

## Brunette: Testing scores highest ever

Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette Nov. 18 called the scores in the 1985 testing in city schools the highest ever achieved.

The Minimum Basic Skills (MBS) Test was administered to all ninth-grade students in March of this year. Ninety-five percent scored better than their peers in the mathematics portion, and 93 percent in the reading portion. Mr. Brunette said these percentages were the highest since the tests were first implemented.

The MBS Test has been replaced by the High School Proficiency Test (HSPT), a much more difficult test. Beginning in ninth grade all students must pass this test in order to receive a high school diploma.

The state has not yet provided a passing score for this test. However, Mr. Brunette announced Rahway's students improved in 1985 over 1984.

He said results showed Rahway is much better than similar communities, about on a par with the state and slightly below the District-Factor-Group, a

socio-economic grouping of school districts.

Supervisors and teachers have analyzed the results of the HSPT to determine strengths and weaknesses. The heart of instruction comes from this testing and teachers will improve curriculum in areas showing weakness and will continue in areas which show strength.

All students in kindergarten to 11th grade are tested each year with a norm-referenced test.

The Iowa Test of Basic Skills in kindergarten to eighth grade and Tests of Achievement and Proficien-

cy in grades nine to 11 compare Rahway with the nation as a whole.

Results from the spring of 1985 show 10 of the 12 grades were above grade level in kindergarten to ninth grade and grades 10 and 11 were slightly below level. These tests have been analyzed and will be used to improve achievement during this year, reports the superintendent.

Mr. Brunette explained evaluation is an integral part of the education process.

Though comprehensive testing programs progress is continually checked and the

achievement of all students is a major concern of the administration, he said.

All test results are public information and may be viewed in the office of the director of student-personnel services.

Following is a comparison of ninth-grade Minimum Basic Skills Testing showing a percentage of students above the state standard:

1978, reading, 68 percent; mathematics, 62 percent.

1979, reading, 77 percent; mathematics, 77 percent.

1980, reading, 76 percent; mathematics, 79 percent.

1981, reading, 86 percent; mathematics, 84 percent.

1982, reading, 88 percent; mathematics, 90 percent.

1983, reading, 89 percent; mathematics, 90 percent.

1984, reading, 92 percent; mathematics, 93 percent.

1985, reading, 93 percent; mathematics, 95 percent.

### Merck & Co. Board proposes common stock split

According to a company spokeswoman, the Board of Directors of Merck & Co., Inc., recently proposed that the common stock of the company be split two for one. The holders of common stock will be asked to vote on the proposal at the annual meeting of stockholders in Rahway, on April 22, 1986.

Dr. P. Roy Vageles, president and chief executive officer of the health products firm, said the proposed split is intended to

create a broader market for the company's common stock.

Prior to this proposal, the last Merck stock split was in 1972, when the common stock was split two for one.

The Board of Directors also declared a quarterly dividend of 90 cents a share on the company's common stock.

The 90 cent quarterly dividend, payable Jan. 2,

1986, represents an increase of approximately 13 percent over the 80 cents previously paid quarterly. The dividend is payable to stockholders of record at the close of business on Dec. 9.

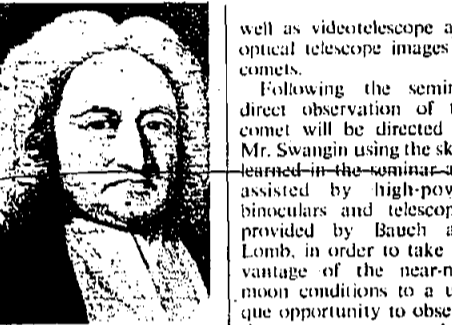

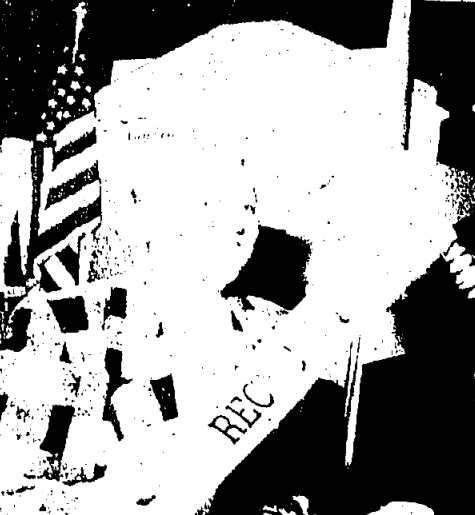

MINDS OVER MONEY

Bond swapping can save you in taxes

Editor's Note: Following is the 12th in a series of columns on financial planning by Jennie S. Eckers, a financial consultant for Shearson Lehman/American Express, Inc. of East Brunswick.

Now is the time to search your bond portfolio for loss items—corporates, governments, municipals, even units of bond unit trusts—that may be candidates for an excellent tax-saving technique known as "swapping."

Swaps must be completed by the end of 1985 to establish a tax loss for this year.
—Any tax deductions you achieve will be worth more to you this year (than next if the Reagan proposal to cut tax rates takes effect in 1986).

