

Hall of Fame Day slated for Saturday at Veterans' Field

Twenty-two people will be inducted into the Rahway High School Athletic Hall of Fame on Saturday, Oct. 18, at Veterans' Field, during the fourth annual Hall of Fame Day, sponsored by the Rahway Sideliner.

Frank J. Cicarelli, of Rahway, director of physical welfare for the Elizabeth Board of Education, will be among the honored guests. Mr. Cicarelli is also executive director of the Union County Interscholastic Athletic Conference. He coached 1970's number one ranked high school football team in New Jersey—Thomas Jefferson High School, Elizabeth, where he had a 72-23-3 record during his coaching career. Six of his former players eventually played in the National Football League.

Woman's Club offers headquarters tour

The Rahway Area Junior Woman's Club will hold its general meeting at the New Jersey State Federation Headquarters located on the Douglas College Campus, New Brunswick, on Tuesday, Oct. 21. The meeting will commence at 8 p.m.

According to a club spokeswoman, prior to 1959, the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs met in Newark in any building where they could obtain a room. In 1959, the Federation moved to a four-room suite in the Griffith Building, where, for the first time, records could be stored. In 1964, a committee met to formulate plans for the establishment of a new headquarters.

A two-acre tract on Cliff Avenue, adjacent to Douglas College, was found to be ideal, and on October

15, 1964, the final approval for leasing land was granted by the Rutgers Trustees.

Construction began in October 1965. Over half the funds for the building had been raised by collecting trading stamps. The building was formally dedicated on May 1, 1966.

A tour of the building and a history of the General Federation of Women's Clubs will be presented to members and guests. Vacant position at RHS will be reposted by board

The position of Athletic Director will be reposted as announced by the Rahway

Board of Education at a special meeting held on October 9.

The position was down graded in title from Supervisor of Athletics to Athletic Director and will be reposted and advertised out of district for affirmative action reasons, said Board Vice President Robert Munsey. "Reposting has nothing to do with people," said Munsey, "it is a procedural decision. Did we in fact generate the largest pool of candidates for what we feel is an important position? We have an obligation to affirmatively seek all qualified candidates."

Two candidates from Rahway have applied for the position. A vacancy was created in the athletic department when Supervisor of Physical Education/Health Edward Yergolis was appointed as vice principal of the high school. Robert Polhemus has filled the supervisory position which leaves the title of Supervisor of Athletics, downgraded to Athletic Director, vacant.

Parents from Grover Cleveland School also attended the meeting to ask for an additional teacher in

response to a third grade class size of 30 students. Grover Cleveland School Principal Arthur Lamgren said enrollment was up by 17 children this year, from a total of 270 to 287. He said room was available to handle an additional teacher and class.

Business Administrator/Board Secretary Anthony Rocco said money is available in the budget to generate an additional teacher. "The business office has been supportive of the educational aspect over the years," said Rocco. "We have often spoken relative to the budget. But come February, March and April, the school district needs reserves to operate in a sensible manner."

Rocco said the budget was in better shape this year than last year when lay off notices were sent to teachers in the Rahway School system to avert a deficit. He attributed the increased reserve to the voters' approval of the Board of Education budget last April.

"When the budget goes before the people in April I hope they remember the efforts by this board," said Rocco. "We are here to serve the youngsters—that's the bottom line."

Over \$2 million awarded for county transportation

Transportation Commissioner Hazel Frank Gluck has announced a grant of \$2,312,000 to Union County for the fiscal 1987 state aid portion of the County's Capital Transportation Program (CTP).

The CTP is a four year projection of projects prepared by the County and submitted to the Department for funding from a \$38 million program under the Transportation Trust Fund.

In a letter to Freeholder Chairman Paul J. O'Keefe announcing the award,

Gluck indicated that the source of the funds, the Trust Fund, expires at the end of fiscal year 1988.

"The Department recognizes the critical need to provide funding for local transportation projects and is advocating legislation that would continue the Trust Fund and with it an expanded state aid program," Gluck said. "However, you must be aware that, at this point, funding for the current CTP beyond 1988 is not assured," she added.

