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Rahway to deliver surplus food

The City of Rahway is in the process of obtaining additional cheese and flour in order to accommodate these qualifying residents who were turned away during last Wednesday's giveaway when the City ran out of cheese and flour.

Board of Education adds extra class at Cleveland

The Rahway Board of Education voted to create and post an additional teaching position at Grover Cleveland School at their regular meeting held on Oct. 20.

The move was in response to parents' request for an additional class to handle a third grade class size of 30 students at the school. Grover Cleveland Principal Arthur Luntjogen had advised the board that room was available to maintain another teacher and class.

The board also honored students David De Friesse, Bruce Howells and Susan Loughlin, seniors who placed in the top 50,000 of more than one million participants in the 32nd Annual Merit Scholarship Program.

In other business the board:

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Agreement settles resource recovery battle

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The City of Rahway and Union County officials have negotiated an agreement to end the months long battle over resource recovery.

A Host Community Agreement has been finalized whereby Rahway will be strongly represented in all future dealings with the County over the planned facility.

The \$150 million resource recovery facility, planned for a 21 acre site on Route 1, but a snag when the Rahway administration charged improper procedure in formulating the Union County Freeholders appointed Utilities Authority which would oversee construction and operation of the plant.

Mayor Daniel L. Marin charged that the chairman of the authority had been promised to City Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett by Chairman of the Freeholder Board Paul O'Keefe.

Instead, James Fulcomer, Rahway Councilman and Freeholder, and a Republican, was chosen as chairman of the authority by the Freeholders Board by the republican majority. Rahway's mayor and the Municipal Council's majority are democrats.

The City also charged that the authority was improperly created when the ordinance creating the

authority was not filed with the secretary of state.

Litigation was initiated on Sept. 10 and an injunction was obtained in Superior Court by Judge Milton A. Feller which prevented the Utilities Authority from taking any action.

New charges of conflict of interest were added last month when Marin released a statement saying County Counsel Robert Doherty and Freeholders Richard Maltran, Paul O'Keefe and James Fulcomer entered into an "illicit conspiracy."

Judge Feller offered a mediator in the dispute between the City and Union County to negotiate a settlement. Officials met with Assignment Judge Edward W. Beglin, Jr. as mediator to hammer out the final agreement which was approved by the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Union County, the mayor and council of Rahway and the chairman and members of the Utilities Authority on Oct. 16.

Terms of the agreement include:

- Rahway shall designate two members of the authority for as long as the resource recovery facility is located in Rahway.
- The office of chairman of the authority will rotate among the members and no chairman will be eligible to consecutive terms in office.

James Fulcomer will end his tenure as chairman on Feb. 1, 1987 when a new chairman will be appointed.

Rahway will have the right to have one of its representatives annually elected to either of the offices of chairman, treasurer or secretary.

The authority agreed to name both of Rahway's representatives to the Vendor Negotiating Committee, with the representative not serving initially as treasurer to serve as chair

man of this committee.

One resident from each municipality that executes a Host Community Agreement with the county for a landfill site will receive a seat on the authority.

On Oct. 16 Rahway's Municipal Council approved a resolution designating Joseph Hartnett as Treasurer of the Utilities Authority and Fourth Ward Councilman Harvey Williams as Chairman of the Vendor Contract Negotiating Committee.

In voting for the resolution Council President James Caigan said, "The big winners in this are the citizens of Rahway. It is written in stone. This is something that can never be taken away."

"Saying the people of Union County are now protected, Councilman Max Shields said, "This authority started out with two left feet. Now it can serve Union County without the political shenanigans in the past."

"This solidifies what we want for the citizenry of Rahway," said Mayor Martin. "Not only short term but for as long as we are the host community."

"It is an outstanding settlement for the citizens of Rahway," said Joseph Hartnett.

Councilman Vincent Adona said the council has been receptive to voters in Rahway. "The entire council has been sensitive to people's needs," said Adona.

NJSCPA offers five \$4,000 college scholarships

Last year the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants (NJSCPA) completed a campaign to raise additional funds for its Scholarship Awards program. After raising approximately \$145,000, the NJSCPA was able to award five \$4,000 college scholarships plus another \$20,000 in special awards at its Annual Scholarship Reception in June.

