

## Crowd relives 'vaudeville days' at theatre gala

Nostalgia reigned at the old Rahway Theatre on Sunday, Oct. 6 as an estimated 200 persons were treated to authentic glimpses of a colorful bygone era.

The occasion was the unveiling of a bronze plaque memorializing Bernard (Barney) Engelman, a self-made Rahway business leader who, with his brother-in-law, Major David Olanish, built the elegant, 1,600-seat theatre in 1927-1928.

On hand for the mid-afternoon event were several persons who had been involved in some aspect of vaudeville and silent films.

The theatre's restored Wurlitzer pipe organ played as attendees and special guests filed in. On view in the partially-restored inner lobby were several preserved artifacts from the theatre's early years, including original lobby furniture and banners trumpeting the takeover by the fledgling RKO Corp. at the onset of the great depression of the 1930's.

Alan Hurley, vice president of Rahway Landmarks, Inc., the theatre's present owner, opened the program by identifying some of the special and honored guests. Besides members of the Engelman family, local business and religious leaders and representatives of local government, these included Morton Bratter, who managed the theatre at the time of its 1928 opening; Ethel Kingsbury, whose late husband, Chet Kingsbury, was the theatre's first house organist and later Musical Director for the NBC Network; Joseph Harko, a

local resident who occasionally emceed stage shows at the theatre and was part of the Hark & Bark vaudeville team, and Manila Taylor, a veteran silent film piano accompanist.

The ceremony officially commenced with an invocation by Rabbi Jacob Rubenstein of the Rahway Hebrew Congregation (of which honoree, Barney Engelman, had been an active member) followed by an address by Walter McLeod, councilman-at-large and president of the Rahway City Council.

Councilman McLeod described the theatre restoration project as one that would benefit everyone, and expressed his relief at being able to address a non-controversial subject for a change.

Sandra Sweeney, Rahway Landmarks' president, introduced the principal guest of honor, Robert Engelman, the honoree's younger son and retired president of Spiegel Inc., the nationally-famous Chicago mail order firm. He and other family members had donated the memorial plaque, together with a substantial cash contribution, to the restoration effort.

Mr. Engelman, 73, had just attended the 55th reunion of his Rahway High School graduating class (the class of 1930).

"Rahway has changed," he said, noting it had been only half its present size when he grew up here in the 1920s.

"But the whole world has changed," he added.

He described his father, who died in Florida in 1950, as a self-educated man whose philosophy was,

"When you take something out, you must put something back in."

"You all have your memories of Rahway," he concluded. "I hope they are as good as mine."

He and Mrs. Sweeney then unveiled the plaque, which contains a sculptured likeness of the honoree and the words "IN MEMORY OF BERNARD (BARNEY) ENGELMAN, 1878-1950, RESPECTED RAHWAY MERCHANT, BANKER, CIVIC ACTIVIST, SUPPORTER OF CHARITABLE CAUSES; BUILDER OF THIS THEATRE."

Rahway Landmarks has commissioned a special "planning study" in preparation for the start of a capital fund drive. The study was scheduled to commence on Oct. 7 and to be completed by Friday, Nov. 1.

—MORE ABOUT BARNEY ENGELMAN—

Barney Engelman emigrated to this country with his family from their native Austria before the turn of the century, settling first in Elizabeth, where he was subsequently employed by the Singer Manufacturing Co. for a number of years.

Early this century he married Miss Lena Pachman of Rahway and opened a small dry goods store in the store while he retained his job with Singer.

In time the little store on Main St. expanded into Engelman's Department Store, the largest one in Rahway. By investing his profits from the store in real estate, Mr. Engelman became one of the city's largest property owners.

However, cost overruns in its construction forced Mr. Engelman to sell off much of his property, including the department store.

In addition, he helped organize and direct the former Rahway Trust Co. and became a director of the Axia Federal Savings & Loan Assn.

Barney Engelman served on the Board of Adjustment and in several other capacities, was a substantial donor to the building fund for Rahway Memorial Hospital, and provided free ice cream for children at annual field day events and history prizes for eighth-grade students in the Rahway public schools.

Upon its completion in the autumn of 1928 the Rahway Theatre became the city's largest (and most elegant) commercial structure.

It had—launched the distinguished professional careers of two young broadcast organists, one of whom—Rex Koury—composed the theme for the

"Beverage Shop" on Irving and Lewis Sts.

In 1946 he sold it to his son, Irving Engelman, and a partner and went into retirement.

