HANDS ACROSS AMERICA

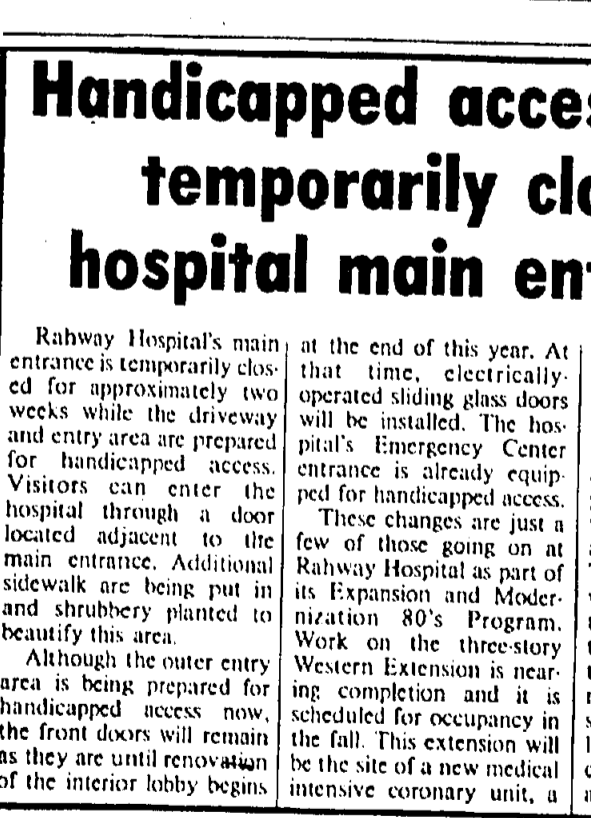
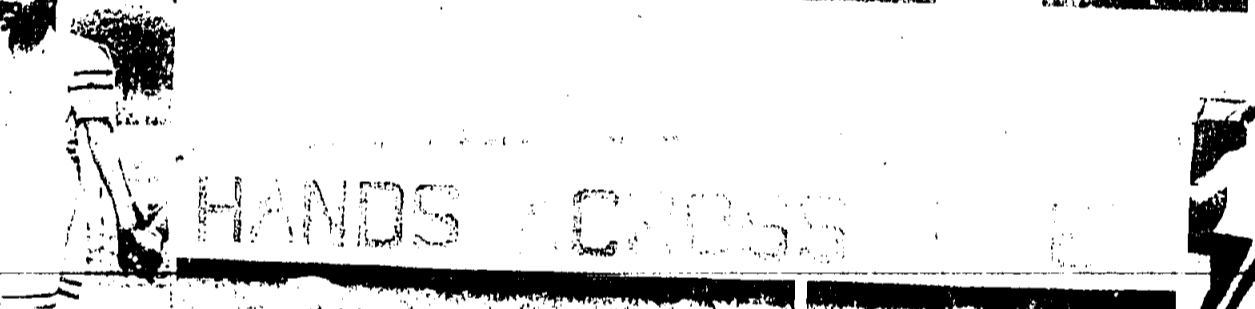


The long-awaited "Hands Across America" day, held on Sunday, May 25, was a historic day for all participants across the United States. The purpose of the day was to aid the homeless and hungry in America.

Participants in Rahway came through with flying colors, as they joined the line with a feeling of pride and excitement. People came from as far away as Queens to join hands with relatives in Rahway. The patriotic spirit was evident, as many hand-holders held flags. Hundreds of small children were seen waving flags as they viewed a slice of American history taking

place. People of all ages held hands... the young... the old... many in wheelchairs. It was an orderly group that eagerly awaited the final moment before joining hands, the symbolic gesture. At exactly 3 p.m., thousands of red, white and blue balloons were released to finalize the historic event. Participants sang three songs... "We Are the

World," "America the Beautiful" and the theme song, "Hands Across America" as hands were united for this historical effort. "It was a red, white and blue day for all Americans," explained Ellen Vigilante, Rahway coordinator.



Handicapped access work temporarily closes hospital main entrance

Rahway Hospital's main entrance is temporarily closed for approximately two weeks while the driveway and entry area are prepared for handicapped access. Visitors can enter the hospital through a door located adjacent to the main entrance. Additional sidewalk are being put in and shrubbery planted to beautify this area. Although the outer entry area is being prepared for handicapped access, now the front doors will remain as they are until renovation of the interior lobby begins at the end of this year. At that time, electrically operated sliding glass doors will be installed. The hospital's Emergency Center entrance is already equipped for handicapped access. These changes are just a few of those going on at Rahway Hospital as part of its Expansion and Modernization 80's Program. Work on the three-story Western Extension is nearing completion and it is scheduled for occupancy in the fall. This extension will be the site of a new medical intensive coronary unit, a surgery suite, a day surgery unit, and the physical and respiratory therapy departments. Renovations of some areas of the hospital are in progress, but major internal work is scheduled to begin at the end of the year. There will be a new lobby as well as refurbishing of patient rooms and nursing stations. Extensive renovations will modernize the maternity suite and nursery, and there will be a new labor and delivery unit including a fathers' lounge and birthing rooms.

Public urged to "Touch A Life"

Many prospective foster parents do not realize they are eligible to care for children in need of a home. State requirements for foster parents are that they be more than 18, in good physical and emotional health, participate in a minimum of 10 hours of training, and be able to provide a child with shelter, food, clothing, and a place to sleep. The New Jersey Foster Parents Association is a non-profit organization that provides information on becoming a foster parent. Through a site contact, the organization provides training and recruitment of foster parents, and acts as a referral service on foster care issues. The state association is largely composed of 20 county associations, along with other child advocacy groups.