Excess of long-term capital losses are applied on a two-for-one basis, which means if you have \$2 of losses to offset \$1 of ordinary income. Moreover, losses above the \$3,000 ceiling can be carried forward and used in later years.

The recipient of the first annual award from the Alzheimer's Disease Fund of New Jersey, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-N.J.), said that old age will be far less frightening in the next century if breakthroughs are achieved in preventing and treating the disease that blots out the mind.  
In accepting the award at the dinner meeting at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, he pointed out that some 2.5 million Americans are afflicted with a loss of memory, speech and other vital functions in the final stages of Alzheimer's. But the list of victims, he said, should include their families who sometimes find it impossible to cope with the "most total loss of recall by a family member."  
"In some cases," he said, "an Alzheimer's victim doesn't just forget how to use a telephone. He even forgets what a telephone is for. It is a heartbreaking and baffling disease."  
He praised the members of the Alzheimer's Disease Fund of New Jersey for their courage in bringing Alzheimer's to public attention. Even though it was first discovered in 1906, he added, Alzheimer's has only lately received public attention and federal funding for research.  
For the short term, he said, medical researchers need to develop cheaper and more reliable diagnostic tools. It now costs as much as \$2,000 for a full diagnostic evaluation, and Alzheimer's is often misdiagnosed. Some medical experts claim that one-third of the cases may actually be due to depression or other treatable diseases.  
"Alzheimer's is not an inevitable consequence of aging," Rinaldo said. He served as chairman of the Medical Aging Committee hearing in New Jersey on Alzheimer's, and was commended by the president of the Fund, for his crusading efforts in Congress.  
Although there is no known cure for Alzheimer's, Rinaldo said, his quest would make old age far less frightening to millions of people; and would save the nation billions of dollars now spent on caring for Alzheimer's sufferers in institutions and in their homes.  
Alzheimer's is a brain disorder that causes progressive loss of mental functions over a period of years. Patients suffer severe disorientation, personality changes, loss of speech and some victims cannot remember the names of their closest relatives and may have no knowledge of the world.  
Rinaldo is a sponsor of legislation in Congress to provide funds to state to establish Alzheimer's treatment programs. He said the hope is that society are huge in human and financial terms, and that many families cannot remember the names of their closest relatives and may have no knowledge of the world.  
"We've got more than our share of other health care worries. Cancer, viral infections, heart disease, blood disorders," Rinaldo said. "It is not an easy battle to fight. Alzheimer's is a public issue. You have brought people together in a common cause that has had tremendous benefits in the future. Where there was no hope before, you have the first candle to show the way," he told members of the Alzheimer's Fund.

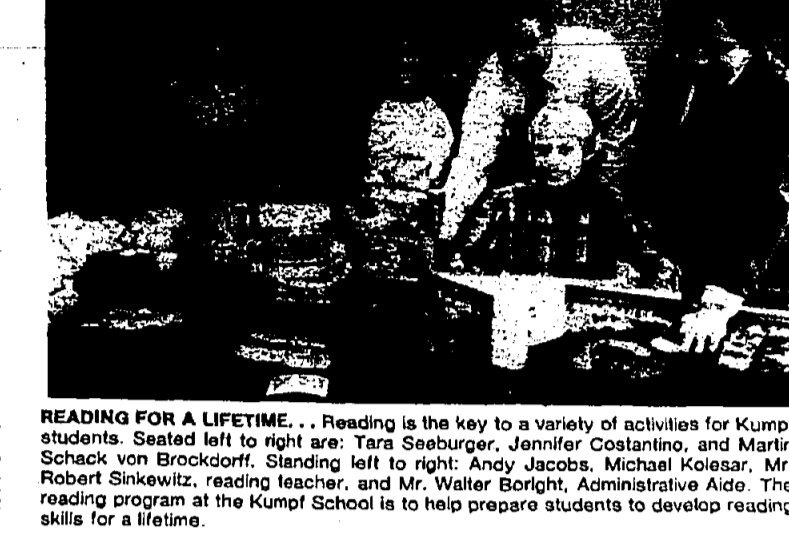

**Juvenile aides help 'latchkey' children**

Help for the thousands of "latchkey" children throughout Union County is on the way, compliments of a new program from the Union County Juvenile Officers' Assn.

In each of the county's school districts special home emergency instructions are being distributed to the children of working parents who arrive at home each weekday to find an empty house.

Developed by Sgt. Stephen Jordan of the Plainfield Police Division and Det. Edward Kisch of Springfield, the program allows juvenile officers to go into the schools and talk about common sense behavior in the home.

Each youngster is given a copy of a small white card, called the "Child's Guide To Emergency Help,"

Fanwood Lt. Robert Carboy, president of the juvenile officers' group, said the county-wide effort is aimed at a growing number of young people who need special attention from parents, the school community and law enforcement.

Union County Prosecutor John H. Stamler fully endorsed the effort, pointing to the alarming statistics involving children from single parent households or having parents who both work during the daytime hours.

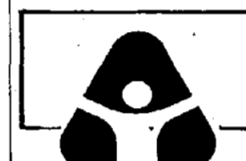
