



How to use stock, bond indexes

Editor's Note: Following is the ninth in a series of columns on financial planning by Jennifer Hicks, a financial consultant for Shearson Lehman/American Express, Inc. of East Brunswick.

It's a familiar sight: Executives and other investors rustling through the evening paper to the financial pages to check their stocks. But those who simply scan the tables describing the performance of individual stocks before turning to the front page or the sports page are getting only half the picutre - and perhaps a deceptive of It isn't enough to know your stock rose or fell and by

how much. You must also know whether it traded with the market or against it. In general, if your stock is moving in the same direction as the market as a whole — whether up or down you have no special cause for concern. But if the market is rising while your stock is falling, you should talk to your financial consultant about what's going on an whether you should sell. Conversely, if the market is falling while your stock is rising, you should discuss buying

The easy way to gauge what the overall market is doing is to look at the market "averages," the various indexes that show how large groups of issues have moved. Check the broadest indexes first, that is, the ones most representative of the stock market as a whole. These are e "Standard & Poor's (S&P) 500" and the relatively new

Next, look at the indexes of the three main stock ex changes: The New York Stock Exchange (NYSE) Index the American Stock Exchange (Amex) Market Value Index and the National Assn. of Securities Dealers tomated Quotations (NASDAQ) Index, which covers the over-the-counter market.

You'll probably want to glance, too, at the mos widely-quoted index, the Dow Jones Industrial Average Be aware, however, the Dow may not be as accurate a reflection of the market as it once was - for severa reasons. It is a narrow measure, covering only 30 blue chip stocks. It does not include a good sample of the dynamic new growth companies in the American economy. It represents primarily industrial enterprises, whereas service companies now comprise a major seg-

Finally, if you're particularly interested in industrial utility, transportation or financial issues, look at S&P's or other specialized indexes. For example S&P covers 400 ndustrials, 40 utilities, 20 transportations and 40 finan-

chg", which tells you whether the index moved up or down and by how much. If you track this information other market and business center had made too many bad regularly and also note whether the volume on each exchange was heavier or lighter than normal (which you can find in the paper's daily market summary article), you w

soon get a sense of market trends. You can keep tabs on the increasingly volatile bond market in similar fashion. Most investors are less familiar with bond indexes than with stock indexes, but since many people now own at least a few Treasury securities what's happening in this segment of the financial market

The easiest way to stay current is to check the Shear son Lehman Treasury Bond Index, which is made up of all outstanding Treasury issues with maturities of one year or longer. It's a good indicator of overall bond market trends, since Treasury obligations today account for 63% of the total bond market. Moreover, corporate and municipal bonds generally follow the moves of Treasury issues. This index appears daily on the next to last page in "The Wall Street Journal" and in many local


The key item to look for in the Shearson Lehman Treasury Bond Index is the number on the far right above the graph — say, +11.25 — which indicates the number of "points" the index rose or fell from the previous day's close. (Points equal 1/10 of a percent, and are equivalent to dollars. An 11.25 increase means the price of a composite Treasury bond was up \$11.25.)

Because bond prices reflect interest rate changes (in versa), following this index will give you the information you need to time your purchases or sales of fixed-income

Child nutrition needs our support

The House of Representative voted recently to extend a number of important child nutrition programs through its overwhelming support for H.R. 7, the School Lunch and Child Nutrition Act.

The legislation, which won passage in a 367-59 vote Sept. 18, would extend through fiscal year 1988 five child nutrition programs, including the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) supplemental feeding program. I joined the vast majority of my colleagues in the

House in supporting this bill. H.R. 7 is a fiscallyresponsible bill that recognizes the cost-effectiveness of providing nutritional benefits to our nations' children. A modest increase is provided in the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program that would allow 120,000 additional participants.

WIC provides crucial nutrition and health services to low-income pregnant women, infants and children who are determined to be at nutritional risk. A recent bipartisan study by the House Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families found WIC is a deficitreducing program that saves \$2 and \$3 in medical costs for every dollar spent on pre-natal care and nutritional The Women, Infants and Children program current-

ly serves three million participants, only about one third of those eligible for its services. The modest increase provided in H.R. 7 for this program would allow more pregnant women, infants and children through age four to be served by this effective program, and help restore some of the losses suffered when child nutrition programs were reduced by nearly one third in 1981. ____

Another important program improvement provided in H.R. 7 responds to an evaluation by the United States Dept: of Agriculture of the National School Breakfast Program. This study concluded the program does not curvitamins. The bill provides a nominal increase in the program to improve the nutritional benefits of the breakfast. Witnesses testifying on this subject before the House Education and Labor Committee reported a direct orrelation between children who are well nourished and their motivation in school. The bill also raises the current tuition ceiling for

vate schools in order to permit their continuation in he school feeding programs. Overall the nutrition programs supported by this bill crucial to the health and well-being of our citizens. The continued need to sustain these programs is illustrated in the Physician's Task Force Report on Hunger

issued in February of this year.

These physicians described hunger in America as a 'growing epidemic," and found the problem of hunger to be more widespread and serious than at any time in the ast 10 to 15 years. With these compelling findings in mind, it is crucial we maintain our investment in the programs funded by the School Lunch and Child Nutrition Act which have demonstrated their effectiveness in promoting the health and well-being of our nation's children
