## Two positions reinstated by Board

### Contract approved with Labor Relations Consultants

The Rahway Board of Education reinstated two positions at their regular monthly meeting held on Jan. 21 at the Intermediate School.

Due to the death of Alex Busse, Supervisor of Curriculum and Instruction, and the board's decision to appoint an area supervisor, on a temporary basis, to fill this position, one nurse and one guidance counselor have been removed from the Reduction in Force (RIF) list for the remainder of the 1985-86 school year.

According to Business Administrator/Board Secretary Anthony Rocco, Jr. the RIF list was necessary to divert an anticipated budget deficit. The reinstatement of these two positions leave a total of nine staff members and one nurse still affected by the RIF.

The board also approved a motion to award a contract to Cassette and Taylor, Labor Relations Consultants, South Plainfield to

represent the Board of Education in the Unfair Labor Practices charge leveled at them by the Rahway Education Association. Richard Waters, president of the REA, said a hearing on these charges took place on Jan. 17 before the Public Employees Relations Commission (P.E.R.C.) Waters said the commission hears the complaint and the defense to explore the possibility of a compromise. The commission can then issue a judgement to confirm or disagree with the complaint. This decision can take up to two weeks.

### American Legion helps America work

Editor's Note: Commander William Disney of the American Legion Post 5 in Rahway has released a series of articles on Americanism. The following is his first release:

Preamble to the Constitution  
The American Legion  
For God and Country we associate ourselves together for the following purposes: To uphold and defend the constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred percent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to community, state and nation; to combat antipathy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

The Legion shall endeavor to instill the basic ideals of Americanism in all peoples, through planning and establishing a constructive educational system designed to:

1. Combat all Anti American tendencies, activities and propaganda.
2. Work for the education of immigrants, prospective American citizens and alien residents in the principles of Americanism.
3. Inculcate the ideal of Americanism in the citizen population, particularly the basic American principal interests of all the people are above those of any special interest or any so-called class or section of people.
4. Spread throughout the people the information as to the real nature and principals of American government.
5. Foster the teachings of Americanism in our schools.

#### Principles of Americanism

The characteristic which distinguishes our form of government from other is the recognition of the truth that the inherent and fundamental rights of men are derived from God and not from government, dictators, or minorities.

These inalienable rights, which are the gifts of man from his Creator, are: Freedom of Worship; Freedom of Speech and Press; Freedom of Assembly; Freedom of Work in such occupation as the experience, training and qualifications of man may enable him to secure and hold. Freedom to enjoy the fruits of his work, which means the protection of property rights; and the Right to pursue his happiness so long as he does not harm others in the pursuit of this happiness. Upon these basic principles, the whole structure of our form of government was established by our forefathers.

### Rahway Schools gearing up for HSPT

#### Magnolia: "Our children will learn"

In 1982, school districts were notified on the impending High School Proficiency Test (HSPT) to be administered to ninth grade students in April. Educational systems throughout the state, and especially in Rahway, have been upgrading their curriculum in preparation for a major battle with the new graduation requisite.

The High School Requirement Law of 1979 directed the Commissioner of Education, with approval of the State Board of Education, to establish a program of standards for high school graduation. One requirement was the development of a state wide assessment test in reading, writing and computation skills to be administered to all secondary students. The HSPT is a direct result of the New Jersey State Department of Education's efforts to upgrade standards for high school students.

Much more difficult than the Minimum Basic Skills (MBS) test used in the past, the HSPT, according to Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette, presents a challenge to the school system. "Our efforts must insure that students know exactly what is on that test," said Brunette. "We have to make them aware of the skills they will be tested on and we have to insure that instruction goes on in those areas. If those skills are not mastered by the student, we must then

provide remedial assistance for them."

Mr. Brunette feels there is some basis for hope and optimism and points to the history of progress the district has had in the percentages of students passing the MBS test. Statistics show an overall improvement in scores from 1978, when the MBS was first given, to 1985 with math percentages going from 62.3 to 95, and reading rising from 72.7 percent to 93 percent. The State Department of Education also expects progress with the experience of the HSPT.

"This test is a measurement of achievement. It might be misleading to think of it only as a high school test," continued Brunette. "It tends to imply that high school will be the place where students will gain the background to pass this test. The HSPT is a test to measure accumulation of achievement from pre-school to twelfth grade. We are concentrating a great deal of effort in our elementary grades. We know there is a high correlation between the achievement of children in the second and third grades and the achievement of students in the eleventh grade."