He died of a heart attack on Feb. 6, 1950 at his winter home in Hollywood, Fla. He is buried in the B'nai Israel Cemetery in Elizabeth.

—THE THEATRE'S LEGACY—

Although Mr. Engelman was forced to sell "The Rahway" in 1937, it was not until Nov. 27, 1981, after briefly functioning as a showplace for X-rated films the theatre finally shut its doors as a commercial enterprise.

long-running "Gunsmoke" radio/television series—been the site, in 1933, of the biggest wedding in Rahway's history and one of the biggest in the history of New Jersey (the bride and groom were an obscure young couple who had volunteered for the honor)—launched one of its managers, Sam Sileff, on a brief Hollywood career

as personal manager of MGM superstar, Mickey Rooney,—and hosted stage appearances by entertainer, Bert Parks, and baseball great, Don Newcombe.

Rahway Landmarks, a non-profit corporation founded in the city in 1979, acquired the solidly constructed theatre in September, 1984 and the following January began

restoring it for re-opening as a combined civic center and county arts center.

The complete history of the theatre is covered in the 50-page illustrated souvenir book, "ENCORE For a Worthy Performer," published in 1984 by Rahway Landmarks.

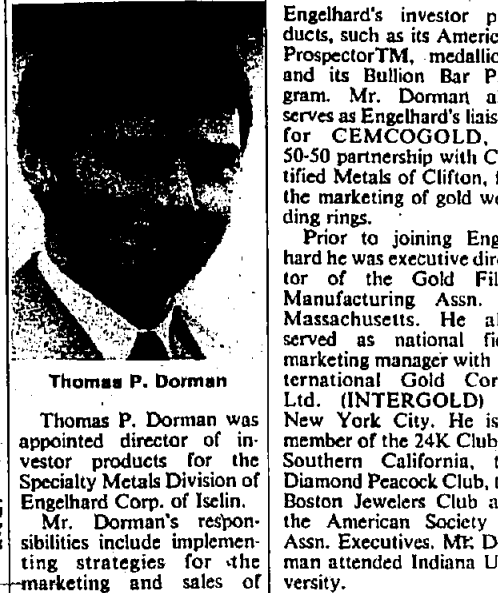

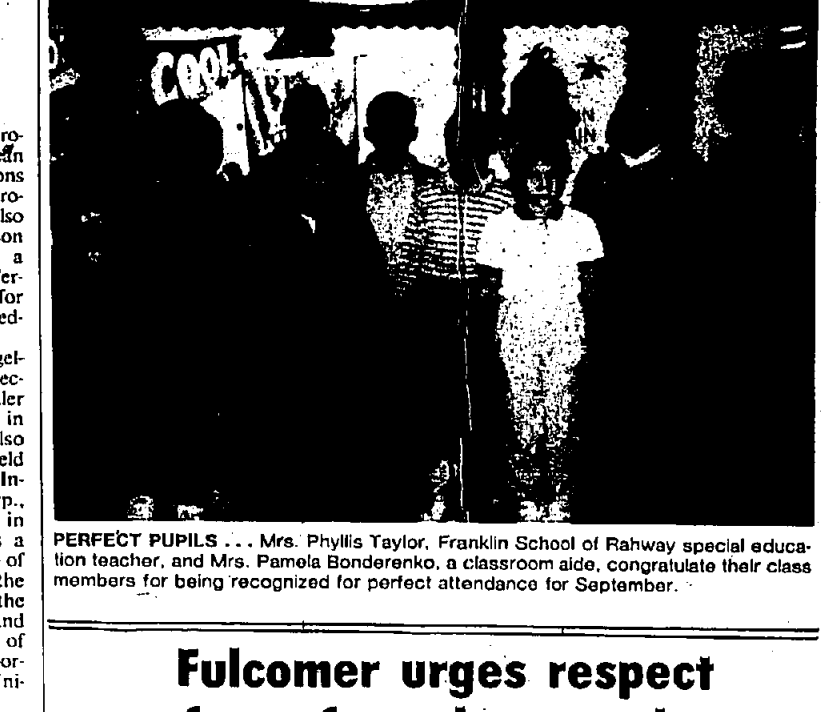

### State help praised in rest area cleanup

Editor's Note: The following is a letter to the editor from Peter M. Campana, Clark's senior citizen director and the Democratic candidate for Fourth Ward councilman, who resides at 18 Broad Ave.

I would like to take the time to publicly acknowledge the record of the cooperative job done by Mayor George Nucera, safety chairman, Councilman Joe Posnock, the majority of the Township Council and the New Jersey Dept. of Transportation (D.O.T.) in helping to resolve the problems at the Madison Hill Rest Area of the Garden State Parkway.