Architectural firm hired for renovation of historic tavern

Vincent Parlapianno, president of the Rahway Historical Society, announced this week that "one of the most distinguished architectural firms in the state Short and Ford, of Princeton, has been hired in the first step for rehabilitating the historic Merchant's and Drover's Tavern on St. George's Avenue in Rahway."

The "Drover's," circa 1750, is the only four story masonry building in the State of New Jersey still standing from the Colonial period. The building is listed on both the National and State Historic Registers, but is suffering from severe structural deficiencies and code violations. A major fund raising historic campaign is now underway to restore the landmark building.

Short and Ford has been involved in the restoration and preservation of numerous historic buildings including the New Jersey Governor's Mansion (Burlington, N.J. State Senate and Assembly Chamber; Trenton War Memorial Building; James Fenimore Cooper House (Burlington); Albert Einstein House (Princeton); and Guarisey Hall (a large circa 1840 Princeton mansion) and several other notable projects.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin, noting that funds for hiring an architectural firm were made available from the U.

S. indicated he was quite pleased with the selection of Short and Ford. Martin indicated that the firm will provide a report on the existing conditions of the Tavern.

The Mayor said, "The intent of the report will be to obtain a thorough understanding of the building and its problems, and to set up a framework for, on going restoration. The report will provide recommendations for restoration including a priorities schedule with budget estimates for the work."

Mr. Parlapianno indicated that efforts to restore the Tavern is proceeding "right on schedule" and that repairs to the building could commence by early summer, depending on the amount of money raised.

