Contamination closes four City wells

The City has shut down four of its five operating wells due to contamination. The state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has been monitoring wells throughout the state and has found a contaminant, tetrachloroethylene, to be present in Rahway's wells. The chemical is a derivative of dry cleaning fluids and degrading materials. According to Thomas Schimmel, Director of Public Works and the

Water Department, the City has requested help from the state in locating the source of the contamination. City wells 1 and 4 were closed on Aug. 13 and wells 2 and 5 were closed on Oct. 31. "We have received letters from the state advising us that the water is not acceptable by their guide lines," said Schimmel. "Wells 1 and 4 were shut off previously to the letter by our own analysis. The state said wells 2 and 5 were not

acceptable but did not advise us not to use them as a source of supply. We have terminated usage as a safety measure."
With four wells shut down and one out of service, this leaves the City with one operating well. Schimmel explained that only 10 to 15 percent of Rahway's water supply comes from the wells. "By terminating their use we are increasing our water supply from the Rahway River," said Schimmel. "It hasn't affected our operation at all."

The City is now in the process of talking with consulting engineers on proposals for designing a water treatment facility to remove contaminants, said Schimmel. "Based on these proposals we will make a determination as to the feasibility of keeping the wells running or abandoning them," explained Schimmel.

Recycling plan approved by Municipal Council

The Rahway Municipal Council voted to approve for first reading an ordinance to establish a program for recycling at the regular council meeting held on Nov. 10.

The State Solid Waste Management Act has authorized the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to amend Union County's Solid Waste Management Plan. The DEP has mandated that all Union County municipalities prepare individual recycling plans and their proposed ordinances by Sept. 14 for the recycling of at least one material. By Nov. 14 all municipalities must have adopted such ordinances and be prepared to implement mandatory source separation, collection and marketing of at least one major recyclable material within two months

of their 1987 budget adoption. Rahway's ordinance calls for the separation and collection of construction waste, aluminum cans, and other materials. The director of the Department of Health was authorized to establish regulations as to the manner, days and time of collection. The aluminum, once placed curbside, will become the property of the City and it will be a violation for anyone else to collect or pick up the material. Residents may contribute recyclable materials to other organizations, but these items must not be placed curbside.
Councilman James Fulcomer said that if Rahway joined the county recycling plan it would cost each household an additional \$18 per year. He compared this figure with an estimated \$85 per ton for

garbage to be sent to a transfer station. "There is no doubt that recycling will cost money," said Fulcomer. "By 1988 all Union County municipalities may have to send their garbage to a transfer station. Recycling at \$18 per ton is actually cheaper than \$85 per ton which would be in excess of \$100 per household."
Business Administrator Joseph Harnett said that eight communities have committed themselves to the county plan. He said that Union County government gave a cost estimate of \$18 per ton to pick up the recycled materials and said that would include 10,000 stops in Rahway or \$180,000. "This is for no additional service, just more separation," said Harnett. "It equals almost five tax points for every resident of Rahway. We have to take a long hard look at softening

this blow for the taxpayers."
Harnett suggested two alternatives to the county plan: negotiation with the City's scavenger and to look into having City employees handle the collection. "We have a lot of investigating to do on cost effectiveness," said Harnett.
The public hearing and possible final adoption of this ordinance will be held on Feb. 9.
In other business the council:

Approved a resolution adopting the Tax Assessor's report concerning the assessment for a local improvement and reconstruction of Montgomery St. from East Grand Ave. to East Scott Ave.
Approved a resolution authorizing the Rahway Police Department to purchase jointly with the City of Linden Police Department a two-way police radio system under a state bid contract.
Approved a resolution providing for the insertion of a special item revenue in the budget for a Drink Driving Enforcement Grant in the amount of \$7,840.06.
Approved a resolution opposing a rate increase by Suburban Cablevision.
Approved on a vote of eight in favor, Councilman John Marsh opposed, a resolution awarding the purchase of a portable air compressor for the Division of Water, pending certification.
Approved on a vote of five in favor, with Councilman Jerry Coleman, James Williams, James Fulcomer and John Marsh opposed, a resolution awarding the purchase of a wheel loader backhoe for the Division of Water.
Approved a resolution appointing Carol A. Kamin as acting City Clerk from Dec. 2 through Dec. 8.
Approved an ordinance to amend the Code of the City of Rahway so as to add a new Chapter 188, Vehicles and Traffic. This will be a comprehensive ordinance controlling and regulating vehicles and traffic in the City, repealing prior ordinances and providing penalties for violations.

Ballet Folklorico entertains students at Arts Center

Some achieve great things...some have a thirst upon them. Community development subject of hearing

A public hearing and special meeting was held on Nov. 10 to allow the public to add their input on Community Development Funds to be received by Rahway.

The county receives \$4 million each year from the Department of Urban Development and municipalities compete for portions of the funds.
Only one resident, Kay Papirnik, who is Rahway's senior citizen coordinator, approached the council for funds. Mrs. Papirnik asked if funds would be allocated for the senior citizen bus service. Councilman Harvey Williams said a proposal for \$31,000 would be submitted for senior activities.
Other proposed projects include a housing rehabilita-

tion program, downtown facade program and construction of a sewer on Hazelwood Ave.
Councilman Williams explained that projects must benefit low and moderate income families in order to be considered for the Community Development Funds.

Edmund Halley, the noted English astronomer, was calculating the orbit of a comet in 1682 when he discovered a strange coincidence. He noticed that the orbit of the comet was similar to that of comets which had appeared in 1531 and 1697.

Halley speculated that all three comets were simply one and the same comet with a 76 year orbit. It was not until 1758 that the comet was actually observed.

In the process of "combining" through our senses we discovered that the word comet can be traced back to the Greek word "kometes," meaning "the long haired." Hence, these "long haired" comets were named for the long, thin, icy tails they emitted.