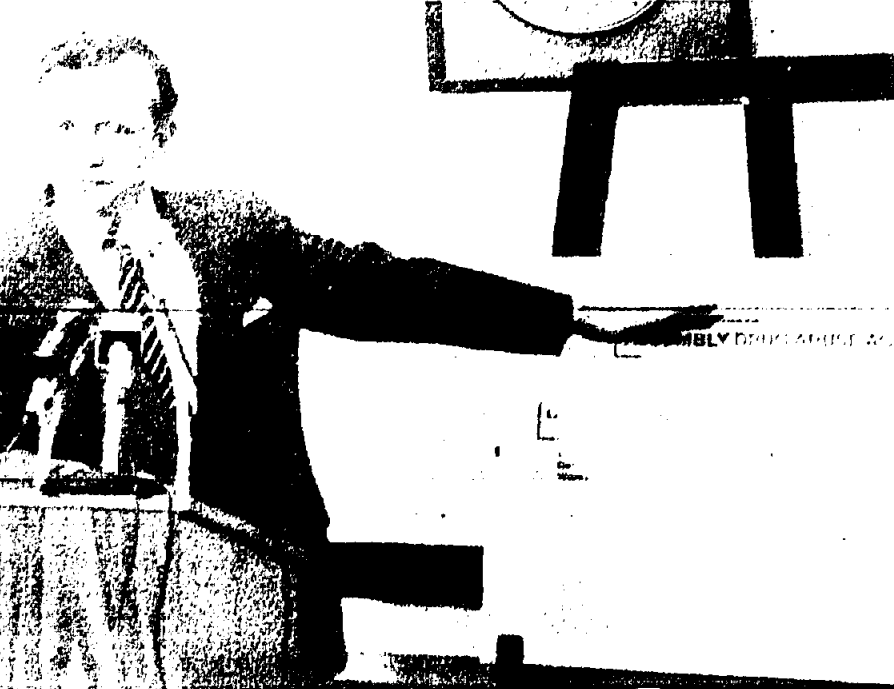
Again in 1987, the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants will be offering five \$4,000 college scholarships payable over two years to New Jersey high school seniors who intend to enroll in college and major in accounting. In addition, a number of special awards ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 will be granted.

To qualify for the scholarships and awards, students must take a 50-minute examination which is essentially a measure of those skills and abilities considered important for the study of accounting. It is commencing 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, 40, 45, 50, 55, 60, 65, 70, 75, 80, 85, 90, 95, 100 minutes.

"Mommy... Don't!" March of Dimes to launch substance abuse campaign

The March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation is launching a national campaign to prevent birth defects caused by substance abuse during pregnancy. The physical and mental damage done to babies in the womb by mothers who use illicit drugs is devastating, said Charles L. Massey, March of Dimes President. "No less tragic are the birth defects caused by alcohol, tobacco and even over-the-counter drugs taken by pregnant women without the knowledge of their physicians."

The prenatal care campaign is titled "Mommy, Don't!" which reflects the preventive action — don't take unprescribed drugs, don't drink, don't smoke — that the March of Dimes wants all pregnant women to take for their own health and their babies' health.

The year-long campaign will begin November 12 with a national day of awareness in Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Washington, D.C., and other major cities.

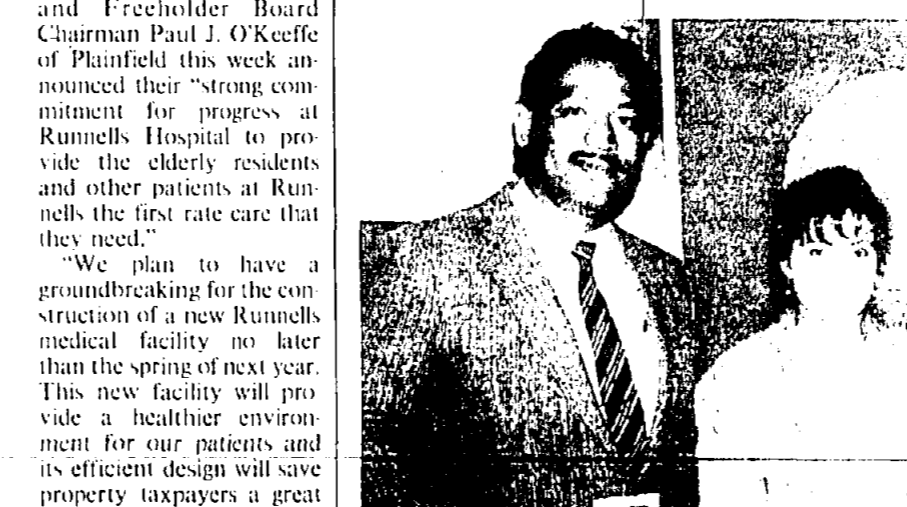

The pan can be one of following: a 12" round metal cake pan, a 12" round aluminum cake pan, a 12" round cardboard cake pan, a 12" round plastic cake pan, or a 12" round paper cake pan.

GREAT PUMPKIN "COOKIE CATS"

2 cups flour
1 cup quick oats, uncooked
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup margarine, softened
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 cup milk, "solid" Park Pumpkin

Combine flour, oats, baking soda, cinnamon and salt, set aside. Cream butter, gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla mix. Alternate adding flour mixture and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Stir in milk. Chill dough. Bake each cookie, drop in cup dough onto lightly greased cookie sheet spread into round shape about 1 1/2 inches in diameter, using a 1 1/2" metal spatula. Bake at 350° for 10 to 12 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Variation: Substitute 1 cup raisins for milk.

