Martin voted into fifth term

Republicans fail to unseat Democratic administration

Rahway residents voted Daniel L. Martin into a fifth term as mayor with a margin of 629 votes over his opponent, Republican Councilman John Marsh.

With 6,351 of the 13,278 registered voters going to the polls, the Democratic incumbent team of Martin and Councilmen Vincent Addona, Walter McLeod and James Cadigan will continue as the "Pride and Progress Team."

Republican council candidates William Wuuck, Diane Carvalho and Evelyn Wilson did not garner enough votes to unseat the incumbents.

"I am very elated with the confidence the people of Rahway had in us," said Martin. "All the hard work over the years proved

itself." "Rahway is in good hands for four more years," said Councilman-At-Large James Cadigan.

"People have voted on our record," said Councilman-At-Large Vincent Addona. "I'm gratified."

Martin received a total of 3,409 votes, compared to John Marsh's total of 2,861. Marsh, Second Ward Councilman from 1960-66 and 1972-present, won the majority of votes in the First Ward, First District, the Second Ward, all Districts, the Fifth Ward, Third District and the Sixth Ward, all Districts.

Martin won total votes in the First Ward, Second, Third and Fourth Districts, the Third Ward, all Districts, the Fourth Ward,

all Districts and the Fifth Ward, First, Second and Fourth Districts.

Total votes for the mayoral race are as follows: First Ward, First District - Martin 96, Marsh 101; Second District - Martin 166, Marsh 72; Third District - Martin 192, Marsh 52; Fourth District - Martin 126, Marsh 92.

Second Ward, First District - Martin 113, Marsh 144; Second District - Martin 136, Marsh 171; Third District - Martin 107, Marsh 147; Fourth District - Martin 72, Marsh 150.

Third Ward, First District - Martin 158, Marsh 133; Second District - Martin 173, Marsh 142; Third District - Martin 209, Marsh 165; Fourth District - Martin 176, Marsh 162.

District - Martin 188, Marsh 46; Second District - Martin 132, Marsh 42; Third District - Martin 203, Marsh 43; Fourth District - Martin 176, Marsh 81.

Fifth Ward, First District - Martin 133, Marsh 98; Second District - Martin 123, Marsh 86; Third District - Martin 101, Marsh 129; Fourth District - Martin 162, Marsh 122.

Sixth Ward, First District - Martin 121, Marsh 134; Second District - Martin 135, Marsh 186; Third District - Martin 123, Marsh 191; Fourth District - Martin 169, Marsh 172.

Incumbent Councilman-At-Large Vincent Addona garnered 3,419 votes, Councilman Walter McLeod totalled 3,503 votes and Councilman James Cadigan totalled 3,378 votes.

Republican candidates William Wuuck, Diane Carvalho and Evelyn Wilson received 2,636, 2,690 and 2,513 votes, respectively.

Rahway voters also chose Bernard Dwyer as a member of the House of Representatives, Ralph Froehlich as Sheriff and Walter Halpin as County Clerk.

Michael J. Lapolla, Brian W. Fahey and Gerald Green garnered the most votes for members of the Board of Chosen Freeholders in Rahway with totals of 3,253, 3,230 and 3,302. Republican opponents Paul O'Keefe, Edmund Palmieri and Janet Whitman received 2,625, 2,519 and 2,500 votes, respectively. State polls show the winners to be incumbents O'Keefe, Fahey and Lapolla.

Rahway receives housing grant

Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin and Housing Authority Director John P. McGrath announced that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has awarded Rahway a \$1.9 million grant for additional public housing units.

"We consider this a great achievement for Rahway," Martin stated, "primarily because we are one of only

four communities in the entire state to receive a HUD housing grant this year." The other communities receiving grants are Princeton, Newark and Paterson.

McGrath pointed out the grant will fund the construction of 24 new housing units, which will be located on the Housing Authority property on Leesville Avenue.

"HUD delayed releasing the announcement and we received it last week, but we are elated at the news," McGrath stated. He noted that the project will continue Rahway's compliance with the recent court decisions, known as the Mt. Laurel decisions, which require all communities to provide housing for low and moderate income families.

The Mayor commented he was "especially pleased because this grant goes hand in hand with economic growth in the community."

"Rahway is definitely prospering," Martin said, "and is in a good position to remember that there are people in need of assistance and to give what help we can."

"In times of prosperity, it's good to be able to help

those who do need help," the Mayor said.

The Mayor also pointed out the City has been trying for two years to obtain the grant. "We finally got it," he said, "and the project will be the first public housing built in Rahway since 1968."

