Council votes city as waste plant host

Rahway's City Council has agreed to have the city serve as the host community for a Union County resource-recovery plant.

At Tuesday's Governing Body session, citing the approval of city voters of the Nov. 5 referendum on the facility and the memorandum of agreement for its construction between the city and Union County, the councilmen voted 7-2 to agree to have the city as host for the waste-to-energy garbage burning facility.

The only two negative votes were cast by the councilmen who had opposed the facility for the last year or more. Democrat Jerry Coleman of the First Ward and Republican John Marsh of the Second Ward.

Prior to the vote, Capt. Barry Henderson, who is acting chief of the police department, said the people have spoken and he hoped the councilmen approved the measure for the betterment of the community.

Capt. Henderson also urged Sixth Ward Republican Councilman James J. Fulcomer, who made use of Union County

freelander on Nov. 5, to back the plant at the county level.

However, Councilman Marsh said the majority of voters went along with the resource recovery proposal because the county spent \$50,000 on a public relations campaign to give residents only the good points of the proposal.

He called the resolution "a bad taste" and said it would not benefit the community and asked what purpose it would have if it was going to destroy the community.

He added the pollution-control laws have not changed in the last 30 years. Pollutants emitted from incinerators instead of the "monster" (the waste plant) would be outlawed.

If the state can't control emissions from Exxon and Merck, which are under specific laws and have spent millions of dollars in pollution control, he said, it certainly would not be able to control waste-plant emissions, which are not under specific laws.

However, Councilman Fulcomer replied during the referendum campaign propaganda had been used on every side of the issue—and for the four years prior to the vote.

He added detailed literature had been distributed over the years, especially by those in favor of the facility, and he had sent the first information on it to his constituents as early as 1981.

The Sixth Ward representative noted the public relations firm hired by the county had only been promoting it for two weeks before the election and everyone else had been talking about it for five years.

Although he said no scientific expert he knew of had said the New Jersey guidelines would not be able to take care of the pollution, there was no doubt the technology was available to limit the pollution.

Mr. Fulcomer also noted coal burning and automobile emissions were the major sources of pollution and the state and local officials should make sure the guidelines were set to make use of technology to

bring pride and progress to Rahway.

Democratic Councilman-at-Large Vincent Addona said it was time to set politics aside on the issue, especially since the voters in the area where the facility would go had not shown decisively whether they were completely for or against it.

In the Second Ward, he noted, the First and Second Districts had voted for the referendum and in the Third District it had lost by only 24 votes.

He said the Council should honor what the people had voted for, and since approximately 50 percent of the voters had come to vote "yes" the councilmen were obligated to express the voters' feelings.

Third Ward Democratic Councilman Max Shield, pointing out the difference between those who had voted for the proposal and those who had voted against it in the Second Ward was only 29 votes, said he would not pretend to know better than the will of the people—who had supported the plant.

He added New Jersey's guidelines were better than laws because they could be changed "overnight" to accommodate changing circumstances and laws would have to go through the whole legislative process.

The Third Ward representative disputed Councilman Marsh's continuing contention truck routes to the facility could not be controlled.

By contract, he said, trucks would have to use county roads only, the traffic on Inman Ave. would not be as heavy as originally projected and the trucks would mostly be using Rte. No. 1 and getting there via Grand and Westfield Aves.

He also said Councilman Marsh had never said how to get rid of the garbage and because of the crisis situation in waste disposal the county had to take the best means available until a better solution was found.

Democratic Councilman-at-Large James Cadigan pointed out the resolution and the memorandum of agreement with the county both said Rahway would host the facility only if the

conditions it had outlined were met.

He also cited the fact the resolution solicited the support of the New Jersey Dept. of Environmental Protection to ensure the environmental safety of the facility and co-operate in implementation of the project.

Saying Councilman Marsh insulting the intelligence of the people when he said they were fooled by public relations, Business Administrator Joseph M. Hartnett pointed out one of the main concerns expressed by opponents of the project, where the residue ash from the burning process would go, would be solved only when the contract was drawn up and presented to Council.

Fifth Ward Republican Councilman George Wagenvoeller said he was obligated to support the resolution because his constituents had voted for it.

However, it was his concern about the residue ash which "apparently" led Mr. Hartnett to comment on it.

Councilman Coleman said he had campaigned on a proposal for regional instead of local resource recovery long before the Primary Election in the First Ward, which he won last year.

He added even though First Ward voters had rejected the facility by only 15 or 20 votes they still had rejected it.

The First Ward representative noted he would fight to have the trucks routed away from streets in his ward and the councilmen who were supporting the measure should have the trucks go past their homes or businesses.

