

## Voters support school budget; board incumbents are defeated

Rahway voters approved the Board of Education's \$16.1 million budget in a show of support on April 15.

Board Attorney Leo Kahn said 1,977, or 15 percent, of more than 13,000 registered voters turned out in support of the 1986-87 budget, and said it is only the fourth budget to win passage in the past 26 years. "It was a long haul to get to this point," said Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette. "The staff and all the parents really came through."

The budget includes a Current Expense portion of \$10,198,326 and was approved by an unofficial vote of 1009 in favor, 652 opposed. Capital Outlay totaled a vote of 965 in favor, 653 opposed. The Third Ward, Districts 3 and 4 showed the only defeat of both the Current Expense and Capital Outlay portions of the budget, with the Fifth Ward, Districts 1 and 2 approving Current Expense on a vote of 53-50, while defeating Capital Outlay with 49 in favor and 50 opposed.

Board of Education seats went to three candidates who defeated incumbents for their positions. Mrs. Lori Kennedy, a former teacher in the Rahway school system, came in first with a total of 1,019 votes.

### VICTORS IN BOARD RACE

"I'm thrilled," said Kennedy. "Now it's time to get into the business of running the school system."

Peter Kowal, a Rahway business man, received 878 votes. "I feel the new candidates helped the budget," said Kowal, "and the large voter turnout is a positive sign for the town. It reflects that the town is behind the Board of Education. I see positive things for the future."

Robert Munsey totaled 865 votes. Munsey is an employee of Prudential Insurance Company and has a background in business administration. "I am very honored," said Munsey, "especially in light of the huge voter turnout. I feel that I've been given the responsibility in a very im-

portant area in people's lives, their children's education. I will do my best to provide a good education in the most efficient way possible."

Candidate Dennis Hemenway and incumbents Betta Jacobs, Bernard Miller and Eileen Benes lost in their bids for re-election.

## Brown appointed principal of Rahway High School

The Rahway Board of Education appointed a new principal for the High School at a meeting held on April 7.

Robert Brown, presently the assistant principal, will begin his tenure on July 31, after the retirement of Roy Valentine on August 31 after 20 years in the Rahway School System.

Although in support of Brown, several Board Members refused to vote, saying they thought the appointment should be left to the new Board taking office after April 15 election.

Robert Brown is in his 26th year as an educator in

Rahway. He started his career at Roosevelt School as a 7th grade teacher and was transferred to the then Junior High as a Department Chairperson of Social Studies in 1964. Brown was transferred back to Roosevelt in 1973 to serve as assistant principal and a year later accepted the position of assistant principal at the Junior High School where he remained until 1982 when he was appointed to his present position of assistant principal at the High School.

A native of Newark, Robert Brown attended East Side High School, Jersey City State College,

where he earned a BA in Social Science and Montclair State College where he graduated with a Masters in Social Science. "One of my overriding goals," said Brown, "will be to try to build upon the strong foundations left, especially in school spirit, which was firmly established by Mr. Valentine. I plan to begin to make a review of our curriculum with hopes of bringing about improvement where necessary. Initially those are the two areas I would like to focus on."

Petitions have been filed for seats on the Rahway City Council and candidates have announced their intentions to seek the position of Mayor.

Democratic incumbents include Councilman-at-Large James Cadigan, who also serves as Council president, Councilman-at-Large Vincent P. Adona and Councilman-at-Large Walter McLeod. They are joined by Republicans, for at-Large seats, William P. Wnuck, Diane E. Carvalho and Scott Cron seeking four year terms.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin announced his intention to run for the fifth term as Mayor. Martin was first elected in 1970 and has

served consecutively in that office. His opponent in November will be present Republican Councilman John C. Marsh. This will be Marsh's fourth bid for a second term in office. Marsh won election in 1966 and after serving four years as Mayor was defeated by Martin in 1970, 1974 and 1978. Councilman James Fulcomer ran an unsuccessful campaign against Martin in 1982.

The primary election will be held on June 3, but as each candidate is unopposed for the position they seek, the primary will have no effect.

Voters will decide on Council Members and Mayor on Nov. 4.

Pilar Mahoney of Rahway has been named chairman of the American Cancer Society's 1986 crusade in Rahway. The announcement was made by Ronald Posyton, Chairman of the Board, Union County Unit.

The Cancer Crusade in Rahway will be held during April and May. The annual campaign not only raises funds for the Society's research, service and education programs, but also in-

cludes a door-to-door residential education drive.

