John Marsh seeking Mayor Martin's post

Second Ward Republican Councilman John Marsh faces incumbent Daniel L. Martin in the mayoral election of Nov. 4.

If elected mayor, Marsh said he would eliminate unnecessary jobs in City Hall and in the Public Works Department. "And I would instantly go back into bidding with neighboring communities," said Marsh.

"Now Rahway just goes out and buys items on their own," Marsh said a great deal of money could be saved by pooling bids with other municipalities.

Marsh also promised to increase services for residents. "I would immediately start such programs as repairing sidewalks and cleaning sewers, going back to all City services that have been eliminated."

Implementing programs for the youth of the City would be another item on Marsh's agenda if elected mayor. "This City has two elected bodies and the only time we meet is when the school budget is defeated. I would sit down with the school system and implement recreation programs for the youth. The City would do all the general maintenance work for the board instead of them going to local contractors. In return, we would ask them to open the schools after hours to bring people back into the community. For a town the size of Rahway it is vital to make it a real community."

John Marsh served as a Councilman from 1960 to 1966 and from 1972 to the present. He was elected mayor in 1967 and served for four years. He is President of Marsh Engineering Consultants and is a graduate of City schools, the Wardlaw-Hartridge School, Union College and Rutgers University. A veteran of the U.S. Navy, Marsh is the founder and chairman of R.A.G.E. (Rahway Against a Garbage Environment) and a founder and first president of the Rahway Historical Society.

"I was a dedicated mayor to the people of Rahway," said Marsh. "I enjoyed the job and lived at the mayor's office. If it isn't you, you should get out of it. As far as Danny Martin is concerned I don't think it's in him. My concern is very deep for the people of Rahway and the City as a whole that we bring the people together. The people of Rahway have been treated like they are peons. This is not the mayor's town, this is the town of the people of Rahway."

Municipal Council race

Republicans trying to unseat Dems

Republican candidates Diane Carvalho, Evelyn Wilson and William Wnuck will try to oust Democratic incumbents for a seat on the Rahway Municipal Council on Nov. 4.

Diane Carvalho is a sales representative. A life-long resident of Rahway, she is the mother of one daughter.

She serves as a C.Y.R.C. coach, publicity chairperson for the County Status of Women Advisory Board, and is a member of the Women of the Moose, Lodge 913. She became co-chairperson of the Greenfield Preservation Committee and is a member of R.A.G.E. (Rahway Against a Garbage Environment).

Carvalho feels the primary issue in this election is taxes. "Taxation without representation," said Carvalho. "We have an council and administration that doesn't listen to the people. I see Rahway slowly slipping. There have been increases every year with this administration. Out of 16 years, taxes have gone up for 15. I am not a politician, just a concerned citizen who believes in the peoples' right to voice their opinion. They support this town with their tax dollars and they should have a right to voice their opinion on any major issue that affects the town."

Evelyn Wilson is a retired Homemaker/Tenant Counselor and is a life-long resident of Rahway. The mother of four children was drafted for the Union County Advisory Board and is a former Steering Committee Member. She was twice awarded the Rahway Jaycees Community Participation Certificate, was president of two school PTAs and a member of Union County's Council Of PTA Boards and was vice president of the Redskin Band Boosters.

The biggest issue in the

campaign, said Wilson, is the lack of City services. "I really feel that we need a change because when you have officials in for such a long, long time after awhile City Hall seems to become their own territory," said Wilson. "People just don't have much to say. Everything is cut and dried and this is the way things are going to be."

"I've been involved with services and volunteering for 46 years. I started as a young person in high school and all my children have volunteered. That's the way I've raised them, to give something to their city."

William "Bill" Wnuck is an investigating consultant. He is a graduate of Purdue University and is the father of four sons. He is an assistant coach for Rahway Recreation Wrestling and has served as a C.Y.R.C. football and baseball coach. He is a past president of the Zion Lutheran Church Loyals and has served as a Superintendent of the Zion Lutheran Church Sunday School.

Wnuck cited the Martin administration for high taxes and the lack of services. "The administration does not listen to the people," said Wnuck. "I am interested in the people of Rahway, they should be heard. If they are not heard they are being hurt. People are looking for services, less taxes and more interest from the administration. I don't believe the administration cares about the people anymore."

Martin seeking fifth mayoral term

Resource recovery which loomed as a major issue in this year's election has effectively been taken out of the mayoral race by a settlement between the City of Rahway and Union County officials.

"With the settlement of resource recovery there are no major issues City-wide," said Mayor Daniel L. Martin who is seeking his fifth term in office. "Our strongest point is respect for government. The general public respects the fact that the administration, council and the City have been acting in the best interest of the citizens."

Martin also pointed to tax stability as a long range plan. In a letter dated Sept. 22, Martin pointed to a tax increase of only eight percent for residents of Rahway ranking the City at number 18 on a list of tax increases for neighboring municipalities. On a list for actual taxes paid per residence, Rahway ranked 17th.

"As your mayor, I am particularly proud of the

fact that in terms of total taxes actually paid by residents, we have accomplished as of this year the best position in Rahway's history — a ranking of seventeenth out of the twenty — one municipalities in Union County," said Martin.

During Martin's administration the City saw the building of the new City Hall, Fire Station, three senior citizen complexes, the Geriatrics Center, expansion of public works buildings, extensive modernization in the water plant and the groundbreaking for a hotel/convention center and office buildings.

"We have to expand within ourselves," said Martin. "Business and industry have to have growth and the residential market has to expand. We have to try to establish some programs that will recognize this and benefit everyone."