He proposed mechanical separation of trash as an alternative to burning and said the assistant to Barry Commoner, a professor considered an expert in environmental matters, had pointed out dioxin would still be present even after the burning process was complete.

As early as June or July of this year, he said, he had been told by representatives of the public relations firm it did not wish to present the negative side of resource recovery.

Fourth Ward Councilman Harvey Williams said even though he was voting in favor of the resolution this did not mean he was in favor of resource recovery.

Although the two-vote margin against the facility put him in a difficult position, the Fourth Ward representative said he would still seek all the information he had been seeking all along on the facility and had not yet gotten it.

He added no one knew the effects of dioxin from resource recovery and even a chemical firm in Michigan which had been ordered by state law to reduce dioxin emissions could not reduce them below one third.

The mayor noted the public relations firm had not collected on its \$60,000 contract yet and had one year to inform the rest of the county about resource recovery.

Mayor Martin added the district voting results showed city residents had favored the concept by a 2-1 margin, with 16 districts in favor of it, six against and one evenly divided.

Councilman Marsh, referring to another resolution on the agenda calling for voluntary recycling during the county-declared Recycling Month this month, said mandatory recycling was needed.

Councilman Fulcomer replied the state was working on a mandatory recycling proposal but recycling would not be able to take care of 100 percent of the waste produced.

He urged Councilman Marsh to propose a mandatory recycling ordinance in the city.

Councilman Coleman said he had long supported the mayor's plan for recycling.

He pointed out, however, that those involved with resource recovery were not that much in favor of recycling because it would take away materials from a resource recovery facility.

