and cost effective one, helping to reduce and eradicate the incidence of many preventable diseases such as rubella That epidemic resulted in large numbers of deaf children orn to mothers who contracted the disease. In another example, the Department of Health and Human Services estimates that about \$1 billion per year is being saved because of immunization against polio. While comprehensive immunization programs have ad great success in reducing the incidence of preventable. diseases, increases in vaccine prices have made it more and more difficult for states and local health agencies to provide vaccinations. The price of polio vaccine has increased by over 140 percent in the past two years, and liptheria pertussis tetanus (DPT) vaccine prices have usen more than 230 percent during that same period. The net effect of these high prices has been a reduction in the vailability of public health immunization services and in e number of children being vaccinated.
