Board oks 9% salary boost for secretaries

The Board of Education Nov. 18 approved a salary guide for those in administrative offices not represented by the Rahway Education Assn. Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette will receive \$72,095. Assistant Superintendent Nicholas Delmonaco \$62,830. Board Secretary/Business Administrator, Anthony Rocco, Jr., \$55,930. Attorney, Leo Kahn, \$32,745. Accountant, Albert DeGiorgio, \$23,430. and maintenance supervisor, Frank Erickson, \$36,230.

The Board members also approved a guide for the salaries of administrative secretaries, which will range from \$16,000 to \$20,000. This represents an average increase of about 9 percent over last year, according to Mr. Rocco.

The Board also approved fundraisers, re-appointed coaches in the athletic department and approved payments for the ongoing renovation project at the high school.

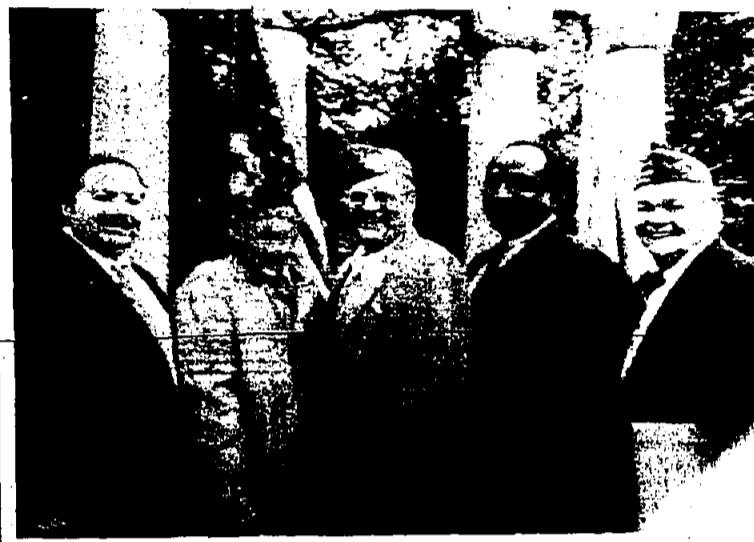

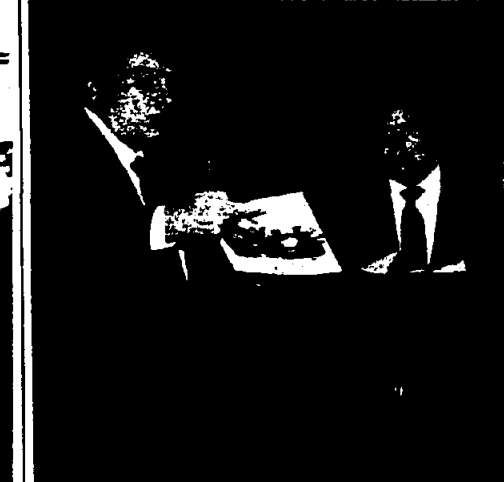

Plantation sets guided tours

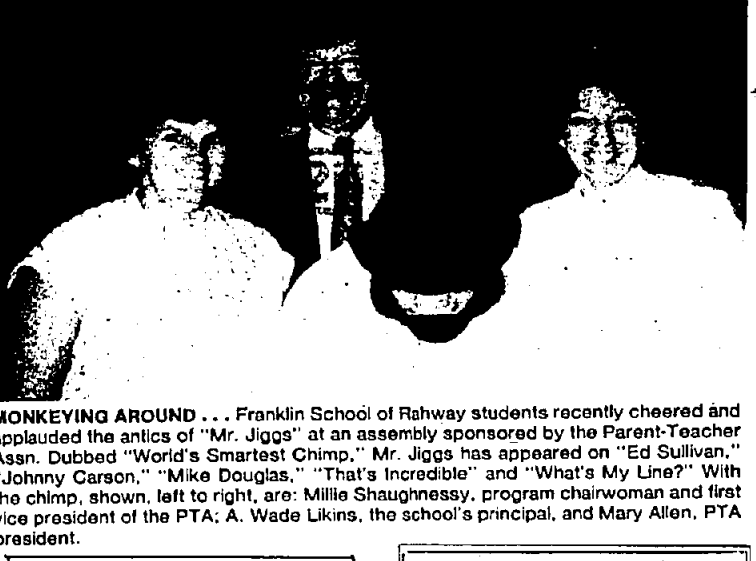

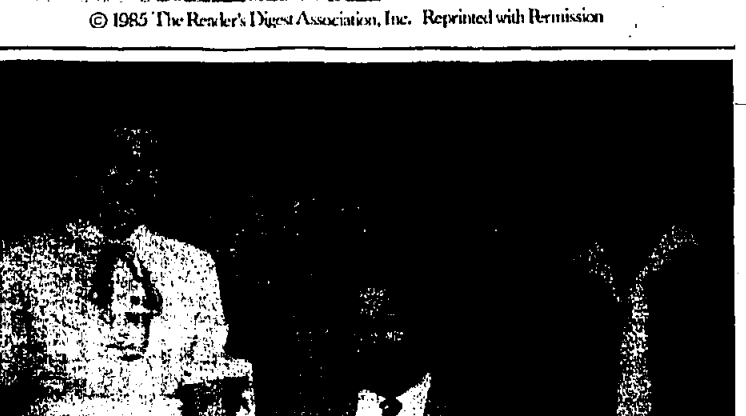

Arts center plans major fund drive

Yes, \$1 million can be raised to make the Union County Arts Center a reality in Rahway... but it's going to take lots of work and some seed money.

That is essentially the conclusion of a planning study just completed by Goettler Associates, an Ohio fundraising firm.

The study, commissioned by Rahway Landmarks, the non-profit owner of the Rahway Theatre, consisted mainly of one-on-one interviews with business and community public relations throughout Union County.