Rahway public schools have been working since 1982 to align curriculum with the skills to be included in the HSPT. Assistant Superintendent of Schools Nicholas Delmonaco explained, "We have gone completely across our entire

curriculum to insure that all of these skills are being taught. In-service sessions have been set aside for staff development, an important part of the testing procedure. This first test is going to be a measure of how well we did our job as far as aligning total team project between teachers and the administration to see that the information is properly delivered to the students. The staff and administration have done a tremendous amount of work to assure that students master the skills."

Mrs. A. Magnolia, Supervisor of Curriculum and Instruction at the high school served for the State Department on the original MBS test. The commissioner then asked her to participate with a number of people from the state representing business, industry, parents and the State Department to determine what the new test would encompass. "Our responsibility," said Mrs. Magnolia, "was to design a set of specifications, or set of skills, that, when students graduate from public schools in New Jersey, will enable them to be productive, competitive citizens in the highly technological society of the twenty-first century."

"The most significant thing about the HSPT is this," continued Mrs. Magnolia. "It says to the educators, 'all of our students can learn'. To parents, it says, 'all of my children can learn'."

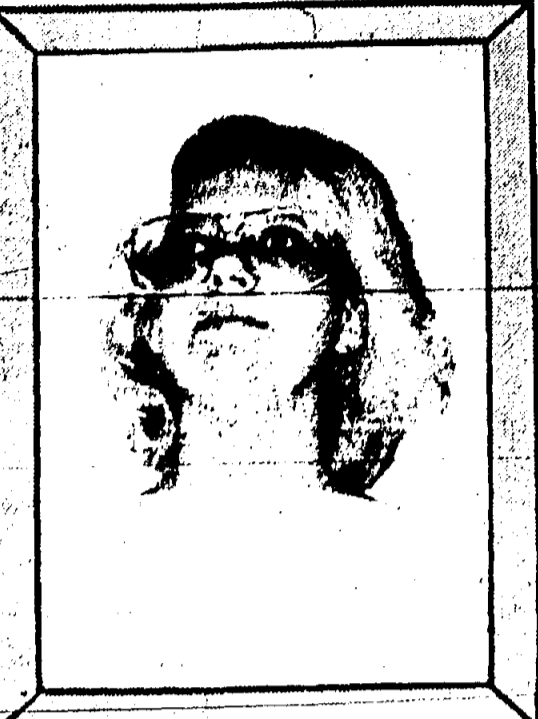

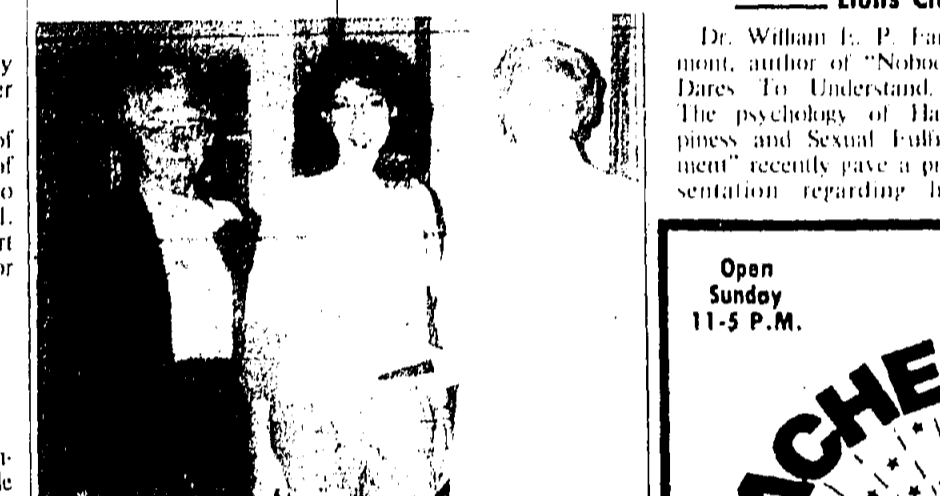

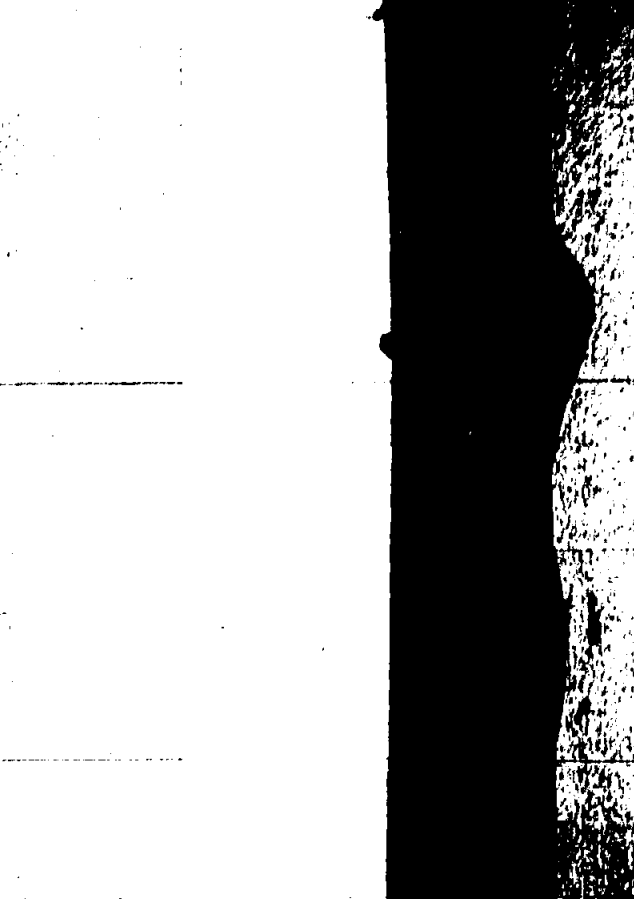

During the next few weeks, Rahway High students will be designing their schedules for the 1986-87 school year. Included among the varied courses being offered will be four electives in English: Creative Writing, Speech and Dramatic Arts, Journalism, and World Literature. Students will have the opportunity to take any of these courses in addition to the regular English class. The school lists the following courses being offered:

Creative Writing is a half-year elective, worth two and one-half credits. It is open to all students without any prerequisite requirements. The course offers guided and intensive writing experiences for learners who feel that they have creative ability or who wish to develop their creative writing skills. All pupils will engage in various types of composing, in-

cluding journal writing, poetry, short stories, a playlet, and essay.

Speech and Dramatic Arts is a half-year elective, worth two and one-half credits. It, too, is open to all students without any prerequisite requirements. The philosophy of this course is that effective communication with others in today's world can be one's most valuable assets. One of the most saleable skills a student can possess is the ability to speak and communicate well. Through various activities, students will recognize the importance of developing the ability to speak effectively, learn how to improve their speech for informal as well as special occasions, learn responsibility to themselves as well as to a group, learn the need for speech activities in a democracy, develop the ability for critical thinking, use and improve techniques of plan-

