

Prisoners to join hands on Sunday

Inmates to lend a hand for Hands Across America

Hands Across America, the nationwide fund-raiser to aid the poor and homeless, will have its counterpart on Sunday in the yard of Rahway State Prison.

Charles Allen, Chairman of the Prisoners Representative Committee, is the coordinator and liaison of the prisoners' effort to raise money and, more importantly, to show their support of humanitarian efforts.

"Prisoners are concerned about the poor," said Allen. "Many of them go home with only \$50 and may end up homeless themselves. Our concern for the poor is a basic concern for ourselves."

Allen expects more than the 350 people needed to fill a quarter mile line inside the prison yard. Prisoner contributions are made by filling out a money transfer, which then goes to the business office, where their account is credited.

"Prisoners make up to \$1.50 a day, and for worthy causes, some give \$2 or \$3," explained Allen. "That's a lot of money in here."

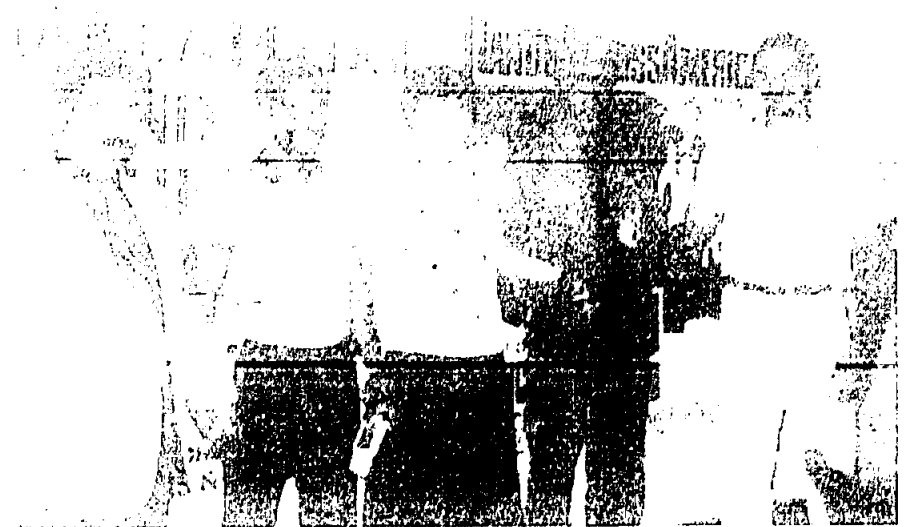
"There is no set goal for contributions; participation is more important," explained Allen. "We want the community to know there is a problem, and to recognize and do something about it."

The Prisoners Representative Committee consists of 18 elected representatives chosen from eight wings, making up the general population of approximately 1,500 inmates.

The committee serves as liaison between prisoners and the administration and has been actively involved in various fund-raiser for Ethiopian famine relief, children with AIDS, and the Big Brother and Big Sister organizations.

Allen is quick to point out that the administration has been cooperative with the committee's functions. "The administration has been supportive of our humanitarian efforts, they have not curtailed our activities," said Allen.

Allen has spent 13 years in prison and still feels that he and others are making a viable contribution. "We feel we've been able to give of ourselves to the communities we come from," explained Allen. "Most of them have recognized their errors, they're not bad people, and they look for any opportunity to express their humanity."

Board approves contracts for asbestos removal

Contracts for the removal of asbestos from City schools and payments for work completed on the High School Renovation Project were approved by the Rahway Board of Education at a regular meeting held on May 19.

A contract was awarded to Princeton Testing Laboratory, Princeton, to prepare specifications for the removal of asbestos from boilers and pipes in the Roosevelt School boiler room at a fee of \$1,000 and to provide an inspection monitoring and analysis phase contract at a cost of \$391 per day. A contract was approved with Ace Insulation Co., Colts Neck, for the removal of asbestos from the boiler room. Ace Insulation Co. was also awarded a contract for the removal of asbestos in the hot water room at the High School. Hammond Contracting Co., Bloomfield, was awarded a contract for the heating and ventilating system renovations at Roosevelt School, in the amount of \$115,300.

Payments were authorized to the following for work on the High School Renovation Project: NOD Mechanical Contractors, Inc. in the amounts of \$33,300, \$61,200 and \$17,100 for work completed on the heating and ventilating systems and \$4,500 for plumbing work completed; John Schwarz, Inc. in the amounts of \$34,830 and \$31,878 for electrical work completed; Semper Construction Co., Inc. in the amount of \$201,594 for general construction work; Princeton Testing Laboratory in the amount of \$1,300 for the prepara-

tion of specifications to remove asbestos from the High School Fickett, Morton, Russo and Maggio in the amount of \$10,055 for architectural services.

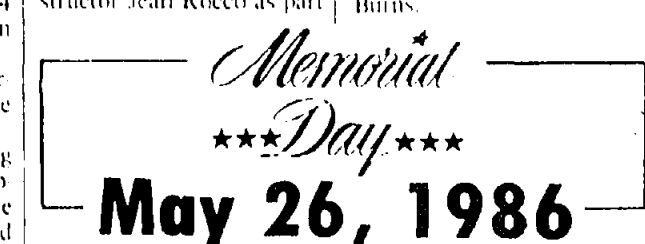
Sponsor pledges supporting the Jump-a-thon were collected by the students.