Mayor Martin was born and raised in Rahway. He is a graduate of the Rahway school system and attended Union College and Rutgers University. He is a Profes-

sional Project Manager in heavy construction industry, a veteran of the National Guard and is a deacon, moderator and a member of the First Presbyterian Church. He is married and is the father of two children.

"I am not a shouter and hollerer," said Martin. "I have the people's best interests at heart. I think that I weigh the pros and cons of a situation relatively well and most people are enjoying the decisions that were made. Once in a while some people are disappointed but when they reflect back they see those decisions were beneficial to the city."

Cadigan, McLeod, Addona re-seeking At-Large seats

Three Democratic incumbents will seek reelection for At-Large seats on the Rahway Municipal Council on Nov. 4.

James Cadigan, current council president, is a former two-term elected member and president of the Rahway Board of Education. A resident of Rahway for 24 years, he is seeking his second term on the council. Cadigan is a graduate of St. Benedict's Prep School and attended Kean College. He is a construction superintendent in mechanical trades and is married and the father of four children.

"I would like to see the City administration and the council work closer with the Board of Education to improve the educational system in Rahway," said Cadigan. "The City and the school board did work

together for the renovation of the high school and I think we could do it again. The Rahway train station is, I think, a disgrace. For anyone coming into Rahway it is a terrible first impression. I vow to clean it up."

Although saying he was not a politician, Cadigan stressed that he "stands up for my convictions even when they are unpopular."

"I do listen to the people but I listen to all the people, not just the pressure groups," said Cadigan. "I am easy to get hold of and I am very responsive. I've been in office for 10 years and I feel I am still dedicated."

Vincent P. Addona is seeking his third term as councilman. A resident of Rahway for 22 years, Addona is a vocational teacher in Elizabeth and is a past

president of Rahway Parents, Teachers, Students Organization. He was educated at Kean College and Rutgers University and is married with three sons.

"We are running on our record," said Addona. "As I look around the community I see a tremendous amount of progress. Real estate values are up. We are continuing our road work and the first phase of the hotel/office buildings has started."

Addona pointed to his dedication as a council member. "I've attended 97 percent of the meetings. I am consistent. I am always at subcommittee meetings and I worked to negotiate settlements with the Board of Education when voters turned down the budget. I am always available to every body. I've answered every call that ever came into the home."

Walter McLeod is a fourteen year member of the council and is seeking his fifth term. A resident for 31 years, he was educated at the R.C.A. Institute, Union College and Rutgers University and is a supervisor for the Western Electric Company. He is a member of the Ebenezer A.M.E. Church and is married with five children.

"What people I've come into contact with have complained about is City services, the need for sidewalk repair and trimming or removing trees. One of my prime concerns is to get these things taken care of. I am also trying to resolve problems with the Permit Parking system."

Calling himself a non-political person, McLeod said he is "sincere." "I have my convictions and have an open ear," said McLeod. "I'm also easy to find."

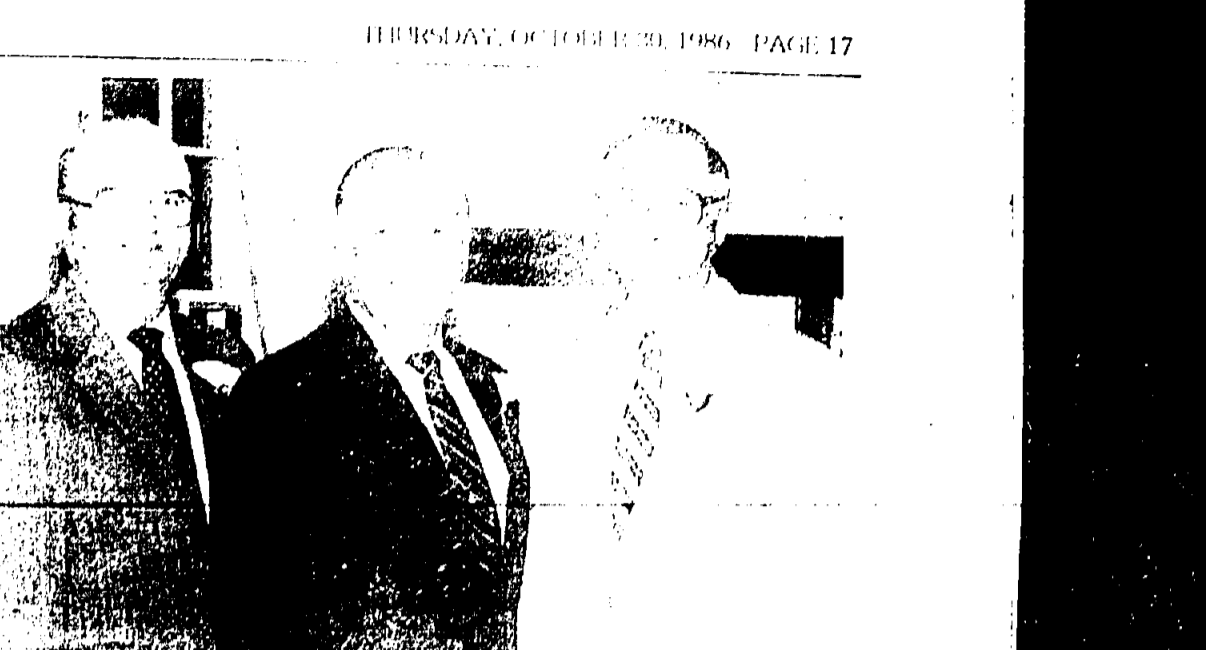
