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Resource recovery battle....

City adds charges to pending litigation

New charges have been added to pending litigation filed by the City of Rahway against county officials in the ongoing battle over resource recovery.

At a press conference held on Tuesday, Sept. 30, Mayor Daniel L. Martin released a statement that charges County Council Robert Doherty, and Freeholders Richard Malgran, Paul O'Keefe and James Fulcomer with an "illicit conspiracy."

Martin said a request for a meeting between the administration and the Freeholder Board was suppressed by Doherty and O'Keefe.

"It has become clear to us that the main intention of County government in these negotiations has been to cover-up and protect a conspiracy between Freeholder Richard Malgran and Freeholder James Fulcomer, and possibly others," stated the Mayor. "We have not been given any indication that anyone with the County is concerned about good government, about integrity or about the interests of the people of Union County. All County efforts have been directed toward one thing and one thing only -- to protect this illicit conspiracy."

Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett said a "deal" had been struck whereby Fulcomer was promised the chairmanship of the Utilities Authority and Malgran would be chosen as its lawyer.

"There were rumors that a deal had been made," said Hartnett. "The result of bringing this litigation is that

we found out they are not rumors, they are facts. A deal was made by certain Union County officials."

Martin's statement released to the press included the charges that Malgran agreed to support Fulcomer as chairman of the authority in exchange for Malgran's appointment as general counsel, and that O'Keefe and Doherty had knowledge of this "illicit conspiracy."

"We wish to again emphasize that the real issues in this matter are not the chairmanship of the authority or any other positions for Rahway," said Martin. "It has fallen to Rahway to

stand-up on behalf of everyone for good government and for integrity in government. This is the largest single project ever undertaken in Union County. It is the only project which directly affects every single citizen and every business in the county. We will not allow it to be tainted by the blind ambition of Freeholders Fulcomer and Malgran or anyone else."

Martin said that if differences are not resolved in the issue of resource recovery in Rahway would be put back on a referendum. "The administration will not make the decision

for the City," he said. "We will not change our course without going to a referendum."

James Fulcomer, when asked about his reaction to these additional charges, stated, "The Utilities Authority doesn't even have a budget to hire an attorney, and no attorney has approached me for the position. Mr. Malgran and Mr. O'Keefe don't have a vote on the authority."

Fulcomer added, "This is an allegation without any substance whatsoever and is just another trick of the Martin Hartnett adminis-

tration in a devious campaign at the taxpayers' expense to get Martin re-elected Mayor and Hartnett reappointed business administrator.

"They think they can pull the wool over the eyes of the voters by using a lawsuit with false charges to help their campaign."

"All of these wild and false accusations are part of a sour grapes campaign to cover up their personal humiliation of having lost the chairmanship of the Utilities Authority by a landslide vote," Fulcomer concluded.

Lee Erwin to sustain organ tradition at Arts Center

A Union County Arts Center spokesman has released the following information:

In 1908, a resourceful theater owner in Seattle, Washington decided to install a pipe organ for the accompaniment of silent films, thereby approximating the effect of an orchestra with a single musician. Most large film theaters from that day forward followed this original example, and the organ interlude became a cinema tradition.

Lee Erwin is among the musicians who have kept this uniquely American tradition alive through concerts on restored theatre pipe organs. One such instrument in our area is the 1928 Wurliitzer at the Union County Arts center (the former Rahway Theatre) on Irving Street in downtown Rahway.

Mr. Erwin, who has a classical organ background, but made his name in radio during the 1930s and '40s, will perform on the Rahway Wurliitzer Saturday, October 4 at 8 p.m. A \$5 donation is required for admission. Proceeds will go toward continuing restoration of the Rahway Theatre.

The event will mark Lee Erwin's second appearance at the landmark Rahway facility, the first having been in April of this year. On that occasion, the former soap opera organist and music arranger for the Arthur Godfrey TV shows, drew a sizeable crowd.

On October 4, Erwin will accompany two classic silent films, one starring Buster Keaton; the other a short feature with Wallace Beery and Gloria Swanson. The program will also include a mini-concert and some miscellaneous musical diversions.

Humanitarians honored by Rahway Hospital

In a ceremony held Tuesday evening, September 16, Rahway Hospital presented its Humanitarian Award to Arthur Klose of Linden and Frank Light, M.D., of Clark. Over 90 members of the community and hospital family turned out for the fourteenth annual awards presentation.

The Human Relations Committee of the hospital's Board of Governors created the Humanitarian Award in 1973 to honor those people and groups who have demonstrated a concern and caring above and beyond the call of duty, both to the hospital and the community.

This year's ceremony was opened by Thomas Grabill, Chairman of the Human Relations Committee. The presentation to Mr. Klose, an inactive volunteer at Rahway Hospital, was made by Phyllis Andelman, Volunteer Services Administrator. Dr. Light, Chairman of the hospital's Anesthesiology Department, was presented with

his award by Lawrence Guarino, M.D., President of the hospital's Medical Staff.

Dr. Light, who joined the hospital's Medical Staff thirteen years ago, received his medical degree from the New Jersey College of Medicine, and then went on to perform his internship and residency at the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital in Staten Island. He has earned the respect of his associates and patients alike through his unique blend of professionalism, humor, and humility. His patients appreciate his caring attitude and the tremendous amount of time he spends with them, allaying their fears about surgery. As a professional, he takes his responsibilities in the operating room (OR) and special care units very seriously, and serves with distinction on the medical executive, OR, and ethics committees.

