
Seven space explorers are lost in our skies, and the magnitude of that truth is overwhelming.

Upon these basic principles, the whole structure of our form of government was establish ed by our forefathers.

COLLAR A colorful subject.

What a colorful and varied career this word collarhas had, despite its humble origins. Its source is the French word collier, a necklace, derived from the Latinword collum, meaning neck. However, a collare uniculum a Roman necklace of a different kind, since it was the I atm phrase used to describe a neck bond or noose used. to detain criminals or slaves. Conditions improved for the collar during the middle ages, when knighthood was conferred with a slight strike on the neck with a sword, or by an embrace. > Since you probably don't have the legal or accounting expertise required to evaluate a complex partnership offering on your own, you must rely on the expertise of the general partner (also called the sponsor) and the dealer om which you buy your partnership interest. (If you have an account with a major investment firm, like Shearson Lehman Brothers, which sponsors several limited partnerships itself, the sponsor and the dealer may be the same) Do business only with "name" firms whose creden tials you can check.

The prospectus is your main source of information on the partnership. Make sure the legal and accounting opinions contained in it come from well-known firms. That way you can be confident that the tax and other benefits claimed have been thoroughly researched and donot rest on shaky assumptions.

The minimum investment in a public limited partner ship is typically modest (\$5,000 or \$2,000 for an incomeoriented partnership used in an IRA). However, you should make certain you can manage without that money. for the life of the partnership, usually five to fifteen years 'he market for partnership shares generally is not liquid. like the stock or bond market. If you have to sell nrematurely, it may be hard to find a buyer and you may have to sell at a discount. A more positive reason to maintain your investment position, however, is that, according o a recent study of real estate partnerships, as much as - 40% of your ultimate return comes from holding your in-

Tax assistance for the new year,

Now that the holidays are over and the new year is tere, all of us will begin the task of filling out our federal ncome tax returns. In doing so, we cannot help but remember the chaos some taxpayers experienced during last year's processing. The IRS claims to have overcome the many tax processing problems of 1984 and has instituted a number of safeguards and procedures to improve service to the taxpayer.

As you probably know, the IRS had severe difficulty in completing a major but necessary conversion program to their computer system last year. This conversion unfortunately suffered a series of unanticipated setbacks and caused extreme delays in processing forms. These problems, in turn, indirectly led to a strain on the other IRS taxpayer assistance services.

The computer conversion at the IRS' ten major regional service centers, responsible for the processing of federal tax returns, is now complete. In fact, the IRS states that it has taken several initiatives to improve the overall quality of service to the taxpayer. For example, Congress has been advised that the Brookhaven Service Center in Holtsville, New York which processes the tax returns from New Jersey, has increased its computer capacity by 75% and will also have additional computer capacity on call in case of an emergency.

Again this year, the IRS will be operating a numbe of walk in centers around the state. Nearby sites will include Asbury Park, Bloomfield, and New Brunswick, and will have expanded hours of operation. These centers will be staffed with IRS-trained income tax assistors who will provide free income tax return preparation. Centers will be open weekdays between 8:00 am and 4:30 pm. In addition, taxpayer service representatives will staff a statewide, toll-free number 1-800-424-1040 which will be available for use 8:15 am to 4:15 pm on weekdays. A number of other toll-free numbers will be available between the hours of 8:15 am and 4:15 pm. To order tax forms and additional publications, a toll-free number to

the Richmond Distribution Center will be in operation. The number is 1-800-424-FORM (3676). The "Tele-Tax" service has been expanded this year to allow individuals to call and hear recordings on over-150 tax issues. Persons with a rotary phone can call 1 201 624 1223 in Newark.