Mahoney said she expects to raise \$3,000 through this year's Crusade. "This money will be used to support programs right here in Union County for the prevention, early detection and treatment of cancer and to provide assistance to cancer patients."

The 1986 Cancer Crusade in Union County is part of a statewide and National effort.

## Teenagers of tomorrow join anti-drug league

By taking a secret oath to "say no" to drugs and wearing a special red, white and blue "Defenders Against Drugs" (DAD) badge, young people across New Jersey are being sworn into a new anti-drug league by the New Jersey Narcotics Enforcement Officers Association.

Sgt. Leo Uebelin, president of the NJNEOA, said his group members are asking youngsters from kindergarten up to junior high school to help spread the word that "it's just not cool" to get mixed up with illicit substances.

This past week, Union County Prosecutor John H. Stamler swore in the first batch of "Defenders" at the county administration building in Elizabeth. Stamler, who has been NJNEOA's general counsel for 15 years, said deputizing the teenagers of tomorrow before they reach the age where drug experimentation and peer pressure begin is a novel approach to "the number one law enforcement problem — drugs."

Association members, some 1,500 strong from throughout New Jersey, are asking school officials to fortify their drug prevention programs and help "deglamorize" drugs. "This whole idea came about in response to a growing alarm about the prevalence of drugs in our society and the

young age at which kids are being exposed to it," Uebelin said.

The youngsters, sporting their DAD badges and certificates of membership, repeat a pledge in which they promise to keep their bodies healthy and clean and to tell friends not to get involved with dangerous substances.

"We've done well in the fight against drug dealers and suppliers but unfortunately the supplies con-

tinue to come into our area," said Uebelin. "The association now wants to cut down the demand, hopefully addressing the use side of the scale."

Uebelin, a detective in the Union County Prosecutor's Office, had 3,000 of the special badges made up and is hoping a corporate sponsor will provide his group with enough materials to take the anti-drug message statewide.

He has already made a presentation to PTA and PTO leaders from Union County, and will be reaching out to the Union County Juvenile Officers Association in May, according to Assistant Prosecutor Robert O'Leary. The juvenile officers group, comprised of school administrators and juvenile bureau detectives from throughout the county, is interested in the entire program, he said.

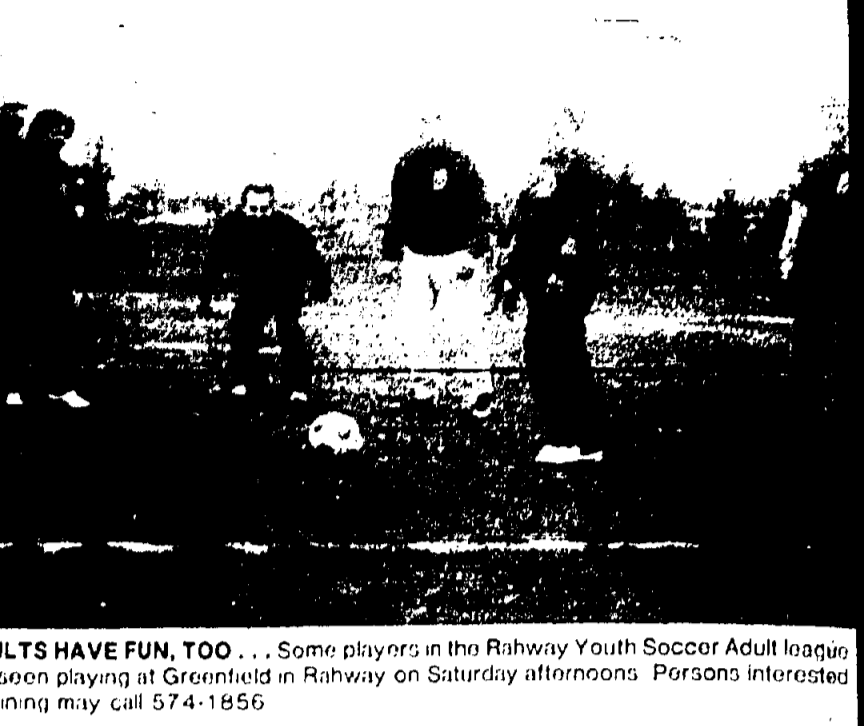

## American Legion helps America work

This is the second in a series of articles on Americanism from Commander William Disney of American Legion Post 5, Rahway.

**AMERICANISM** is — love of America; loyalty to her institutions as the best yet devised by man of secure life, liberty, individual dignity and happiness; and the willingness to defend our Country and Flag against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

**AMERICANISM** is — a vital, active, living force. Americanism means peace, strength, the will and the courage to live as free men in a free land. It means a friendly hand to people everywhere who respect our institutions and our thinking. It is not a word; it is a cause, a way of life, a challenge and a hope in this world of turmoil.