Whether at work or at home, Dr. Light demonstrates a concern for humanity which seems to

know no bounds. He is active on the board of the Family and Children's Society in Elizabeth, a social service and adoption agency, and has served as its president. Over the years he has taken in more than 25 children while they were awaiting adoption. This is no small task considering he has seven children of his own. He has also counseled families of abused children and is in charge of the agency's fundraising project for a new building.

Mr. Klose, who has been a Rahway Hospital volunteer since his retirement from Exxon in 1982, seems to epitomize what the spirit of volunteerism is all about. Not only has he put in 1700 hours of service at Rahway Hospital, but he has also clocked the same amount of time at Memorial General. Additionally, he is an active member of the Hilda Gould Chapter of DePaul Heart and Lung Foundation, a fundraising org for this unique hospital which does not charge fee to its patients.

His volunteer activities

go far beyond his hospital work. He has taken part in the activities of the Cornerstone Lodge #229, Linden Elks, Old Guard of Elizabeth, AARP, and the Retired Men's Club of Linden. He also visits the residents of the Soldier's Home in Menlo Park, and serves as a senior warden and choir member of the church. For all of this service to the community, he was recently recognized by the Linden Recreation Department as Outstanding Senior Citizen of the Year.

Mr. Klose and Dr. Light were each presented with a bronze medallion on a walnut base and a plaque with a citation recounting their contributions to the hospital and community. The members of the hospital's Human Relations Committee, which works each year to present this award, are as follows: Thomas Grabill, Chairman, Marydel Grabill, Esther Krueger, Frank McGovern, Reverend Edward Myers, Constantine Vigilante, Reuben Washington, and Freeman Whiting.

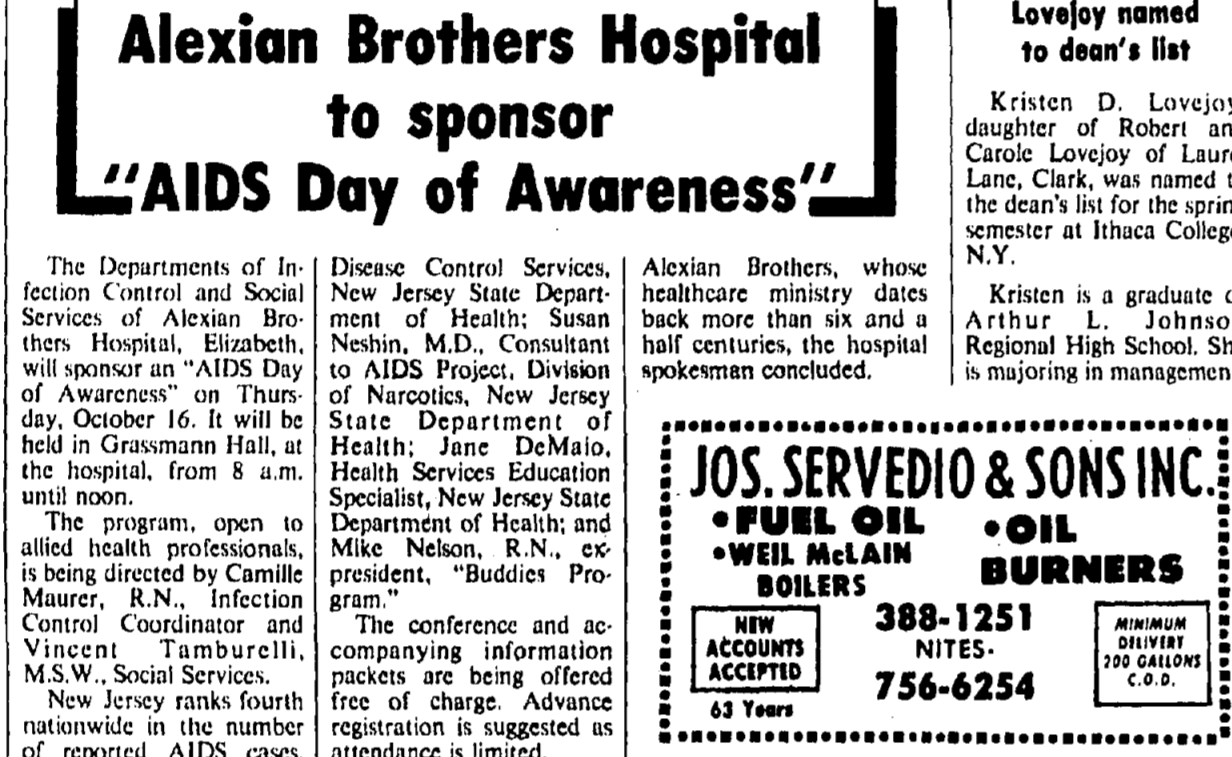

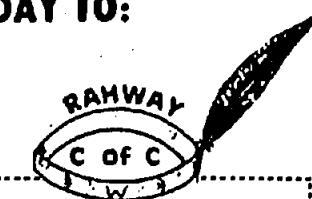
