Resource recovery battle....

City adds charges to pending litigation

by Pat DiMaggio New charges have been added to pending litigation filed by the City of Rahway against county officials in the on-going battle over resource recovery.

At a press conference held on Tuesday, Sept. 30, Mayor Daniel L. Martin released a statement that charges County Council Robert Doherty, and Freeholders Richard Malgran, Paul O'Keeffe and James Fulcomer with an "illicit conspiracy*.

Martin said a request for a meeting between the administration and the Freeholder Board was suppressed by Doherty and O'Keeffe.

"It has become clear to us that the main intention of County government in these negotiations has been to cover-up and protect a conspiracy between Freeholder Richard Malgran and Freeholder James Fulcomer, and possibly others," stated the Mayor "We have not been given any indication that anyone with the County is concerned about good government, about integrity or about the interests of the people of Union County, All County efforts have been directed toward one thing and one thing only -- to protect this illicit conspiracy."

Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett said a "deal" had been struck whereby Fulcomer was promised the chairmanship of the Utilities Authority and Malgran would be chosen as its lawyer.







Vice-chairman speaks out on resource recovery

I wish to correct some of the misrepresentations of facts by Rahway Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett in his failed attempt to intimidate the majority of the Union County Utilities Authority to make him chairman against their wills.

straight regarding misinformation coming out of Mayor Daniel Martin's partisan administration. First of all, there never has been any county governmental commitment to anyone or to Rahway to make any individual, including Mr. Hartnett, chairman of the Authority.

It is very important that the public record be set

One freeholder said he would recommend to the freeholders that they appoint Hartnett chairman and that freeholder personally kept his promise. One man's opi nion or recommendation, however, is by no means a com mitment of county government

The county tapes and minutes clearly demonstrate that the Board of Chosen Freeholders never made such a commitment. It also is against the law for the Board of Chosen Freeholders to select the chairman of the

county commitment, Hartnett and Mayor Martin has attempted to violate the fundamental concept of majority rule by their vigorous attack on the right of the majority to select a chairman of their choice. The Authority chose instead to elect, in this case, a highly qualified resident of Rahway who was active for years in promoting resource

There were intimidating letters sent to Authority members by Mr. Hartnett and comments in Hartnett's own handwriting making the threat that the project would not go through if Hartnett were not elected chairman. Many members of our Authority felt Hartnett's letters and public demands were equivalent to blackmail and that they would not allow themselves to be held hostage to such threats whether this was done by a Democrat or

by a Republican. To give in to such intimidation would be setting a bad precedent for any autonomous body. The will of the people was expressed in the 1985 Rahway referendum on resource recovery. In this referendum the people of Rahway, based on the memorandum of understanding between the county and Rahway, decisively voted to host the facility in Rahway. 

Audi 5000: Defect or Driver Error?

Recently a 74 year old New Jersey woman was pinn-

ed against a car in a parking lot as a result of an Audi 5000S, equipped with automatic transmission, suddenly accelerating from its parked position. Despite the contention of the manufacturer, Volkswagen of America, that driver error caused this occurrence which resulted in the pedestrian's partial paralysis, the episode is not novel. According to the Center for Auto Safety in Washington D.C., one out of ever 400 Audi 5000S automobiles manufactured between 1978 to 1986 has already experienced a sudden acceleration accident. In one case, a woman was pulling out of a garage when her newly purchased vehicle inadvertently propelled out of the driveway, fatally injuring her six year old son. The incidents have been so overwhelming that the Audi Victims Network has been formed to address concerns regarding defects in the vehicles. The consistent occurrences, as well as the eight year recall history of Audi 5000S's, suggests that these unfortunate accidents are caused by a defect in

the product rather than the alleged "driver error" Innocent people continue to be victimized by the Audi 5000S when the vehicle randomly and suddenly accelerates to full speed without any warning. Not only are the drivers of the allegedly defective vehicle at risk, but nedestrians, service station men and anyone within range of the automobile can and have been injured. As a resul of the high incidence of runaway Audis, some parking garages in New York City have printed warnings to employees on their parking tickets. Also, dealers in many cases have suffered damage to their showrooms, cars and employees because of the Audi 5000S' sudden accelera-

The broad range of incidents, alarming number of resulting injuries and similarity in the drivers' accounts of sudden acceleration accidents, illustrates the correlation between runaway vehicles and a defect in their design and

Regardless of the manufacturer's theory that the sudden acceleration is due to human error, their gratuitous compensation of victims appears contrary to that position. In many cases, Audi has replaced damaged vehicles with new cars, paid for property damage and voluntarily released owners from lease agreements. While Audi claims that these reparations are a "gesture of goodwill", such actions are consistent with their responsibility the recall of 1986 vehicles for a near gear shifting mechanism aimed at preventing sudden acceleration and the redesign of 1987 Audi 5000S's constitute evidence confirming the existence of a defect in the Audi 5000S's

equipped with automatic transmissions. Spokesmen for Audi have incessantly denied responsibility for sudden acceleration accidents. The nature of the occurrences, however, in both severity and scope, along with the compensatory stand Audi takes in compensating the victims, suggests otherwise. Moreover, Audi is not the only automobile manufacturer to have produced vehicles manifesting the sudden acceleration problem. For example, there have been approximately two hundred lawsuits filed against General Motors between the years 1981 and 1985 alleging defects analogous

to the sudden acceleration syndrome. Should an owner suspect that they have experienced a problem relating to unintended acceleration, or any other auto defect, current manufacture recall information may be obtained by contacting the Department of Transportation's toll free hotline at 1-800-424-9393.