The grant conditions require that a site be determined within nine months and construction start within twelve months thereafter. Since Rahway already has a site, McGrath pointed out, the entire project should be completed within a year.

The Mayor commended Housing Authority Chairman James Daly for "successfully pushing this project and never giving up."

"This is another example of the great track record of our Housing Authority," the Mayor concluded.

Board of Education appoints athletic director, member

An Athletic Director and Board of Education member were appointed by the Rahway Board of Education at a special meeting held on Nov. 3.

Thomas Lewis, a district teacher and basketball coach for 14 years, was chosen to fill the position of Athletic Director. A vacan-

cy was created in the athletic department when Supervisor of Physical Education/Health Edward Yergalons was approved as vice principal of the High School. Robert Polhemus was then appointed to fill the supervisory position leaving the title of Supervisor of Athletics, now Athletic Director, vacant.

Appointed as a Board of Education member to fill the unexpired term of Louis Rizzo, who died on Sept. 22, was Rev. Donald Jones, Pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Rahway. His term will expire in April.

Jones, a resident for 10 years, is married and has three children who gradu-

ated from Rahway High School and one who attends Roosevelt School. He has been involved in drug and alcohol education programs and is the Chaplain for Rahway Geriatrics Center and the Police Department. A founder of the Thanksgiving Blood Bank, currently in its ninth year, Jones is also a member of the First

Aid Squad building committee and was chosen as an Honorary Member of the Hall of Fame in 1984. "We feel we have been blessed to be in Rahway," said Rev. Jones. "Our children have received a splendid education and I'd like to share with the community some of the love they've received."

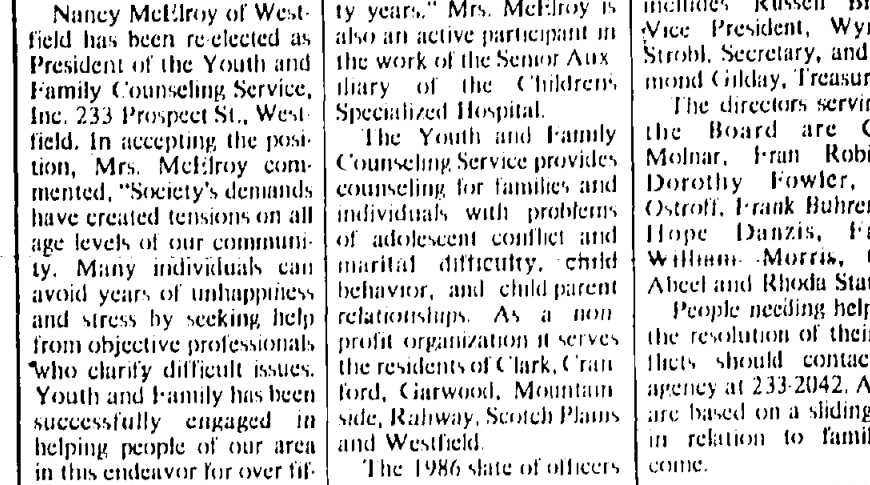

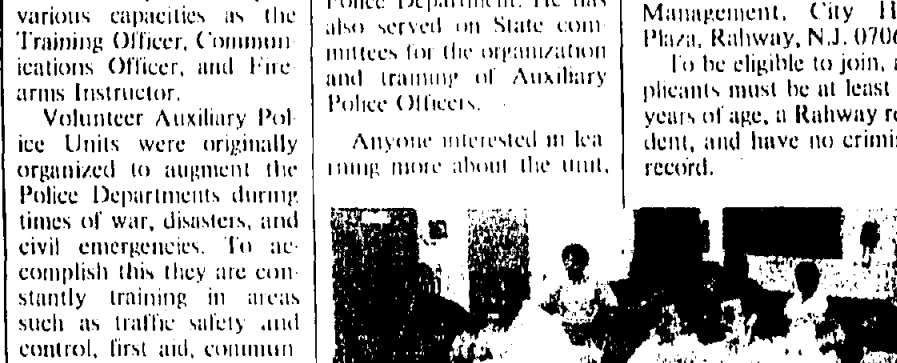

Residential tenant rights

I would like to believe that it was the successful jury verdict which I obtained on behalf of my former clients in their products liability suit against a major manufacturer which brought them back to my front door with their latest problem. I was a bit disappointed to learn that it was the availability of a parking space in front of my office rather than that of my competitor who the block that prompted my clients return visit. So much for client loyalty!

