Indians take first victory: See Inside

Resource recovery gets 55 percent of city vote

With slightly less than 50 percent of Rahway's 13,592 registered voters going to the polls, the resource recovery plant proposed for the city passed its first test on Tuesday with 3,302 (55 percent) in favor and 2,731 (45 percent) opposed.

Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett called the results on the non-binding referendum, "A landmark decision for the state of New Jersey."

Proponents of the facility, to be located on Rie-

No. 1, had cited endorsements from environmental organizations and promised a tax rebate worth in excess of \$1 million a year. Opponents had voiced concerns over inadequate government regulations on pollution control and increased truck traffic through city streets.

Three wards defeated the referendum by a narrow margin. The First Ward had a vote of 372 in favor and 408 opposed.

The Second Ward narrowly defeated the proposal, with 528 in favor and 562 opposed, and the Fourth Ward had a margin of only two votes, with 293 in favor and 295 opposed.

The final breakdown on the voting in the six wards was: First Ward: First District, 74 in favor, 113 opposed; Second District, 52 to 129; Third District, 92 to 92; and Fourth District, 154 to 74.

Second Ward: First District, 160 in favor and 132 opposed; Second District, 172 to 144; Third District, 113 to 138 and Fourth District, 83 to 148.

First Ward Councilman Jerry L. Coleman and Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh have been vocal opponents of resource recovery in Rahway. The final breakdown on the voting in the six wards was: First Ward: First District, 74 in favor, 113 opposed; Second District, 52 to 129; Third District, 92 to 92; and Fourth District, 154 to 74.

90 opposed; Second District, 51 to 56; Third District, 83 to 81 and Fourth District, 108 to 68.

In the Sixth Ward, First District, 174 in favor and 136 opposed; Second District, 193 to 136; Third District, 183 to 105 and the Fourth District, 212 to 126 for a total vote of 762 in favor and 503 opposed.

City officials stressed certain conditions must be met before a facility will be acceptable to city residents. All truck routes must be subject to control by the city of Rahway within city limits. Pollution controls

must be stringently adhered to and the facility should maintain an attractive appearance.

Two public questions that would help fund facilities throughout the state were approved in Rahway as well as passing state-wide, Question No. 2 on the ballot, the Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Fund Bond Issue, had 3,939 in favor with 2,053 opposed.

Incumbent Republican Gov. Thomas H. Kean won a landslide victory in Rahway as well as in the state. Gov. Kean won 5,364 for Gov. Kean with

1,874 for his Democratic opponent, Essex County Executive Peter Shapiro of West Orange.

In the General Assembly victors in Rahway were Republicans, Michael Pasnock and Alice Holzapfel. Mr. Pasnock, an attorney with offices in Linden, drew 3,242 votes, while Mrs. Holzapfel, a resident of Elizabeth, drew 2,961. Democratic opponents, Thomas Deverin and George Hudak, received 2,711 and 2,706 votes, respectively, in the city.

However, districtwide the Democrats won easily, with 2,708 votes and seats in the race for Union County freeholders.

Incumbent G. Richard Malgran, of Plainfield, chairman of the freeholder board, received 3,396 votes in Rahway. William H. Eldridge, a former mayor of Berkeley Heights, received 3,416 votes and James J. Fulcomer, the Rahway Sixth Ward councilman, tallied 3,804 votes.

Democratic opponents included Walter Borchert, of Scotch Plains, the freeholder with the longest tenure on the board, with 2,828 votes in Rahway. Charlotte DeFilippo, of Hillside, the other Democratic incumbent, with 2,708 votes and Gerald McCann, of Elizabeth, 2,703 votes.

The Republican freeholder candidates also won countywide, by an estimated margin of 10,000 votes each. This increases the GOP margin on the county governing body from 5-4 to 7-2. The Assembly victories of Mr. Deverin, the only incumbent in the race, and Linden Mayor Hudak were not as happy for the Democrats as they might have been. Gov. Kean's landslide carried enough GOP assemblymen in statewide to give the Republicans control of the lower house of the Legislature for the first time in 12 years.

At the Rahway Board of Education's regular meeting on Oct. 21 at the Intermediate School Superintendent of Schools, Frank Brunette, introduced Vito Gagliardi, Union County superintendent of schools, who gave a presentation on the function of the county office.

Mr. Gagliardi said he works for the state of New Jersey and not for the county. He said all other functions are supported by the board of chosen freeholders and explained his office as having two basic categories. In the regulatory category, his office is responsible for such items as making sure transportation contracts are correct and teachers are certified. The second category is providing technical assistance and Mr. Gagliardi stressed this is as important as the first, noting his office is there primarily to benefit the young people of the county and the state. Board president, Mrs. Betta Jacobs, expressed thanks on behalf of the Board to Mr. Brunette, assistant superintendent of schools. Nicholas

Delmonaco, and Board secretary, Anthony Russo, for their representation of the Board during the past months of negotiations and discussions with the teachers.

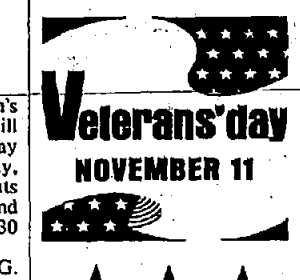

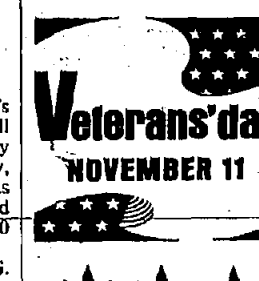

Rinaldo urges public to give hotline tips

Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, whose district includes Clark today called on his constituents to make full use of the telephone hotline program established to reduce waste, fraud and mismanagement in the federal government.