The Rams lead the series 10 games to 8. The Rams have won the last five games, the last Crusaders won was in 1980 by a 21-6 score.

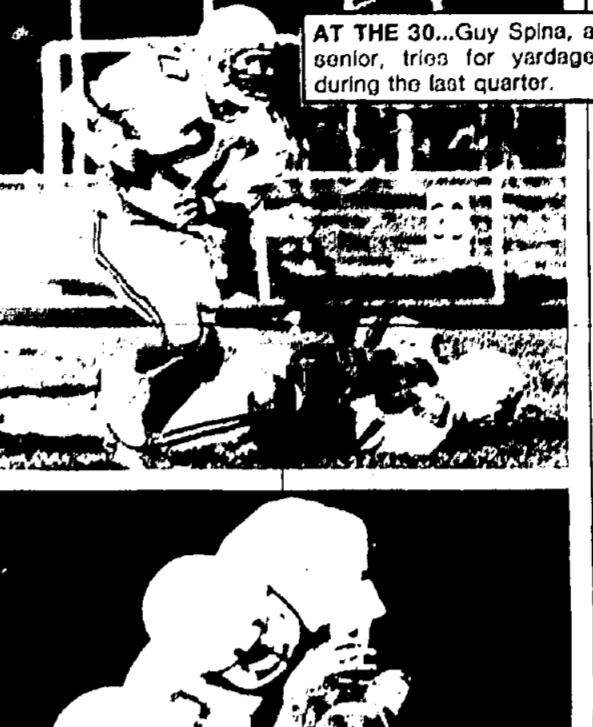

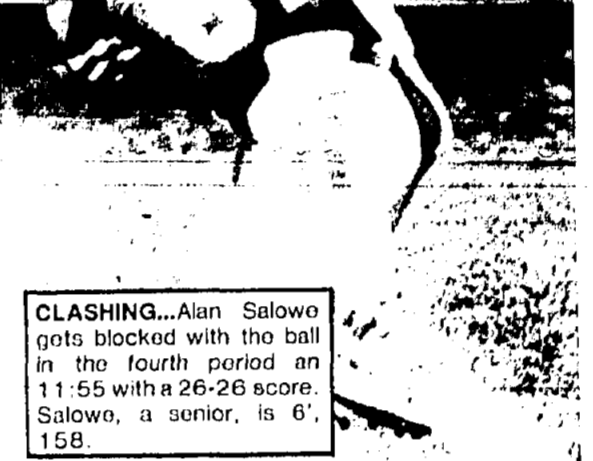

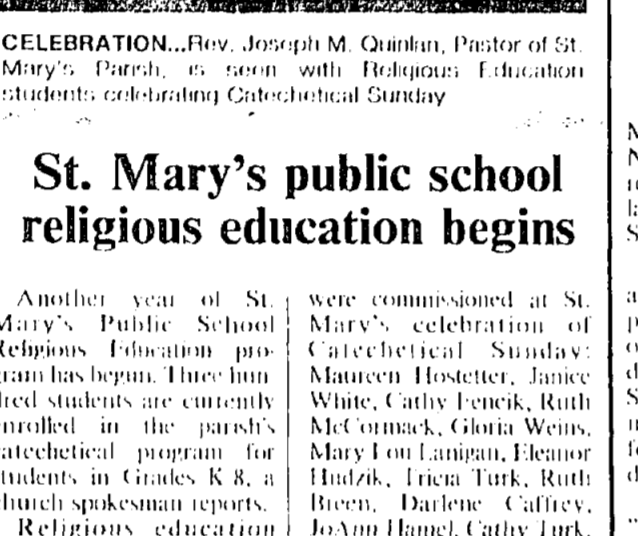

Warning: Carbon monoxide and cigarettes

It's colorless, odorless—and lethal. It can cause dizziness, headaches, drowsiness, nausea and can affect coordination.

The substance is carbon monoxide. One of its prime sources is cigarette smoke. The level of carbon monoxide gas in the blood of smokers is about four times heavier than that of nonsmokers. For heavy smokers it can be 15 times higher, according to The Respiratory Health Association, an organization devoted to promoting lung health and to fighting lung disease.

This gas has been identified as contributing to heart attacks and sudden coronary death in smokers. Carbon monoxide is present in cigarette smoke in a concentration 640 times the level considered safe and permitted in industrial plants. It has about 200 times the affinity for red blood cells as oxygen, and it is oxygen that red blood cells distribute throughout the body. Inhaled carbon monoxide quickly displaces the oxygen in red blood cells. A cigarette smoker, depending on the brand and number of cigarettes smoked, may have five to ten times more than normal life-deny carbon monoxide in red blood cells.

Carbon monoxide not only prevents red blood cells from picking up oxygen, it hinders them from yielding it in response to bodily needs, according to the RHA. There is no age limit on this effect. A teenage smoker may feel winded under mild stress on only five or six cigarettes a day. That is why a smoker who is active in sports might pant for air more quickly than nonsmoking competitors.
