

Council meeting heats up over police car purchase

Tempers flared amidst accusations of improper procedure and a councilman was threatened with expulsion at the Rahway City Council meeting held on April 14.

A resolution authorizing the purchase of two 1986 Chevrolet Caprice Police cars for the total price of \$20,950 was voted onto the agenda.

Councilman George Wagenhoffer questioned the validity of the resolution as the police cars had already been purchased.

Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett explained that authorization for purchase was made by a vote of council on the transfer of monies into the proper ac-

count and when the procedural error was discovered, the proper resolution was to be offered to the council for a formality vote.

Councilman John Marsh accused the administration of "apathy."

"How can a city spend over \$20,000 without the authority to do so," questioned Marsh. "If this happened in industry, someone would be fired."

A heated discussion broke out among various council members and when Council President James Cadigan called for order, Councilman Marsh continued to speak out. A guard was brought into Council Chambers. "If anyone refuses to honor the chair," stated Cadigan, "he

will be escorted from Council Chambers."

The resolution was approved by a vote of 8 in favor, with Councilman Jerry Coleman opposed. "My vote is in line with a commitment I made when I took office," explained Coleman, "to not support any corporation doing business with South Africa."

In answer to a question on the City's parking problem from resident Patricia Cane, Elm Ave., President Cadigan said the council committee was actively working on the problem.

Lyn Salerno, Elm Ave., advised council that a petition was circulating and would be presented to council at the May meeting in reference to the new con-

tract with Garden State Kennels, Stirling, Ms. Salerno said that a dead animal had not been picked up and she was unsure of the procedure involved in notifying the kennels.

In other business, the Council:

- Approved a resolution authorizing the purchase of gasoline under State Contract.
- Approved a resolution amending the quarterly rate schedule for industrial waste.
- Approved a resolution confirming the sale of City-owned property.
- Approved a resolution for the acceptance of the

bid of Spectra-Physics of Piscataway for an accessory data system for existing laboratory instruments.

- Approved a resolution awarding bids for paper products and washroom and maintenance supplies.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the reconstruction of Bond St. between East Scott Ave. and East Grand Ave.
- Approved an ordinance to amend an ordinance to authorize the improvement of the water distribution system in, by and for the City of Rahway to appropriate the sum of \$1,300,000 and to authorize the issuance of bonds.

Sponsored by the Mayor's Business and Government Economic Development Committee, the Arts and Crafts Show will feature over 200 quality artists and craftspeople who will be located on Main, Cherry and Irving Streets.

In addition to the high number of participants in

the show, this year there will be a special Arts and Crafts Competition for Union County Schools.

Mayor Martin said, "this competition will be entertaining and healthy for all the youth of Union County." The school's competition will be held on Irving Street near the Union County Arts Center.

In conjunction with the Arts and Crafts Show, the Union County Arts Center will provide free shows on stage in the theater featuring the N.J. Dance Theater, Roselle Park Band, City Stage Band, Rahway High School Chorus and Band, and the Iselin Barbershop Chorus. Shows begin at 11 a.m. and continue all afternoon at scheduled intervals.

ing Rahway Hospital volunteers for "their dedicated, selfless, and compassionate efforts." Hospital volunteers Mary Arvey, of Rahway, and Bernio Paltz, of Linden, are two of over 300 volunteers and auxiliaries who give their time, energy, and service to the hospital.

Rahway Hospital honors volunteers

During the week of April 20 to April 26, National Volunteer Week, Rahway Hospital recognizes the work and dedication of its over 300 in-service volunteers and auxiliaries, who help keep the hospital running all year long.

Auxiliaries are responsible for administration and staffing of the Rose Tree Gift Shop, the Snack Bar, the Shop-on-Wheels, and the Baby Photo Service. They also provide new mothers with information on immunizations and loan infant car seats when needed.

Their efforts also extend to giving generous financial support to the hospital. Recently, they have pledged over \$800,000, including \$500,000 towards the Expansion and Modernization '80 Program. The Auxiliary also offers nursing and allied health scholarships to local young people pursuing a college education in these fields.

In-service volunteers can be found all over the hospital contributing a total of almost 50,000 hours of service a year. Their jobs range from the traditional, such as general office work, delivering flowers, and making beds, to less traditional assignments such as staffing the surgical waiting room and working in the hospital's audio-visual department running live game shows which air on the hospital's own television station.

Adult volunteers take part in a general orientation and receive on-the-job training.

Some volunteers receive special training to perform such jobs as working in the Emergency Center as a liaison between patients, staff, and awaiting family members, or providing patients with information and answering questions on Medicare. Junior volunteers receive training from the nursing staff on how to feed patients, make beds, and operate a wheel chair so that they can provide assistance.

Home-bound senior citizens also serve as volunteers by knitting baby caps, which are distributed to mothers of new babies born at the hospital, and slippers, distributed to other patients.

Beware of all power lines

I'm Camiel Bolle, a Troubleshooter at PSE&G, and that slogan, **LOOK UP AND LIVE**, adopted by the New Jersey Utilities Association, could save your life.

ALWAYS steer clear of power lines, transformers, substations, or buildings or fences displaying signs that say **DANGER HIGH VOLTAGE**.

Be sure your children are aware of the dangers of high voltage areas. Climbing a tree with wires near it or running through it is especially hazardous, because your child could accidentally be injured or killed.

Call PSE&G first

Use string, not wire, on kites and don't fly them in areas where there are power lines or substations. If a kite does get caught in a high voltage area, **FIRST**, call PSE&G. We will remove it for you. **DO NOT** attempt to climb a utility pole, a tree or fence or pull on the string.

If you see a broken power line, stay away. Call PSE&G or your fire or police department right away. At home,

NEVER use an aluminum ladder while working near wires. Do not trim trees that have wires running through them or near them.

When you are working on the exterior of your home, and especially if you have aluminum siding or if you are installing a TV antenna, stay well clear of any wires attached to your home. If in doubt on how to proceed, call PSE&G and we will advise you.

Overhead wire safety extends to the inside of your home, too. If you have installed additional major appliances be sure to check with your electrician to avoid any danger of overloading the circuits. Such a condition could cause a fire.