ning and organization, develop speaking skills, enhance their poise and self-confidence and learn to work democratically with others.

Journalism is a full-year elective, worth five credits. It is open to all students without any prerequisite requirements. We are reminded constantly of the public's need to be properly informed of timely information and how it affects one's opinions and behavior are important. Through this course, students will learn how to improve their logical thinking, the history and traditions of journalism, knowledge of the functions, responsibilities and significance of mass communications, how to be a reporter, methods of gathering news, techniques of writing news, how to plan, write, and publish a newspaper, and effective writing skills. Students will learn in some fashion with the production of Rho Iota Sigma, the school newspaper.

World Literature is a full-year elective, worth five credits. It is open only to twelfth grade students. This course is designed to afford seniors the opportunity to examine representative selections of classic literature not studied in the regular English class. Through the "great works," students will achieve an appreciation and love of great literature, study in depth the various literary genre, learn critical thinking, promote their creativity, relate the past to the present and expose the "concept of individuals" in relation to specific readings.

Students should select electives with care. The new electives can fill needs for many students who are looking to expand their academic horizons or who are looking to develop additional skills.

"Black Women: Achievement Against the Odds," an exhibit focusing on the contributions of black women to American history, culture and society, will be on display in the Nancy Thompson Library at Kean College of New Jersey, Union through March 10.

Mounted in conjunction with Black History Month and International Women's History Week, the exhibition is organized around 18 women featuring scenes from their lives and placing them in historical perspective. Although most of these women are virtually unknown, their contributions encompass fields as

varied as religion, the military, the arts, sports, labor, business, science and medicine, education, and civil rights. Information about 120 women is included in the exhibition which spans 200 years.

Examples of women featured in the exhibition are Madame C.J. Walker, the first female black millionaire who rose from a poor washerwoman to head her own cosmetics manufacturing company; Katherine Dunham, an anthropologist who studied African, Caribbean and Central European cultures, and formed her own dance troupe to perform a unique combination of these dance traditions; and educator and orator, Mary McLeod Bethune who founded the National Council of Negro Women.

During Black History Month, Kean College will also sponsor a lecture by James Baldwin on Feb. 12, the Inner-City Dance Ensemble on Feb. 20 and the Newark Boy's chorus on Feb. 26.