**AMERICANISM** is — a way of life, the best way of life ever known.

**AMERICANISM** is — an ideal of loyal patriotism, religious tolerance, righteous freedom, fearless courage, honest integrity, abiding faith in the commanding destiny of the United States, and a fathomless love for the principles which led our forefathers to found this country.

**AMERICANISM** is — complete and unqualified loyalty to the ideals of government set forth in the Bill of Rights, the Declaration of Independence, and the Constitution of the United States. It is respect for, and ready obedience to, duly constituted authority and the laws of the land. It is freedom without license, religion without bigotry, charity without bias or race hatred, love of Flag, and a readiness to defend that for which it stands against every alien and subversive influence from without or within.

**AMERICANISM** is — an unflinching love of country; loyalty to its institutions and ideals; eagerness to defend it against all enemies; individual allegiance to the Flag; and a desire to secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and posterity.

### POST AMERICANISM COMMITTEE

The Americanism Committee of Posts are responsible for carrying out the obligations embodied in those sections of the Preamble to the Legion constitution reading: "To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America, to foster and perpetuate a 100 percent Americanism, to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to Community, State and Nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses, to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy." All of these principles are the concern of all Americanism Committee.

The Americanism program of The American Legion has always been, and must of necessity continue to be, a program fostering wide-range community service, educational growth, religious emphasis, youth development, and constant observation of subversive organizations and individuals — all promoted and conducted at the Post level by the Post Americanism Committee.

### SERVICE TO GOD AND COUNTRY

When our Founding Fathers established our form of government, they based the practical workings of this government upon a new and untried political ideal or philosophy. It was a philosophy of government that has long existed in the minds of men, but as yet had never been tried in practical manner. They based our form of government upon the idea that the great Creator of man had endowed each and every human being with "certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," and they established the function of government as that of protecting these God-given rights.

To us, today, this ideal of government seems axiomatic. We ask, "What other basic idea of government can there be?" but we must realize that a large part of the world today subscribes to a form of government that is unalterably opposed to our own philosophy. They say that the State, not God, is the author of our rights. This is Totalitarianism, which appears under the guise of Communism, Nazism, Fascism, and many other isms. Often it is presented under a patriotic guise that fools those who do not see its basic evils. When it is too late, men realize that they have been sold on a program injurious to themselves. If the State gives the individual his rights, the State may withdraw those rights for its own convenience. Thus, for propaganda purposes, or for any other reason, the State may even take back from the citizen the right to live. In doing this, it asserts itself does no injury to the individual since he essentially has no right to live except at the sufferance of the State.

### IT IS AMERICANISM

Under our own American philosophy of government this withdrawal of human rights is impossible. If God gave us rights, only the Creator of those rights can take them away. No State, for reasons of its own, can take your life, your liberty, your property or any other right. They are God-given and our government recognizes this fact.

The American Legion, as a measure protecting this ideal of government, realizes the fact that the American people must never forget God, the source of their rights. A people, imbued with the realization that their Creator endowed them with their individual rights, can never be sold on totalitarianism under any guise. It is the aim and objective of this American Legion Post to bring God to the foreground in American life, not only the religious life, but the social, economic and political life as well. God is an essential part of real Americanism. Without God, there is no Americanism.

What better example can be shown than "The Tale of Four Chaplains" that I quote:

For Chaplains once set out to sea  
(This story is quite true)  
Two Protestants, a Catholic priest  
And last, not least, a Jew  
They embarked on our God  
And yet each thought the other's views  
Concerning God were "odd"  
The Protestant denied the Pope  
The Jew, the Trinity  
The Catholic priest had his own views  
As they set out to sea  
The old ship was torpedoed  
Fire spread all around  
And it was plain to every man  
The ship was going down  
The Chaplains prayed and worked as one  
They saved the lives of men  
And when they'd done all men could do  
They knelt and prayed again  
The answer came — they linked their arms  
and stood like "steel" in prayer  
A monument to the living God  
Sure proof that He is there  
This lesson that they died to teach  
Is left for us today  
A gift from God that He sent us  
By those saints yesterday  
God sends His saints to teach us all  
They endure the pains of hell  
Thank God for saints who'll pay the price  
To teach His lesson well.

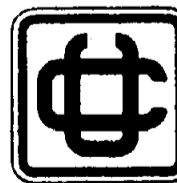