Over the course of the past two months I have visited the rest area and observed firsthand the department of transportation's clearing of the underbrush and cleaning of the area. On one occasion I accompanied Councilman at-Large Fred Eckel to photograph the area as proof for Mayor Nucera and Council that progress was indeed being made.

The New Jersey Dept. of Transportation responded swiftly and strongly to our request for help, and for this I deserve to be commended, not antagonized, as my opponent wished to do. The D.O.T. emphatically stated previously under no circumstances would it close the rest area since New Jersey is one of the worst states in the nation in terms of rest areas.

It was much fortuitous on the part of my opponent, and would have served no purpose to demand the area to be closed. We must also keep in mind it would have been unwise to antagonize the D.O.T. since Clark is trying to get the department's support for a traffic study on the feasibility of opening another exit and entrance to the parkway on Inman Ave., Colonia to relieve traffic congestion at exit No. 132, which empties into the parkway circle. It was gratifying to see the sound, rational judgment of the mayor and the experienced, senior members of the council.

### Development unit backs waste plant

The Union County Economic Development Corp. would like to express its strong support for the plan being undertaken jointly by the county and the city of Rahway to build a modern, environmentally sound resource recovery facility on Rte. No. 1, Rahway.

Clearly the problem of solid-waste disposal has traveled the full course from "service taken for granted" to "situation too long overlooked" to its current status as a "full-blown crisis."

While Union County has an impressive list of features and benefits it is obvious failure to devise a method of disposing of the things we throw away can literally strangle our economy.

However we believe Union County is fortunate in several regards. 1) It has a freethinker board which has moved aggressively to resolve the solid-waste crisis, 2) in ideal location as a resource recovery has community, but also the significant revenue-producing and cost-saving benefits that could accrue to it, and 3) a sensitive, safe, efficient technology exists with which to address the problem.

In light of these considerations we would like to urge the county and Rahway to continue working cooperatively toward a realistic solution to the problem of solid-waste disposal.

### Building trades support waste plant

The Union County Building Trades, after careful consideration, support the building of a resource recovery facility in Rahway.

These facilities have proven to be environmentally sound and will provide the city of Rahway and Union County substantial tax revenues to help reduce the tax burden on homeowners.

It will provide 50 permanent jobs and up to 500 construction jobs over a three year period. This will certainly provide a major stimulus to the county's economy.

## TAKE MY WORD FOR IT

### TERRORISM INTERNATIONAL EXTORTION

Terrorism, which means many forms, has been around for a long time. Even the words to describe this phenomenon are not new.

In fact, terrorism, terrorist and terrorize were coined during the French "Reign of Terror" from March, 1793 to July, 1794. Once again, however, it is necessary to go back to Latin, to the word *terrore*, to frighten, for the source of these words. *Terrore* has some nasty relations, including *terrible* and *terrific*. The closely-related Latin word *terrificus* produced *terrore* and the not-so-terrible word, *terry*.

One revered etymologist suggests *terrore*, from the Latin word *terrore*, which is usually associated with *terra*, earth, might also stem from *terrore*. This interpretation relies on the word's sense of to warn off, which is what you might do to someone who trespasses on your territory.

One of the more sinister forms of terrorism is sky-jacking. This word is analogous to "hijack" which probably came from a greeting used by a highway robber as he pulled up to the driver's window of his potential victim. The recent sky-jacking, a form of airborne extortion, is one of the newest and most effective tools of international terrorism for getting media coverage. This act focuses world attention on the hostages, who become innocent pawns in a gigantic game of international chess. Next week we shall explore hostage and related words.

### Letters To Rahway Hospital

Q: Because of the many questions that patients and their families have asked about the PRO (Peer Review Organization), we thought this column would be a good place to describe the PRO in depth.

A: The PRO, which operates independently from the hospital, is a group made up of doctors who have a contract with the federal government to review the hospital care of Medicare patients. This review must be done in order for the hospital to be paid for care rendered. The PRO conducts the review either before the patient is admitted or after discharge.

For certain illnesses, a doctor has to obtain the approval of the PRO before a patient can be admitted to the hospital. If this is the case, several things can happen:

1. The PRO may say all in order and the doctor can go ahead and admit the patient.  
 2. The PRO may say the patient requires care but doesn't need to be admitted to the hospital to be treated.  
 3. The PRO may say the patient does not need the care ordered by the doctor.

