Canned goods collection helps feed sixty families

They were among the most needy cases from among the thousands of victims of violent crimes throughout the county, according to Robert O'Leary, Assistant Union County Prosecutor. Mothers to march against birth defects

January 17 through February 2 marks the campaign dates of the annual Mothers March fundraiser to benefit the North Jersey Chapter of the March of Dimes. On these dates, residents of Union County will be "marching" door-to-door asking their neighbors for donations to help benefit birth defects prevention programs. All Mothers Marchers will carry proper identification in the form of official Mothers March tags. The volunteers will also distribute free educational pamphlets promoting birth defects prevention.

Mothers March began in Phoenix, Arizona in 1950 when volunteers "marched" door-to-door soliciting donations to benefit research against polio. Eventually, these donations led to the funding and discovery of the Salk polio vaccine. The drive is traditionally held in January to commemorate the birthday of March of Dimes founder, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. This year's Mothers March will continue to strive for the elimination of this nation's most serious child health problem. The March of Dimes asks that

residents of Union County give generously when a marcher calls. Proceeds will be used to fund programs in education, medical services and research for the prevention of birth defects.

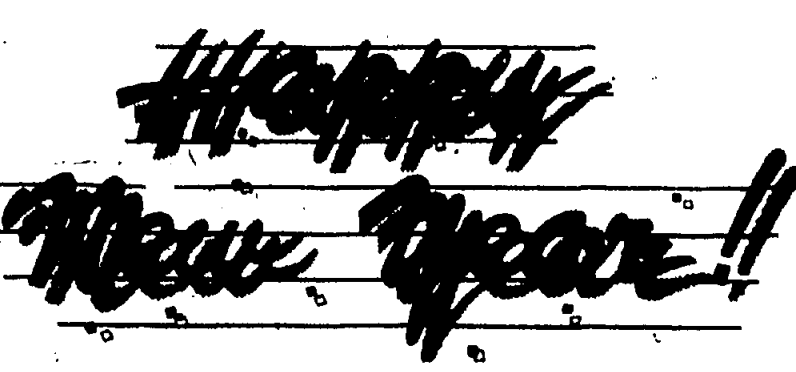

Tips for caring of stroke victims

The American Heart Association has offered the following information:

(1) You're trying to help someone recover from a stroke, here are some important tips to remember:

(2) Try to realize that neither you nor the patient is to blame for the trying episode that may occur or the emotional upset stemming from the illness.

(3) Be aware that indifference or resignation can be worse for a patient than anger or irritability. Keep encouraging your family members in trying to build his or her confidence.

(4) Talk frankly and regularly with the doctor about mental changes, depression or other concerns you may have. Your doctor can help you arrange physical, occupational, speech or other rehabilitative therapy as necessary.

(5) When it's time for the patient to come home, make sure that necessary household adjustments are made, such as installation of handrails and wheelchair ramps, and that trouble some obstacles are removed.

(6) When long term at home care is required, divide duties and responsibilities among family members so that the burden doesn't fall on any one family member. Friends often want to help but need direction from the family. Numerous home care services are also available to help with the care of your doctor or a hospital social worker about them.

(7) Be active participants in the patient's therapy and exercise program, not merely observers. Therapy benefits derived by the patient or other insurance may run out before recovery is complete, and precise therapy is very costly, so learn the procedures yourself.

(8) Take concrete steps to build the patient's overall health and prevent another stroke through proper nutrition, good eating habits, drug therapy prescribed by the doctor and avoiding risk factors such as smoking and undue pressures.

(9) Don't be discouraged. Keep working toward specific goals. Recovery of lost neurological functions generally can be expected within six months after a stroke, but long range improvements in the quality of life can still occur after that.

(10) Don't relegate the patient to the sidelines or leave him or her with only television and radio for company. Encourage him or her to participate in family activities, develop a hobby, stay in touch with the world and be as independent as possible.