Assemblyman Franks honored by Candle Lighters

American Legion salutes our flag

Editor's Note: This is the final article from outgoing Commander William Disney of Rahway American Legion, Post 5.

FLAG EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

Flag education has been a major program of The American Legion. Each year Posts in every section of the country distribute hundreds of thousands of copies of the Flag literature to local schools and youth groups as a community service. Thousands of FLAG CODES, and LET'S BE RIGHT ON FLAG ETIQUETTE are distributed annually.

HISTORY OF THE FLAG

The United States Flag is the third oldest of the national standards of the world, older than the Union Jack of Britain or the Tricolor of France.

The Flag was first authorized by Congress June 14, 1777. This date is now observed as Flag Day throughout America.

The Flag was first flown from Fort Stanwix, on the site of the present city of Rome, New York, on August 3, 1777. It was first under fire three days later in the Battle of Red Bank, August 17, 1777.

It was decreed that there should be a star and a stripe for each state, making 13 of both, for the states at that time had just been erected from the original 13 colonies. The colors of the Flag may be thus explained: The red is for valor, and for energy; the white for hope, purity, cleanliness of life and rectitude of conduct; the blue, the color of heaven, for reverence to God, loyalty, sincerity, justice and truth.

The star is an ancient symbol of India, Persia and lofty aspirations. The constellation of the stars within the union—one star for each state—is emblematic of our federal constitution, which reserves to the states their individual sovereignty, except as to rights delegated by them to the Federal government.

The symbolism of the Flag was thus interpreted by Washington: "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing liberty."

In 1791, Vermont, and in 1792, Kentucky were admitted to the Union and the number of stars and stripes was raised to 15 in correspondence. As other states came into the Union, it became evident there would be too many stripes. So in 1818, Congress enacted that the number of stripes be reduced and restricted henceforth to 13, representing the 13 original states, while a star should be added for each succeeding state. That law is the law of today.

The name "Old Glory" was given to our national Flag August 10, 1831, by Capt. William Driver of the brig Charles Doggett.

The Flag was first carried in battle at the Battle of Swanton, September 11, 1777. It first flew over foreign territory January 28, 1778, at Nassau, Bahama Islands, Fort Nassau having been captured by the Americans in the course of the war for independence. The first foreign salute to the Flag was rendered by the French admiral, LaMotte Piquet, off Quiberon Bay, February 13, 1778.

The United States Flag is unique in the deep and noble significance of its message to the entire world—a message of national independence, of individual liberty, of idealism, of patriotism.

It symbolizes national independence and popular sovereignty. It is not the flag of a reigning family or royal house, but of over two hundred million free people welded into a Nation, one and inseparable, united not only by community of interest, but by vital unity of sentiment and purpose, a Nation distinguished by the clear, individual conception of its citizens alike of their duties and their privileges, their obligations and their rights.

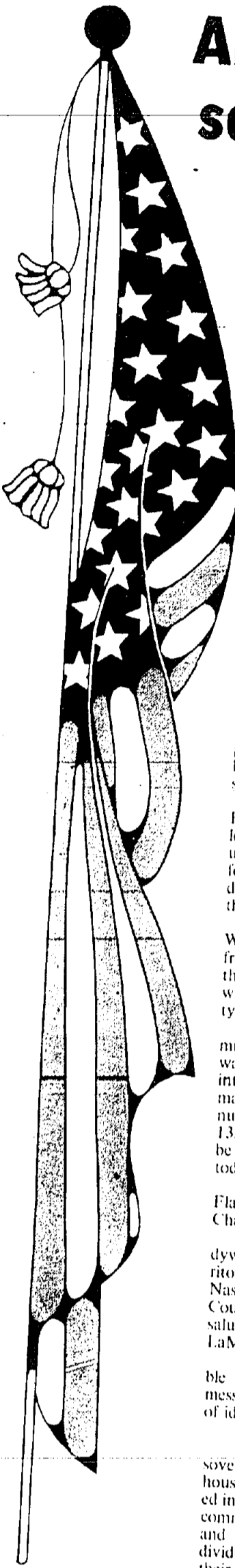
It incarnates for all mankind the spirit of Liberty and the glorious ideal of human freedom; not the freedom of unrestrained or the liberty of license, but an unique ideal of equal opportunity for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, safeguarded by the stern and lofty principles of duty, of righteousness and of justice, and attainable by obedience to self-imposed laws.

Floating from the lofty pinnacle of American idealism, it is a beacon of enduring hope, like the famous Bartholdi Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World to the oppressed of all lands. It floats over a wondrous assemblage of people from every racial stock of the earth whose united hearts constitute an indivisible and invincible force for the defense and succor of the downtrodden.

It embodies the essence of patriotism. Its spirit is the spirit of the American nation. Its history is the history of the Fathers of the Republic who devoted upon its altars tales of national honor and glory cluster thickly about it. Ever victorious, it has emerged triumphant from nine great national conflicts. It bears witness to the immense expansion of our national boundaries, the development of our natural resources, and the splendid structure of our civilization. It prophesies the triumph of popular government, of civic and religious liberty and of national righteousness throughout the world.

The Flag first rose over thirteen states along the Atlantic seaboard, with a population of some three million people. Today it flies over fifty states, extending across the continent, and over great islands of the two oceans; and one hundred and millions owe allegiance, sacrifice. Citizens have advanced it and heroes have died for it. It is the sign made visible of the strong spirit that has brought liberty and prosperity to the people of America.

Commander Disney wanted to take this opportunity to thank his Officers and the Auxiliary who contributed to the success of his term. Also, all those who served as Chairman or on a Committee for special activities throughout the year. May God bless you all.
