Editor's Note: The following is a letter to the editor from Peter M. Campana, Clark's senior citizen director and the Democratic candidate for Fourth Ward counilman, who resides at 18 Brant Ave.

I would like to take the time to publicly acknowledge, for the record, the fine co-operative job lone by Mayor George Nucera, safety chairman, Councilman Joe Pozniak; the majority of the Township Counii and the New Jersey Dept. of Transportation (D.O.T.) in helping to resolve the problems at the Madison Hill

Rest Area of the Garden State Parkway. The safety of Clark's residents is first and foremost. Over the course of the past two months I have visited the rest area and observed firsthand the department of transportation's clearing of the underbrush and cleaning of the area. On one occasion I accompanied Councilman-at-Large Fred Eckel to photograph the area as proof for Mayor Nucera and Council that progress was indeed being made

The New Jersey Dept. of Transportation responded swiftly and strongly to our request for help, and for this it deserves to be commended, not antagonized, as my oppo-nent wished to do. The D.O.T. emphatically stated previously under no circumstances would it close the rest area since New Jersey is one of the worst states in the nation in terms of rest areas. It was rash foolishness on the part of my opponent,

and would have served no purpose to demand the area to be closed. We must also keep in mind it would have been unwise to antagonize the D.O.T. since Clark is trying to get the department's support for a traffic study on the feasibility of opening another exit and entrance to the narkway on Inman Ave., Colonia to relieve traffic conges ion at exit No. 135, which empties into the Clark Parkway circle. 

Once again, however, it is necessary to go back to Latin, to the word terrere, to frighten, for the source of these words. Terrere has some nasty relations, including terrible and deterrent. The closely-related Latin word terrificus produced terrific and the not-so-terrific ward, terrify.

One revered etymologist suggests territory, from the Latin word territorium, which is usually associated with terra, earth, might also stem from terrere. This interpreta tion relies on the word's sense of to warn off, which is what you might do to someone who trespasses on your territory

The recent sky jacking, a form of airborne extortion, is one of the newest and most effective tools of international terrorists for getting media coverage.