If the PRO disagrees with the doctor, the patient will receive written notice of the decision. The doctor and the patient have the right to appeal the decision, but if the appeal is unsuccessful, Medicare will not pay for any treatment rendered.

If the doctor does not have to receive approval from PRO before admitting a patient to the hospital, the medical record may or may not be reviewed by the PRO after the patient has been discharged.

If the record is reviewed then and the PRO disagrees with all or part of the treatment, the patient will receive notification. This notice is only to inform the patient of the PRO's decision and to tell him or her the hospital will not be paid by Medicare. Patients have the right to appeal any determination by the PRO whether it is made before or after treatment.

Since the hospital receives payment from Medicare depending on the determination of the PRO, our staff will also conduct a review of the care ordered by physicians for Medicare patients. In the event we determine a patient no longer needs hospital care, the patient is notified in writing.

## Real Estate Commission sets new rules to protect the public

In a move to protect the real estate consumer from fraudulent advertising practices, the New Jersey Real Estate Commission has approved a proposed regulation that calls for full disclosure in ads.

The proposed regulation prohibits brokers from making any free offers of services or goods unless the offers are clearly disclosed in the advertisement. The regulation also requires that all advertising must be truthful and claims must be provable. Any advertisement offering a free gift or other prize are not misleading.

A long-standing rule which prohibited brokers from making any free offers of services or goods was repealed by the Commission on July 30. According to Daryl G. Bell, director of the Commission, courses in Illinois and other states have ruled that similar prohibitions were unconstitutional because they violated a broker's right to commercial free speech.

"With the courts finding similar regulations unconstitutional, it is imperative to act first, adopt our own regulations, and then challenge the courts," Bell said. The Commission will hold a hearing on adoption of the regulations on Oct. 22. ## Posnock praises Rinaldo boatride

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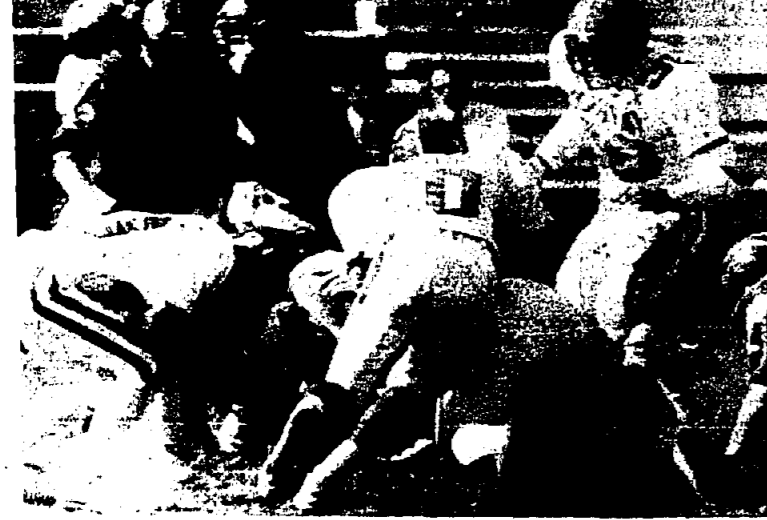

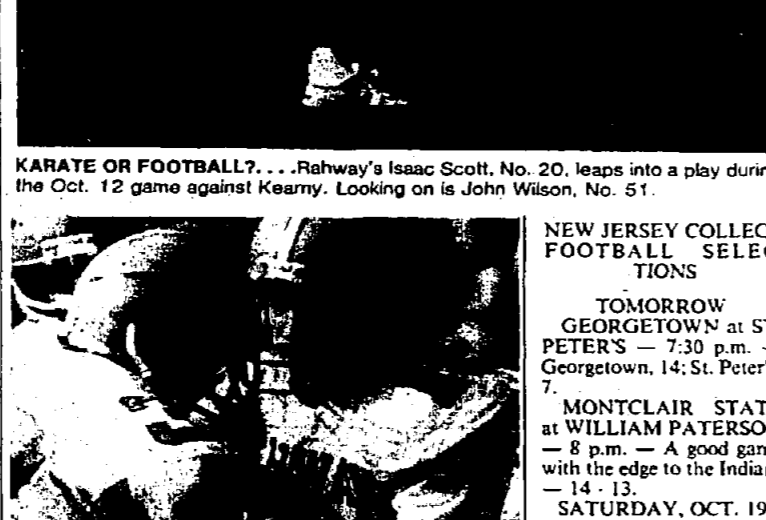