The New Jersey Republican noted since the citizen hotlines were established in 1981 as part of a multi-faceted, anti-fraud and management improvement program, more than 77,000 calls have been received by federal authorities. They have led to thousands of prosecutions, management improvements and other changes that have resulted in an estimated \$4 billion being put to better use.

During a recent six-month period 10,370 tips were called in on 42 government hotlines accessible from anywhere in the nation, according to Rep. Rinaldo. A team of federal inspectors general and other authorities are fielding the calls and following up on reports of wrongdoing and recommendations for management improvement.

Through the hotline leads authorities have successfully prosecuted an array of criminal cases ranging from mail theft and bribery to contract kickbacks and the overpricing of spare parts.

One recent tip, the representative said, resulted in the conviction of a general contractor accused of cheating on a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) contract for renovating an apartment complex. Another tipster pointed

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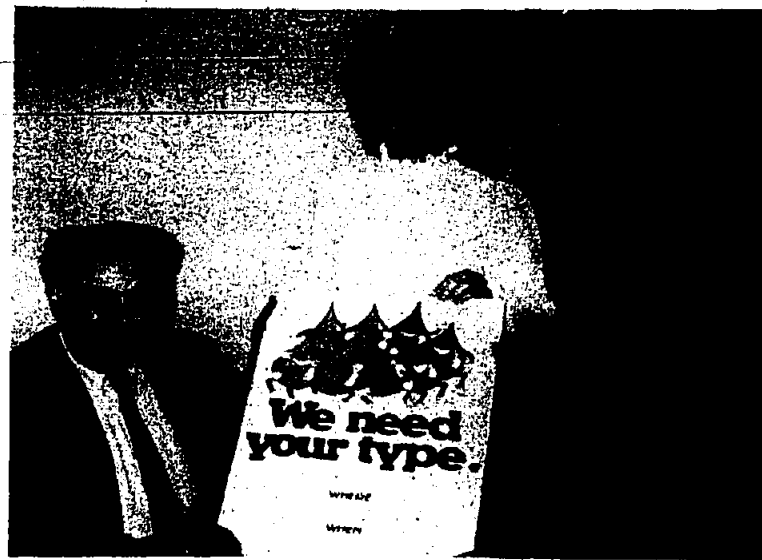

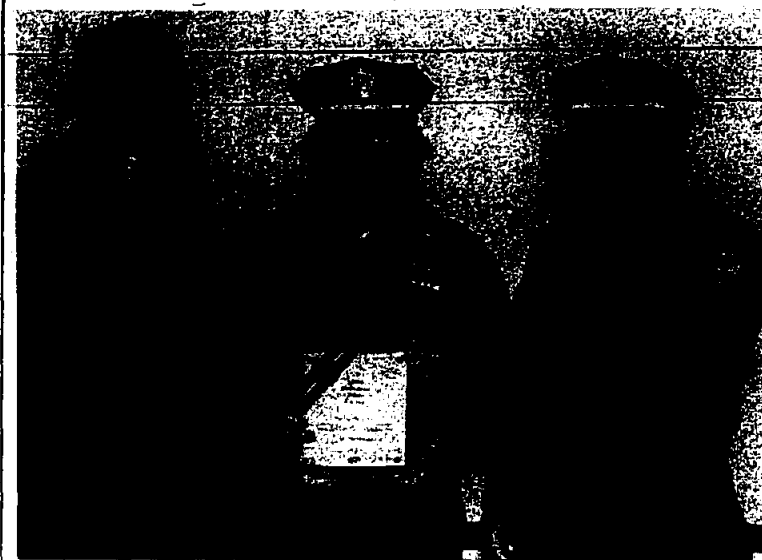

Rahway honored for safety record

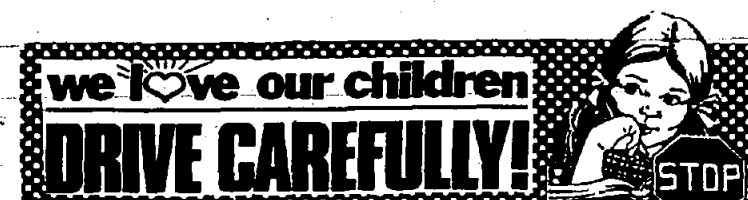
Pedestrian safety is a major concern of the American Automobile Assn. and the New Jersey Automobile Club.

Locally 53 communities have earned the association's pedestrian protection awards for their achievement in the prevention of pedestrian fatalities and injuries and their outstanding pedestrian safety programs, according to Matthew J. Derham, president of the New Jersey Automobile Club. Government and police representatives from the communities received their awards during a luncheon program at the Alton Restaurant in Florham Park.

The 53 awards were among 1,800 top citations being presented by association clubs across the country in the Federation's 46th Annual Pedestrian Protection Program, said Mr. Derham of the Florham

Park-based association affiliate. More than 2,500 cities and 30 states participated in the association survey, which evaluates and recognizes the outstanding pedestrian safety achievements of participating communities made during the previous calendar year. The one-of-a-kind pedestrian program focuses national attention on pedestrian safety needs by recognizing cities, counties

and states that have demonstrated successful pedestrian safety programs. Communities participating in the association program are judged with others of comparable size and characteristics.