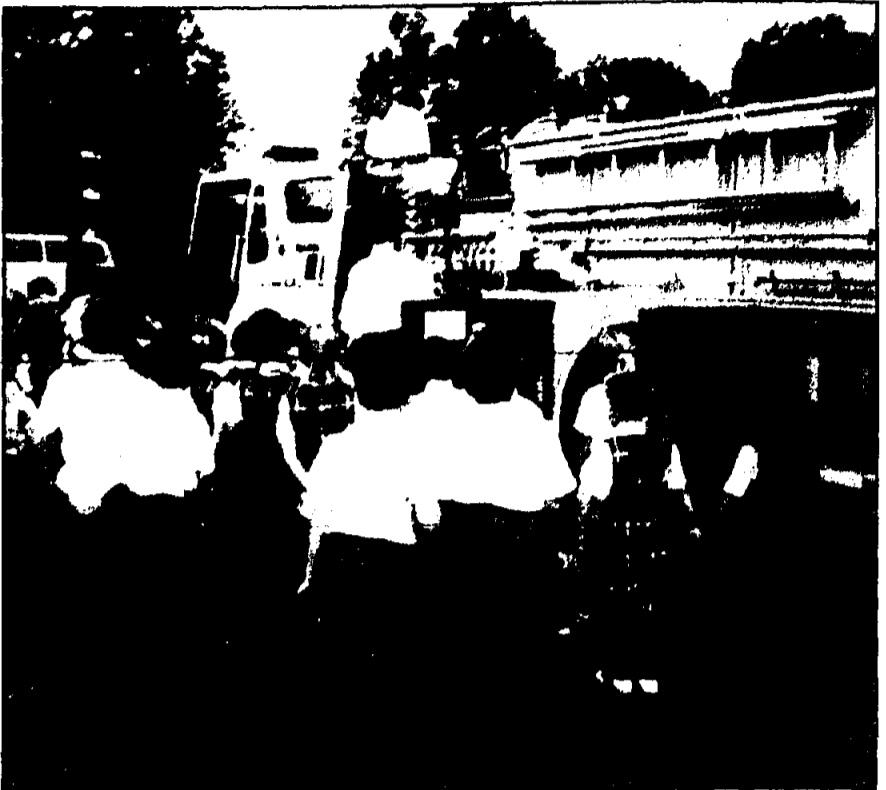

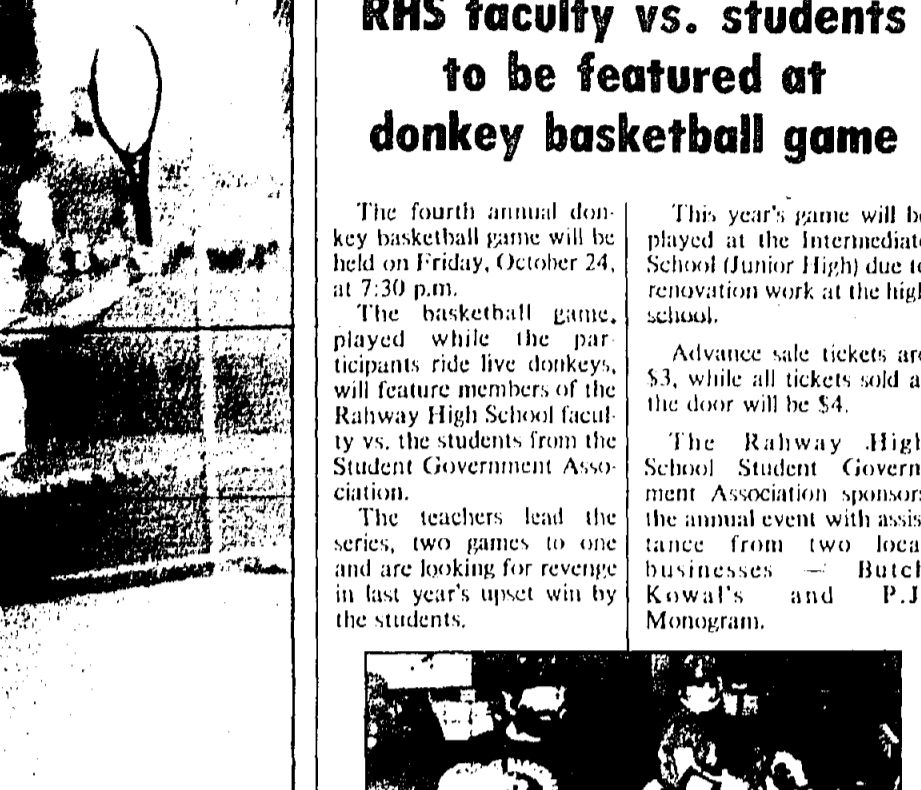

Tax rate criticized by Council candidates

"Rahway's tax rate is the second highest in all of Union County according to the Union County Abstract of Rates," charged Republican Council candidates Mrs. Diane Carvalho, and Mrs. Evelyn Wilson, adding "Cranford runs their city for \$1.9 million less in taxes than Rahway. Westfield does it for \$2.5 million less, than Rahway, and Linden for \$2.3 million less. As one resident put it when she saw the official county records, 'At this rate, if Martin gets re-elected, we'll all be broke.'"

The Council candidates, who are running with Republican Mayor candidate John Marsh, referred to a letter from Mayor Martin to the citizens of Rahway which they said "not only misrepresents the real tax picture, it contains outright falsehoods."

Quite frankly, the citizens are outraged. They view Martin's letter with disbelief — and well they should," Mrs. Carvalho declared, noting "Only Plainfield has a higher tax rate than Rahway. Furthermore, Rahway now spends 'an incredible 36 cents out of every tax dollar to run the city — compared with Cranford which spends 23 cents out of every tax dollar, and Linden and Westfield, each of which spends 15 cents out of their tax dollars to run their communities. When Marsh took office as Mayor in 1967, Rahway was spending 38 cents out of every tax dollar to run the city. When Marsh left office as Mayor in 1970, he had gotten that down to 26 cents out of every tax dollar. Mayor Martin has raised it right back up again," the candidates charged.

Mrs. Carvalho pointed out that Linden, like Rahway, provides garbage pick up and they still manage to run their city for 15 cents out of every tax dollar. Even in Cranford and Westfield, residents pay between \$38 and \$40 per quarter for garbage pick up. Moreover, "Carvalho noted, "Rahway's garbage contract accounts for only about a half million dollars in our budget so what's happening to the other \$1.4

million or \$1.9 million difference between Rahway's taxes and Cranford and Westfield?"

Mrs. Wilson pointed out "17 out of Union County's 21 towns have smaller tax appropriations for municipal purposes than Rahway," adding "Mayor Martin's reference to Linden having had a 58% tax increase this year is a real hallucination. and is now \$3.14 — that's an increase of less than 20%."

The Republican candidates concluded, "Mayor Martin's stewardship of Rahway's finances — with his campaign manager also acting as Rahway's Business Administrator — leaves much to be desired."