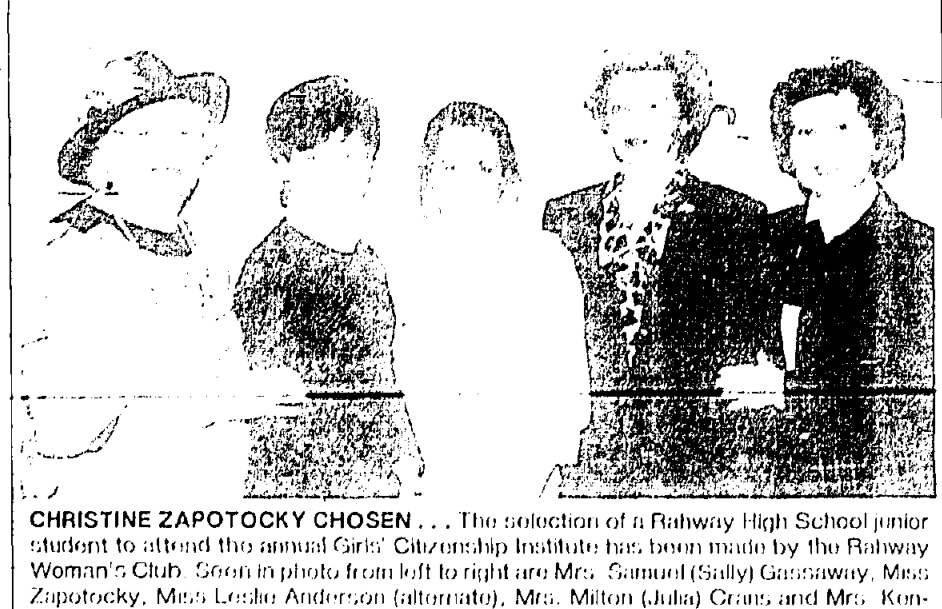

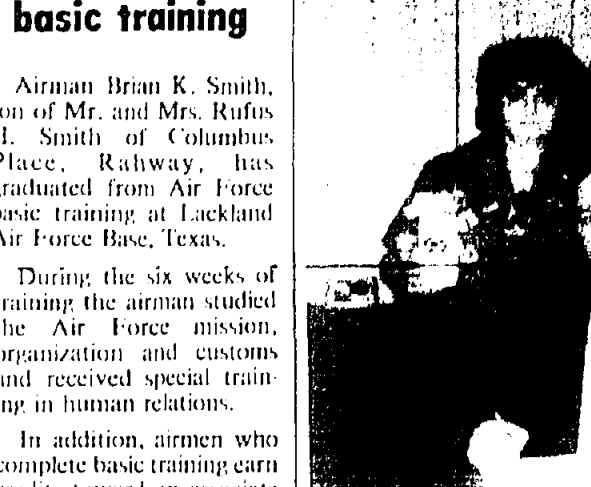

Social Security benefits total nearly \$2 billion

More information about Social Security financing can be obtained at the Elizabeth Security office located at 442 Westminster Avenue. The telephone number is (800) 272-1111.

Many Americans are aware that the almost 37 million people receive monthly Social Security benefits totaling almost \$2 billion. John H. McClintock, Social Security Analyst, is the local administrator of the Social Security Administration in Elizabeth.

They are less aware that this massive effort involves an administrative cost of just 1.5 percent and that the remaining 98.5 percent of Social Security taxes collected is paid out in benefits, he explained.

Although the Social Security Administration also administers the supplemental security income (SSI) program, the manager said, the administrative costs for SSI are paid from Federal general revenues, not from the Social Security trust funds.

Mr. McClintock engaged Social Security employees in Elizabeth to explain Social Security covered employment and how benefits will be available for them to use and when they can get them under the new rules.

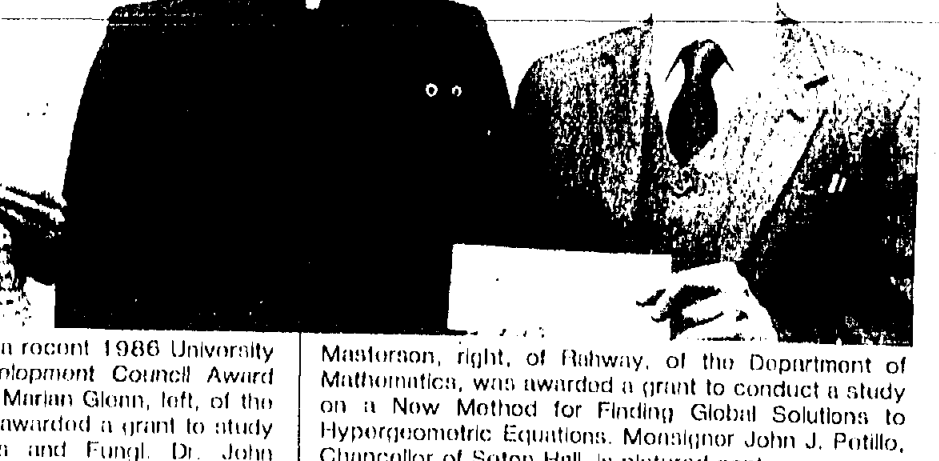