After explaining the premises, my former clients, I'll call them the Klients, explained to me that they were ex-perturbating. They were with their landlord, Mrs. Klient, who showed me a one paragraph hand written letter from her landlord which simply stated that they were to vacate the premises by the first of the month. Having received the letter only a few days earlier, the Klients were quite naturally upset since the end of the month was only two days away. Mrs. Klient explained to me that they were ex-perturbating because their landlord, Mrs. Klient, had telephoned his landlord to find out the reason why he wished them to leave the townhouse which they had rented from him in multiple occupancy. Mrs. Klient explained that the Klients lease had expired and he did not wish to renew it. The landlord also said that he himself wished to live in the townhouse and added the comment that the Klients were a violation of the lease because they allowed their pet pug dog "Fee Fee" to remain on the premises. The Klients made it perfectly clear that they did not wish to leave their townhouse and they wanted to know what, if anything, they could do to prevent their landlord from evicting them.

Florio hails approval of construction of Memorial to Korean War Veterans

Congressman James J. Florio, D-N.J., last week commended the approval of his legislation authorizing the construction of a national memorial honoring America's 5.1 million Korean War veterans.

Florio, a member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee and himself a veteran, said the House act "means that our efforts to remember Korean War veterans in a way not possible by any other means has proven successful."

The House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved the legislation. The Senate also gave its approval by an overwhelming margin. The two bills are identical, therefore, a conference between House and Senate members will not be necessary. The bill now goes to the President for his signature.

According to the legislation, the American Battle Monuments Commission (ABMC) will oversee the construction of the memorial, which is to be located on federally owned property in Washington, D.C. The ABMC was chosen by Florio and Senate proponents of the bill because of ABMC's previous track record in building, operating and maintaining military memorials and cemeteries for the United States.

The legislation also provides for \$10 million in federal funding for the memorial, \$500,000 to be allocated for site preparation and \$500,000 for initial construction costs.

Florio said private donations to the memorial will be permitted since an existing provision in the ABMC's federal charter allows the Commission to accept private tax-deductible donations for its operations.

"By utilizing this 'innovative approach,' Florio said, construction of the memorial can be begun almost immediately without having to wait years for enough contributions and donations to trickle in before beginning the construction process.

"According to Florio, the Korean War veteran is sometimes referred to as the forgotten veteran. "I do not think that is fair," he said. "There was no war without the Korean War veteran. Many had served during both World War II and the Korean War and now simply wanted to return home and resume their lives as quietly as possible once the Korean War was over."

Florio explained, "And to this day, there is no official memorial recognizing the sacrifices of these brave set-aside men and women despite the fact that the ferocity and the brutality of the Korean War was and is a matter of public record."

"Their sacrifices have gone unnoticed and time consumed for far too long. This memorial is their honor which we should have constructed more than 30 years ago," he said, which is long overdue and an plea that we now have an opportunity to more appropriately recognize their and the honorable sacrifices. Freedom comes at a price, and it is the duty of all of us to honor those who have sacrificed.

Johnson won its third game of the season last weekend when they won over the winner Bound Brook Crusaders.

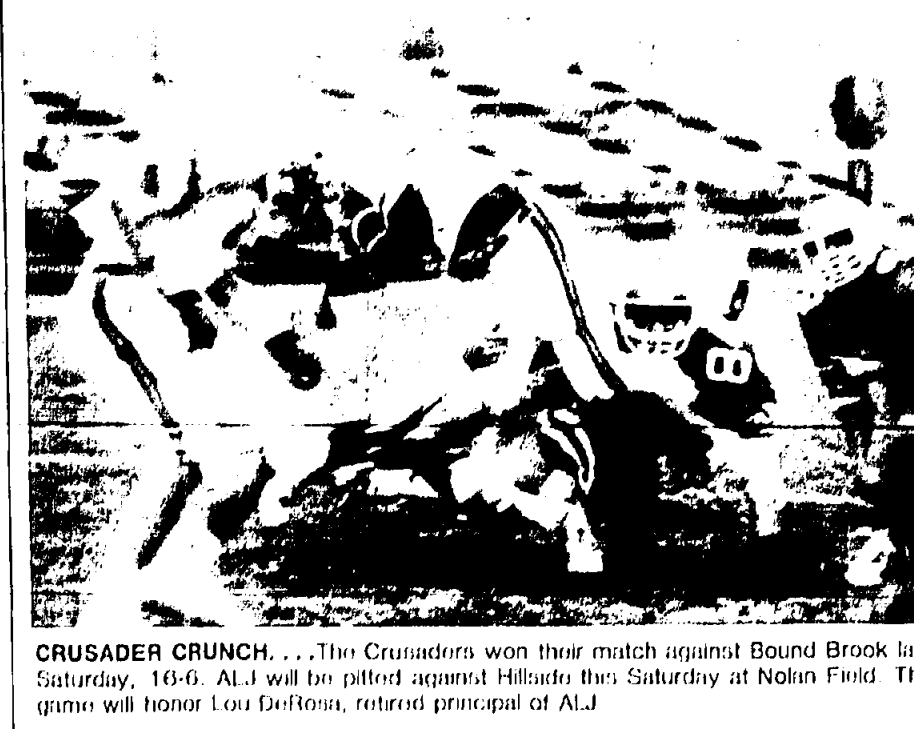
Alan Sadawo carried 12 times for 63 yards and ran for 100 yards on Saturday.

