Kean signs DiFrancesco legislation

Union County to get \$2.3 million in extra aid for nursing homes

signed into law legislation sponsored by Senator Donald T. Di Francesco (R-22) which will enable state and county operated nursing homes to receive additional federal funds. Union county will receive \$2.3 million in extru aid and Essex county, \$3.8 million.

The new law authorizes the state commissioner of Human Services to establish a new category of skilled nursing homes run by county governments, separate and distinct from proprictary and voluntary facilities, to qualify them for higher reimbursement

A Victim of Circumstances The events that swirled around Thomas Boycott in 1880 incited a semi-peaceful resistance movement that might have been the model for Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King. Both of these great men also used the power of massive relentless peaceful resistance to achieve political and social reforms in their own countries. Let us examine the vortex in which Boycott found

English Pathament, formed the National Land League and advocated that any man who accepted the higher rents or any landlord refusing to accept lower rent scales recommended by Parnell's League, should be shunned "by isolating him as if he were a leper of old by leaving him strictly alone "Boycott, carrying out Lord Erne's instructions, refused to give in to the land reformers demands. The citizens of County Mayo, acting on Parnell's recommendations, so totally ostracised Boycott that he was forced to flee to England in 1880. In 1881, the British Parliament passed a land reform bill. Within 2 months, "Boycott" was used as a word to describe this Irish style peaceful resistance movement, and within six years, Boycott's name was lower eased. Thomas Boycott achieved the dubious honor of contributing an eponym ta word derived from a person's years. Therefore an annuity should be treated as a supplename) to the English language

Actually, it was Lord Frie's unsympathetic response to the plight of his tenants that earned Thomas Boycott this unwanted distinction. The resistance of these brave Irish farmers set off a chain reaction that ultimately advanced man's relentless quest to improve his social condi-