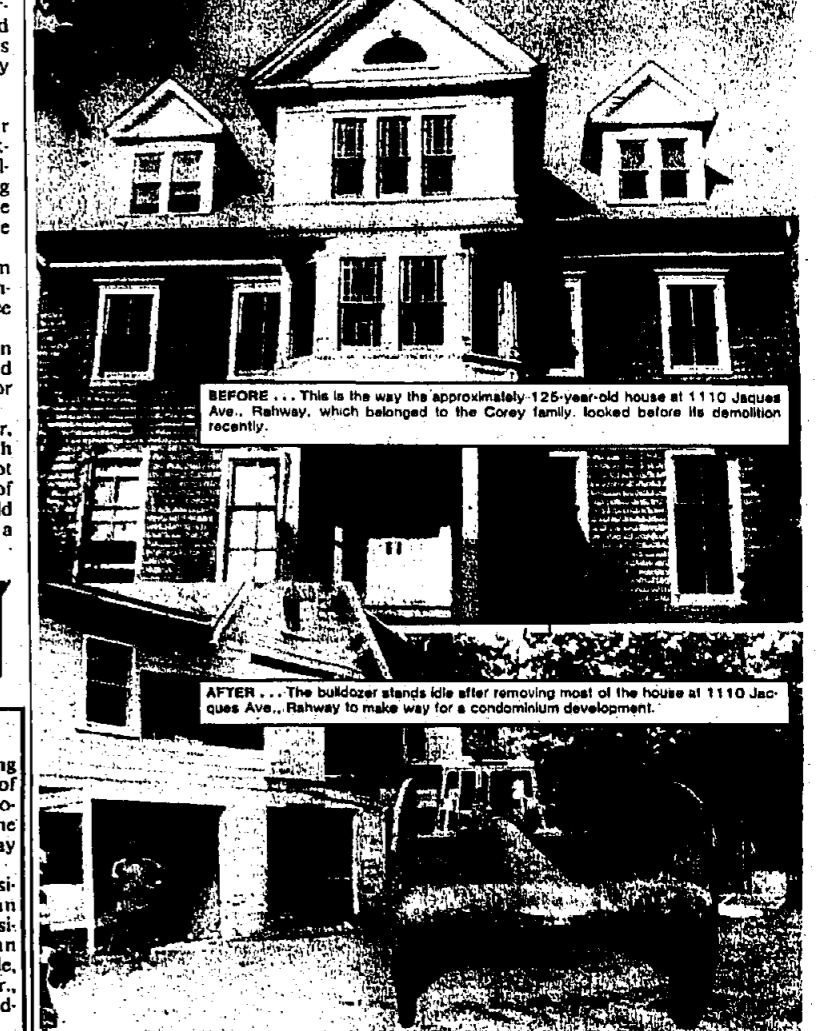

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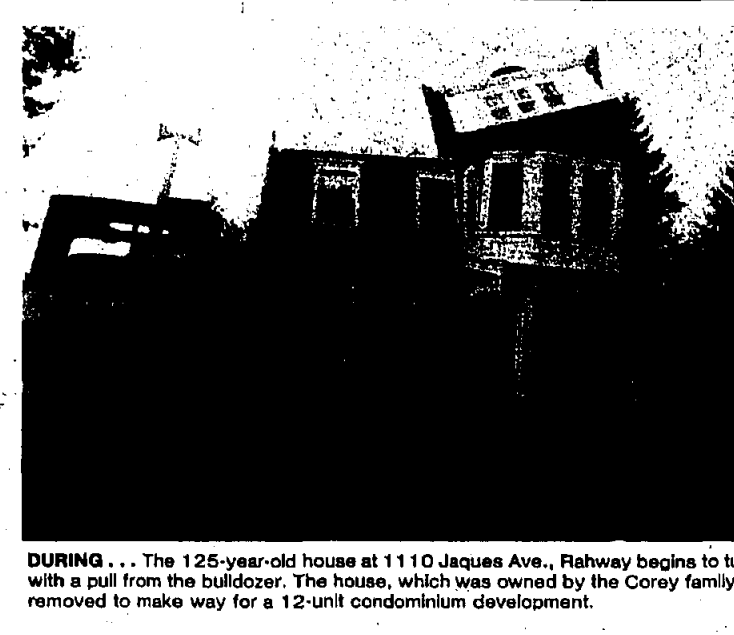

Prosecutor cracks whip on corporate crime

Not only are white collar criminals being tracked down, caught and convicted in Union County, but a get-tough policy being carried out by the Union County Prosecutor's Office is resulting in jail terms for corporate criminals.

Last month alone two defendants were sentenced to jail and ordered to pay restitution. Businessmen whose firms have been victimized believe the committed efforts of the Economic Crimes Unit staff brought the cheater and embezzlers to justice.

Since 1977, under the direction of Prosecutor John H. Stambler, a special unit has been placing priorities on crimes such as embezzlement, extortion, loan sharking, fraudulent schemes and public corruption.

In 1984 alone the unit undertook 134 investigations into business crimes, official misconduct, toxic waste and embezzlement.

One businessman who can attest to the effectiveness of the criminal investigation and prosecution of white-collar crime is Howard A. Massler, president of the Bestway Group.

Mr. Massler, whose firm was victimized by one of its own employees, made a special presentation in appreciation of the efforts of the unit.

An employee at Bestway, John O'Donnell, was found guilty of theft following a

three-day trial before Superior Court Judge Alexander J. Menza and sentenced in September to a seven-year prison term plus full restitution of \$163,802.21.

The monies were embezzled from the corporation over a 10-month period, according to Assistant Prosecutor James L. Sonageri, the supervisor of the unit, who presented the state's evidence in the case.

Mr. Sonageri said the judges are aware of the tremendous negative impact on business and the related ripple effect on prices, inflation and employment. Economic losses from embezzlement, extortion and insider theft can result in layoffs and even plant closings in severe cases, he said.

Mr. Massler said because police departments cannot spare the manpower to conduct detailed white collar investigations and federal authorities concentrate on drug trafficking and racketeering the county authorities are best trained with expertise to prosecute crimes against businesses and small firms.

Last month, a Keyport man who defrauded a Mountainside firm out of \$186,000 was given an eight-year prison sentence by Judge Menza. Mr. Sonageri said Robert Amoroso was given a three-year parole disqualifier and ordered to pay restitution as

a result of the stolen-check scheme.

In another Economic Crimes Unit case, a Hazlet bookkeeper admitted to stealing \$126,000 from companies in Union and in Hazlet. Work on the cases was conducted by Investigator Thomas DeCastro and Lawrence Wlazlo, with assistance by investigative accountant, Joseph Heiser, according to Mr. Sonageri.

Blood pressure to be checked

High blood pressure is recognized as the major cause of heart disease in the United States, yet 17 million people who have this health problem don't know it.

On Thursday, Nov. 21 volunteers from the American Heart Assn. will conduct a free blood pressure check. Local residents may be checked at The Medicine Shoppe pharmacy at 453 Amboy Ave., Woodbridge from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

Because high blood pressure has no symptoms, its presence often is not obvious. The only way to determine if a person has the disease is through a simple test. That is critical,

because it is important those with elevated blood pressure receive a physician's care and treatment to prevent disability or even death, reports a spokesman.

Health check programs like high blood pressure screenings let the public take an active role in health maintenance. Held nationally since 1976, The Medicine Shoppe's continuing blood pressure education program has detected thousands of high blood pressure victims, he added.

"The health screenings are not diagnostic, but they can alert individuals a problem may exist so they can contact a physician," said pharmacist, Murray Weiss, "and persons with an elevated reading will be referred to their physician for a complete diagnosis."