Denson, Jenkins and Toney to be honored by Rahway NAACP branch

The Rahway Branch of the National Association for Colored People will present its annual Freedom Fund Banquet and Awards Dinner on Friday, Nov. 14, 7 p.m., at the Landmark Inn, Woodbridge. Among the distinguished honorees at this affair will be the recipients of the prestigious Armed Services Award which will be presented to James Alfred Denson, Thomas L. Jenkins, and Denson Toney, announced the branch president, John J. Robertson.

Throughout United States history, Black Americans have served with bravery and distinction in the United States Armed Services, demonstrating, despite adversity and the NAACP members who have carried on this proud tradition through honorable and distinguished service, according to an NAACP spokesperson.

Recipient, James Alfred Denson, served in the U.S. Army in 1951 and was honorably discharged in 1955. His tour of duty took him through Texas, Virginia, West Germany and Vietnam. During his tenure in the Army, he attained the rank of non-commissioned officer, Sergeant First Class.

Mr. Denson was involved in the Civil Rights Movement in the early sixties where he was a participating member under the leadership of the late Martin Luther King, Jr. He has received leadership awards from the Boy Scouts of America, Father of the Year Award from Second Baptist Church, and managerial awards from the American Legion Post No. 499, a member of the NAACP Association for Post Managers, and has served as a silent force through his volunteer skills and talents.

Mr. Denson is a member of the Deacons at Second Baptist Church. He is employed on the Municipal Staff at the U.S. Postal Service in Elizabeth, and is owner and operator of J.M.D. Video Tapes, located at 31, Mrs. Toney married to Bethrotha Scott Toney and they have two children.

Thomas L. Jenkins served as a Merchant Seaman with the Merchant Marines from 1945 to 1950 and in 1950 joined the United States Army.

Applications available for development funds in Union County

The Union County Community Development Revenue Sharing Committee has begun its annual application process for available funds for community development in 19 of the 21 municipalities in the county, Donald J. Anderson, Union County Manager, announced recently.

Proposals have been submitted from the public, municipalities, and other agencies and all community municipalities, except Elizabeth and Union, which have programs of their own for the funds, made available under the Federal Housing and Community Development Act.

Applications are available to help some of the less developed neighborhoods, said William H. Hildebrand, Union County Technology and liaison to the 6-community Development Committee. "This is the thirteenth year of the program and the process has been completed."

Projects must serve the needs of the economically distressed neighborhoods to be located in an area of change or being blighted, according to Richard S. Miller, Acting Director of the Division of Planning and Development of the Union County Department of Engineering and Planning.

Many projects will be a continuation of efforts previously funded, which typically include housing rehabilitation, social service programs and public improvements such as streets and sidewalks.

All participating municipalities have been directed to hold public meetings to discuss possible projects before submitting proposals to the county.

Dates and locations of the meetings can be determined by contacting the municipal clerk or the local community development representatives at the city, town, and community Development Act.

The program will be directly administered by the Union County Office on Handicapped and is available to Union County residents, ages 18 to 65 who are physically disabled and who know what their needs are, and can direct the attendant in providing those needs.

"Preference will be given to those who are employed, preparing for employment or living independently in the community," said Colleen Fraser, Coordinator of the Union County Office on Handicapped. "They are the ones most in need of the program."

Persons eligible for the

program under Social Services Block Grant guidelines, will receive the services at no cost. Those with annual incomes exceeding \$20,000 will be asked to contribute to the cost using a sliding fee scale.

Clients selected for the program will receive 10 to 40 hours of service per week based on their circumstances, which will be assessed and planned by the client and registered nurse or social worker.

Attendants will come from various service agencies, with the client having the option to choose his or her own attendant, who will receive training and approval.

"This program is an excellent opportunity to allow the disabled residents of our county the chance to lead a more independent lifestyle," said James J. Fulcomer, Union County Freeholder and liaison to the Advisory Board on Handicapped. "I hope after the initial two-year demonstration period, this program will become permanent."