The former movie-theatre on Irving St. has already been partially restored for reopening sometime in 1986 as a combined cultural and civic center.

Restoration cannot continue, however, without a capital fund drive in which \$1 million is the goal.

Rahway Landmarks spokesmen are quick to point out that this is but a fraction of the cost to build a comparable new facility.

According to the Goettler report an intensive awareness campaign must be the immediate next step, and this requires recruitment of influential supporters of the project to present the case for support at meetings with key prospects. The awareness campaign will also include a community public relations program.

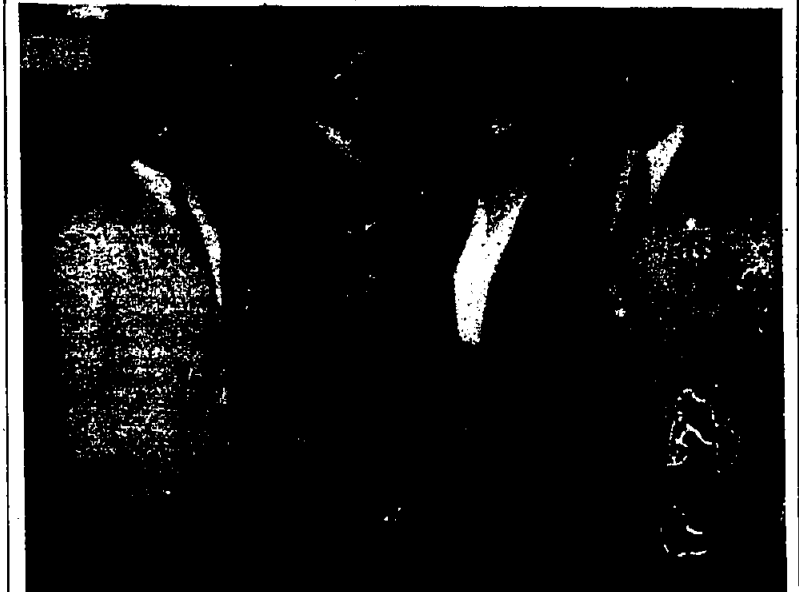
Of the total sum to be raised, Ralph Goettler of Goettler Associates recommends half of it be in the form of challenge grants from government agencies and half from the private sector.

In a series of upcoming meetings the officers and directors of Rahway Landmarks will be planning their next move.

"Confidence remains high," says Landmarks president, Sandra Sweney. "The Union County Arts Center will be open for business in 1986 regardless of how much funding has been raised."

The Goettler organization praised Rahway Landmarks' "hardworking board and dedicated core of volunteers" and acknowledged the strong support the arts center project has among residents of southeastern Union County.