Holiday Hints For The Diabetic

Diabetes is a condition in which the body does not produce enough insulin to help utilize the sugar that becomes diabetic patients must monitor and adjust their diet, exercise and activities, and insulin intake accordingly. But the holiday season can be a prime time for non-compliance. According to Dr. Gratiere, "Proper preparation and the consumption of traditional foods make it difficult for the diabetic patient, who must eat specific foods at specific times."

Dr. Gratiere recommends that the diabetic patient consult his doctor or dietitian to learn how to exchange special holiday foods for other foods that are low in fat and calories. If you are in the aid of his father for cooking and for food after holiday meals, the diabetic can reduce the temptation to snore and snuggle.

Some people who are well controlled are able to work an occasional alcoholic drink into their diets. An excess of these drinks can account for 10% of daily caloric intake and/or nutritional value, the

diabetic should consult his physician for advice on how to fit drinks into his meal plan. The diabetic should avoid very sugary drinks during the holiday. For the diabetic to stay on his regular exercise program, Dr. Gratiere recommends working exercise into the busiest of days by walking instead of riding, taking the stairs rather than the elevator, performing regular chores more quickly and doing light exercise while watching TV.

Attending a late dinner party can pose a problem for the diabetic. His doctor may recommend eating a light snack at the regular meal time.

If holiday plans include travel, there are a few tips Dr. Gratiere has for the diabetic. The East Central District committee has selected two winners from each grade. These winners are:

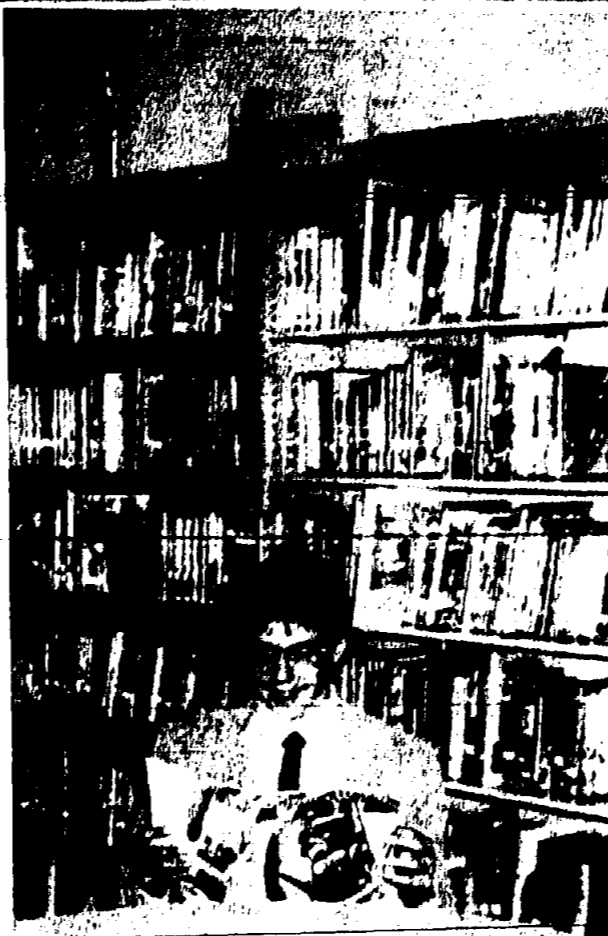

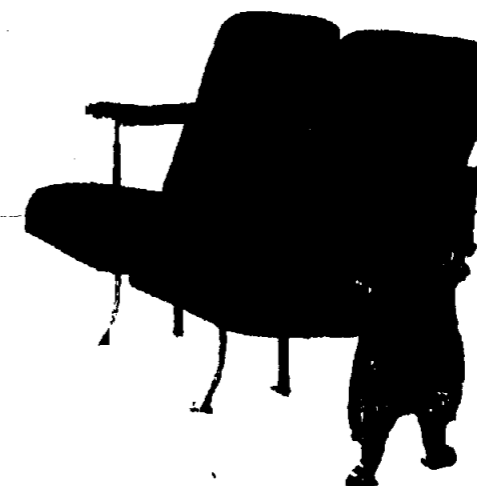
