527-4280, or when I see you at gatherings throughout Union County. I. What is meant by "probate of a will"?

Under New Jersey law the county surrogate admits wills to probate, which means upon the death of the testator to testatrix (maker of the will) the legal process which is required to settle an estate is started by tablishing the genuineness of the will. 2. Where does this process take place?

This process takes place in the Surrogate's Office in the county in which the decedent resided. In the case of most of the readers of this newspaper it would be the Union County Courthouse. (address given above). In the next column I will continue to answer questions on wills.