In October the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders adopted a resolution of support granting Rahway Landmarks exclusive use of the name "Union County Arts Center" for the former Rahway Theatre.

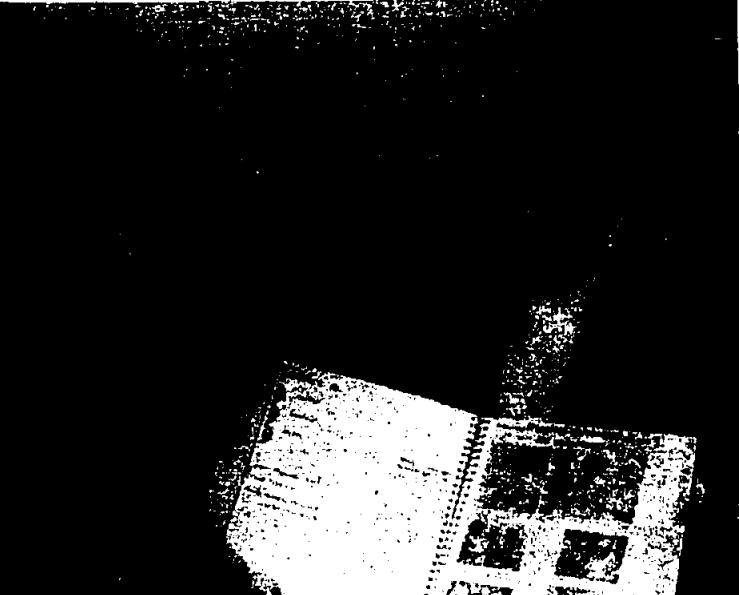

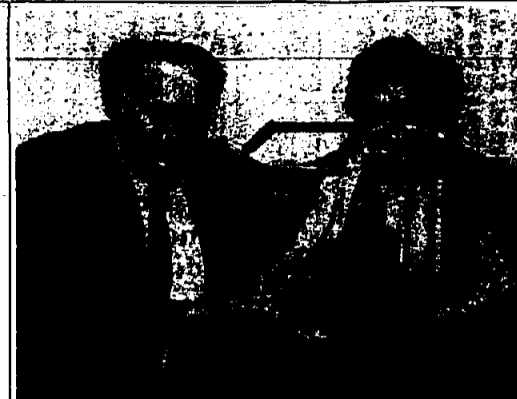

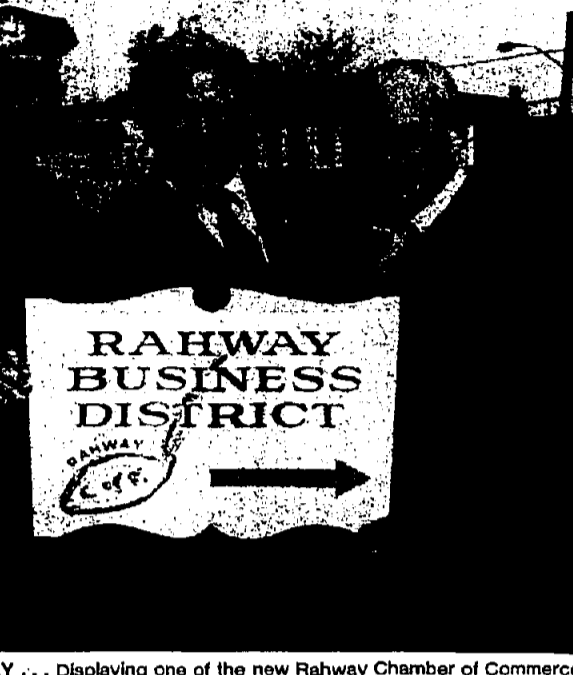

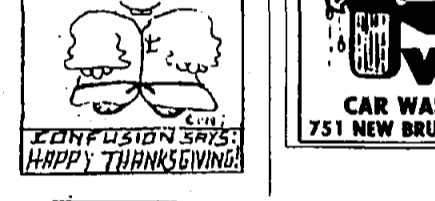
This project was initiated as an outcome of a discussion with Joseph Hartnett, business administrator, and the directors of the Rahway Chamber of Commerce.
