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We have emphatically rejected any thought of letting Union County become the testing ground for some experimental technology," Kazar said. "We know this one works because of the weight of scientific evidence and because we have seen it in operation first hand."

Kazar emphasized that the plant under consideration will accept only residential and commercial wastes. "No hazardous industrial waste, chemical waste or toxic substances will be accepted," he noted.

To prevent these materials from accidentally or illegally entering the plant, the County plan calls for trucks to be weighed and inspected before entering the tipping area, the

enclosed portion of the plant housing deep bunkers into which trucks unload refuse under the supervision of plant operators. The wastes are then mixed to assure proper burning and transferred by crane into a refuse feed hopper that leads directly to a charging chute and then into the furnace.

In the mass/waterwall system, solid waste is burned at temperatures averaging 1800 degrees Fahrenheit to assure maximum combustion. Water-filled tubes lining the furnace then produce steam which is converted to electricity for sale to a local utility.

The ash that remains after burning, totaling roughly 15% of the original

waste volume, is usually delivered to a landfill, although research is currently under way to explore possible use of the residue for road construction, building materials and other applications.

The plan prohibits depositing or storing solid waste outside the plant at any time. Only closed trucks enter or leave the plant, thus rodents and insects are not attracted. All odors are contained within the plant because the facility is totally enclosed, and also because a constant negative air pressure is maintained which continuously draws air from the tipping area to provide oxygen for combustion.

Thus, even when doors open to admit trucks, air moves into rather than out of the building. Any odors carried by the air from the tipping area to the furnace are destroyed by the high temperature burning process.

The mass burn/waterwall system is one of several technological processes commonly referred to as "resource recovery." However, because of its long record of success, it has been identified as the technology of choice by Union County and is now the centerpiece of the solid waste plan.

This plan, recently amended by the Board of Freeholders and submitted to the New Jersey Department of Environmental

Protection for approval, calls for the proposed resource recovery plant to dispose of roughly 75% of the County's solid waste stream, estimated at approximately 1,200 to 1,500 tons per day.

Other elements of the plan are: 1) recycling, which is to account for about 25% of the County's waste; and, landfilling, which will consume those wastes not suitable for burning and also the ash residue from the resource recovery plant. "It is a state-of-the-art solution to a tremendously serious problem," said Kazar. "It is clean, efficient, economical and practical. Moreover, it is the only sensible solution available to us," the County official concluded.

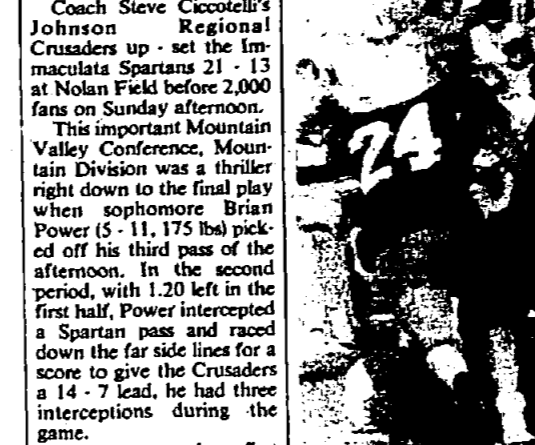

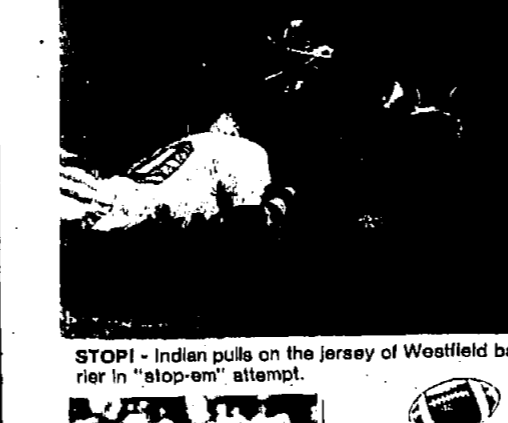


ON HIS WAY - Crusader Jeff Barr runs with the ball as Immaculate players move in. Barr scored with touch-down.

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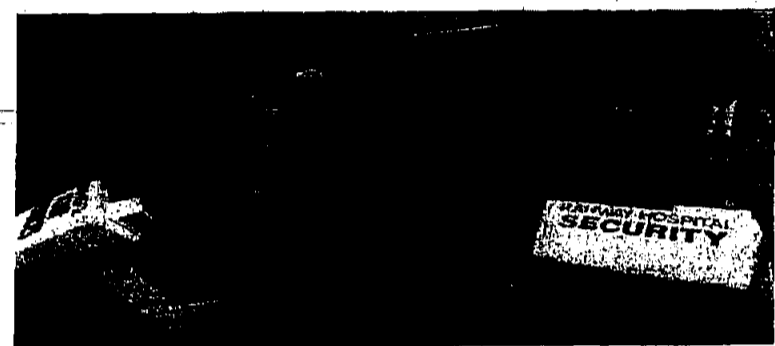