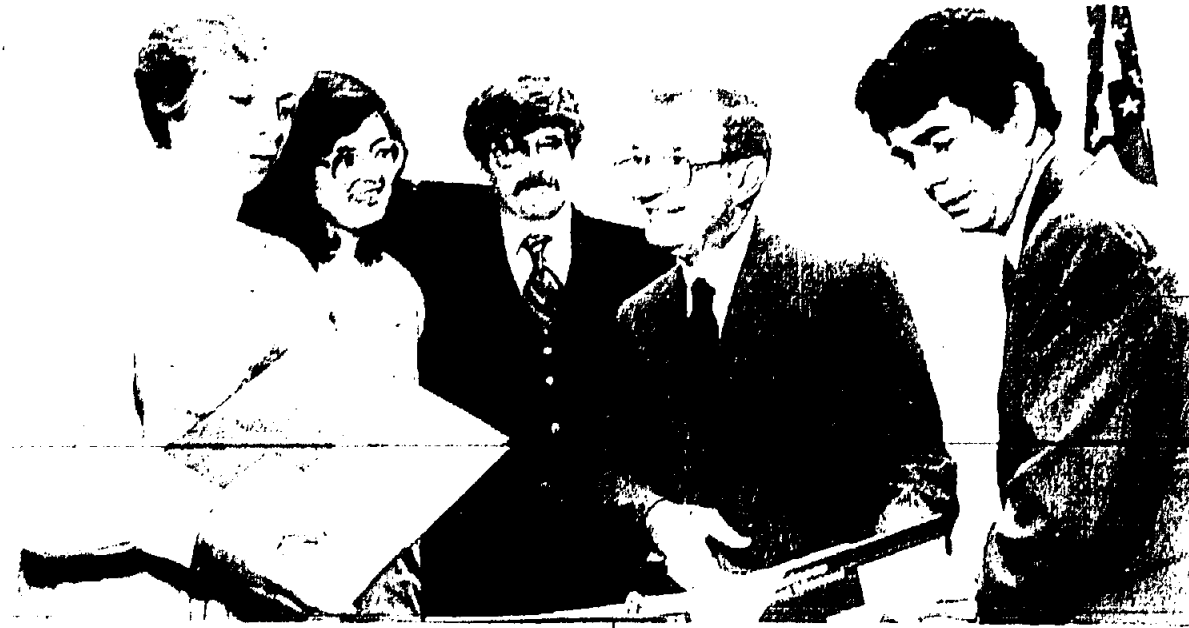

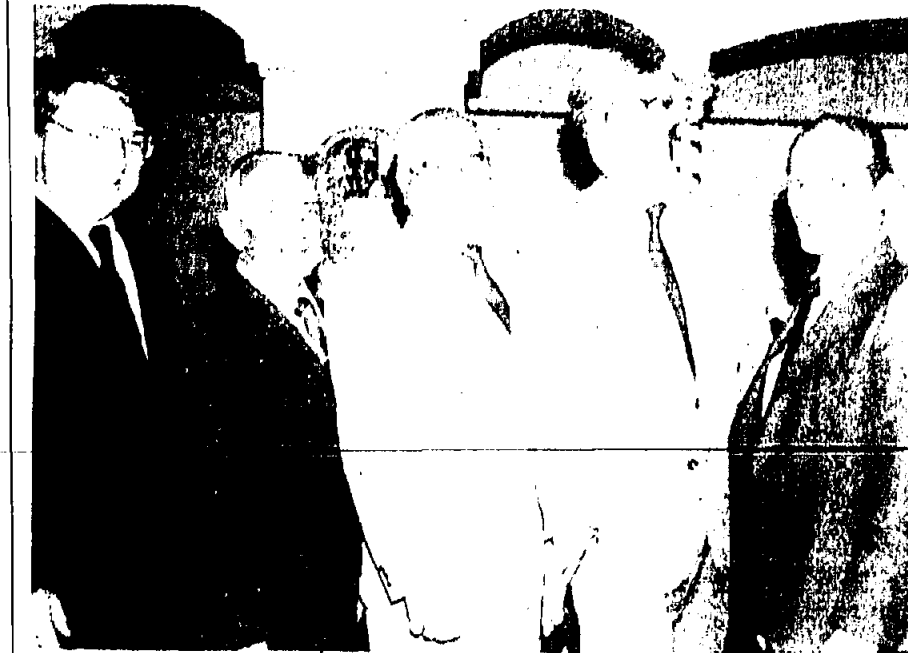
