School administrators accept salary guides

Guides covering administrative salaries between the Rahway Administrators and Supervisor Association (RASA) and the Board of Education were approved at a special meeting last June 16.

Sixty-four members not included in the RASA bargaining unit were also approved for one year period. Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette received an increase of 3.5 percent and his salary from \$72,095 to \$76,500. Assistant Superintendent of Schools Nicholas Delmonico received a 6.6 percent increase to \$67,000, and Board Secretary/Business Administrator Anthony Riccio, Jr., increased by 8.1 percent to a total of \$60,500.

Robert Munsay, Chairman of the Negotiations Committee, explained that even though the 1986-87 budget approved by voters included a 9.5 percent in-

crease for top administrators signed granted them less than what was budgeted.

"We felt we needed the money in the classrooms," said Munsay, "to apply the dollar to instructional programs." He thinks the administration understood that there was an absolute dollar amount we could spend. Anything above that would be detrimental to the kids."

The salary guides cover the top administration including the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Board Administrator, Area Superintendents, Principals. Traditionally, administrators traditionally, would receive an increase of one quarter percent over that negotiated by the teachers.

Contract negotiations last fall gave Rahway Education Association members an increase of 9 and 9.5 percent in-

cent over two years of a contract.

A two-year Letter of Agreement was signed covering salaries for Area Supervisors, Principals and Vice Principals.

Principals will receive a salary of \$55,156; Ralph Manfredi, Vice Principal, will receive \$54,230, and Edward Yerpalonis, appointed as Vice Principal for 1986-87 at a salary of \$49,240.

Council in quandary over City garbage

over City garbage

Anne Fidler, a recipient of the final award to the Mayor from his administrative seat to a spectator seat, the Rahway City Council transacted business as usual on June 11.

A resolution objecting to the establishment of a Transfer Station for the disposal of Union County garbage to an out-of-state location was approved on a vote of 5 in favor with Councilman Jerry Colen, George Wagnleitner and John Marsh opposed. Councilman Vincent Adornato was absent.

Councilman James Fidler explained that the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has required a Transfer Station be built to transport garbage out of state until Rahway's Resource Recovery Facility is operational in 1988.

Fidler suggested that either the II-R Landfill Site in Middlesex County be reopened or that the Edgboro Landfill be expanded. He said the County Planner estimated the cost of out-of-state disposal would be \$100,000 per household, or \$900,000 for the City.

Brown Ferrini, a Union County vendor, has estimated the cost at \$100 per person, or \$2.6 million

approved by the Council Pitts, the recipient of the Union County Pro Secontee's Office Annual Achievement Award for 1986.

This award is a reflection of Detective Pitts' unusual devotion to the City of Rahway, the Police Department and should be an inspiration and example to his fellow officers," read the resolution.

"The Solid Waste Advisory Committee says the county should spend from \$9 to \$10 million to build this facility to compact our garbage," said Councilman Max Sheld. "It will be used to store trash until the Resource Recovery Facility is finished. We will end up with a big 'white elephant.' The money can be spent for better purposes."

Councilman John Marsh, a local opponent of resource recovery, responded that Rahway agreed with the building of a Transfer Station.

"I take a totally different stand," said Marsh. "The purpose of a Transfer Station is to collect our garbage, making it easier to transport. It is a means of saving money. Its purpose is to eventually take garbage to the incinerator in compacted form. These are economical figures. More garbage and are a waste tactic to get the incinerator built."

In other business, a resolution commending Detective Daniel Pitts was

approved for first reading.

The resolution included the recommendation to rezone Madison Avenue, the appropriation of \$10,000 and the authorization to issue bonds to finance the appropriations. Public hearing and final adoption of this ordinance is scheduled for July 14, with prior approval of the budget.

Also approved for first reading was an ordinance regulating and restricting parking on certain streets and providing for a permit parking system. Public hearing and final adoption of this ordinance is scheduled for July 14, with prior approval of the budget.

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NOTICE OF CANCELLATION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the following ordinance was in effect at a regular meeting of the Mayor and Council of the City of Rahway, New Jersey, held on June 11, 1986, and will remain in effect for four months after a public hearing of a regular meeting of the City Council following its adoption:

On June 14, 1986, the Mayor and Council of the City of Rahway, New Jersey, did adopt Ordinance No. 14-86, which provides for the cancellation of the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND REINFORCING THE LAW OF THE CITY OF RAHWAY RELATING TO THE USE OF THE CITY OF RAHWAY AS A SPORTS AND ENTERTAINMENT CENTER AND THE ISSUE OF PERMIT FEES.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Rahway, that Article 5 of the Code of the City of Rahway, entitled "Permit Fees," is amended to include the following:

ARTICLE I.

Permit fees are hereby imposed on the following activities:

As set forth in the following table, the permit fees shall be paid on the streets of parts of the City of Rahway as indicated in Schedule A, attached hereto, for the duration of the activities or events described in the following table:

The activities or events referred to in the following table may be conducted on any portion of a street, if a

permit is issued for such portion of the street, or on any portion of a street, if a

current residential parking permit, or

30. The permit fees under section 2 of the following table shall be exempt from the two-hour parking provisions of this Ordinance, and shall be paid by all other parking applicants, whether or not issued a permit, to the City of Rahway or to the State of New Jersey.

SECTION II.

Description:

All the following vehicles shall be exempt from this parking Permit Ordinance:

1. Any vehicle displaying a current valid parking permit

map or a maximum of seven (7) days prior to the issuance of the permit, or a bona fide ticket issued within the permit parking areas.

This permit shall be displayed in the dashboard of the vehicle as a placard or sticker on the front or rear window of the parking

vehicle.

SECTION III.

Administration:

At the time of application, and continuing to administer and enforce the provisions of this ordinance, any body delegated by the Housing Authority of the City of Rahway (hereinafter referred to as "the Parking Authority")? The Parking Authority may add, amend, and repeal, if necessary, any part of this ordinance.

Officers shall be appointed by the Parking Authority:

1. The Board of Education, Schreiber Board, Clerk, New Jersey, and Superintendent of Schools.

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

Statue of Liberty celebration to get strict boat watch by Marine patrols

Colonel Clinton L. Parano, State Police superintendent, announced that the Marine Law Enforcement Bureau is preparing for the upcoming Statue of Liberty observance scheduled for the week of June 29 to July 6. He told

colonel Parano and other State and local authorities will be on

the waterways to insure the safety of the boating public by strictly enforcing all boating regulations.

Colonel Parano said the spectacular events scheduled for the week-end will be expected to attract to New York Harbor the greatest concentration of pleasure and commercial boats ever. "It has been estimated that

as many as 40,000 vessels will be operating on the waters from Sandy Hook Bay to the George Washington Bridge," Parano said. "This concentration of vessels raises the possibility of accidents or damage due to faulty equipment, lack of knowledge, and the most serious of violations, operating a vessel while under the influence of alcohol or drugs."

Colonel Parano urged boaters to avoid overloading their boats. "With so many people wanting to be aboard a boat in the spectator flotilla, marine police patrols will guard against the potential to overload pleasure and charter crafts heading for the celebration," he said.

"They are fully prepared
